

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

THE ABELL FAMILY IN AMERICA

INTRODUCTION

In the adoption of the above title for this work there was considered primarily only the descendants of Robert Abell, of Weymouth and Rehoboth, Mass., as the first of this name in America, and the purpose of the subsequent pages was to show as fully as possible all those direct descendants bearing the same family name and as many as reasonably convenient of the known allied lines, who lived and acted in that brief space of time from Robert Abell the immigrant down to the present era. The gathering of these statistics is an enormous task and we make up our humble tale from many disjointed fragments, legends and anecdotes of the personages who have appeared upon the stage and upon a foundation of material collected from histories, patriotic and genealogy society records, and from private individual and family Bible records as well as public and vital records.

This work has involved endless research not only among the earliest American records but among English records prior to 1630, the date of the first immigration. Extracts from the latter have been placed in the front of the book, showing our lineal connection now proved over a century farther back to be of the Derbyshire Abell families whose arms bear the "fleur-de-lis" symbols signifying perhaps their Norman-French source or having been acquired in

that service.

In addition there have been collected in the Appendix about ten more or less complete lines a few of which are of the same trunk prior to the first immigration and one of these coming to America from Leicestershire, adjoining Derby, about a century ago where they had been established for about two centuries previously, may yet prove to be of descent from one of the two brothers of Robert Abell. At first it appeared to be far beyond the scope of this work to attempt to include the most numerous—next to our own lines the descendants of the several Abell immigrants direct from England to the colony of Maryland in the years 1649 to 1673 many of whom moved on about a century later into Virginia and Kentucky. However, in response to our circular-letter a mass of interesting records were sent in from descendants of these settlers now scattered throughout the south and southwest, and even from old Mexico. Similarly, it will be observed in the following pages that the trend of settlement of the New England lines bore consistently to the north and northwest, with two branches just over the border in Ontario, Canada. Most of the descendants of the latter have since returned to "the states" but those remaining should not be

confused with other Abell families direct from England.

As a general physical characteristic it may be claimed that the descendants of Robert Abell are of a light or fair complexion with blue or gray eyes, while many of the descendants of the Maryland, Virginia and Kentucky families are of dark complexion, dark hair and brown eyes. This may indicate different national origins, such as Saxon and Norman. A mild surprise or two was encountered in finding recent immigrants of this form of the name from Italy, southern Russia and other points of southeastern Europe. With the exception of the individual of earliest Bible history it had not occurred to us but that the name in all forms was essentially "Nordic." However, the natives of Italy admit having dropped a final "o" for business convenience. The Russian families appear to be of Hebrew origin.

Considerable confusion has resulted in the alteration of the form of the name, both by members of the families and perhaps to a

larger extent by general public usage or indifference.

In the half-century period preceding the Revolution nearly all branches of our lines appear to have omitted the final ell (1). It may have been in accord with a spirit of simplicity prevalent in Puritan life and institutions, and could not have been of mere ignorance or carelessness, as the signatures on wills, deeds and other public documents of the period will certify. The signatures of our immigrant, Robert Abell, and those records under his control, always appear in the form of "Abell," which has more recently been confirmed by discovery of the will of his father, George Abell, of Leicestershire, England. In the "History of Rehoboth" by Leonard Bliss, Jr., occur several references to Robert Abell, spelled with the double ell (ll), and on page 26 is appended the following note: "In transcribing the names in the list, as in most of the extracts from the ancient records, I have followed the orthography of the original." In most branches where the final ell (1) was omitted, the double ell (ll) form has been resumed within the last century, especially by those removing and settling in new locations, while in others the single ell (1) continues to the present day. The latter form "Abel" appears to be originally correct for people of German, Hebrew, Scandinavian and some other nationalities, whose number in America far exceed the combined Abell family lines.

Brief comment may appropriately be made also, on the matter of pronunciation. It will be news to the great majority of us that more than one pronunciation can be made of this name. However, the pronunciation as given for John Abell (A-běll'), noted singer of the period of Charles II, is becoming more and more popular among the Abell families in America. In addition to the traditional Welsh origin, and the record of Norman-French adoption into England, the historic symbol of the bell with letter "A" used in

various forms by many members of the families, unknown to each other and unaware of its antiquity, may tend to verify it as the original and correct pronunciation as well as the form of the name. We may well claim this to be true in the case of Thomas Abell, the martyr, whose indelible memorial remains to attest in the Tower of London.

The earliest recorded appearance of the family name so far discovered is on the roll of knights and men-at-arms under William the Conqueror in 1066, preserved in Battle Abbey, England, where it is inscribed in the form of ABELL. King William, after he had gained possession of the lands in England by conquest, and in order better to protect his followers in their acquired rights to the soil, sent commissioners into each county for the purpose of accumulating exact statements of the property and revenue of the kingdom wherever rents and services were due to the crown. These inquisitions or surveys were completed in the year 1086, and afterwards arranged in proper order in a record called Domesday. Through the means of this record we learn that estates or manors were managed for the crown by stewards or lords as sub-tenants. Many Normans who had rendered assistance to the Conqueror were rewarded by being made tenants-in-chief to the king. Of these tenants-in-chief there were about fourteen hundred in number. They were considered the most distinguished men of that period, and stood ready at a moment's notice to render any service that the king might require of them, whether of a civil or military nature. We find the name of ABELL inscribed in this Domesday book as an under-tenant living in the county of Kent. This may have been the progenitor of the English families that flourished in various parts of England from the conquest to the Stuart period and to the present time.

The next record found is a "summons" from King Edward I, in 1272, to John Abell and wife Sue of Kent to attend the King and Queen's coronation at Westminster. This John was probably a descendant of the Abell mentioned in the Domesday book. In 1276 William Abell is a witness to a sale of land in Castle-Bromwick. county Warwick, in the same place Richard and Thomas Abell owned land in 1353 and 1362. Abell has long been a Leicestershire name. John Abell resided at Staunton Harold in the reign of Edw. III (1326-7 to 1377). A John and Isabell Abell, registered at the Guild of Knole, 1459. During the reign of Henry VII (1485-1509), another John Abell was the progenitor of the Suffolk and Essex Abells and became wealthy in the clothier business. In central England we find a William Abell as interior decorator of the Warwick Cathedral about 1500; then the martyr, Thomas Abell, who in 1540 lost his head by order of Henry VIII, for his chivalrous defense of Queen Catharine. John Abell was rector of Newbold Verdun, in the time of Elizabeth (1558 to 1602-3). John Abell, of Desford, owned 30 acres of Leicester forest, in the reign of Chas. I (1625 to 1648-9).

Some elaboration may be permissible here of a tradition persisting in many branches of the lines of Robert Abell as well as in some non-related lines, and unknown to each other, of the Welsh origin of our family and name. If indeed it has any basis in fact, it must antedate our earliest record by several centuries. The Welsh are known to be the remnant of the ancient Britons, crowded into their mountainous retreat by the covetous Angles and Saxons who came to "rescue" them from the Picts and Scots in the fifth century. Others found refuge across the channel in northwestern France, which henceforth has been known as "Brittany" and adjoins the province of "Normandy" established by the "Norsemen" about the same period. Therefore the tradition finds plausible verification in the return, under the banners of William the Conqueror, of Sir Abell to repossess his own. Even a brother of Harold had allied himself with another invader direct from the "Northlands," paying with their lives at Stamford Bridge only a month before Hastings.

Robert Abell, Esq., was living in Bryslingcote, county Derby, in 1517. He was servant or tenant of Sir William Gresley. His grandson, George Abell, of Leicestershire, in 1578 matriculated at Brasenose College, University of Oxford. He appears to have been a member of a branch which flourished in the central counties during the 16th and 17th centuries and in which the names of Robert and George predominated. In 1636 William Abell of Northampton was an alderman of London and next year was high sheriff, in which capacity he became so cordially unpopular in his attempt to enforce the king's unjust taxation scheme, that during the protectorate he was forced to seek refuge in Holland. A few years later John Abell became a favorite at the court of Charles II, possibly a son or near relative of the high sheriff being recompensed after the restoration. He was a noted "alto" singer, i. e., of high voice, the modern tenor. It appears that he also became unpopular during the revolution which deposed James II, but found great demand and much acclaim for his talents on the continent, especially in Poland then at the height of her power.

But our story digresses from the English lines in 1630 when Robert, second son of George Abell of Leicestershire, set sail in the fleet under Governor Winthrop for Massachusetts Bay. His father's will made in September the same year "cut him off" with a "twenty shilling piece," in view of having set him up in business in London of which he had made no use and more recently of having outfitted him for New England with the hope of his safe arrival. No doubt George Abell had passed on before such a message could have been received in those days. The first American record finds Robert Abell settled at Weymouth, Mass., where on October 19, 1630, his name appears on a petition, with others, to be made a "Freeman." He took the oath as Freeman on May 18, 1631. This act endowed him with full privileges and responsibilities of citizenship in the new colony, including ownership of lands, in the exercise of which

he continued to acquire holdings, especially after his removal in 1643 to Rehoboth, a new settlement on the south side of the peninsula begun in 1642 by a party of colonists under the Reverend Samuel Newman, a minister at Weymouth for five years preceding. Robert Abell purchased the allotment first sold to Job Lane. His name appears frequently in public records up to the time of his death in 1663, including two appointments as keeper of the "Ordinary," from all of which it is reasonably to be assumed that he attained a position of considerable importance and was held in high esteem by his associates in the colony. In connection with the Inventory of his estate, administered by his widow Joanna, is mentioned his "eldest son," to whom was bequeathed the homestead, his "daughter Mary and five other children." His widow Joanna married William Hyde in 1667, and with her second husband moved to Norwich, Conn. Robert's eldest son, Preserved Abell, remained in Rehoboth, and his three other sons went to Norwich with their mother.

Probably all of the present day Abells of New England stock are descendants of Robert's three sons, Preserved, Caleb and Benjamin Abell. His fourth son, Joshua, did not leave any male descendants.

The second Abell immigration of record appears to be Captain Robert Abell (Appendix J) who came to south Maryland from England prior to 1649. The christian names of his immediate descendants would indicate that he and Robert Abell of Weymouth, the first immigrant, were of the same English ancestry, the Derbyshire branch. It appears that Captain Robert returned to England after settling some or all of his children in the colony. Much study indicates that his sons were Richard, Samuel and probably Cuthbert, James, and William. Captain Robert's descendants began to migrate in about Revolutionary times to Virginia, Kentucky and thence in general to the south and southwest.

Other immigrants to south Maryland were James Abell, a servant transported 1664; Charles Abell, a servant, transported 1669; Robert Abell, transported 1675; and Hendrick Abell, a cordwainer, came in on his own resources in 1667, bringing his wife Sophia and children, Joseph, Macklett and Gartrick. No descendants of these immigrants, of a certainty, have been established, although under Appendices C, G and H, there are several Abell families listed whose connections have not been determined but some of them may be the descendants of one or more of the above immigrants.

The next immigrant of record appears to be Daniel Abell (Appendix D), born in Yorkshire, England, in 1730. His first American record is his marriage to Susanna Clark of Freehold, N. J., in 1751. It is believed by some of his living descendants that he was a pirate but his prompt reception into polite society surely proves that if ever he shipped on a pirate craft, it must have been under duress.

In 1736 we find in Orange County, Va., a Joseph Abell (Appendix B) who might have been the immigrant and progenitor of the

Abells in Virginia. It is quite probable that his connection with the New England families may be established through the unknown fifth one of the "five other children" mentioned in the will of Robert Abell, or a connection might be established through Richard Abell, son of Captain Robert Abell, who was in Maryland prior to 1649. Special attention is directed to the similarity to the New England families of the names, Caleb, Joshua and Benjamin, continuing with them to the present day. This can hardly be classed as a mere accident or coincidence, and may prove to be of aid in the fulfillment of that persistent tradition of "one of the brothers settled in Virginia."

Another distinct line of Abell folk of English descent has been added to our history. The immigrant ancestor of this line was Francis Abell (Appendix I), an English soldier of the Revolution, who surrendered and was taken prisoner in Yorktown, Va., in 1781, and upon being released elected to remain in America and married the daughter of an Irish immigrant who served on the American

side.

Another immigrant of Abell name (Appendix E), with a family of twelve, arrived in 1823 and settled in Erie, Penn., and yet another group (Appendix A) came a few years later from Leicestershire where the family had been resident for two or three centuries, and judging from a similarity in christian names, may prove descent from George, or Richard, brothers of Robert Abell the first

immigrant.

In addition to the above there have been several Abell immigrants from England direct to Canada within the last century whose descendants should not be confused with those of two branches of our own lines who settled in two localities near the Niagara frontier early in the 19th century. Descendants of the former, especially of the Devonshire, England, Abell families, now mingle with our own lines on both sides of the border. Similarly one or more pioneers of the Kentucky Abell families found themselves settled across the southern boundary in old Mexico and intermarrying with the native and Spanish families, descendants of whom have recently ventured to return as far as points in Texas.

Sincere appreciation of the labors of earlier historians and of invaluable assistance rendered by representative members and friends of the Abell families, is hereby gratefully acknowledged.

INTERPRETATION OF THE ARMORIAL BEARINGS OF ROBERT ABELL

Visitations of Derbyshire in 1569

ARMS: Argent a Saltaire engrailed Azure charged with nine fleur-de-lys Or.

ARGENT (Silver)—the Field of the Shield. A SALTAIRE—an X-shaped cross. ENGRAILED—With pointed edges. AZURE—The color of the Saltaire (Viz, Blue). CHARGED WITH—Super-imposed thereon. NINE FLEUR-DE-LYS—French Lilies. OR (Gold)—the tincture of the Fleur-de-lis.

The above is the literal interpretation of the Abell blazon as quoted from the Derbyshire visitation of 1569.

The Abell escutcheon is a perfect example of authentic heraldry and is, in accordance with the ancient laws of blazonry, correct in every heraldic detail of line, color, and design. Argent, or Silver, upon a shield signifies the purity and high resolve of the bearer. It also demanded of all his descendants the pledge that the family escutcheon shall forever remain without stain.

The Saltaire is actually the Cross of Saint Andrew. Ancient families were prone to adopt certain saints as their family spiritual guardian, and embodied the Saint's heraldic device in their family arms. Evidently the Abells of old favored St. Andrew, hence the presence of the Saltaire upon their shield. The saltaire is to be found in very many Scottish coats as St. Andrew is the patron saint of that country.


Fleur-de-lis signify that the Abells were originally of Norman-French origin and they, in all probability, settled in England during the Norman invasion. The presence of the Fleur-de-lis so prominently on the Abell escutcheon signifies that they were held in very high esteem by the Norman rulers, for only those families of the very noblest rank were given the privilege of bearing the Fleur-de-lis, which was the chief heraldic device on the escutcheon of the early Norman-French kings. It was a very rare distinction for them to share this device with others.

The fact too, that the Fleur-de-lis are of gold tineture is evidence of the highest honor. The notable thing regarding these Fleur-de-lis on the Abell shield is the fact that they are accurately placed upon the saltaire, viz, all points pointing to the chief, top, or honor point of the escutcheon. Ever so many of those shields having such devices show them wrongly placed.


The Abell arms are undoubtedly of very ancient origin and such charges as are borne upon their shield could only have been displayed by a family of more than ordinary power and privilege.

Family Numbers

The numerals placed at the left of the names of children in any family are repeated where the biographical record of that individual occurs. These numbers will be found in numerical sequence. The absence of such a number indicates that we have found no further record.




Armorial Bearings granted to various Abells in England

Abells of Kent, England



Probably of knights eligible to be called to the council of the nation.

His descendant John Abell died possessed of Hering Hall about the end of Queen Elizabeth's reign, but his son Samuel Abell was the last of the family there.

A branch remained in Buckinghamshire where six of the Abells lie buried in East Claydon Church. (See "Visitation of London," 1633-4-5.)

Abells of London, England

- 1. William Abell of Oundell in county Northampton.
- 2. Thomas Abell of Oundell in county Northampton.
- 3. William Abell of London ("Visit." 1640), Alderman of London, was elected Alderman of Bread Street Ward 1636. He was a vintner by trade and in 1637 became Sheriff of London at the time of a financial dispute with the King. While England was enduring "the miseries of Civil War" a Royalist Merchant, William Abell, left the City of London, bought the Manor of East Claydon about 1650, with the White House,

and tried to bury himself in the safe obscurity of the life of a country squire. He bore a name that was unpleasantly notorious. Master of the Vintner's Company, had been the King's tool in his illegal attempts to tax the City Companies; to escape the gibes and caricatures showered upon him in London during the Protectorate, he fled to Holland. His wealth is computed at 10-12 thousand pounds. Married Isabell, daughter of Thomas Laundiss of Beverly in county Yorks. Children:

- RICHARD ABELL, Uncle of Mary Abell Verney.
 SUSANNA ABELL; m. Henry Field of Chancery Lane, Apothecary.

- 4. William Abell, Esquire, eldest son, Lord of East Claydon, High Sheriff of Bucks, buried at Claydon 1661; held the Manor of East Claydon; married Anne, daughter John Wakering and Mary Palmer, of an old family of small landowners at Kelvedon in Essex. Daughter:
 - MARY, born 5th April 1641; m. Edmund Verney 1st July 1662 in Henry VII's Chapel, Westminster, the eldest son of Sir Ralph Verney. She died 1715. In the parish books of East Claydon it is recorded that 20s a year are given away on the 5th of June being the day of the death of Mary, the Great Bell tolling while the money is distributed. She was the relict of Edmund Verney and continued some 27 years after his decease, Lady of this Manor; and notwithstanding her lunacy she was a woman of extraordinary goodness, piety and devotion. Four children born to them: Ralph, b. 1666, d. 1686, unm.; Edmund b. 1668, d. 1690, unm.; Mary, b. 1675, m. John Keeling, d. 1696; and a dau. d. in inf. Her property which had been the subject of so much scheming reverted to the Abell family, but in 1726 her cousin William Abell sold it to Ralph Verney.
- 5. Richard Abell, uncle of Mary Abell Verney, in one record is reported to have sold the Manor of East Claydon. The Church, dedicated to S. Mary the Virgin, stands on a little eminence, surrounded by elms and overlooking the vale of Aylesbury. It has a short south aisle with Norman work.... The Church was carefully restored in 1871 by the friends of the Vicar, the Rev. W. R. Fremantle, afterward Dean of Ripon. There is a marble monument to the Abell family. Son:
- WILLIAM ABELL, Esq., sold East Claydon; m. Elizabeth, ob. 2 Jan. 1714, aet. 51. Arms: Az. a bend between 6 covered cups Or.
- 6. William Abell, Esquire, ob. Feb. 19, 1740; aet. 69, buried East Claydon. About 1726 the Manor and Estate were conveyed by William Abell, Esq., to Messrs. Portlock and Snow, Bankers of the Strand, London, who by lease and release dated 9 and 10 April 1729, in consideration of £25,

790 granted their interest to Ralph Verney, second Viscount Fermanagh from whom this Estate afterwards descended with Middle Claydon, until the Manor impropriate rectory and advowson of the Church in 1827 became vested in Sir Henry Calvert Bart (now Sir Harry Verney) the present possessor, but by virtue of a settlement made in 1813 on the marriage of Thomas Digby Aubrey Esq. to Mary Wright niece of Catherine Verey, widow and relict of Rev. Robert Verney and by subsequent agreements, eleven farms in Bottle Claydon, East Claydon, etc., have been conveyed, for term of life, in lieu of provisions of the said settlement and vested in Sir Thomas Digby Bart with remainder after his decease to Sir Harry Verney Bart. The Village, consisting of small farmhouses and cottages claims no particular distinction. The remains of a mansion probably the rendevice of the family of Abell, having over the door the arms of Verney impaling Abell, was during many years converted into an inn but is now decayed. On a tablet of white marble on the North side of the Church, at the entrance to the Chancel, the arms are given, Arg. a saltire engrailed Azure Abell. impaling Az. a bend between 6 covered cups Or. Children: RICHARD ABELL, ("Visit 1743"). A benefactor to East Claydon Parish. He settled a rent charged of 5s per annum on the Parish Clerk (probably to keep monuments of his family in a clean and decent state) which in 1786 was said to have been "lost during many years, from inability in the Church wardens and overseers to sue for the same." BRIDGET ABELL, Ob. 28 Feb. 1743; aet. 53, bur. at Claydon.

Arms. Arg. a saltire engrailed, Az. Crest. Issuant from a crescent a dexter hand and arm in mail with a gauntlet grasping a sword, the blade reversed Proper.



Thomas Abell, The Martyr

Abell, Thomas (d-1540), Catholic Martyr, studied at Oxford and took the degree of M.A. in 1516. Nothing else is known of his early life nor when it was that he entered the service of Katherine of Aragon; but it was certainly before the war of 1528, when he received a new year's gift from the King as her Chaplain. Later Katherine sent him to Spain on a delicate and rather perilous mission to the Emperor Charles V. Henry VIII had then instituted his suit for a divorce before the Legatine Court in England and had discovered to his surprise that his case was very seriously weakened by the fact that besides the original bill of dispensation for the marriage a brief had been also granted by Julius 2 which completely met some objection he had taken to the Sufficiency of the other document. This brief was in Spain and he determined to get it into his hands, by artifice. Pressure was put upon Katherine's legal advisers and through them she was induced to write to the Emperor earnestly requesting him to send it to England, as its production was of the most vital importance to her cause and she was informed no transcript could be received in evidence. Abell was commissioned to carry this letter to Spain but along with it he delivered one of his own to the Emperor, stating that he had been expressly desired by the Queen to explain that she had written under compulsion and that he particularly begged he would by no means give up the brief as in her letter she requested him to do. Thus the Emperor was made fully aware of the Queen's position and carefully avoided doing anything to prejudice her real interests at her written request. After his return from this mission Abell was presented by the Queen to the Rectory of Bradwell on Sea in Essex in which he was instituted in 23rd June 1530.

By this time the Legatine Court in England had been dissolved and Henry was seeking the opinion of the Universities in his favour, which being obtained, books were published by the King's authority to show that marriage with a deceased brother's wife could not be legalized by papal dispensation. To one of these publications Abell wrote an answer entitled "Invicta Veritas" which was printed in 1532 with the fictitious date "Lubeberge" on the title page, to put inquirers off the scent. He also preached boldly to the same effect and as an actual consequence was committed to the Tower where we find stated in a contemporary letter, he and his fellow prisoner, Dr. Cook, parson of Honey Lane were permitted by some extraordinary oversight to say Mass before the Lieutenant (Calendar of State paper, H. Hill, Vol. V, Nos. 1256, 1532). During his imprisonment, replies to his book were published which he in vain asked permission to see. He was however liberated

at Xmas, with an injunction not to preach again till after Easter. and for a few months he was again at liberty. But in July 1533 we find search made for him again by the Lord Chancellor Audeley, yet it appears that soon afterward, if not at that very time, he was attendant upon Katherine and her household. By this time the marriage with Anne Bolevn had taken place and in December of the same year a deputation from the King's Council headed by the Duke of Suffelk waited on Katherine at Bugden, to induce her to renounce her title of Queen and accept the name of Princess Dowager. This she steadily refused to do, and the deputation endeavored at first with equal little success to impose an oath upon her servants inconsistent with that, which they had already sworn to her as Queen. Suffolk and his colleagues found upon inquiry that the servants had been instructed how to reply by Katherine's two Chaplains, Abell and Baker. They dismissed a portion of the household, put the rest in confinement and carried the two priests up to London, where they were lodged together in the same grim fortress from which Abell had been released only twelve months before. At the time Eliza Barton, popularly known as the "Nun of Kent" had recently been arrested for the denunciation of the King's second marriage and she had already made open confession at St. Pauls that she had practised imposture in her prophecies, ravings and trances. The opportunity was unscrupulously used to make her implicate as many as possible of those who had notoriously disliked the King's divorce and second marriage as confederates with herself in a disloyal conspiracy, and an act of attainder was procured against them in Parliament early in the following year. In that act Abell was named, not as one of her active accomplices, but as having been guilty of misprison by concealing her treason; and it was charged against him that he had encouraged "the lady Catherine" after her divorce still to claim the title of Queen and her servants to call her so, against the King's express commands. At that time he had as a fellow prisoner in the Tower, one Friar Forest, who like himself suffered martyrdom some years later; and it would appear that though both were for the moment spared, they both at the time expected to die together. This is known from the letters they wrote to each other in prison which were printed nearly 50 years later in Bourchier's "Historia Ecclesiastica de Martvria Fratrium" (Ingolstadt 1583). Abell was of course deprived of his benefice of Bradwell; but as the charge against him in the Act was only imprison he seems to have remained in the Tower for six years longer. On 30th July 1540 he was one of a company of six prisoners who were dragged out of the Tower on hurdles and suffered at Smithfield. Three of them however were Protestant heretics and were burned at the Stake; the other three, of whom Abell was one, were hanged, beheaded and quartered for treason, the specific charges against them being denial of the King's supremacy and affirming the validity of his marriage with Katherine of Aragon. On the wall of his prison in the Tower, during his confinement, Abell carved the device of a bell with the letter "A" on it to represent his surname, surmounted by his Christian name "Thomas." This memorial of his captivity remains and is continually shown to visitors along with the other inscriptions in the Beauchamp Tower.



The Tomb of John Abell



The tomb of John Abell in Sarnesfield Churchyard, Hereforshire, England, bears on the top slab a curious representation of Abell himself and his two wives. Also a circle surrounding the compasses, square and plumb. All these are roughly carved in relief and much weathered. The following inscription in double lines is above the ornaments:

for an Architectors bed
That lofty buildings rais'd high
yet now lyes low His head
His line and Rule so Death concludes
are locked up in store
Build they that list or they that wist
for He can build no more
His House of Clay could Hold no Longer

In the contract for the new roof of Abbeydon Church he is styled John Abell, of Sarnesfield, carpenter. He built the several Market Houses of Brecon, Kington, and Leominster, etc., and is no doubt properly styled Architector, as Mr. Blashill says, a competent master builder. The same writer seems to consider the ornaments as being of later date than 1694.



Chart Showing Line of Descent from Preserved Abell, Second Son of Robert Abell of Rehoboth, Mass.





Chart Showing Line of Descent from Caleb Abell, Third Son of Robert Abell of Rehoboth, Mass.

His English Ancestry and His Descendants

EARLY ABELLS IN THE COUNTY OF DERBY, ENGLAND

SEVERAL BRANCHES of the Abell family lived in the County of Derby, England, in the sixteenth century. One branch lived in Creighton and Uttoxeter. The brothers John and Richard Abell were the progenitors of this branch. Richard died before 1536. Henry Abell who died in 1540 was the earliest known of another branch, living in Sommersall. A third branch of the Abell family lived in Norbury. The earliest found of this branch was Nicholas Abell, who died about 1557.

Most of the American Abells are descendants of Robert Abell, who lived in Stapenhill, also in the County of Derby. There is a probability that all the branches of the Abell family in the County of Derby were descendants of a common ancestor.

ABELL FAMILY IN ENGLAND

Robert Abell, Esq., of Stapenhill, county Derby. Named c. 1533-8 as of Stapenhill, in a complaint of Walter Blount (Chancery Proc. Early 725/38, 738/10). Gryseley and was at Bryslincote, county Derby, in 9 Henry VIII (1517-8) (Star Cham. Proc. 19/159).



4. Robert Abell, born in England; died June 20, 1663 at Rehoboth, Mass., son of George and Frances Abell of Hemington, Leicestershire, England; married Joanna (———), probably in England.

Joanna died in America, after 1682, buried probably in

Norwich First Burying Ground.

Robert was mentioned in his father's will 1630 as then living in New England. He came to America probably in the fleet with Gov. Winthrop, which arrived at Charles-

town, Mass., June 1630 (Savage).

The first record of Robert in America is at Weymouth, Mass., included in a list as desirous to be made a Freeman, October 19, 1630 and he took the Oath of Freeman May 18, 1631. He is mentioned at the Quarterly Court, held at Boston December 4, 1638 and June 2, 1640 at Weymouth he is mentioned in regards to land owned by John Ffussell, John Stable and James Snooke, October 26, 1642 to May 21, 1644.

Robert removed from Weymouth in 1643, probably following Rev. Samuel Newman, the real founder of Rehoboth. Rev. Newman was minister at Weymouth for four and a half or five years, then with a majority of his congregation, in 1642 removed to a place called by the Indians Seekonk, to which he gave the name of Rehoboth.

The first meeting of the original planters of Rehoboth, to be found on record, is dated at "Weimoth" the 24th of the 8th month (October) 1643; the next meeting of the proprietors was held at Weymouth, the 10th day of the 10th month (December) 1643. About the year 1643 a joint agreement was made by the inhabitants of Sea-conk alias Rehoboth, for the bringing in of their estates; that so men's allotments might be taken up according to person and estate, also for carrying on of all public charges both for present and future; furthermore the means and interest of what is here expressed is that by which lands now granted by the Court of Plymouth to the town, are to be divided according to person and estate, as is expressed in a list of 58 names. The 28th name on the list is Job Lane (underneath written) "now Robert Abell's," £50; it is evident that Robert Abell was written in after he had bought of Job Lane.

At a meeting of the town February 18, 1646 it was agreed to draw lots for the new meadow, and to be divided according to person and estate, only those that were under £150, estate to be made up 150. Robert is the 41st name on a list of 46 who drew for lots.

The 26th of the 12th month, 1651 it was agreed that Robert Abell and Richard Bullock should burn the commons round about, from the Indian fence, all on the neck, to the new meadow near, and so far about the fresh meadows as may be convenient; and they are to have 20s, for their pains, and to begin the 15th of March next, and to be paid out of the first rate.

The 28th of March, 1653 it was concluded and agreed upon, that Robert Abell should have three acres of meadow on the north side of the line, next the town, next the line that parteth the land of the purchasers and the town of Rehoboth. This meadow was given them by Mr. Prince, Captain Standish and Mr. Winslow.

Mention is made of Robert in Court Orders, June 29, 1653, June 10, 1661 and April 22, 1662.

On February 1, 1654 at a town meeting, Robert was ordered to keep the Ordinary, and on July 3, 1656, Plymouth, Mass., he is allowed by the Court to keep an Ordinary at Rehoboth. (An Ordinary is a place where meals are provided.)

Robert was at the Court of Elections at Plymouth, June 3, 1657 and on Jury at the General Court at Plymouth, June 4, 1657 and took the oath of fidelity in 1657.

On June 22, 1658 at a town meeting, lawfully warned, lots were drawn for the meadows that lie on the north side of the town in order as followeth, according to person and estate. Of the 49 names on the list, Robert was the third on the list who drew for lots. It appears that this division was

King Philips Chair

KING PHILIP'S Chair

A rare and interesting piece of furniture of the very earliest days of the New England colonies has recently been brought to light. This is a turned or Carver chair, dating about 1625 and possessing the name of "King Philip's Chair." Aside from being the rarest of early American pieces, it is priceless from an historical view point.

The chair originally the property of one Preserved Abell of Seekonk, son of Robert Abell, the immigrant. and remained in the family for succeeding generations until purchased by a Dr. Mason of Providence, who kept it until his death, when it was bought at auction by the Rev. L. S. Woodworth, whose family held it until June 9th, 1921, when it was purchased from them by Duncan A. Hazard of port, R. I.

The story about how and why the cognomen

Philip's Chair" was earned was told to its present owner, and is proved by old papers which he later discovered in the seat of the chair. The gist of these papers is as follows: During King Philip's War and two days after Pierce's fight, on March 28th, 1676,

a party of Indians crossed the river and laid the town of Seekonk in ashes, which meant the burning of forty houses and thirty barns. These houses were around the "King of the Town," now called "Seekonk Common." Only two houses were left standing, one of them being the house of Preserved Abell. Not willing to leave even these, the torch was applied to the dwelling of Abell. As the flames mounted, the Indians seated themselves contentedly around the fire to enjoy the conflagration, and one of the warriors brought out this chair, which is a large heavy armed chair, for their chieftain, Philip. When the blaze died down, and before leaving, an Indian threw a fire-brand into the chair, which consumed the bottom, but left the high frame, only scorching the parts to which the bottom was attached. These bear evident marks of having been burned, as in some places the wood is burned away as much as half

It is said that while on good terms with the English, Philip was in the habit of visiting the Abell family, and that they always brought out this chair, the big armed chair of the house, as a mark of distinction and honor, for the use of "King Philip," as he styled himself.

At this period is mention of a cushion being in the seat of the chair with the king's signature on it, but this has been lost through the centuries. Otherwise, the chair is as the famous Indian used it for his temporary throne, and the scars made by the fire bear mute witness to the fact.

See "History of King Philip's War" and "History of Rehoboth or Seekonk," each telling a story of this chair.

of land afterwards included in the North Purchase, near

Attleborough and Cumberland.

At a town meeting on May 26, 1668 lots were drawn for the meadow lands in the North Purchase and there were 79 names on the list who drew for lots. Samuel Luther is the 2nd on the list, Goody Hide the 5th, Children's Lands the 6th and Preserved Abell the 8th. Samuel Luther married Mary, daughter of Robert Abell. Goody Hide was Robert Abell's widow (Joanna) who married William Hyde in 1667. Preserved was the eldest son of Robert Abell. "Children's Lands" next to Goody Hide on the list were probably Robert Abell's other children, Caleb, Joshua, Benjamin and Experience.

Note: REHOBOTH NORTH PURCHASE, now Attleborough (Mass.) and Cumberland, R. I. It was bounded on the West by the Pawtucket River, now Blackstone; North by the Massachusetts Colony on the bay line (so called); East by territory which was afterwards the Taunton North Purchase, now Mansfield, Norton and Easton; and south by the ancient Rehoboth, now Rehoboth, Seekonk and Pawtucket. This purchase included Attleborough, Cumberland, R. I., and a tract of a mile and a half in width extending east and west (which was annexed to Rehoboth as an enlargement), and a part of Mansfield and Norton. This purchase was afterwards, viz., Apr. 10, 1666, granted and confirmed by the Plymouth government to the inhabitants of Rehoboth.

This land was a Massachusetts Bay Colony possessions and placed under Dedham for local jurisdiction. This probably accounts for the mentioning of Caleb Abell (Robert's son) in the Colonial Records at Dedham in 1665, indicating that this is as near as Caleb ever got

to living in Dedham.

The appraisers, Stephen Paine, Thomas Cooper and Peter Hunt, were deposed to this Inventory the 18th of Feb. 1663 before Thomas Willett. This division of the estate was approved of and established by the Court held at Plymouth the 3rd of Mar. 1663-4, "attested by me Nathaniel Morton Clarke of the said Court." The above held at Plymouth the 3rd of Mar. 1663-4, and deposed unto by

Joanna Abell, widow.

Administration granted unto the widow, Joanna Abell, to administer on the estate of Robert Abell deceased Feb. 29, 1663-4.

Captain Willett is requested to administer an oath to Widow Abell of Rehoboth for the tenth of the inventory of the estate of

Robert Abell deceased Oct. 5, 1663-4.

In connection with the inventory of the estate of Robert Abell are specifically mentioned his "eldest son, widow, daughter Mary and five other children," bequeathing the homestead to his "eldest son." Therefore, inasmuch as Lieut. Preserved Abell was the only child to remain on and in possession of the homestead at Rehoboth, it appears reasonable to suppose that he was in fact the eldest son. CHILD. Some records mentioned a James Abell, marrying Sarah Bowen, Dec. 27, 1686 but this appears to be incorrect. The original vital records of Rehoboth state that Sarah Bowen married Preserved Abell, Dec. 27, 1686. The vital and probate records and register of deeds do not list any individual by the name of James Abell. No record has been found that shows the name of this child. It is quite probable that a connection with the Maryland-Virginia-Kentucky families may be established through this unnamed child. (See appendix B.)

Note: Joanna, after the death of Robert Abell; m. 2d, in Rehoboth, June 4, 1667, William Hyde, who prob. came to America in 1633 with the Rev. Thomas Hooker, sojourned a short time at Newton, Mass., and in 1636 removed with him to Hartford, Conn., where he was the first minister. The time is not ascertained but he owned lands in Hartford as late as 1639, and probably went to Saybrook, Conn., soon after that. William Hyde was one of the original proprietors of Norwich, Conn., in 1660, and a man of considerable importance among the settlers frequently elected as a townsman, or selectman. He d. at Norwich, Jan. 6, 1681. No information has been obtained as to his first wife. He had two children by her, Samuel Hyde, b. about 1637, m. Jane Lee, and Hester Hyde, who m. John Post.


In the Book of Grants of Norwich, is a deed recorded to Caleb Abell, son of Joanna, and a deed to Caleb Abell, Jr., grandson of Joanna, which reads as follows: "ffour acres of meadow More or less in seven acre meadow with some swampie land bounded westerly on the highway with a bowing line and northerly upon meadow of Lieut. Joseph Backus and southerly upon the Commons and easterly upon the river, which was Given to Caleb Abell by his flather William Hide deceased and ordered to be recorded to him by John Post Executor to the will of sd Hide." Recorded Dec. 11, 1710.



6. Lieut. Preserved Abell, born in 1644 at Rehoboth, Mass. (G.S.ins.); died there August 18, 1724 in the 80th year of his age; buried in the old Newman Cemetery in what is now East Providence, R. I. He married 1st, Martha Redaway, September 27, 1667, born March 15, 1648 at Rehoboth, buried March 1, 1685-6, daughter of James Redaway. He married 2nd, Sarah Bowen, December 27, 1686 at Rehoboth. She was born February 7, 1656 at Rehoboth, died there May 14, 1704 (G.S.ins.), daughter of Richard and Ester (Sutton) Bowen. He married 3rd, Mrs. Anne West of Boston, intentions at Rehoboth, December 30, 1706, died December 11, 1723 at Rehoboth.

In May 1668 he was eighth on a list of those who drew lots for land in the North Purchase. In 1670 he is listed as a freeman of Rehoboth, and the same year John Butterworth and he are listed as surveyors of highways in Rehoboth. He was constable of Rehoboth in 1671. In 1684 Samuel Peck and Preserved Abell are listed as Grand Jurymen from

Rehoboth.

In the Rehoboth census of February 7, 1689 he is listed as a Sergeant. Ensign in 1690, and Lieutenant in Capt. Samuel Gallup's Company in the romantic expedition of Sir William

Phillips against Quebec, Canada, in 1690.

He served in King Philip's War under Major Bradford and advanced £7:15:01 towards the expenses of carrying on the war. His father-in-law James Redaway advanced £5:14:04 towards carrying on the war; his brother-in-law John Redaway served in the Narragansett Expedition. His home was burned in the destruction of the town by King Philip's ally and leader, Agawan, who sat in the same chair which he often occupied as a guest at the Abell homestead before the war.

His home was replaced by another now owned by Frank Allen Hill, which was the second one built. It seems to the writer (without a careful examination on his part) that the type of this house is not old enough to have been the second house, and perhaps is the third, although the second house may have been altered over to its present style which is of a later date.

The above is from a speech delivered by Rev. L. S. Woodworth, pastor of the Newman Congregational Church, at the dedication of Goff Memorial Hall, at Rehoboth, May 10, 1886.

(inscription on grave-stone in Norwich, Conn.); married Margaret Post July 1669 in Norwich, born February 21, 1653 in Saybrook, died November 1700 in Norwich, daughter of John and Hester (Hyde) Post. Hester Hyde daughter of William Hyde who

married Sergt. Caleb's mother Joanna Abell. He married 2nd, Mary Miller, June 25, 1701, born 1687, died after Aug. 7, 1731. She was the widow of Stephen Loomer of New London, Conn., and daughter of George Miller.

Sergt. Caleb Abell is first mentioned in the Colonial records at Dedham in 1665, petitioned for Freeman in Dedham, May 3, 1665; in 1668 moved to Norwich, Conn. In the original purchase of land when Norwich was settled, six acres having 16 rods front was assigned to Robert Wade, this he sold to Caleb Abell in 1677 and it was afterwards known as the Abell homestead. This property abutted on Town Street 16 rods, on the home lot of Morgan Bowers 72 rods, on the river 18 rods and on John Birchard land 74 rods. The location may be seen in a map on page 67 of "Caulkins' Norwich." On December 18, 1694 Caleb was appointed to keep his house as "an ordinari or of entertayment" for the


year, or until another be chosen.

In 1697 Caleb and ten others were allowed to build a seat on the east side of the meeting house on the Leanto beams for their convenient sitting on the Lord's Days. Rev. Huntington's book of "Old Houses of the Ancient Town of Norwich" names 36 men whom he supposes to have been original proprietors; but one of these was Richard Wallis and another was Caleb Abell, who in 1660 was only 14 years of age. On May 2, 1728 Caleb deeded 121/4 acres of land to his daughter, Esperience Hide. On January 12, 1727-8 Caleb deeded to his son Noah his home lot, dwelling house and barn, all lands adjoining his home lot and lands over the river (Yantic) his pasture land lying northerly and northeasterly of William Hide dwelling house (which house was on the other side of Town Street and a little to the east) lying in two parcels, together with land on both sides of Bradford brook on north side of road leading to Lebanon, except $1\frac{1}{2}$ acres on south east of brook and land near Benjamin Abell's dwelling house which he gave to his son Samuel, reserving to himself and his wife Marey the dwelling house during his life and for hers after his decease, also liberty to his daughter Hannah to dwell in said house so long as she remains unmarried and a passageway across home lot to his son Samuel to Samuel's own land.

Caleb joined the first church of Norwich before 1701. He was Sergeant of the Norwich Train Band in 1701 and Selectman in 1682, Constable in 1684 and 1706 and Townsman in 1689. In the book of Grants in Norwich, there are 38 or more items to Caleb Abell.

Will of Sergt. Caleb Abell:

I, Caleb Abell of Norwich in the County of New London & Colony of Connecticut in New England being far advanced in years and

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apprehending my great change approching, Being also of Sound mind & perfect memory, do now make & ordain this my last Will and Testament viz on this 30 day of July Anno Dom 1728 to say as follows. I do Comply with ye Divine will and resign my Body to the Dust whence it was formed whenever God shall call me hence to be here no more & my Soul I do resign to God that gave it. And respecting such worldly Estate as God hath given me I do make the following Disposition.

Impr. As to my well beloved Wife Mary having already made provision for her Comfortable Maintenance after my decease, I do hereby Confirm that and moreover do give unto her the Bed and Bedstead Bolster & Pillows we lies in the West Room together with one pair of sheets two Blankets & a Coverled and the Curtains we belong to it; and also the use of the warming pan during her occasion for it.

Item. Respecting my Eldest Son Saml I have already by deeds of Gift given him that we I have that myself able to do and what I esteem as his proportion of my Estate. But as a token of my fatherly affection for him do also give him twenty shillings money.

Item. Respecting my son Caleb I have also done for him what I thot proper by Deeds of Gift & moreover do now as a token of my love Give him the sum of Twenty shillings.

Item. Respecting my son John I have also done for him what I that proper by deeds of Gift & do also as token of my Love give him twenty shillings.

Item. Respecting the heirs of my son Theophilus deceased having before given him his full proportion of my estate do now give unto them as a token of my Love ye sum of Twenty shillings.

Item. Respecting my son Noah wt I have already given him by deeds of Gift I do now Confirm and moreover do give unto him a pair of Oxen with the Cart yoke & chains & tackling belonging thereto, and also the one half of a ten acre lot in the Sheepwalk to him & his heirs forever.

Item. Respecting my daughters Experience, Margaret, Johanna, Abigail, Hannah, I do give unto them equally an hundred acres of Land lying as Sutland in Windham to them & their heirs forever. The one half of my ten acre Lot in ye Sheepwalk I give unto my Daughter Hannah, I do give the Bed and bedding we is in the East Room, a Brass kettle a brass skillet and also a warming pan at her Mothers decease, and for her extraordinary servitude I do give her one great puter platter and two smaller ones and six puter plates to her & heirs forever. The Rest of all my Moveables I do give unto all my Children equally.

My Land at the Cranberry Pond I do order to be sold to pay the Debts & leave the disposal of it wth my Executors for that end, and I do appoint My Sons Samuel & Noah Executors of my Last Will & Testament.

And I do pronounce this and no other as my Last Will and Testament.

In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal ye date above.

The Last Will & Testament of Caleb Abel as on the other side expressed & written was by him ordained syned sealed & published as such in Norwich on the 30th of July A.D. 1728 In presence of us Witnesses



Note: Several genealogies credit Caleb Abell with a son Benjamin and a daughter Mary; the vital records of Norwich, other records and Caleb's will dated July 30, 1728 do not mention either. (See note under Benjamin Abell, No. 9.)

8. Joshua Abell, born 1649, probably at Rehoboth, Mass.; died March 1, 1725 (inscription on gravestone at Norwich, Conn.); married Mehitobell Smith, November 1, 167-, born July 4, 1655 at Marshfield, Mass., died March 14, 1684-5, daughter of Nehemiah Smith and Ann Bourne of New London, Stratford, New Haven and Norwich. Ann Bourne was daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth Bourne. He married 2nd, Bathiah Gager, November 1685, born 1660, died March 31, 1723, (inscription on gravestone at Norwich, Conn.), daughter of John and Elizabeth Gager who was son of Dr. William Gager.

Joshua was Constable in Dedham, Mass., and frequently chosen Townsman. He moved to Norwich, Conn., 1677 and became a considerable land owner, 44 land grants are listed to him of a total of about 1000 acres and he was buying others. He presented the West Church Society of Norwich, February 24, 1720-1 with the lot on which was erected the first meeting house. In 1691 Joshua exchanged his lands east of the river for the Norwich town homestead and other privileges of John Allyn, son of Robert Allyn.

His nephew Benjamin (31) probably lived with him. He lived near the center of West Church Society, now Franklin, Conn., and joined this Church in 1724. On June 12, 1684

Nehemiah Smith and his wife gave their home and 15 acres to their son-in-law Joshua Abell, stipulating maintenance for life as they were infirm from age.

On February 8, 1703-4 Joshua Abell of Norwich, Yeoman, conveys 15 acres of land to Caleb Abell, Jr. (16) of Lebanon, Mason, indicating Joshua's occupation.

Will of Joshua Abell:

Know all men by these presents—That I Joshua Abell of Norwich, In ye County of New London, Considering ye mortality of my body vc. have thought fit now in my Right understanding & memory to Settle & Dispose of my temporal estate by this my Last Will and testament. In manner following & first of all my will is vt my wife Injoy During her natural Life one third part of all my Lands & thereunto.

Item. yt She Enjoy one third part of my other estate viz. of my Chattels both Real & Personal at her dispose forever.

Item. I will & bequeath to my two Eldest daughters viz. to Anne Fitch & Martha Smith & to their husbands Nathaniel Fitch & Obadiah Smith twenty pounds yt is ten pounds to each Daughter

Item. I will all ve Residue of my Lands—tenements Goods Chattels & Estate of all sorts in what place or places soever be equally givided to and amongst my other four daughters & their husbands that is to say the fourth part yt of to my son in law Thomas Lathrop to hold during his natural life & after yt to remain to his wife my daughter Lydia and her heirs in fee Simple.

One other fourth part thereof to my Son in law John Leffingwell to hold during his natural Life & then after yt to Remain to his wife

my daughter Sarah & her heirs in fee Simple. One other fourth part to my Son in law Hugh Calkins to hold During his natural Life & then after that to Remain to my daughter his wife Phebe & her heirs in fee Simple.

& ye other fourth part to my son in law John Lathrop to hold during his natural Life & then after that to his wife my daughter Elizabeth

& her heirs in fee Simple.

All wayes provided for it is my will yt in ye division amongst my four Daughters Left with their husbands named, it shall be considered what they or any of them have Received or before my decease shall have received and they shall first be made Equal and then ye Residue equally Divided as aforesd. Excepting yt ye farm I gave to John Leffingwell shall be counted to him at Twenty pounds Less than its just worth which I consider for ye trouble he has been at in defending ye title of it. Also Excepting all my Lands in Voluntown which I will to my Son in Law Thomas Lathrop & his wife Lydia & their heirs as a free gift (for Reasons to me known) & shall not be counted to them in ye Distribution as any part of their portion.

Finally—I make my Son in law Thomas Lathrop aforesd ye sole executor of this my Last will who is hereby directed to pay all my debts & funeral charges with ye twenty pounds to my two eldest daughters & their husbands aforesd & then to assign & Sett to my wife Bethia her third part as will in ye Real as in ye Personal Estate as she & he shall agree & then by ye orders & Directions of ye perogative Court to proceed to make an Equality as above in my will ordered & then an Equal Division of what shall be Remaining as is

above Expressed.

And I doo Solemnly hereby Revoke all other wills by me heretofore made and In Testimony yt ye is my Last & testament I have hereunto Sett my hand & Seal in Norwich ye Sixth Day of November in ye year of our Lord God 1722-(Note ye words (& their heirs) were Interlined next above ye 14th Line from ye bottom before Signing & Sealing)

Note: Several genealogies credit Joshua Abell with a daughter by the name of Hannah but Joshua Abell's will dated Nov. 6, 1722 mentions Anne Fitch and Martha Smith as his two oldest daughters and names his other four daughters who were living at that time but none by the name of Hannah, indicating that Hannah was not his daughter as she was older than his two oldest daughters and was living the same time, when Joshua made his will.

9. Benjamin Abell, died at Norwich, Conn., in 1699, and buried probably in Norwich First Burying Ground; married Hannah (———), probably in 1678, died after 1717, may have been daughter of John Baldwin. She married 2nd, David Caulkins, Sr., of New London, Conn., before 1717, probably 1700, after the death of his former wife Mary, daughter of Thomas Bliss of Norwich. David Caulkins, Sr., will dated June 20, 1717, died November 25, 1717, son of Hugh Caulkins of Norwich.

On January 4, 1692 Benjamin owned 13 acres of land, abutting on the lands of Peter Cross and Caleb Abell and the Highway, land formerly belonging to Jonathan Ginnings; 50 acres of land abutting on the Commons and near Joshua Abell's land; 12 acres of land abutting on Sucksquatomecut Brook, on the Swamp, the Commons and Joshua Abell's land; 10 acres of land abutting on Beaver

Brook and the Commons, these 10 acres a grant from the Town, layed out February 1693-4. Benjamin conveyed three acres of land on the brow of the hill next to forty acre hill, December 21, 1693 to Peter Cross in consideration of two acres of land adjoining his house; on the same day, Peter Cross in consideration of three acres of land next to forty-acre hill, received from Benjamin Abell, conveyed two acres of land adjoining the said Benjamin Abell's land where his house standeth.

Court held in New London, June 6, 1699, the inventory of the estate of Benjamin Abell of Norwich deceased was exhibited, proved, accepted and ordered to be recorded. The Court granted administration to the widow and also distributed to her one-third part of the movable estate forever, and one-third part of the real estate during her natural life; to son Benjamin a double portion at twenty-one, and to six daughters equal portions at the age of eighteen years or day of marriage. By request of the widow, Joshua Abell (8) and John Baldwin were appointed overseers.

Note: Several genealogies have credited Benjamin Abell and his brother Caleb both with a son by the name of Benjamin, and Caleb's son was supposed to have married Lydia Hazen. The early land records of the town of Norwich, Conn., indicate that there were only two Benjamins and show conclusively that Benjamin who married Hannah deeded all his land to his son Benjamin who married Lydia Hazen, and he in turn deeded most of this land to his sons, his two sons Benjamin and Simon receiving the largest parcels. Further records show deeds from Benjamin to his sons, Andrew, Elijah, Oliver, Altheus and Isaiah.

The confusion undoubtedly arose from the custom of orphaned children, especially minors, being located in the homes of their next of kin and to all intents becoming members of such families. We therefore find Hannah, probably oldest daughter of Benjamin, in the household of Joshua from the death of her father in 1699 at least until her marriage in 1702 to Ebenezer Metcalf. Similarly,

Mary and Benjamin are found attached to the household of their Uncle Caleb. Four other daughters, Lydia, Mehitable, Jemima and Experience, probably youngest members of the family, may have remained with their mother and probably were taken into the household of David Caulkins whom she married.

Caleb was Constable 1719, 1720, 1727 to 1732. On February 8, 1703-4 Joshua Abell of Norwich, Yeoman, conveys 15 acres of land to Caleb Abell Jr. of Lebanon, Mason, indicating Caleb's occupation. On April 10, 1735 Margaret Abell Douglas, widow of New London, and Hannah Abell of Norwich, convey their rights in 40 acres of land to their honorable grandfather John Post of Norwich deceased, later Joshua Abell buys the rights of the same land from Caleb Abell and Zachariah and Joanna Loomis.

Rev. Orlo D. Hine on July 4, 1876 in an address found in a book called "Early Lebanon" says there is a tradition that the Abel house, which stood where Mr. Robert Peckham's house now stands, was a sort of fort (stockade, I conclude) to which the inhabitants fled in time of danger.

Hempstead says he fell dead as he was steering a scow up to Mr. Richard's sharp. The inventory of his estate was £2868, but it was not divided till 1751.

Considering my advanced years. To wife Anna, one third part of land and buildings. To my four daughters, Mary the wife of Samuel Griswold, Lucy the Wife of Benajah Bushnell, June., Abiah the Wife of John Diggs, Hannah the wife of John Edgcomb, the full value of £20 to each in Spanish milled dollars, 6s to a Dollar—to be paid by my two sons Caleb Abell & Thomas Abell—each to pay one half. To Thomas Abell my Dwelling house & my barn & the land they both stand on. All the rest of Estate to be equally divided between the two sons Caleb & Thomas & they to pay equally all debts and bequests to my wife & daughters.

The two sons are named as Executors. The Will was proved in Franklin, Apr. 3, 1787. On Apr. 11, 1789, an agreement signed by Anna Abell, Caleb Abell and Thomas Abell, describing the land and the personal property that each is to have of the Estate of Noah Abell. A metal marker at his grave reads: "A Patriots' grave 1775-1783."

He owned 13 acres of land abutting on the lands of Peter Cross and Caleb Abell and the Highway, land formerly belonging to Jonathan Genings and deeded to Benjamin Abel, 50 acres of land abutting on the Commons and near Joshua Abell's land, formerly belonging to his father, 10 acres of land abutting on Beaver Brook and the Commons, a grant from the Town to his Father. These four parcels were ordered to be recorded to him November 1712, by his

mother Hanna Calkins, administratrix to his Father's estate.

Benjamin also owned 30 acres of land upon the middle hill, abutting on the lands of John Tracy heirs, the Brook, Caleb Abell and Kingberrye's land. This grant was delivered to him as part of his portion of his Father's estate and ordered to be recorded to him by his Uncle Caleb, December 28, 1709.

D. 1787, firm in body & sound in mind & memory but knowing it is appointed to all men to die, not knowing how soon I am, I do therefore make & ordain this my last Will & Testament—and primarily & first of all, I recommend my Soul into the hands of God who gave it, & my Body to the earth to be buried in a decent Christian burial, at the descretion of my Executor hereafter named—And as to the worldly Estate God has given me, I do give & bequeath in the following manner, after my Lawful debts & funeral charges are paid.

Item—Give & bequeath to my beloved Wife Sarah all my Household Goods during her natural life, also the improvement of all the lands that I have not given to my Sons (viz) Daniel, Elijah by deeds & also the land I have given to my Grandsons Eliphalet, Ezekiel & Simon, Sons of my deceased Son Eliphalet by Deed & Will.

Item—I give to my Son Daniel for his part of my Real Estate, above what I have given him by deed, all the Land I have the South side of the Highway leading to Exeter Meeting-house, except five acres of the Meadow I had of Noah Webster, after my decease & my Wifes decease, to him & his Heirs forever.

Item—I have given to my Son Jonathan, heretofore by Deed of land I had of Abel Marsh, in full of his part of my Real Estate—I also after my decease give him one third part of my wearing apparel.

Item—I give to my Son Elijah, above what I have given him by deed, nineteen acres of land, adjoining to the Land given him by Deed, running a paralel line from the Highway to the rear of my Farm, after my & my Wife's decease to him & his Heirs forever also one third part of my wearing apparel—also five acres of the Meadow I had of Noah Webster.

Item—I give to my Grandsons (viz) Eliphalet, Ezekiel & Simon, Children of my Son Eliphalet deceased, five acres of land adjoining to the thirty acres I have given them by deed, running a parallel line with the same; provided they quit their right & title to the Norwesterly part of the House I now live in & pay to their Sister Lydia, her part of sd House & get an acquittance from her of the same & deliver the same to my Executor, then the aforesaid Eliphalet, Ezekiel & Simon are to take possession after my decease to them, their Heirs forever.

Item—I give to my Daughter Mary, three pounds, thirteen shillings & eight pence, above the twenty one pounds, eight shillings and four pence I have already given her, to her & her Heirs forever.

Item—I give to my Daughter Betty, one pound, eight shillings & five pence, above the twenty three pounds eleven shillings & seven pence I have given her heretofore, to her, her Heirs forever.

Item—I give to my Daughter, Sarah, three pounds, fourteen shillings & three pence, over & above the twenty one pounds five shillings & nine pence I have heretofore given her, to her, her Heirs forever.

Item—My Will is, that the above Legacies that I have given to my Daughters shall be paid out of my moveable Estate as far as they shall go, & the rest to be paid out of the land I have given to my Sons Daniel & Elijah by Will if they refuse to pay the Money

to be paid in one year after my & my Wife's decease the moveable part to be paid at our decease.

Item—My Will is, that my Son Daniel, have one third part of the fruit that grows in my Orchard for the term of six years after

my decease.

Item—My Will is, that my wife, Sarah, have the improvement of the South front Room in my House, also a privilege in the Kitchen. And I do also appoint my Son Daniel to be my lawful Executor to this my last Will & Testament, signed sealed, published & declared by ye sd Daniel Abell to be his last Will & Testament the day & year above written.

She was a woman of low stature, thick set, and of a firm constitution, resolute and persevering, enterprising and economical in the management of whatever came under her control or care; but few excelled her in housewifery. She was well favored, had black piercing eyes, brown hair, and well stored with animal fire which did not fail to explode whenever her orders were disregarded, and which soon put her commands in operation.

The office of Town Clerk was in the Abell family over 50 years. In 1801 Caleb Abell was elected Town Clerk of Rehoboth, this territory being part of that town. When what is now East Providence Centre became Seekonk and was set off from Rehoboth, which was in 1812, Caleb Abell was elected Town Clerk of Seekonk, and retained the office as long as he lived. When he died, his son, Preserved T., more familiarly known as Thompson, was elected and held the office until 1851.

The town records made by Caleb Abell attest that for those times he was an accomplished Town Clerk and his records compare favorably with those of the Town Clerks of the present day. He wrote a round distinct hand and the language is grammatical and terse. The records are much more legible than some which have not been made onequarter of the time.

He was a Deputy from Rehoboth to Plymouth Court in 1811, and served in the War of 1812 as Quartermaster with rank of Captain. He also served in various offices during a

period of thirty years.

Caleb's will, dated July 21, 1842, left fifty dollars to Elona Leonard, daughter of his second wife by her first husband.

He had served at the battle of Bennington and in the campaign culminating in the surrender of Burgoyne at Saratoga. After the action at Bennington, he had a miraculous escape. A stray bullet struck his gun barrel, just over his heart and glanced off leaving him unharmed. This gun has been passed down the family as an heir-loom and the imprint of the bullet is yet discernible.

Jonathan bought a farm on April 4, 1794 in Hebron, Conn., consisting of over 200 acres of land and buildings, where he evidently lived until March 23, 1798, when after selling some small pieces in the meantime, he sold the farm and buildings for \$1766.00, and afterwards sold 10 acres and a right of way on February 8, 1800, giving his residence

He was in the campaign of 1758, French-Indian War 1755-1762, Third Regiment, Col. Eleazer Fitch, First Company, entered Service May 24, 1758, discharged October 28, 1758, said to have rendered service in the Revolution as a recruiting agent, probably without pay. He may have been the person recorded as mustered in under "Lincoln Men" July 28, 1778.

And principally and first of all I recommend my Soul into the hands of God who gave it; and my Body to the Earth to be buried in a decent christian burial at the discretion of my Executors, hereafter named: And as to the worldly Estate God hath given me-I give & bequeath in the following manner—(viz)

Item—To my beloved wife Lydia, I give and bequeath one third of my Real Estate to use and improve during her natural Life-

also one third of my Household Furniture.

Item—I give and bequeath unto my two Sons Jonathan & Elias all my Real Estate, equally for quality and quantity—upon their paying my lawful Debts & Legacies to my Daughters hereafter mentioned, forever to them & their Heirs.

Item—To my daughter Betty, I give one third of my indoor Moveables and what doth not Amount to One hundred Dollars, to be paid to her in Money in three years after my decease, by my

Sons, with Interest after two years, to her and her Heirs forever.

Item—I give to my Daughter Olive, one third of my indoor Moveables that I have not given to my Wife, and what she falls short of one Hundred Dollars to be paid in money by my two Sons in four years after my decease with Interest after two years, to her, her Heirs forever.

Item--I give to my Daughter Laty, the remainder of my moveables, what that falls short of a Hundred Dollars, to be paid in Money by my two Sons in five years after my Decease, with Interest

after two years to her, her Heirs forever.

Item—I give to my Daughter Theoda, five pound in four years after my decease.

Item—I give to my Daughter Lydia, five pound in four years after my decease.

Item—I give to my Daughter Sarah five pounds in four years after my decease.

I do hereby constitute my two Sons Jonathan & Elias, Executors of this my last Will and Testament.

Phinehas Abell included in a list of Colonel Bellows' Regiment, marched from the county of Cheshire at the requisition of Major General Gates to reinforce the Army at Ticonderoga October 1776. He was a Sergeant and served

26 days.

In 1837 Rev. Alfred Abell describes his father, Phinehas Abell, as a man of a middling stature, dark sparkling eyes, an honest, upright man in all his dealings with mankind, and sustained an unblemished character. He attended to the externals in religion whatever he possessed in heart. He was of a slender constitution and seldom ever undertook in matters of deep enterprise. He followed farming as his occupation, by which means he gained a comfortable living for himself and family through life. My Mother's name before her marriage to my father was Susanna Wales and daughter of Ebenezer Wales, Esq. of Union. He was a pious godly man and highly esteemed as a Christian, and a civil magistrate. He was eminently useful in society and was a man of business and of property. He married two wives by whom he had twenty children. From among his sons arose a physician, a justice of the peace, an attorney at law, and a worthy deacon of a respectable Baptist Church and also a Baptist minister who soon died to the great disappointment of his venerable father. Susanna was the oldest daughter of Mr. Wales by his second wife, and who in time became my affectionate mother. She was a person of rather low stature, well built and of a fair countenance, possessed of a firm constitution, resolute and persevering, comely featured and of a light complexion, red or sandy hair, black eyes, was of a kind obliging disposition which she gave proof of whenever circumstances required it of her. In her bosom was awake all the tender sympathies of humanity which is one of the brightest ornaments ever lavished by nature on the female character, in which the poor and needy, the friendless and distressed found relief as far as her means would allow. She truly feared God and honored religion at home and abroad.

Abel Abell served in the War of the Revolution, enlisting April 7, 1777 as a private in Lieutenant Smith's Company, Colonel Belden's Regiment of Brigade of Gen. Erastus Walcott, stationed at Peekskill, March-June 1777. Discharged May 11, 1777. Re-enlisted June 4, 1777 as a private in Captain Warner's Company, 3rd Regiment "Connecticut Line" formation of 1777-81, under Colonel Wyllys, raised for the New Army or "Continental Line." Assisted in repelling enemy at Danbury, Conn., April 26-7; served in Parsons' 1st Brigade under Putnam along Hudson until January 1778, taking post at West Point, and began construction of permanent works there. Encamped at White Plains with Washington's main army. In 1779 served in General Heath's wing on east side of Hudson. Its light company under Captain Champion detached to Meigs' Light Regiment at Stoney Point, January 1779. Wintered at Morristown, N. J., then with main army along Hudson until reorganized. Abel Abell was probably among captured prisoners of war at fall of Fort Washington, together with his elder brother Elijah and several other members of the Abell families, being recorded in a list of 8000 men confined on the prison ship "Old Jersey." Surviving these hardships he was granted a pension for faithful service in March 1818. Other records show service as Lieutenant and as paymaster. Elijah Abell was also pensioned for service in the Revolution, probably as a commissioned officer; in later years appeared lame probably resulting from wounds received, and died unmarried at the age of 87 years.

After the war Elijah and Abel Abell established a saw and grist mill at the foot of Chestnut Hill, continued after their deaths by Jabez Lathrop Abell, who later removed to Illinois. He is said to have lived in Mass. prior to his residence at Orwell, Vt., to which he had probably emigrated with his father, Isaiah Abell, after the Revolution. He may have married in Mass. His eldest child, Oliver, probably named for his Uncle Oliver, was born at Orwell in 1789. During the Revolution while yet in his "teens" Azel acted as scout in the Lake Champlain region, and fulfilling a resolve returned and made his home in the "Pleasant Valley" district, and on September 11, 1789 purchased a tract of land from Noah Ferris on the north bank of the Little Boquet River. where he erected a log building which became Elizabethtown's first hotel, and so repeated the vocation of his ancestors Benjamin and Robert. He entered actively into local political affairs, including supervisor, inspector, road commissioner, etc., and also served as captain in the war of 1812. He appears to have carried the 'Abel' form of his name into the new settlement and it has been handed down to the present day among his descendants.

It has been a family tradition that the cane shown in the photograph was brought to this country by Robert Abell the immigrant, in 1630, and at the time the Abell house in Rehoboth was destroyed by fire in King Philip's War, one of the Abell women carried the cane with her when she sped to the garrison house for safety. The cane was last in the possession of Dr. Daniel T. Abell, of Sedalia, Mo.; was destroyed at the time his residence burned about 1890.

In the will of Caleb Abell, July 21, 1842, he leaves to his son, Daniel H. Abell, 'my Ivory Headed Cane, which came to me from my ancestors, and it is my request that it be handed down to the male heirs of our Abell family."

On April 2, 1864 Mr. Abell wrote an acknowledgment of his election as an honorary member in the Orwell Pioneer Association, contributing a lengthy and most interesting article on his personal experiences as a pioneer of that dis-

trict. He was then 87 years of age.

He appears to have returned the favor as was customary in those days and accompanied his brother Azel in establishing the latter's settlement at Elizabethtown, N. Y. (See "Pleasant Valley, a History of Elizabethtown, Essex County, N. Y.," by Geo. Levi Brown, 1905.) His name was also written as "Willis" but he was probably a namesake of Colonel Wyllys, commander of the regiment in which his father had served together with many other members of the family, in the "Connecticut Line" formation of 1777-1781.



Rose Campbell, daughter by her first husband, was rescued by Mr. Abell from being run over by a street vehicle, which happily ending incident led to his marriage to her mother.

In 1822, Mr. Abell was a printer apprentice with the "Providence Patriot." In 1827 he became foreman of a large printing office in Boston. Mr. Abell, Azariah H. Simmons and William M. Swain together established a penny newspaper but found in Philadelphia a better field, where they established the "Public Ledger" in 1836. A year later Mr. Abell was delegated by the partnership to supervise a similar venture in Baltimore and on May 17, 1837 "The Sun" made its first appearance. On September 13, 1851 the "Sun Iron Building" was occupied, the first of its kind. Following the deaths of his partners in 1855 and 1868, Mr. Abell became the sole proprietor of "The Sun," selling his interest in the "Public Ledger" in 1864.

A pony express of sixty exclusively owned horses was organized by Mr. Abell to carry The Sun's war dispatches from Mexico via New Orleans, permitting The Sun to publish the latest news in Baltimore, prior to the U. S. Government's information at Washington. By this express, the first report of the capitulation of Vera Cruz was published by The Sun before the fact was known in Washington, and it was through Mr. Abell that President Polk and his Cabinet were first informed of the capitulation, April 10th, 1847. The cost of the express was \$1,000.00 a month, a tremendous amount for those days. The use of carrier pigeons as a medium of news transmission was employed by Mr. Abell, who established in Baltimore a pigeon loft containing between 400 and 500 carrier pigeons for news service. In order to obtain the latest news from Europe, pony relays were established between Halifax and Annapolis,

Nova Scotia, a distance of 150 miles, thence dispatches were relayed by boat and train to Boston and Baltimore, the distance of 1,000 miles being covered in fifty hours.

He was the first printer to adopt the Hoe rotary press and also the telegraph as a news agency, being associated with Prof. Samuel F. B. Morse in developing the latter, and he was an incorporator of the first telegraph company, always keeping in the front by utilizing improved methods. In 1887 he transferred the management of "The Sun" to his three sons and celebrated its semi-centennial by receiving them as co-partners. On August 9, 1892 "The Sun" was incorporated as the A. S. Abell Company.

His public service was almost identical with his brother William's but at different periods, serving in the very same official capacities, except as to the funerals, and being chosen captain of the same military company. He was also associated with his brother in the trades of carpenter and mill-wright. Capt. George Abell on account of sickness was unable to serve in War of 1812 and his place was filled by his older brother William.

At one time he was the only one in Goshen who voted the Abolition ticket. His home was a station on what was known as the "underground railway" for fugitive slaves at a time when such action was contrary to law. They would come to the house at night and he would feed them and send them on to the next station. He frequently said that

some time there would be a war because of slavery and he lived to see it begun.

Said old house being the same that Joseph Waters dec'd lived in and in which I now live, also the new part of said Dec'd's barn being on the east end of the old barn with liberty of passing to said buildings and of taking them away or occupying The Grantor was Philemon Waters. No record found where he disposes of this property, but presume he went with his father as this land joined his father's and it was sold together March 23, 1798. This property located in Hebron, Conn.

Between the years 1810 and 1813, Jonathan with his family removed from Lebanon, Conn., to Duanesburg Township, and settled on a farm. On October 5, 1813, he mortgaged to Silas Marsh for a part of a farm on Lot No. 243 in Duanesburg. This property is located on the Albany-Buffalo turnpike, about one mile from Esperance. My stature is five feet and ten inches. Dark hazel eyes and dark brown hair, which has now become white with age; quick in motion, easily irritated but soon calm and reconciled, ever possessing more ambition and fortitude than strength of body to perform and accomplish, by which means my constitution has often been broken down, and my health injured, as to beauty, comliness and character I leave for those who have ever been best acquainted with me to judge.

> The writer of this sketch married for his wife, Juletten Wheelock, born at Mendon, Mass. Her mother being left a widow with a large family her farm being previously disposed of removed to Alstead, N. H. where her children being eight in number were brought up. Julettea having a sister married and living in Lempster came to live with her, which circumstance brought her within my knowledge and she became my wife, by whom I have had ten children, two sons and eight daughters, buried my two sons and a lovely daughter in their infancy. Seven daughters living and all married. One living in the State of Ohio, the other six nearly in the vicinity where it is my fortune to reside. I have at this present time 23 living grandchildren all in comfortable circumstances and peaceable habitation for which reason I have abundant reason to bless God.

My parents removed from Norwich to Lempster in 1774. My grandparents and my father's only brother soon removed to Lemp-ster also where they all died and were buried. My father's uncle Elijah Abell with a large family of children by a second wife, he and his wife were buried with my parents and grandparents in the same solitary ground near Dodge's pond. My uncle's family have married and are scattered here and there. My brother Truman still resides in Lempster. We are the only two with our families that bear the name of Abell in N. H. surely it will soon be said of us, "They are dead! and have gone down to the graves of their fathers and in a few fleeting years our children and our children's children will sleep with us in the same solitary mansion. What is human life? It is but a vapor that appeareth but a very little while and vanisheth away. Oh how important it is to me the exchange of worlds, a scene which we cannot escape neither is there any discharge in that war."

Reg.," Vol. VII, page 291, records the death of Dr. Truman Abell at Lempster, May 19, 1853, aged 74 years; married September 2, 1804, at Newport, N. H., Sarah (Sally), daughter of Mr. Lane of Newport.

He was an astronomer, botanist and chemist of note and was author and publisher for 39 years of the "New England Farmers' Almanac." A kinsman of the northern Vermont families writing to a cousin said he knew a Truman Abell by reputation only and once while passing through Walpole, N. H., his home was pointed out. He kept a combination book and drug store. This may have been a son and name-sake of the doctor.

In 1837 Rev. Alfred Abell describes his brother Truman as a tall, slender built man of a feeble constitution, blue eyes, sandy hair.

Very reserved and modest in his manners, bordering hard on diffidence, and much to his disadvantage talks but little, and seldom laughs beyond a strong smile, a man of great study, and possesses a deep penetrating mind. He is an able physician, a real philosopher and well read in astronomy, and publishes one of the best Almanacs in New England, is a worthy member of society and I doubt not but a Christian although in religious sentiment is a Swedenborgen. He married for his wife, Sally Lane, the daughter of Esq. Lane of Newport N. H. by whom he has eleven children, four sons and seven daughters; has buried two sons and three daughters, has two sons living at this present time.



Even in those pioneer days not many daughters had been so competently trained that at 16 years like Martha Abell, they were accomplished in all the household arts of the period including cooking, brewing, spinning, weaving and sewing, and prepared to continue in these duties for her own husband and the large family of ten children to follow.

In 1897 an application for membership as an "Original" daughter of the American Revolution was filed on her behalf by her daughter, Miss Anna Rich, and accompanying the certificate the customary gold spoon was received, which was made the occasion for a notable celebration.

At this time she had survived five of her ten children and was grandmother to thirty and great-grandmother to forty descendants.

Even before ten years of age she had contributed her share to the demands of her country's defence and in later years could easily recall how her oldest half-brothers were encouraged to join the pioneering migration in "covered wagons" to the "far west" beyond the Ohio leaving the younger of them to represent the family in the rilitary activities of the War of 1812.

In the Civil War, Mrs. Rich sent four sons and two sonsin-law to the front, two of her sons paying the last measure of service, one during the war and the youngest after the

war of disease contracted in the line of duty.

Until past 90 years of age, Mrs. Rich, who had been making her home with her son Herman and family, always insisted upon performing her share in the household affairs but in March 1897 she fell and sprained or fractured her right leg and was confined to bed for the greater part of the time remaining until her death on May 22, 1902, aged 96 years, probably the record for longevity in the Abell family. This was closely approached by her nephew, Robert Abell of Aylmer, Ont., who died on February 13, 1923, but two months short of 95 years.

In 1850 probably owing to a lack of sympathy for slavery institutions he removed to Detroit, Mich., and the following year to Dearborn, a suburb where he taught school for a short time, then joining the gold rush to California where he remained in association with his brother, Alex G. Abell, until 1856. Returning to Michigan, he was elected treasurer of Dearborn and followed farming until 1862 when he was appointed an officer of the draft and deputy provost marshal during the war. He was exempted from active service by disability but supplied a substitute at a cost of \$800. He also served as deputy assessor and collector of revenue until removed by President Johnson. In 1867 he was elected State Senator and was active on committee work, being chairman on Railroads, and as a member of committee on Supplies, procured a large gilt frame and mountings for the portrait of General Lafayette for the senate chamber. He was a director of the Detroit, Lansing & Northern R. R. He established the village of Nankin, and its first hardware store, and served as postmaster, president of the village and trustee.

From 1875 to 1878 he was Supt. of the Wayne County Poorhouse, and in 1884 returned to reside in Detroit. (See Reports and Collections of the Michigan Pioneer and Historical Society, vol. XXVI, page 300.)

It was due to his forethought that "The Sun" emergency building was erected for just such a catastrophe as the great fire of February 7-8, 1904, in which "The Sun Iron Building" was destroyed. This disaster, however, proved too great a strain and he did not survive to see the new Baltimore rise from the ashes of the old. Mr. Abell was an excellent judge and collector of art. 

On November 21, 1863, he, with 11 comrades, was captured by Major Moseby's troopers at Warrenton, Va., and taken into the Blue Ridge Mountains. They were almost recaptured the first night by their own command, but were hurried on upstream toward Piedmont where Moseby awaited, and sent them on to General Stewart's headquarters. They were forced along several days with but little to eat, toward Madison C.H. Mr. Abell's natural caution and daring stood him in good stead and together with a

stranger comrade he silently planned escape.

One dark rainy night when their ever-watchful guards exhausted had succumbed to sleep they quietly slipped past and ran over mountain, through stream, valley and forest, unable to sense their bearings, but determined to cover the greatest distance possible before daylight, when a friendly hay-stack afforded concealment for the day. And none too soon, for they heard the baying hounds and clattering pursuit pass within a few feet of them. "Faith of our fathers with us still," they thankfully reflected, and ventured out only at night, weak and weary from lack of food, finally deciding to ask for help and food and proper directions from the next man they should meet. Fortunately a negro, as they had hoped, soon came along and hearing their appeal, said, "Why, golly massa, yous going jes all wrong." Following his directions and avoiding the settlements they did not again meet with anyone, and fortunately, as their resolution to proceed prompted instant action as necessary. Finally reaching the Union Lines after ten or twelve days their destiny again intervened, for, following a battle, their sentries had orders to shoot on sight, but from force of habit probably, they were first challenged by the sentry they approached and came safely again into their own lines. (See "History of Conway, Mass." by C. S. Pease.)

A year later he was at home again. He married Alice A. Holcomb, and in the spring of 1870 they removed to Greenfield, Mass., where he engaged in carpentering, until in 1879 he lost his left hand in a planing machine. This necessitated a change in business and they lived for a few years at Northampton, Mass., and in 1882 he established a mattress factory in Meriden, Conn. He was a true type of Christian gentleman, devoted to home and friends, a member of the Congregational Church as were his fathers before him.



> The father of Silas Palmer Abell, dying when Silas was but three years of age, he remained under the care of his mother until nine, when he was put out to work for his board and clothes and allowed to attend the district school in the winter, until sixteen. He then contracted to remain until he was twenty-one, receiving in addition \$125.00. Meanwhile he taught school two terms, the payment of \$90.00 for which went to his employer. So strong had the attachment grown between his guardian, Col. Julius Clark, and himself, that he continued after his marriage to make his home there, finally purchasing the property, which continued after his death in the possession of his son.

Mr. S. P. Abell followed a varied political career, always standing for what he believed the true principle. At first he was a Democrat, but divided on the slavery question and entered the Free-soil Party. He was elected to two terms in the legislature as a Republican, 1860 and 1880. In 1876 he was a candidate from the 9th district for State Senator. In later years he became a member of the Prohibition Party in accordance with his convictions on that subject. He served many years in the minor political offices, on board of relief, board of selectmen, town agent, notary and justice of the peace. He was called upon to write many wills and frequently was consulted on private as well as public matters. His activity in his church life, being a member of the Congregational Church at Exeter, included service as clerk and on committee assignments, besides filling the office of deacon for nearly twenty years.

Resided at Groveland, N. Y. He was a farmer but retiring from that occupation devoted his whole interest to political affairs and was elected State Senator, Geneseo, N. Y.—In gloomy, weatherbeaten grandeur, ghost-haunted, surrounded by thick pines and evergreens, an old brick house stands deserted by the highway which leads from Geneseo to Mount Morris. It is known as the old Abell place, and once the home of politics and fashion, it now stands lonely except for the legendary ghosts which haunt its cobwebbed halls and dark stairways and the worn and leaning gravestones which keep sentinel behind the pine trees and the house.

As the story goes, twenty years ago when the house was still inhabited, a travelling peddler was mysteriously murdered close by. He was found lying in a deep gulley, his head beaten in, and a large blood stained rock lying near him. Some nights afterward a member of the family which was then living in the Abell place, while going up the dark stairs to bed, tripped over a large rock which was lying on the stairs. A candle was brought and lighted and the stairway was seen to be absolutely empty. The rock had

mysteriously disappeared. Night after night the same thing occurred, until in terror the family packed up their goods and chattels and fled from the place. Since that time the house has been uninhabited. It is said that if you watch carefully on a dark night and at the hour of midnight, you can see Colonel Abell, who lived and died there, and whose body is buried in the little cemetery, gallop by on his white horse.

Brave men have visited the old brick house in the night hours, and have returned home breathless, pale with terror, long before daybreak. Whatever they have seen, however true these legends may be—for we are not a credulous people—the Abell house deserves phantoms of the past, whether they exist or no. Few houses carry with them such

a past wealth of adventurous and honorable days.

The house was built in about 1860 by Colonel D. H. Abell and constructed of bricks which were drawn at great expense and with much trouble from the old Genesee Valley canal across the flats. The rough unmatched pine boards in the floors, most of them about two feet wide, can still be seen in the old house, but years have shrunk and warped them, leaving inch-wide cracks. The house was erected on the site of the former hamlet of Williamsburg, which had, by the middle of the nineteenth century, dwindled away to a few frame houses. Colonel Abell was just too late to see Williamsburg in the days of its prosperity when it boasted one or two stores, a blacksmith shop, a tavern, a distillery, and a number of dwellings. The village lay on the old stage coach route from Fort Schuyler to Geneva, an Indian path in 1787, and was one of the first settlements of Livingston county. The house was destroyed by fire on July 4th, 1934.

Colonel Abell was at one time State Senator, and during his active years was a power in politics. His home was one of the centers of Genesee Valley society, and was the scene of great gaiety and fashion. The Colonel was also a sporting gentleman, and very fond of betting. When he was undergoing his last illness a consultation of physicians was called, and when it was ended he asked his nurse the verdict. She told him that he was doomed to die, whereupon the Colonel raised himself feebly in bed and in a weak but sporting tone

said, "Bet you fifty I don't."

The Colonel was a great friend of the late Captain Craig W. Wadsworth, an older brother of James W. Wadsworth, Sr. He lived with his family, a jovial host to the surrounding countryside, in the old homestead until the early '70's, when he died and was buried in the cemetery at the rear of his home. On the death of Colonel Abell, the estate was

sold to W. A. Wadsworth. Until 1902 the house was tenanted by Captain Martin, brother of Edward Sabin Martin, editor of "Life." Since that time it remained deserted, except for its "ghosts."

Charles Rollin Abell and his sister Edith, were left orphans at a tender age and residing among both friends and strangers, lost touch with their nearest of kin and when at an advanced age and in feeble health, he was unable to produce many authentic records, or recall with any degree of accuracy, many items of family history. However. comparing his statements with those of the Rev. Alfred Abell (see No. 205) fairly reasonable deductions are made herein, covering his earlier connections. Mr. Abell completed his education in a course at law, was admitted to the bar and became a practising attorney, both at his home in Massachusetts and also in Minneapolis, Minn. At the time of his marriage he was employed in the Department of Justice, Washington, D. C., where he resided for a decade or more. He enlisted for the Civil War but was not drawn into action.

384. Edith Abell, born December 25, 1845 in Boston, Mass.; died December 15, 1926 in the Presser Home for Aged Music Teachers. Unmarried. Miss Edith Abell studied music in her early youth under a pupil of the famous Louis Spohr, later singing with Rudolphson, Sig. Abella, then director of

the Italian opera in New York, with his wife, Madame D'Augri, a famous contralto. Her first appearance of note was at Springfield, Mass., at the age of 19, her success on that occasion resulting in her engagement by the Handel and Haydn Society for two concerts, one probably the "Messiah." This was before she went abroad. She was then engaged for leading roles in the Richings English Opera Company for two seasons, after which she went to Milan, Italy, where she studied for two years under Lamperti, the elder, and Sangiovanni, making her debut in the "Barber of Seville" in which she appeared for forty-two successive weeks, afterwards appearing in a repertoire of some eightythree operas with much success, in Genoa, Milan, Varnese, Novi and other cities. She then went to London where she studied repertoire with Jenny Lind Goldsmidt and Sir Arthur Sullivan, singing in oratorio under the direction of Sir Joseph Barnaby at the Royal Albert Hall, at Windsor with Sir George Elvey and with other directors in various cities. Sir Arthur Sullivan engaged her for a season at the Promenade Concerts at Covent Garden including the part of Little Buttercup in "Pinafore" and she assisted him in obtaining copyrights in the United States, and she sang an engagement with Mapleson in "Rigoletto." There were appearances, too, at Glasgow in the Symphony Concerts. Sir Michael Costa, Sig. Favio Campana and other well known musicians advised Miss Abell to remain in London, but her American engagements obliged her returning to her own country, where she sang in concerts and oratorio in Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Boston and other cities. She made several concert tours of the States and Canada with Mme. Camilla Urso, the Mendelssohn Quintette Club and other organizations with unvarying success. For several years she confined herself to teaching vocal music in London, Boston and the Twin Cities. Among her best known pupils are Haydn Coffin, the popular London baritone, and Esther (?) Osborn of the Royal Swedish Opera at Stockholm, while many leading vocalists in opera and concert have studied repertoire with her. She was musical critic for the "Boston Transcript" before Philip Hale.



Mr. Abell attended private schools and Georgetown University. He was employed as a clerk in the National Marine Bank, assisted his father in administering the affairs of "The Sun," was elected a member of the Board of Directors of the A. S. Abell Company, June 15, 1894. From 1895 his father who had assumed the management of "The Sun" gradually committed it to him. He was elected vice president June 6, 1901, and president June 21, 1904, after the death of his father. The great fire of February 7-8, 1904 which caused the destruction of the "Sun Iron Building" gave

added responsibility to the new President. He supervised the removal of the library, records and files to a place of safety and secured the use of the Washington "Evening Star" building and equipment, from which the regular editions of "The Sun" were printed and published without a day's interruption, until the emergency building was made ready in Baltimore. November 17, 1906 "The Sun" occupied the newly erected building at Charles and Baltimore Streets, the selection of the site and supervision of the erection of which devolved upon Mr. Abell.

Mr. Abell resigned the management of "The Sun" April 19, 1909, in order to make a long contemplated journey around the world, he also resigned his directorships in the National Marine Bank and the Eutaw Savings Bank. During his absence he had occasion to decline appointments by Governor Austin E. Crothers on the newly created Public Service Commission as well as to fill an unexpired term to the United States Senate. Mr. Abell then entered the railroad business with Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad Company in Chicago until the United States entered the World War when he attended the second officers' training camp at Fort Myer, Virginia, and later entered the Priorities Division of the War Industries Board. 

Henry Edward Abell was left an orphan and on his own resources at the age of 14 managed by much diligence both at work in stores and banks and at school when opportunity offered to complete his education at the Delaware Literary Institute, Franklin, N. Y., Columbia University and as a law student in the office of the late Joseph H. Bradley at Washington. Republican, casting his first vote for Lincoln, soon after he entered the newspaper field as editor of a paper

in Delaware county. In 1864 he consolidated two papers under the name of "Schoharie-Union," in a district abounding in "copperheads," and narrowly escaped assassination at the hands of a mob attacking his office, on account of his support to President Lincoln. Debarred from active duty in the Civil War on account of defective eye-sight he went to Washington and was sworn into service in defence of the capital. He was commissioned by Secretary Chase to sign the first issue of government bonds to meet expenses of the war and at the same time did guard and hospital duty when

not required at the Treasury Dept.

Colonel Abell was the organizer and first chairman of the Farmers' League of the State of New York, establishing in its interest "The Farmers Union League Advocate," later published in Albany, N. Y. He served under Horace Greeley on the "New York Tribune" and was editor of the "Albany Express." In 1869 Alonzo B. Cornell, surveyor of the port of New York, appointed Colonel Abell his deputy, which position he filled for four years, after which he was appointed by Collector Arthur of the same port to prosecute certain violations of the navigation laws. In 1879 upon his election as governor of New York State, Mr. Cornell appointed Colonel Abell his private secretary, and he served 3 years. He afterwards served many years as an officer of the Assembly, financial, journal, and assistant clerk, and was appointed to examine the constitutionality of bills introduced. In 1894 he acted as counsel for the state prison investigating committee with creditable record and in same year was elected to the Twelfth Assembly by the largest plurality ever given a candidate in that district. 

He decided to visit his Uncle Lemuel in Winona County, Minn., and in January 1857 with his cousin Austin went to Otisco County, and there purchased from him 80 acres of land which he began to develop for his permanent home.

He entered actively into public affairs and as a result of much reading, close thinking and accurate reasoning displayed more than ordinary ability and executed with great credit and fidelity those public and private duties entrusted to his care. After the first pipe line to Buffalo had been completed, Mr. Abell resigned to accept a position as superintendent of construction of the marine elevator, which was being built by his father and Daniel O'Day. Mr. Abell returned to New York and continued his writing for the "Courier," and later was transferred to Washington, D. C. Mr. Abell is the only surviving son, an incident which happened in his line for succeeding generations, and therefore has no close relatives in the Abell lines. While he was living in Iowa in 1884, a salesman of farming implements of New York named Abell called at his home and remarked about their very uncommon name, stating that a genealogy of the family was being compiled at that time. No record was kept of this man's identity nor of the genealogy he referred to.

APPENDIX A

Abells from Leicestershire, England

Richard (?) Abell, was a gentleman farmer and proprietor of Red Hall, Frith Hall and White Hall near Leicester, England. It is claimed that the battlefield of Bosworth belonged to this Abell family for several generations. (Refer to Morant's "Essex," Vol II, pages 228-230.)

The head of this sketch left three sons, Thomas (?), Richard, Samuel; and a daughter who married a Mr. Morris of

Leicestershire.

THOMAS (?) ABELL, probably father of Richard Abell, whose son, Headly Abell, resided on an inherited estate near Stapleton or Hinckley, Leicestershire.

SAMUEL ABELL, born in Leicestershire about 1800. He died in Derbyshire, date uncertain. Child: Samuel Frederick Abell, born Leicestershire, October 19, 1830; died New York, N. Y., 1871; m. in New York, June 10, 1853, Catherine, dau. Samuel and Martha (Murrell) Cook of London, Eng., b. E. Bloomfield, N. Y., 1834, d. Rochester N. Y., Feb. 23, 1925 at the advanced age of 91 years. Left no surviving children.

1. Richard Abell, being the second son, did not inherit the estate. He married Anne Cooper, only child of a wealthy family, whose estate he enlarged and developed. He resided all his life in Leicestershire, where he died about 1850. Some characteristics of this family such as fair-to-ruddy complexion, light-colored eyes, also mathematical, engineering, writing and musical talents, appear to be common with the American stock. In 1854 he married Nancy Ann Noel of Portsmouth, Ohio, who traced her ancestry to the Noel who accompanied William the Conqueror in 1066 from Normandy to England, and on her grandmother's side (who was a Polk, 1st cousin to President Polk) to the French immigrant Joseph De Fuert (Fort). Mr. Abell was located for a time in Minnesota where his elder children were born, and later as chief engineer for the Hudson Bay Company at Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada. He died at Joliet, Ill., in 1895. Children:

Also a daughter Annie, who married Hunter Snyder and resided in Denver, Colo. Dr. E. J. Abell married 2nd, Miss Eaton and had Edmund Richard, born about 1910 and Katherine, born May 8, 1911, married Joseph Summerville Minnis, June 6, 1933.

His tablet, unveiled in Christ Church, Joliet, on the Seventh Sunday after Trinity, July 19, 1931, was erected by Harry C. Abell of New York, in memory of his brother. Inscription on tablet:

To the glory of God and in lasting remembrance of Edmund Joseph Abell, Doctor of Medicine, Vestryman of Christ Church 1898-1903. For thirty-five years as a learned and faithful Christian physician he went in and out of the homes of this city ministering to the physical and spiritual needs of others. Born July 3, 1855, died December 22, 1926. "Greater

love hath no man than this." He was a man of great learning and wide sympathy, he was possessed of a loyalty of character that made for him a host of friends. His high ideals and sterling character with a strong personality set him up as a real physician among his fellows. Above all, his deep interest in the spiritual life of his patients marked him as one who realized in a very definite way his full duty to God as a faithful Christian.

- Annie Abell, born in Minnesota but from early childhood her home was in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada; married Prof. Leonard H. Wilder, a native of England, where he received his highly specialized education in the famous South Kensington Art Schools of London and is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts. He has been a teacher of academic art for many years at Chicago (University), Memphis, Denver, and more recently has practiced his art in connection with the Public Health and Marine Hospital Service, in Washington, D. C. Mrs. Wilder has won no less marked distinction as a versatile writer, serving as London correspondent of a St. Paul, Minn., newspaper, and is actively interested in all forms of national conservation, including forestry, on which she has both written and lectured extensively. She is also associated with the National Editorial, International League of Press Clubs and General Federation of Women's Clubs and was elected president of the League of American Pen Women. She is a thorough musician, and an advocate of grand opera in English for English-speaking countries. They reside at McLean, Va.
- 5. Harry Clinton Abell, born at (Fort Garry) Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, July 8, 1871; married June 21, 1902 Fannie M., daughter Logan Martin, lawyer, Att'y-Gen. in 1906 of Alabama, born at Montgomery, Ala. They have one child, Margaret Annette, born in New York in 1905.

Mr. Abell graduated from the Armour Institute of Technology, B.S. in Electrical Engineering, 1897; specialist and consulting engineer for the Denver Gas and Electric Company, Emerson McMillan and Company, New York, and the American Light and Traction Company, and was elected vice-president of the Electric Bond and Share Company. Following a more extensive specialization in gas engineering he was president of the American Gas Association, in which his activities have embraced the Pacific coast and all sections of the country. Resigned in 1933 from all offices and directorates in the Electric Bond and Share group and its affiliates and retired from active business.

APPENDIX B

Abells of Orange and Albemarle Counties, Virginia

- Joseph Abell, who may have been the progenitor of the posterity here given, but owing to the similarity of Christian names it may be quite probable that a connection with the New England families may be established through one of the "other five children" mentioned in the Will of Robert Abell (of whom no further record is found), or some other individual among the several branches remaining uncompleted; or Joseph and Richard Abell may have been brothers and a connection with the Maryland families may be established through Richard Abell, son of Captain Robert Abell, who was in Maryland prior to 1649. (See Appendix-J.)
- Richard Abell, first appears in Orange County, Virginia, census of 1782, as head of a family of 8 white persons. Also in a list of Taxable Property, beginning in 1782 and continuing to 1793 which is probably the date of his death. The names Ephraim and Dick appear under his own 1782-1783, presumably as his sons, Ephraim appearing as the head of a family in 1786-1787 and 1790 with Humphrey as a son. The lists of 1794-95 show Jeremiah Abell, presumably succeeding Richard, as his son.
- Caleb Abell, also first appears in Orange County, Va., census of 1782, as head of a family of 4 white persons (probably son of the Richard above mentioned). His name also appears in the same list of Taxable Property beginning in 1782 and continuing to 1816, when he probably disposed of last property in Orange County after establishing his home in Albemarle County where he had purchased land in 1798. The Tax List of 1817 indicates Richard S. succeeding his father Caleb, continuing beyond 1823. (Refer to "History of Albemarle County, Virginia," by Rev. Edgar Woods.)

About 1841 after hearing a discourse by R. L. Coleman of the Disciples Church, he united with them after severing his relations with the Baptist Church, causing considerable consternation among his relatives and friends, but his father and family soon became reconciled to this change. In 1844 he visited Scottsville on an evangelical mission and thence to Nelson county where he met the lady who afterwards became his wife and who with other members of the family was baptized by him. After their marriage they lived in Charlottesville for three years, then in 1848 removed to Barboursville, Orange County, where he taught school until 1850, when he began his labors as state evangelist on appointment by the Richmond session of 1849.

The service called him on extensive missions through neighboring counties, the Shenandoah valley, the Chesapeake Bay and Potomac River counties, southwestern Virginia, eastern Tennessee, and one extended through eastern Ohio as far north as Cleveland, returning through western Pennsylvania and West Virginia. In 1852 he moved to Scottsville, Albemarle County, and in December 1853 to Oak Forest, Cumberland County, keeping his family as close to his labors as possible. During the winter of 1863 Mr. Abell acted as chaplain to a North Carolina brigade on the Rapidan river and remained preaching to the army until 1865, resuming his evangelizing missions in the spring of 1866. In 1870 he extended his labors in eastern Tennessee and in 1871 located at Murfreesboro where the last 15 months of his service was expended. In 1874 after returning from a tour of northern Alabama he was taken with pneumonia and after an illness of ten days, passed away on December 27, 1874.

APPENDIX C

Jeremiah Abell's Family of Rockingham County, Virginia

1. Jeremiah Abell, born June 30, 1770 in Rockingham County, Va.; married Hannah Aiken, born May 13, 1771 probably in Rockingham County, early in 1791. His immediate ancestors were said to have come from Maryland and his original immigrant ancestor was said to be one of two brothers coming from Wales at an early period. He was rather undersized in stature. Always of a devout turn of mind, he entered upon the study for the ministry in a Presbyterian College in Kentucky after removal to Adair County in that state about 1800.

He was the owner of some slaves in Virginia and Kentucky, but never in sympathy with the system, he liberated those in his charge before removing to Auburn, Sangamon County, Ill., about 1829. His ministry covered a period of many years in the Presbyterian denomination and he received the distinction of Doctor of Divinity. He later united with the Methodists. About 1846 he removed to McComb, McDonough County, where he died in 1852 and was buried in

Argyle Cumberland Church cemetery near Colchester. (See "History of the Early Settlers of Sangamon County, Ill.," by John C. Power, page 76.) His wife died at the home of their son, James Harvey Abell, near Van Buren's, Bond County, Ill., September 14, 1854 and was buried at Old Liberty Church cemetery.

This Jeremiah Abell is claimed to be a different individual from one of the same name mentioned in the Tax Lists of Orange County in 1794-5 but was probably of close relationship. Orange County originally included several of the later

Some of the following records were obtained from a book entitled, "Origins of Clements-Spalding and Allied Families of Maryland, and Kentucky," by Mr. J. W. S. Clements, Louisville, Kentucky. The author has courteously permitted us to use these records.

Captain Robert Abell, in Maryland prior to 1649, the progenitor of the posterity here given, is the second Abell immigrant to America from England. The Christian names of his immediate descendants would indicate that he and Robert Abell, of Weymouth, Mass., 1630, the first immigrant, were of the same English ancestry, the Derbyshire branch. Under appendix "B" a Richard Abell first appears in

Under appendix "B" a Richard Abell first appears in Orange County, Virginia, in 1782, as head of a family, who probably was the progenitor of all the Abells in Virginia. It may be possible that this Richard Abell of Virginia may have been a descendant of Richard Abell, who was sued and attached in St. Mary's and Calvert Counties, Maryland in 1658, a brother or son of Captain Robert Abell. This might indicate that the Abells of Virginia, Maryland and Kentucky are descendants from a common ancestor who immigrated to America prior to 1649.

1. Capt. Robert Abell. The first of the name to enter Maryland was Captain Robert Abell, in the earlier years of the settlement. It is not known whether he earned his title as commander of a ship or as a militia officer but the fact that his name is not connected with the ownership of real estate, and failure to find a will or other evidence of his dying in the Colony, impels the conclusion that he was a seaman, trading with the Colony, and after settling some or all of his children in the Colony returned to England and died there. It is certain he was engaged in business in the Colony before 1649 for

in that year he, by his attorney, Cuthbert Fenwick, sued one David O'Doherty for 1000 pounds of tobacco as is told in Maryland Archives. Family names, and location in St. Mary's County indicate to a reasonable certainty that Captain Robert Abell was our ancestor though no other reference to him is found. A Richard Abell was sued and attached in St. Mary's and Calvert counties in 1658 (the family settled near the line of separation) and he probably was the oldest son of the Captain though possibly a brother. Much study indicates that Captain Abell left in Maryland his sons, Richard, Samuel and probably one named Cuthbert, though latter may have been a son of Richard. There was a James also referred to in a record 1671, and a William in 1724, who may have been sons of either Captain or Richard. The names are unusual in the family though found. James Abell, a servant, was transported to Baltimore County in 1664; Charles Abell, a servant, transported 1669, and Robert Abell transported 1675 by James Inces into Baltimore County. Hendrick Abell, a cordwainer, came in on his own resources to Somerset County 1667, bringing his wife Sophia and children, Joseph, Macklett and Gartrick called servants and for which he got 200 acres of land.

He acted as Episcopal vestryman and held civil office between 1720 and 1750, as justice of the peace, sheriff, and member of House of Burgesses, for St. Mary's County. The records of All Faiths' Episcopal Church show he was vestryman in 1723-42, while his brother John was warden, and in 1749, a vestryman.

Samuel's protestantism does not seem to have been wholly convincing to his fellow parishioners, for we find that in 1737 he was required to and did, take the test oath. He died probably before 1755. There is no will, or other reference to his death. By putting together scattered hints it has been determined that he married Winifred Hall, daughter Simeon Hall, who died testate in St. Mary's County in 1717 and devised all the property he owned in Maryland to Samuel Abell, while that located at South Shield's, Durham County, England, he left to his cousins, the Misses Brown. In 1725 we find a Winifred Abell attesting a will. This is about all we can discover of this worthy pair, except that for certain they had a son Samuel III, ordinarily and irreverently called among his descendants "old Sheriff Samuel Abell" and who styled himself Samuel Abell, Jr., even in his will, though then the eldest of that name. We have missed so far, the name Robert which should have appeared if the founder was Captain Robert. The theory is, that Samuel Abell I had a son so named who died in infancy, or without issue, and that Samuel II also had a son Robert who became the father of Samuel Abell, the youngest. In some way the name was kept alive and in the later generations became the favorite name, though but very seldom in the early history of St. Mary's County. Children:

11. Samuel Abell, III; died 1777; became a wealthy and prominent man long before his father's death, succeeding to the

very offices his father held, religious and civil, always styling himself Jr., while his own son, Samuel IV was styled Sr., and his nephew, son of the supposititious Robert, was styled Samuel Abell, youngest. Like his father he lived outwardly a Protestant. He was a well-educated, strong-minded man, held all sorts of offices from deputy commissioner to settle accounts, to that of a Burgess and high sheriff, filling both places often as well as the inspectorship of tobacco. He was a member of All Faiths' Church. He married probably before 1720, Eleanor O'Bryan, usually referred to as O'Brien. She was a daughter of Philip, a son of Mathias, or it may be a grandson, and her oldest son, Philip Abell, was named for his grandfather, while her oldest daughter was called Winifred for the mother of her husband. Samuel Abell III executed his will on the 1st day of July 1774, witnessed by John Abell, of Samuel, Thomas and Arthur Abell, of his son John. He died the last day of June 1777, as the Revolution was getting well under way. Owing to confusing Samuel III, always styled Jr., with his son Samuel IV a major in the Revolution and always styled Sr., it has been claimed the former was in someway connected with the Revolution. He was a feeble octogenarian when the trouble arose, preparing to die, most likely was not in sympathy with the movement and certainly took no part in it. To his wife he willed his best bed clothes, one-third interest in his water and bolting mill, personalty, and a negro for her natural life: to grandson Elisha Morgan a negro girl and another to his grandson Bennett Wimsatt; to daughter Eleanor a third of his personalty and all the rest of his estate, real and personal, including remainder in mother's estate, to his sons Samuel and Robert made executors. Executors were empowered to sell four slaves to pay debts. The will was probated July 15, 1777, when his son Samuel for the first time was styled Jr., although the event made him Sr. On August 14, 1777, Eleanor, his daughter, appeared in court and renounced all the provisions of his will and claimed her dower rights. He was the strongest of all Abells, cold to last, ignoring most of his children in his will, carrying out the old feudal idea of favoring the sons and taking a final shot at his sons-in-law, whom he did not deign to name. at Cole's Warehouse up to December 23, 1776, when he resigned on being elected high sheriff of St. Mary's County. He was in January 1776, commissioned major in the Lower Battalion of St. Mary's County and given his correct style of Sr., though his father still lived, which has led to the error already noticed. His son Ignatius was commissioned captain in said battalion August 26, 1777 and on same day his son John Barton, a lieutenant, usually enrolled Barton but styled Captain John Barton. On August 30, 1780, Captain Ignatius was appointed tobacco inspector for Leonardtown, resigned as Captain and his brother John Barton took his place. The brother Edward also was in said battalion as captain of militia. Samuel Abell IV was sheriff and major at same time, the service being local in guarding against a possible landing by the English. Samuel Abell, as major, officiated with other high military officers July 1, 1776, at Leonardtown, Colonel Ake Barnes in the chair, when leave was given to Daniel Wolstonholme to return to England. Major or Samuel Abell IV came to old Washington County with his brother-in-law Benedict Spalding and others after 1790 and settled on the Rolling Fork in what became the Calvary Settlement. Already an old man, he survived only to 1795, which had the effect of leaving his name in oblivion. Son of a prominent man, to whose position as a holder of civil offices, he succeeded, magistrate, a burgess and inspector of tobacco, a most important office, as tobacco was then money, high sheriff of St. Mary's County, a major in Revolutionary Army Militia, with three sons and a son-in-law, Ensign John Heard, in his battalion, it is passing strange that he has been overlooked by Kentucky historians. Where he is buried is unknown, for there was no Calvary cemetery when he died. The spot should be found and marked by his descendants. He died testate June 1, 1795. He was accompanied to Kentucky by a part of his children and brought many slaves. More prudent and thrifty than his youngest brother Robert, he died in his own home, surrounded by his family, the owner of a very considerable estate for his day. To his son Edward who had remained in Maryland he bequeathed the five negroes he had left in his possession, to Barton he gave money and two negroes, to his daughter Elizabeth Fenwick negroes for life, remainder to his grandsons Bennet and John Thomas, saying his son Peter had already gotten his share, gave a negro to his son Ignatius, to daughter Mary Ann Bowes twenty pounds, to daughter Henrietta Thomas a negro, to daughter Susanna Heard personalty, to grandson Joseph Abell a negro, and to his son Joshua the remainder of his estate including his lands making him executor. Others probably had previous aid. Benedict Spalding and Robert Abell witnesses.

John made provisions for Ann, his wife and executrix. Samuel Abell, Sr., Samuel Abell, youngest and Cuthbert Fenwick were the attesting witnesses. Children: Zach, Arthur, Henry, Thomas.
- Robert Abell, son of Samuel Abell III; died in Maryland September 13, 1802, aged 46 years; married Margaret Mills, of Maryland. She died February 19, 1818, aged 59 years, at St. Thomas, Ky. After several years spent about Loretto undoubtedly selected Calvary as a place of settlement for his kin and neighbors of St. Mary's County, Maryland. He and his oldest brother Samuel Abell IV bought lands on Cloyd's Creek near the river. He was recommended for magistrate in 1788 with Hannaniah Lincoln, gentleman; was elected several times to represent Nelson and then Washington County in the Legislature and as a member of the first Constitutional Convention. As a magistrate he presided in the first term of the Washington County Court held at Springfield in June 1792. He was a sort of country lawyer, wrote many wills, deeds and other instruments, but does not seem to have had the thrift usual in his family. His little fortune was soon gone and becoming involved in debt in 1802 he left Kentucky for no known reason and went back to Maryland on a visit, it is said, where he died. Children:

John Barton Abell, called Barton to distinguish him even in the Army from the numerous Johns, was born about 1755; married in Maryland about 1780, Elizabeth Heard and his sister, Susana, married her brother John Heard. They were the children of Mark Heard of St. Mary's County, a wealthy planter belonging to one of the largest and most prominent families in South Maryland. All the descendants of Captain John Barton Abell are eligible to the society of The Ark and Dove, a very recherché and exclusive society of Annapolis, Md. He joined the St. Mary's County Militia at the outbreak of the Revolution, commissioned lieutenant

August 26, 1777, and on June 22, 1780, was commissioned as Captain when his brother, Captain Ignatius, resigned to become inspector of tobacco at Leonardtown. He came to Kentucky with his father, bringing his young family and some slaves with him. He was a planter near Calvary, sold his land and removed to the Caney Creek farm which he had bought. It is not known when his wife died but it was sometime prior to August 9, 1813, for on that day he married Dorothy Wimsatt, who survived him. There seemed to be, in that day, a Wimsatt wife for everybody in Maryland and Kentucky. He died testate about February 1, 1820 and was buried at Calvary. He bequeathed personalty to his eldest daughter, Susana. who had married Thomas Spalding of Benedict, to daughter Dorothy, married Robert Abell 1813, to Ann, married Joseph Spalding, and to his widow Dorothy, but left the land and most of his other property to his only son John (Jack) Heard Abell, whom he made executor. John Barton Abell in 1790 census, St. Mary's County, Md., with 4 dependents and 3 slaves. Children:

It is certain he made the mistake of selecting thin lands and directing to them the first Catholic settlement of Kentucky. This forerunner of the Pottinger's Creek County is not noticed by Spalding, or Webb, or other writers. He brought his large family with him. His uncle, Robert Abell, led other settlers there as early as 1795. George Abell, probably son of John P. Abell, came out prior to 1790. From Peter and George Abell sprang the Nelson County Abells, to scatter later like their kinsmen of Washington County, all over the West. Peter Abell may have gone to Breckinridge County where he had land and died there. Probably married Lucy (——). Children:

Will attested by Benedict Spalding, John Barton Abell and Bernard Mills. Joshua probably married Susannah Mills, a sister of his Uncle Robert's wife, before he left Maryland. It will be noticed that when his uncle's land was sold at bankrupt sale, he purchased for \$60, the 200 acres, manifestly for the benefit of the family. All the neighbors were either kin, or in sympathy with the unfortunate family and nobody could be induced to bid against him. Most of the Abells, yet to be found in the old Calvary neighborhood, are descended from Joshua and it would be hard to find anyone there not in some way connected with his descendants. Children:

neighbor, in 1811.

In the Federal Census of 1790, S. C., as head of a family, his name is spelled Abell, but all his descendants spelled the name Able. May 6, 1799, State Records of Land Grants—Jeremiah Abel owned 500 acres in Washington Dist., S. C.

APPENDIX M

Abells of Shenandoah County, Virginia

RECORDS SUPPLIED BY MR. FRANK E. HEPNER, LARAMIE, WYOMING

"Records of Shenandoah county, Va., show that a John Abel married Jane Williams, October 31, 1788, John Pickett minister. Also in Will Book A, Page 6, is a will of Jos. (or Jas.) Abell naming wife Jane, sons John, George, daughter Margaret, grandsons Jos. (or Jas.), Jeremiah and Ezekiel. Will written November 25, 1771, probated May 26, 1772. My informant's writing is not very plain and consequently I am not sure whether she wrote Jas. or Jos. In one place she spells the word Abel and in another Abell. Possibly both spellings occurred in the originals. While these do not connect up directly with my great grandfather who was born in 1801, still it shows that there were Abel's or Abell's in Shenandoah county, Va. about the time he was supposed to have been born there. I am, therefore, of the opinion that John Abel was connected to these families in some way but just how is still to be determined."

John Abel, born July 20, 1801, probably in Shenandoah county, Va.; died at the home of his daughter, Phoebe, at Afton, Iowa, May 10, 1888. He married Catherine Funk, probably in Shenandoah county, Va. about 1825. In his younger days he was a school teacher but later became a carpenter and followed that trade up to the time of his death. After his marriage he moved to or near Cincinnati (?), Ohio. Later he is said to have moved to Ross county, Ohio. Still later he moved to Lafayette county, Wisconsin. After the death of his wife he lived with his daughter, Phoebe, at Afton, Iowa.

His wife, Catherine Funk, was born May 15 (or 17), 1802, probably in Shenandoah county, Va. She died June 6, 1879 at the home of her son, Benjamin, at South Wayne, Wisconsin. She married first John Grandstaff by whom she had two daughters, Maria, born January 26, 1820, and Elizabeth Anna, born October 8, 1821, both in Shenandoah county, Va. (Nothing further is known about John Grandstaff or these two children.) Efforts to connect this Catherine with some of the Funk families known to have been living in that part of Virginia have thus far failed, though without doubt she was so connected. The name of Catherine occurs in the records of two or three of these families and while none of them are this Catherine the fact that there were several of the

same name would suggest the thought that they all had a common ancestor or relative after whom they had all been named. John and Catherine Abel had five children: Polly, Phoebe, Andrew, Morgan, and Benjamin Franklin.

Polly Abel, born October 28, 1827 near Cincinnati (?), Ohio; died December 22, 1915, at South Wayne, Wisconsin; married Aquella Duvall, a farmer in Ohio. Four children were born here: Henry Duvall; John Duvall; Annett Duvall (who married William Arnold); and an unnamed child who died in infancy. They then moved to Lafayette county, Wis., here: Catherine Duvall, born Aug. 14, 1866 (who married James W. Smith); William Duvall; Frank Duvall.

Phoebe Abel, born December 13, 1829 in Ohio; died March 23, 1914 at Afton, Iowa; married (probably in Wisconsin) a farmer, James Eastman, son of John J. Eastman (see children of Amos Eastman, No. 640, of Rix's "Eastman Genealogy"). Her children were: Joseph, Rollie, Frank, and Mary.

Andrew Abel, born May 17, 1832 in Ohio; died January 9, 1916 in Richland county, Wis. He was a farmer. He was married but the name of his wife and those of his children, if any, is unknown. He is reported to have been a Civil War soldier.

Morgan Abel, born December 5, 1836 in Ohio; died September 21, 1918 at Wasioja, Dodge county, Minn.; married August 5, 1855, Mary Ann, daughter of Alva H. Eastman (see children of Amos Eastman, No. 640, of Rix's "Eastman Genealogy"). Whether they were married in Ohio or Wisconsin is not known. He served with Company D, Tenth Minn. Volunteers in the Civil War from August 21, 1862 to February 17, 1864 when he was discharged for disability. For some years he was on a farm at Mineola, Minn. Later, after the war, he ran a wagon-maker's shop at Fairpoint, Goodhue county, Minn. Later he moved to Wasioja, Dodge county, Minn., and there operated an old style stone-burr flour and feed mill. In his later years he acted as agent for the railroad company at Wasioja. He is buried at Wasioja as is also his wife, who was born June 14, 1837 and died October 1, 1920. He had ten children:

ANNA CORNELIA (who married John Maas), born May 6, 1875 at Fairpoint.

MAYETTA (who married Edgar Ingersoll), born Dec. 17, 1877 at Wasioja, Dodge county, Minn.

Benjamin Franklin Abel, born April 2, 1839 in Ohio; died November 17, 1917 at Esmond, South Dakota. He lived for some years at South Wayne, Lafayette county, Wis. It is reported that he was a Civil War soldier. He was a farmer. The names of his wife and children are not known though some of them live at or near Esmond, S. D.

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
