FOREWORD

It was Wilmarth (Lefty) Lewis who said that the Auchinclosses were not a family but a land mass. One wonders if there is any better definition for the spreading genealogical phenomenon that this book describes. We lack the formal aids of the past to hold ourselves a unit. There is no title to pass from generation to generation and keep the serried ranks in order. At least I have never quite believed in that "Sir Hugh Auchinclos" of 1225 or that we had no crest only because "the clan had its origin prior to 1200." There is no family fortune, which, in any case, unless preserved by the strictest rules of primogeniture, would have been long dissipated in division. And survival of our very name, now seemingly guaranteed so many times over, is only a statistical coincidence. Of the 330 descendants of John Auchincloss and Elizabeth Buck, 57 have been males bearing the family surname, an unusually high proportion. Yet of John's twelve brothers and sisters and all their issue only a single descendant, Ruth Auchincloss Child, survives today!

So what is it, a family? Looking for my answer in the pages of Aunt Josie's photograph album, staring at the sober Presbyterian countenances of those early Auchinclosses, Robert the sailor, Hugh and John, with their great aquiline noses and gravely staring eyes, I can find no bridge to take me over the gap to young Stuart on the cover of LIFE. And reading through the scanty records, I cannot altogether repress a shiver at the formidable negatives of Dr. Alexander's funeral oration for the first Hugh in 1855: "The fibre of his nature was strong rather than delicate, hence some misapprehended him as blunt and harsh. The deceased was not a man of smooth words or disguised flatteries. . . ." No, indeed, one feels quite sure that he was not. Is it twentieth century decadence to be glad that we are no longer apprehended as "blunt and harsh?"

And yet. Does not the family name still suggest something to each of us, something apart from ourselves and our individual branches? If the brownstone fronts and the long quiet Sundays and the rigid Presbyterian consciences are gone, if the days are past when any member of the family could know more than a fraction of its total, does not some part of that early simplicity and integrity still endure? My question, of course, can only be decided for himself by each descendant of John and Elizabeth who will read in the pages that follow all that has happened to our expanding family since the good ship "Factor" brought the first Hugh to these shores.

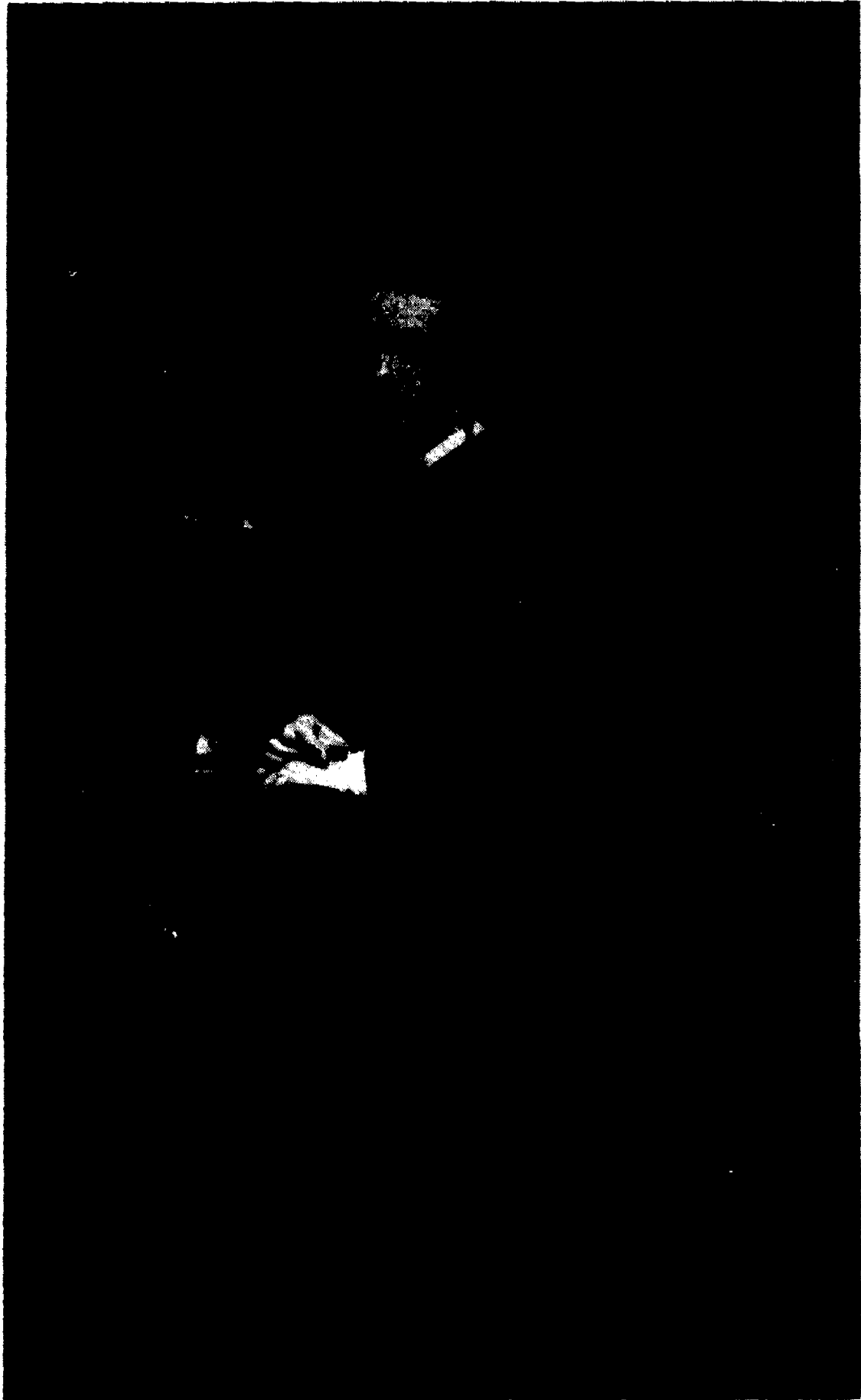

Graduated 1862 from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute at the head of his class, with the degree of Civil Engineer.

1867, appointed by the U. S. Government as Commissioner to the Paris Exposition.

For several years he was connected with the Jersey City Locomotive Works, the Atlantic and Great Western Railway Company, and the Ramapo Car and Foundry Company. After conducting the sale of the Jersey City Locomotive Works, he bought an interest in the Delaware Car Works, of Wilmington, and became Vice-President of the company.

1874, visited Brazil and built the rolling stock of the Sao Paulo and Rio de Janeiro Railway. In 1876, subsequent to his return to Wilmington, the Emperor of Brazil, Don Pedro II, visited the United States and was entertained at the Auchincloss home. While the Emperor was in this country he ordered a private car built by the Delaware Car Works, which was designed and built under William Auchincloss' supervision. This car was exhibited at the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition in 1876 and received first prize.

1879, moved to Philadelphia, where he acted as agent for J. and P. Coats, thread manufacturers of Paisley, Scotland.

1903, retired from business and moved to Atlantic Highlands, New Jersey, on the shore of Sandy Hook Bay, where he lived until his death.

His tastes were decidedly mechanical, but, in later years, he devoted much of his time to literary work. He wrote a number of scientific treatises, and also some books of Biblical research. He was the inventor of an averaging machine, and received six patents for mechanical work.

He was most kindly, upright, and honorable in all his dealings, a devoted father, and a Christian gentleman.

For five years she adapted herself to the Pennsylvania Dutch, then back she went to Summit to build up an entirely different sort of life. Finally, in Dunedin, Florida, she found herself pretty much an invalid, but apparently she was still the same irrepressible Mother. When she lay dying, the most amazing collection of people would come to the door, asking for news of her, eager to tell us what Mother meant to them. them.

Mother based her whole life on the firm conviction that living was a treasure hunt. Gold was to be found in the most unexpected people. She would dig away at anyone who came along, which made each chance acquaintance feel rather flattered. But actually, if Mother found no true gold, no quality that was really worthwhile, she passed on; she simply was not interested. But if she felt someone had a redeeming trait, she would stick by that person through thick and thin. Her encouragement and her fearlessness are the two traits people seem to remember.

Her own children remember her ever-flowing generosity. Anything she had, she would share or give away without a second thought. She was a firm believer that money could help in most crises. Whenever her children were having a hard time, along would come some cash just to spend, to enjoy. Her troubles she could toss off, but she could not bear to let us suffer.

She drove a car down through the Pyrenees and into Spain at Bilbao, where a business friend of Dad's, a Spaniard, was wonderful to her. Not having driven a car for ten years, it was quite a trip. She was accompanied by a Jewish-American man whom she had never seen before the night of escape (and by her small daughter). He proved a true friend though unable to drive a car. Pat crossed into Spain two hours before the Nazis closed the border. Thanks to a cable from Frank, Pat took off when she did. She feels that the entire trip was too weirdly auspicious to be entirely luck. She was able to get gasoline in the Pyrenees because a French friend's husband was in charge of rationing at the tiny village. At La Hendaye another person took her in when the entire city was covered with refugees sleeping on the sidewalks. Pat reached U. S. A. in time to have her second baby in peace and quiet.

Then the Russians "liberated" him, put him in a box car and dragged him around Russia. Viewed through a chink in this locked car Christian's view of Russia was limited but revealing. Meantime Pat was staying with Mother in Summit, with her two children. Christian took ship to U. S. 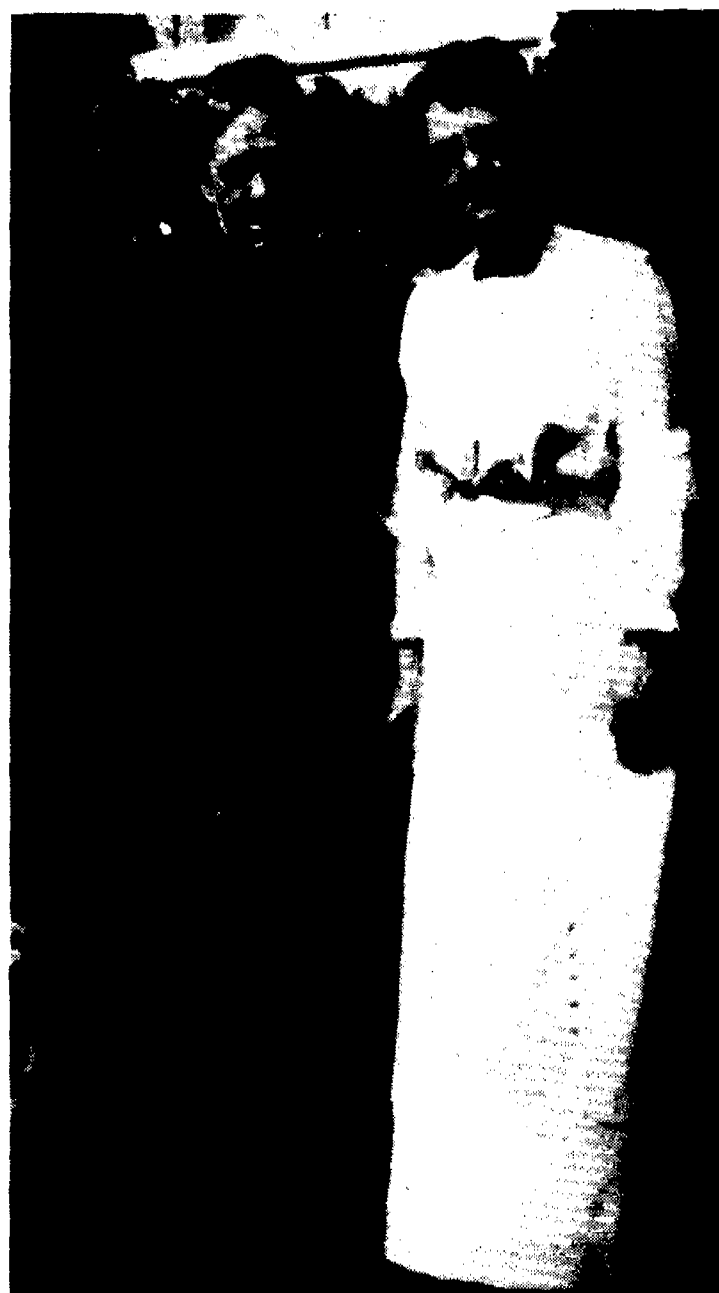

At one time he resigned as a director of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad against the wishes of his father-in-law, Samuel Sloan, who was the president. I understand the resignation stuck even though there was some argument, Father maintaining that he would not be a "rubber stamp." He was loyal to his friends and he seemed to have many of them. Uncle John and Uncle Hugh told me on many occasions how fond and proud they were of him."

Father graduated from Yale in 1901 and from Columbia College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1905. Instead of accepting a proffered internship at Presbyterian Hospital that same year, he took a year out, which he spent abroad with his mother who was recovering from the shock of the sudden death of his sister Ellie.

In 1906 he began his internship at Roosevelt Hospital on the service of Dr. Joseph Blake, whose teaching and surgical skill certainly had the most profound effect on all of my father's later thinking.

It was a lucky chance that sent him to Roosevelt, for it was there that he met Frances Newlands, a head nurse on the surgical service, whom he married in 1908. Her devotion to him was only matched by her loyalty to the profession in which they both served. It would have been impossible for him to have accomplished what he did without her patient understanding and willingness to accommodate her life and that of her family to the unpredictable and time-consuming demands of his work.

My father's greatest interest lay in the precise pathology of surgical diseases and he was largely instrumental in organizing the Surgical Pathology laboratory at Presbyterian Hospital. His three greatest interests in the field of general surgery were cancer of the breast, infections of the hand, and the management of acute appendicitis. He nearly lost his own arm from a very serious hand infection which occurred during his training at Roosevelt Hospital.

In 1921 he became Chief of the Second Surgical Division at Presbyterian Hospital and held that position, along with the title of Professor of Clinical Surgery at the Columbia College of Physicians and Surgeons, until his retirement in 1946.

He loved the outdoors, but especially the sports that went with it—rowing and football in college—and later, tennis, golf, sailing and fishing. He built a workshop on the roof of his home in New York and spent countless hours making gadgets, drawing meticulous medical illustrations and, when the children were little, developing pictures of them.

If there was one man who influenced his life more than any other, it was Endicott Peabody, headmaster of Groton School. His father died when he was a second-former at Groton, and the effect that Dr. Peabody's powerful personality had on his life thereafter was obvious to all who knew them both. It was, therefore, a source of immense satisfaction to him that in later years he was chosen a Trustee of the School.

EDITORIAL FROM THE NEW YORK HERALD TRIBUNE

If the art of healing has not long since given way to the science of medicine, it is because men like Dr. Hugh Auchincloss have been able to demonstrate that the two were not hostile. He was a surgeon whose technical skill gave him the ability to venture, and his radical contributions over a period of twenty years to the surgery of breast cancer have meant life for thousands of women. But more than that, he was a doctor who remembered always that he dealt with men and women rather than with infections and diseases. In the glittering austerity of the operating room, it is sometimes difficult to realize that affection and friendship can sometimes cure more surely than the surgeon's knife, but Dr. Auchincloss always knew it and was glad for it, because affection and friendship were a part of his character.

He had been in retirement from Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center for a year when he died Sunday, and the skill of his hand had already been established as a legacy. Because he was skillful, he was bold; because he was bold, it no longer requires courage to tread the paths he pioneered. The removal of an entire breast was a desperate recourse when Dr. Auchincloss first performed it; today it is the customary treatment for certain forms of breast cancer. This, and other contributions, will remain. His death is a loss to the medical profession, but more than that, a loss to all those who turn to doctors for help. His spiritual qualities were a part of his skill; his rare technical skill took its force from his qualities as a man.

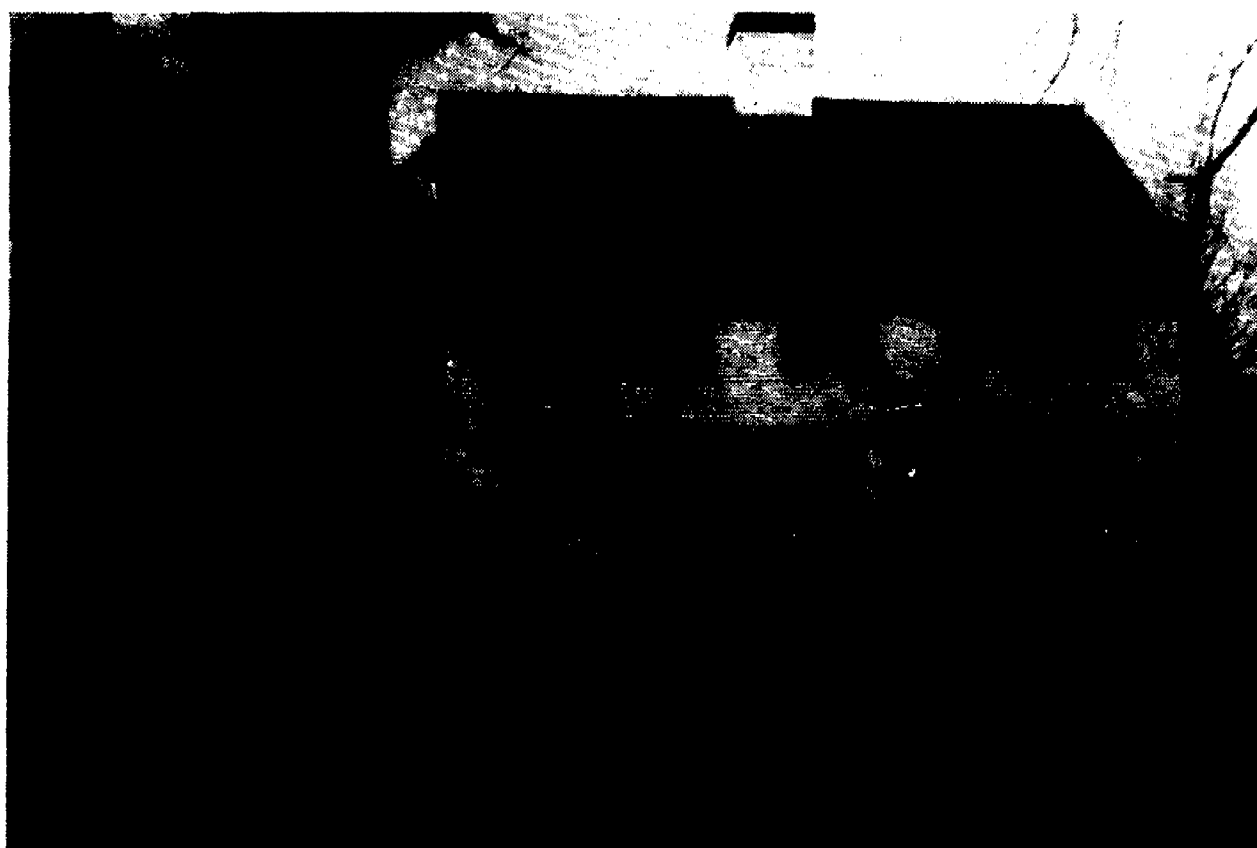

He invited me to join him and after a short walk, we returned to Wyoming Avenue where he lived. We were standing out on the public street and just as I was taking my leave of him, he asked me how my wife was (my wife Maya was recuperating from a very serious head injury she received by walking into an airplane propeller). When I assured him of her recovery, he asked me to give her his best regards, and to tell her that she and he had one thing in common, because, when he was nine years old, he had fallen out of the front seat of a barouche and landed on his head, hitting the curbstone. He had a considerable dent about half-way back on the right-hand side of his head. He then told me to tell my wife that this had been the greatest source of comfort to him all his life, because, whenever he failed to show the normal amount of intelligence, he was always able to blame it on this bump he received when he was nine years old. I, therefore, have felt the bump on the head of the Ex-President and Chief Justice of the United States, on the public street in broad daylight."

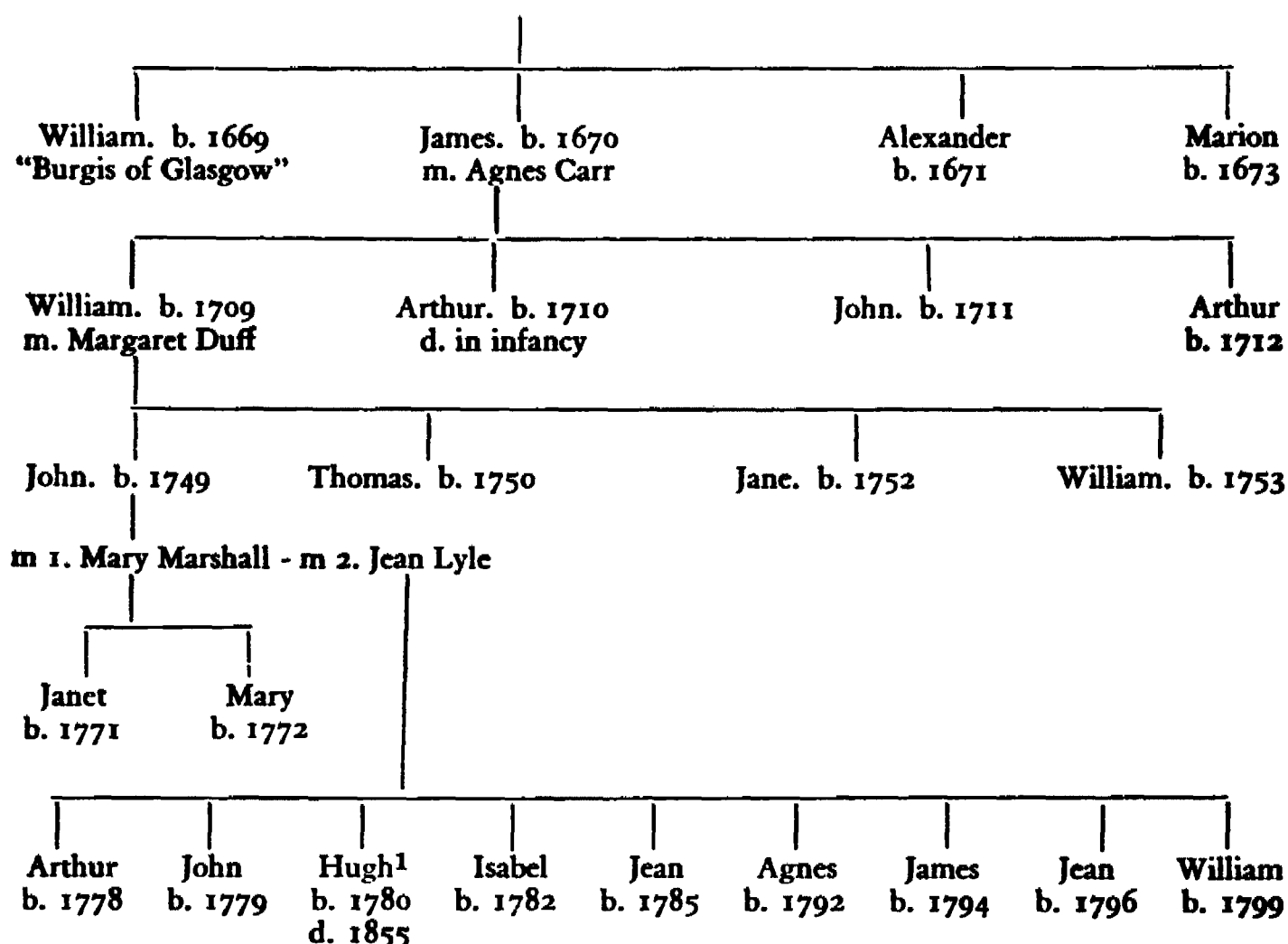

AN INCIDENT IN THE LIFE OF ANN STUART AUCHINCLOSS

As told by her to her daughter Emily (Maxwell) and as written down by her and passed on to her nephew, Henry Buck Auchincloss, and now in the possession of his son John Auchincloss. The facts are from this paper but the story has been changed from the first to the third person for clarity, brevity and continuity.

Hugh Auchincloss who came to this country from Paisley, Scotland about 1804, married in 1806 Ann Stuart, daughter of James Stuart, a merchant of Philadelphia, and brought her to New York where they lived at the northeast corner of Pearl and Pine Streets. When war was declared between England and the United States in 1812, Hugh Auchincloss, who had been occupied in selling dry goods and founding the Auchincloss family in America (i.e. there were three children by this time), had neglected to take out naturalization papers, and consequently was a British subject. President Madison by proclamation ordered all British subjects to remove themselves at least "forty miles from tide water so that they might not be able to render aid or give comfort to the enemy." In conformity with this order Hugh Auchincloss went to Poughkeepsie, leaving his wife and children in New York.

Ann Stuart Auchincloss, who was an American citizeness, at once occupied herself with getting letters of introduction to President Madison, "Dolly" Madison, Secretary Monroe and others of prominence in Washington, in order to pledge the loyalty of her husband to the American cause and to act as a hostage for this loyalty. Armed with these letters she started out alone for Washington, a three and one-half days' trip by stage coach over wretched roads, arriving in the evening of the third day. Next morning on the way to the White House, in an open hack, her driver leaned over and said, "There, ma'am, goes Mr. Monroe, the Secretary of State." "Stop the hack," said she, and jumped out and introduced herself to Mr. Monroe, and asked him for an appointment when she could present her letter of introduction. Mr. Monroe made the appointment for the following morning. She then went on to the White House and presented her letters to the President and "Dolly" Madison. She stayed in Washington for about a week making such a nuisance of herself that the President and Secretary of State to get rid of her, for the country was at war, issued an executive order allowing her husband to return to New York and resume his occupation. Having accomplished

the purpose of her visit to Washington she started for home but was delayed in Trenton by riots over the drafting of recruits for the war. She finally arrived in Jersey City in the evening and was rowed across the river to Cortlandt Slip, but by the time she got there it was quite dark, and she was extremely nervous over the prospect of having to walk across the City in the dark. Fortunately she met the watchman, who was carrying a lantern, and he lit her way through Maiden Lane on a narrow board walk, where, if she had fallen off, she would have been in mud over her shoe tops. She finally arrived safely home where she found her three children sick with the measles. However, they were soon well, and her husband having returned from Poughkeepsie, she was happy and contented. This did not last long as other British subjects and disgruntled Americans brought so much pressure to bear upon The President, for making an exception in the case of Hugh Auchincloss, that he was forced to withdraw the executive order, and again he (Hugh Auchincloss) went back to Poughkeepsie. This time he did not stay there but bought a team of mules and a wagon, loaded the wagon with merchandise and started west. When peace was declared at the end of the war of 1812, Hugh Auchincloss had gotten as far west as Louisville, Kentucky, where he sold his equipment and returned to New York.

He subsequently became the first President of the American Wholesale Dry Goods Association, and successfully steered the Association through the severe panic of 1837. In appreciation of this the Association presented him with a solid silver tea service, which is still in the family.

"THE OLD ELM AT BUCK'S CORNER"

"In the year 1776 Sarah Saltonstall, wife of Daniel Buck, was standing at the door of her residence built the year before on the corner of Wethersfield Avenue and Jordan Lane, when an old and earth-stained Indian came along with a little sprig of an elm tree under his arm. He pleaded with her to exchange the sprig for a quart of rum which was, at that time, kept in every house in New England, and he was so weary and pleaded so hard that her kind heart was touched and the exchange was made. He went off down the road happy with his rum, and she, stooping down near the house, planted the sprig. She has long since gone to her heavenly home, and the magnificent elm on the south side of Mr. Buck's residence, eighteen feet in circumference and its grand old branches spreading eighty feet above, is the outcome of the little sprig that was planted over one hundred years ago. It is one of the grandest old trees in this town, which is remarkable for its many heaven-towering elms."

OUR ANCESTRAL HOME

As you drive towards Wethersfield, Connecticut, from Hartford, you pass two white eighteenth century houses which face each other across the main road at the edge of the town. These are Buck houses and while simple, have good lines and a substantial, respectable look about them, just like all the members of the family. The house to the east was built for Josiah Buck in 1774 and is now owned and lived in by Francis Goodwin, a classmate of Lefty's at Yale. The land in back runs down to Wethersfield Cove, a rather lovely backwater of the Connecticut River, where sailboats and cabin cruisers are moored. The house facing it, which has several large red barns in back, was built for Daniel Buck in 1775, the year he was married to Sarah Saltonstall. Presumably his son Gurdon was born here and lived here until marrying and moving to New York City, where their daughter, our Grandmother Auchincloss, was born. I am told that the house has always been owned by the Buck family, although on my one and only visit to the house there were certainly no Bucks there that I was aware of.
