PREFACE

Just four years ago, the writer became interested in searching for more information concerning the parents of Isaac Austin, Jr., one of the four pioneer settlers of Gouverneur, St. Lawrence Co., N. Y., in 1805.

A very interesting trip was made in May and June, 1923, to Gouverneur, N. Y., and the neighboring towns, DePeyster, Heuvelton and Canton.

The information collected at that time from histories and relatives convinced the writer that an Austin genealogy was worth while. She therefore, undertook the task of compiling this work.

A second trip was made by motor in August, 1923, with the idea of following the course, as far as possible, that Isaac Austin took when he left Rhode Island.

We started from Providence, R. I., and traveled across the state of Massachusetts to Hancock, then across the border line to Stephentown, N. Y., then north to Argyle and Hartford, a most picturesque part of New York State.

In 1924 the writer and family spent the month of July in Hartford, N. Y. While there we took the picture of Isaac Austin's home in Argyle and the family grave yard in the orchard on his farm.

Had it not been for many relatives and friends, both old and new, who aided by tongue and pen, this little volume could not have been issued in the specified time; especially since it was prepared amid the many interruptions incident to a busy life.

THE LINEAL DESCENDANTS

Austin means imperial, noble, grand; and is derived from the name Augustus.

The Austin name occurs in English history at an early date A.D. 1050 being often written Astin, Austen, Austine, Austing, Auston, Austyne, Awstyn, Ostin.

The usual orthography of the present day is Austin. The family of Austin has been identified with the history of Rhode Island from an early period in the development of that state.

The earliest Austins in America were found in Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island. It is believed by many that these Austin families were closely related, but the lack or disappearance of early records makes it difficult to prove the relationship.

Quoting from history:

Massachusetts was settled at Plymouth, November 3, 1620 by English Puritans.

Connecticut was settled at Windsor in 1633 by English Puritans from Massachusetts and continued under the jurisdiction of that Province until April 23, 1662, when a separate charter was granted.

Rhode Island was founded by English refugees from Massachusetts, who went there in search of religious and political freedom. The first settlement was made at Providence by Roger Williams in June 1636. It was under the jurisdiction of Massachusetts until July 8, 1662, when a separate charter was granted.

The object was to establish a colony where church and state were to be entirely separate, and everybody welcomed.

Roger Williams believed that the land belonged to the Indians, that no man was compelled to go to church, and that a man could vote without being a church member.

At this time inhabitants of several Massachusetts towns left that colony for Connecticut. These early Colonists had come to Massachusetts in the Puritan migration. Their removal to Connecticut was caused by their discontent with the autocratic character of the government in Massachusetts.

Robert Austin, founder of the family in Rhode Island, first appears on the records of that state in 1661.

Since Rhode Island is an offshoot from Massachusetts, it is reasonable to believe that Robert Austin, when he came from England, settled first in Massachusetts, and then removed to Rhode Island.

The family has always been one of note in Rhode Island. John Osborne Austin, author, was of this family, and he traced his descent to Roger Williams.

Records fail to give the date when this pioneer settler came to the American wilds, but the Genealogical Dictionary of Rhode Island comprising of settlers who came before 1690 by John Osborne Austin, gives a short account of the Colonial Ancestor of the family. His descendants are now found in many states of the Union.

Isaac Austin with a small colony left Providence, R. I., about 1757. They traveled across the state of Massachusetts and settled at Jericho, Berkshire Co. Jericho was renamed Hancock. Isaac Austin married in 1760 Rhodinah Vaughan, daughter of David Vaughan. He was of Welsh descent. He came from Rhode Island and was one of the first settlers of Hancock, Massachusetts.

In 1770 Isaac Austin moved across the boundary line to Stephentown, Rensellaer Co., N. Y. This was his place of residence when he entered the Revolutionary War. For record see:

At the close of the War, Isaac Austin returned to his home in Stephentown, N. Y.

In the History of Rensellaer County, N. Y. by Nathaniel B. Sylvester, we find that Isaac Austin is registered in Stephentown in 1784. Page 494.

In the spring of 1787 he blazed a trail, by knotching the trees, from Stephentown to Argyle, Washington Co., N. Y. That part of Argyle now known as the "Hook".

He built a log house on Lot 80 which stood for nearly one hundred years. In 1788 Isaac returned to Stephentown and moved his family to Argyle.

The federal Census of 1790 for New York State

shows that Isaac Austin was living in Argyle, Washington Co., N. Y.

Aug. 23, 1794, Isaac Austin bought a farm of 340 acres paying therefor \$4,000.00. Here he built a very substantial home and barns which are still standing in fine condition in 1926.

This Indenture, Made the twenty-third day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety-four between Rogers Savage and Phebe his wife of the town of Argyle, in the County of Washington and State of New York, parties of the first part; and Isaac Austin of the town of Stephentown in the county of Rensellaer and State aforesaid, party of the second part.

Witnesseth that the said parties of the first part for and in consideration of the sum of eight hundred pounds lawful money of the State aforesaid to them in hand paid by the said party of the second part the receipt whereof is hereby confessed and acknowledged. Have Granted, bargained, sold, remised, released, aliened and confirmed and by these presents do grant bargain, sell, remise, release, alien and confirm unto the said party of the second part in his actual possession now being by virtue of a bargain sale and lease to him thereof made by the said party of the first part by indentures bearing date the day next before the day of the date of these presents and by force of the laws transferring of uses into possession and to his heirs and assigns forever.

All That Farm Lot in the town of Argyle known and distinguished on a map of said Town by the name or Number of Eighty containing two hundred and seventy acres of land. And also all that part of lot No. 91 adjoining the aforementioned lot which by survey begins at a beach tree marked 91 and 90 thence running north two degrees west to the centre line of said lot thence west upon said line to the west branch of a creek called the Dead Brook in a swamp then down said Brook as it now runs into south line of said Lot, thence along the south line of said Lot to the south east corner thereof. From thenct north two degrees west to the place of beginning. Containing about seventy acres of land be the same more or less. And all the advantages to the same belonging. And also that certain piece of land lying in the town of Argyle aforesaid being part of Lot No. 90 in a patent granted by King George III to Duncan Reade and others, beginning on the west line of the highway and in the north line of Lot No. 91 in the said patent and running thence on the said west line of said highway five rods to a stake and stones, thence westwardly thirty-six rods and twelve feet till it strikes the north west corner of Lot 91 then east on north line of said Lot No. 91 to the place of beginning at said highway, containing half an acre and twenty-four rods of land, be the same more or less.

Together with all the advantages to the same belonging together with all and singular the hereditaments and appurtances thereunto belonging or in anywise appertaining and the reversion and reversions, remainder and remainders, rents, issues and profits thereof; And all the estate, right, title, interest, claim or demand whatsoever of the said parties of the first part either in law or equity of in and to the above bargained premises with the said hereditaments and appurtances. To Have and To Hold the said lots, pieces or parcels of land to the said party of the second part his heirs and assigns, to the sole and only proper use, benefit and behoof of the said party of the second part his heirs and assigns forever. And the said party of the first part for himself his heirs, executors and administrators doth covenant, grant, promise and agree to and with the party of the second part his heirs and assigns that the above bargained premises in the quiet and peaceable possession of the said party of the second part his heirs and assigns against all and every person or persons lawfully claiming or to claim the whole or any part of the said above mentioned and described premises will forever Warrant and Defend.

In witness whereof the parties to these presents have interchangeably set their hands and seals the day and year first above written. Sealed, Signed and Delivered

In the Census of 1800 for Washington Co. it shows Isaac Austin still living in Argyle, N. Y. Also his son Rehoboam Austin. While his sons David, Isaac, Jr., Jotham and Pasqua (Pasco) lived in Hartford five miles north of Argyle.

Rhodinah V. Austin's father was David Vaughan. He was of Welsh descent. He also came from Rhode Island and was among the first settlers of Hancock, Mass. He was the first deacon of the First Baptist Church of Hancock in 1772 and Caleb Carr, Sr. was second deacon. Both these men were very close friends of Isaac Austin's.

David Vaughan also fought in the Revolutionary War. He was a private in Capt. Wm. Douglass' Company, Berkshire Co., Mass. Commanded by Lieut. Daniel Brown.

Dr. Calvin Pardee practiced first at Lebanon Springs, Mass. then moved to Stephentown, N. Y. and was the first physician to take up a practice in that town. He was a very intimate friend of Isaac Austin's, and Isaac named his last son after him, Calvin Pardee Austin. January 10, 1810 Rhodinah Austin wife of Isaac Austin died. She was buried in the grave yard on his own farm at Argyle, N. Y.

In the summer of 1814, Isaac Austin married a second time. Mrs. Zilpha Hathaway Perkins. She had a son Capt. David Perkins, of Fall River, Mass. Capt. Perkins had two daughters, Hannah and Marcy.

Isaac D. Austin married Hannah Perkins August 31, 1814. She died July 27, 1820. In 1822 Isaac D. Austin married his wife's sister, Marcy Perkins. Isaac D. Austin died from the effects of a fall from his horse November 15, 1827.

Isaac D. Austin lived with his grandfather, Isaac Austin and ran his farm at Argyle, N. Y.

After the death of Isaac D. Austin the farm was sold. It has been owned by the following:

Ashel Glazier, Oscar Barrelle, Wm. J. S. Shields and C. L. McLenithan.

Will of Isaac Austin (29)

In the name of God, Amen. I, Isaac Austin of the Town of Argyle in the County of Washington and State of New York, being far advanced in age and knowing and considering that my dissolution must soon take place though I at present retain my reason and full recollection of my worldly concerns, Do make and constitute this instrument as my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all other wills by me made.

First I do give and bequeath unto my beloved son Pasquay Austin twenty-five Dollars payable three years after my decease. Also to my daughter Honor Carr's heirs twenty Dollars in three years after my decease. Also to my daughter Margaret Carr twenty Dollars. And to my son Isaac Austin, Jr., twentyfive Dollars each to be paid within three years from my decease. To my son Rehoboan Austin, I give and bequeath one Dollar and to my son Jonathan fifty

Dollars each to be paid within one year after my decease; to the heirs of my daughter Polly Savage, I give and bequeath twenty Dollars in two years after my decease. To my son Daniel Austin twentyfive Dollars in four years after my decease. To my daughter Dinah Dyer twenty Dollars in two years after my decease, and to my son Calvin Pardee Austin, I give one Dollar in one year after my decease. To Anthony the son of my daughter Dinah Dyer, I give and bequeath twenty five Dollars payable in four years from my decease. I do further give and bequeath unto Sally Austin, daughter of my son, David Austin, one feather bed and bedding immediate after my To my son David Austin, I do give and decease. bequeath all the residue and remainder of my property both real and personal after paying the several legacies above named. And I do also hereby appoint and constitute my said son David Austin my sole executor to this my last Will and Testament.

Signed, sealed and delivered as the last Will and Testament of Isaac Austin this twelfth day of August, 1815 in the presence of us who subscribed our names as witnesses in the presence of the Testator and of each other.

On August 8th, 1815, Isaac Austin and his wife Zilpha Austin sold to his son David Austin and grandson Isaac D. Austin his entire farm for \$4,000.00 each one to have an equal undivided half part of the whole said land. The Deed shall not take effect until the Decease of the said Isaac Austin then to be in full force.

Isaac Austin was known to wear velvet knickerbockers and a white wig. His eye sight was excellent to the last. He died November 21, 1824, and was buried besides his first wife in the grave yard on his own farm. Grave stone still standing in 1926.

David Austin reserved in his deed the following— This Deed also reserves a small piece of land about two rods square in the orchard of said premises for the use of a Burying Ground. November 3, 1825.

In September, 1924, H. Warren Baker had this burying ground restored in excellent condition, and a substantial fence was erected for protection.

Isaac Austin and Elias Austin 1739-1814 were cousins.

/ Elias Austin was the father of Moses Austin born 1767 at Durham, Connecticut.

Moses Austin was a merchant who turned pioneer. He established himself in Philadelphia. Then he settled in Richmond, Va. with his brother William, and later removed to Wythe Co. Next he went with an exploring party to Missouri 1796.

In 1819 he made the suggestion to establish in Texas an American Colony. He rode on horseback from Missouri to San Antonio de Bexar to interview Gov. Martinez in 1820. The petition of Austin allowing him to bring in to Texas 300 families from the United States was finally forwarded to the authorities of the Eastern Internal Provinces. On his way back from Texas to Natchitoches, La. his health was seriously affected from hardships and exposure. He died in the summer of 1821 a few months after his petition had been granted.

Moses' son Stephen Fuller Austin, born at Austinville, Wythe Co., Va., November 3, 1793, carried on the settlement in Texas begun by his father. Stephen F. Austin was called the founder of the state of Texas. The town of Austin was named after him. He died in the midst of his duties as Secretary of State under Sam Houston at Texas, December, 1836.

David Austin (87)

David Austin became a very successful lawyer and a man of wealth.

He was much beloved by the people of his town and county for his gracious personality, his high character, and his generosity, kindness and fairness to the poor.

He was known for settling his cases satisfactorily out of court, and to be a great lover of peace. David Austin was land agent for Governor De-Witt Clinton, who owned a large tract of land in Hartford, Washington Co., N. Y.

He was Town Clerk and Supervisor of Hartford many times from 1799-1820. He was also Justice of the Peace for many years.

David Austin was a member of N. Y. State Assembly in 1803, 1804 and 1820.

Secretary of N. Y. State Office "Council of Appointment." Civil (Vol. G. 10 Page 170) 1811-1816 Washington County. David Austin was appointed Master in Chancery by Gov. Daniel D. Tompkins March 29, 1814.

At the time of the Anti Masonic War, David Austin fixed up the spacious attic of his home for a Lodge Room, and the meetings were held there for many years.

In 1816 there was a famine in Washington Co. The poor suffered greatly at this time. David Austin had large quantities of corn as did the other wealthy men of this county. The others sold their corn at very high prices, but Austin sold his corn at a very moderate price and to the poor only.

David Austin and Gov. DeWitt Clinton were very close friends, and their wives, Hannah Lee Austin and Maria Franklin Clinton were first cousins.

David Austin entertained Gov. Clinton and his friends often, for he had in his home a spacious ball room. For many years Gov. Clinton and his family spent a part of their summers in the home of David Austin.

Gov. Clinton gave to the town of Hartford, the ground for a cemetery. It is here that David Austin is buried. His grave stone still standing in excellent condition 1925.

In January of 1812 a handsome Bible was presented to David Austin by his friends of Hartford. This Bible is in the possession of Mrs. Wm. Tolman. David Austin was the first man to make a motion for abolition of slavery in New York State. He introduced a bill for same at the time DeWitt Clinton was in the legislature.

Interesting Notes from Mrs. Grace Hayden Baker

In a letter to the Chronicle, Mrs. Baker of Seneca Falls, N. Y. writes:

"Wasn't the reunion the greatest ever? I saw so many people whom I never expected to meet again, and am sure that I missed seeing many, many more. It might be of interest to some to know that I am the proud possessor of one of the set of silver spoons given to Mrs. Hannah Lee Austin wife of Judge David Austin by Mrs. Marie Franklin Clinton wife of Gov. DeWitt Clinton. The spoons were marked M. C. to H. A.

Marie Franklin and Hannah Lee were first cousins.

Hannah Lee Austin was my great grandmother.

The first boat launched on the Erie Canal at Port Byron was called the "Wasp" made from a tree taken from the farm of my grandfather, John Adams Taylor, who with his father-in-law, David Austin were passengers on its first trip. They were met in Syracuse, then a village of twenty houses by Gov. DeWitt Clinton and the Lieutenant Governor.

DeWitt Clinton 1769-1828

DeWitt Clinton was an American statesman and lawyer. He was a member of the Senate of New York State; and was elected U. S. Senator, and Mayor of New York. In 1812 he was defeated by Madison for president.

He was governor of New York State 3 terms. In 1825 he officiated at the opening of the Erie Canal, the completion of a work he had devoted the best years of his life, and with which his name will ever be connected.

DeWitt Clinton married Marie Franklin. After her death, he married Catharine Jones, daughter of Dr. Thomas Jones.

Mrs. Tabitha F. Austin had been confined to her cradle with a spinal affection and rheumatism for more than thirty years. She was a woman of wonderful energy and perseverance, was often carried to church in her cradle, and by example and counsel incited many to follow her bright course of Christian patience and cheerfulness.

In 1805 a party of four hardy men left their comfortable homes in Hartford, Washington Co., N. Y. to try the perils and excitement of pioneer life.

With nothing but a compass to guide them, they entered the trackless wilderness in search of Cambray, St. Lawrence Co., N. Y. afterwards named Gouverneur.

The names of the pioneer settlers were Isaac Austin, Jr., Pardon Babcock, Willard Smith and Eleazer Nichols.

The planning and direction of the expedition was under the leadership of Isaac Austin, Jr., who also prepared the provisions of the party.

These pioneers came at the solicitation of Dr. Richard Townsend of Hartford, N. Y., who was land agent for Senator Gouverneur Morris, the owner of a large territory in St. Lawrence Co., N. Y.

After a brief stop at Gouverneur, the party returned to their Hartford homes to prepare for a more lengthy stay, and the preparation for moving their families to the new county.

Early in 1806 Isaac Austin, Jr., returned with his wife Tabitha Foster Austin and their four children, Rebecca, Elwell E., Patty and Joshua.

Mrs. Isaac Austin, Jr., was a helpless invalid by a rheumatic affliction and was carried the whole distance in a small crib prepared for the purpose. The remainder of the party came with their families at this time also.

The high reputation of this country soon brought many new families to the settlement and Gouverneur grew rapidly.

In 1807 Daniel Austin, brother of Isaac Austin, Jr., left him home in Argyle, N. Y. with Dr. Richard Townsend, Dr. James Spencer and five families from Washington Co.

During the summer of 1808 Gouverneur Morris spent three weeks in the town of Gouverneur with his friend Isaac Austin, Jr., from whence he proceeded by water to Ox Bow to visit his nephew Lewis R. Morris

In 1809, Isaac Austin, Jr., was elected the first Justice of Peace, which office in those days carried much weight and responsibility. The Justice was considered the regulator of public and private affairs and the guardian of town morals. He settled family difficulties, gave advice freely and brought offenders to trial. He also married parties and tied the knot as closely as any minister. In short, he was the faithful arbiter of all duties and the willing servant of all parties.

In the immediate neighborhood were many wigwams of the St. Regis Indians, who although proving harmless, were a source of anxiety to the settlers. A young Indian begged Mrs. Austin for a few gills of whisky to quiet a tooth ache. The good stuff was given to him in a small tea pot, but he soon returned for more saying: "It come so easy he got not home before all was gone." A second donation being refused, he sat down by the fire and was soon in a glorious sleep. Other Indians came for small quantities of the good spirits, and complaint was made that it held too much river water and did not produce the desired and delightful sensations of former libations. On the first day of January, 1809 a company of
Indians made a formal visit at the Austin home having previously notified Mr. Austin of their intentions. They were arranged in their best attire, painted and hung with feathers and ornaments of every hue. As they neared the house a salute of several guns somewhat startled the host and family, but after this friendly demonstration they relapsed into their usual quiet, and patiently awaited the dinner they saw preparing.

The bill of fare, as reported by Mrs. Waid, a daughter of the family, should have satisfied a company of gourmands. It consisted of roasted ribs, fried cakes, bread and wine; after which they smoked their pipes of buck-horn, and returned to their homes in better condition than many who have since made New Years calls.

The ever present Indians evidently exercised their ingenuity in contriving ways and means for refreshing their inner man at other people's expense. The squire and family had one day regaled themselves upon a "boiled dinner" and at the usual hour retired to rest. A little after midnight a slight noise attracted the attention of the sleepers, when it was discovered that a party of redskins had taken possession of the kitchen and were generously helping themselves to the best the house afforded. Pork and beef were gulped down in chunks, and potatoes packed them into place. The bread disappeared like snow in summer, and the empty platter bore a famished look as the bewildered owner made his appearance upon the scene of action. Remonstrance was in vain, the thing was done; and it was not the part of prudence to arouse the ire of the intruders. They however, saw the necessity of an apology, and pleaded an unsuccessful chase, extreme hunger, and the known generosity of their host. A gentle reproof was administered, with instructions to call in future by daylight and make their wants known to the proper authorities.

In September of 1810 Calvin Pardee Austin, a second brother of Isaac Austin, Jr., came from Argyle, N. Y. to make his home in Gouverneur. A few years later he settled in Fowler, N. Y., where he died.

The Pioneers brought with them Christian principles. The Sabbath was strictly observed and religious meetings were often held in the house of Isaac Austin. Most of the Pioneers were members of the First Baptist Church of Hartford, N. Y. and as the time passed they felt the need of a Church home. On February 18, 1811, they constituted a Church of Christ with eighteen members, and called it the First Baptist Church of Gouverneur. The names of Isaac Austin, Jr., and his wife Tabitha Foster Austin were among the eighteen members who joined.

In the War of 1812 Isaac Austin, Jr., enlisted with Wm. Fanning, Stephen Patterson, and Stephen Mitchell and went to the front with the first volunteers.

Isaac Austin, Jr., died October 20, 1825, of apoplexy. He was buried in the burial ground given to the town of Gouverneur by Gouverneur Morris in 1810. His body was moved to the Riverside Cemetery in 1860. His grave stone was still standing in good condition August 14, 1924.

The blood of the sturdy old Isaac Austin's family still courses in the veins of the Holbrooks, Cushmans, Waids, Nortons, Corbins and other families of Gouverneur, N. Y.

Gouverneur Morris 1752-1816

Gouverneur Morris was an American statesman and diplomat. He first suggested the Erie Canal. He made the final draft of the Constitution of the United States. He invented the coinage system adopted by the National government. He wrote the Constitution of the State of New York. He was a member of the Continental Congress. He represented the United States as minister to France and England. He was a United States Senator for New York. Gouverneur Morris married Anne Cary Randolph December 25, 1809. She was then 26 years old. Miss Randolph came from an old Viriginia family.

In the spring of 1807 Daniel Austin (97) brother of Isaac Austin, Jr., left his home in Argyle, N. Y., in company with Dr. Richard Townsend, Dr. John Spencer and five other families for the new settlement in Gouverneur.

Daniel Austin brought his wife Mary Elizabeth Davis Austin with him and two children, Elizabeth and Daniel, Jr., born in Argyle, N. Y.

Daniel Austin did his part in clearing the forests and in the making of the town.

Later in life he moved to DePeyster, N. Y., only fifteen miles from Gouverneur.

He died in DePeyster and was buried there. His

grave stone still standing in good condition August 14, 1924.

Letter written by Daniel Austin (97)

DePeyster, N. Y. June 10, 1831

A consumption appears to be appointed to close my life. Through the former part of my sickness, I preferred to believe in Universalism, though at times, I very much doubted the truth of it, and felt that I was unprepared to meet my God in peace. I indulged a hope of recovering my health until the middle of April, when I became convinced that I must soon leave this world and try the reality of eternity. Ι then commenced an impartial examination of the doctrine of Universalism and though I had lived by it, yet when the prospect of a change of worlds was near, I felt unprepared to go; and when I looked that it should have comforted me most, it failed me altogether, and I was left to seek for support from some other source. Believing that I have but a few days to live, I wish to say to all that I now believe that Universalism is false, dangerous, calculated to still the conscience and open a door to much vice.

I now feel it is my duty to warn all against so dangerous a doctrine. I believe that repentance and faith are the only way whereby we can be saved.

When I had no hope but in Universalism, death looked awfully frightful, an impenetrable gloom hung over the grave, and I saw myself exposed to the wrath of God. But having sought the Lord by prayer and faith, I trust I have obtained pardon through Jesus Christ; and blessed be God, I have a hope that supports me in view of death and immortality.

He died the 22nd day of July following after this letter was written. The above letter was found in the bureau drawer of his daughter, Polly Austin Wilson after her death, by Ida Wilson, wife of her son Frank Wilson.

In the name of God, Amen, I, Daniel Austin of DePeyster in the County of St. Lawrence in the State of New York, being weak in body, but of sound of mind and memory, blessed be Almighty God for the same, do make and publish this as my last Will and Testament in a manner and form following viz. First, I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Mary Elizabeth, all my household furniture, and I also give and bequeath unto my beloved wife the use of all my real estate during her natural life and also all my personal property during her life. And at the decease of my said beloved wife, I give and bequeath unto my dear children Elizabeth Austin, Daniel Austin, Jr., Gouverneur Morris Austin, Hiram Austin, Polly Austin, Barbara Austin, and John Austin, equal shares of two hundred and ninety-seven dollars out of my real estate, the same being equable to the first purchase of the farm and the interest arising therefrom to this date. And out of the residue of my real and personal property I give and bequeath unto my sons Hiram and John, one hundred dollars each after the decease of their mother. And lastly as to all the rest, residue and remainder of my personal property or estate, goods, chattels of what kind soever, I give and bequeath equal shares to my two sons Daniel and Hiram after the decease of their affectionate mother. I hereby appoint my wife Mary Elizabeth executrix of this my last Will and Testament and hereby revoking all former wills by me made. In witness whereof I hereunto set my hand and seal this 2nd day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one.

Gen. Edward Bulkley traces his descent to Rev. Peter Bulkley, who emigrated from England, and settling in Massachusetts. He died in Concord, Mass., in 1659. It is said of him in history that he was remarkable for his benevolence, kind dealings and the strictness of his virtues. His father, Captain Charles Bulkley, born 1749, died Feb. 12, 1824.

Gen. Edward Bulkley was born in Colchester, At four years of age his family Conn., in 1789. removed to Massachusetts.

In the War of 1812-14 he was ordered to Plattsburg and subsequent to that war, made captain of a company of State Militia, and rose by regular successive gradations to the rank of brigadier-general.

In 1815 he married Mary Brown, only daughter of Daniel Brown and Mercy Slade of Hartford, Washington Co., N. Y.

She was a lady of rare intellectual culture and refinement and by precept and example, reared and instructed her children in all that makes life honorable and lends influence and character to society.

Isaac Austin had often repeated the story he had heard from his father about the three Austin brothers who came from England to Massachusetts, and as they grew to manhood they separated. One remaining in Massachusetts, one settling in Connecticut, and the third made his way to Rhode Island.

In 1900, Frank E. Austin of Dallas, Texas, met Henry Austin of Belton, Texas, and discussed their Austin genealogy. Henry Austin at that time produced an old chart which read:

Your esteemed favor as well as the pictures came duly to hand, and I appreciate them very much.

Have shown them to my brothers and they as well as I think there is a very considerable family resemblance between your grandfather, Governeur Morris Austin and my father, Norman Austin. But still a more striking resemblance between your father, John Henry Austin and a picture we have of my father, taken when he was a young man. He had much the same face as your father has now. Your father looks very young in his picture, for his age, and has the regular, steady, plain, hard sense looking face of an Austin. I have never seen one who looked like a dude. I do not know the names of the three Austin brothers who came from England but feel quite well satisfied that the parties named by your father are the same.

My grandfather's name was Aaron, and my great grandfather's name was Joab. The Austins seem to have used old Bible names which does more with me than anything else to identify them as the same original family.

Dear Mr. Austin:

Your letter of January 26th addressed to my father, F. K. Austin, received and I am enclosing you a copy of a genealogical statement of the Austin family compiled by Uncle Henry Austin. My father, as well as Henry Austin and all the others except Chas. Austin, died several years ago.

In addition to the statement I am sending, will say that my grandfather, Norman Austin was born in New York. He clerked for ten years in a store, probably in St. Louis, and came to Texas in 1835. He ran a store for a short time in San Antonio prior to the Mexican War, then closed up and went to Goliad, Texas, and joined General Fannin's command, who was surrounded and surrendered to Mexican General Coss. General Coss promised them the courtesies of prisoners of war, but after they surrendered he lined them up and shot them. My grandfather, Norman Austin, was one of the few who escaped from prison. Afterwards he went to Mississippi and mar-He lived there a short time returning to Texas. ried. Immediately following the Civil War he took his family through Mexico, then to California, then to Central America and back to California; then back to Belton, Texas, where he started from.

One of my grandfather's brothers lived in Michigan and has a family scattered through there, but I do not know their names nor their locations, probably it is Norville, Michigan.

Uncle Henry Austin was very systematic in his records of everything, and he might have some more information stored away at his house in regard to the Austins in Michigan, as he visited them once.

Mrs. Henry Austin is still living but in bad health and if you will write her at Belton, Texas, she might be able to give you more information.

If I can be of any further service to you I will be glad to do so, and any additional statement you might have would be appreciated by me.

Norman Austin moved to Florence, Ala., from Michigan in 1832—3, came to Texas in 1853 and was a member of Capt. Albert C. Horton's company, Col. Fannin's Regiment which was captured at Goliad in March, 1836. Most of Fannin's men were shot by order of Santa Anna on March 7, 1836. Norman Austin escaped and was married to Eliza Ann Houston in Brandon, Miss., on July 11, 1843,

moved to Texas and died at Belton, Texas, May 12, 1890; was an old Texas Veteran as shown by the rolls of that organization.

Ensign Stephen Kellogg, father Deacon Silas, saw military service as an Ensign; was born Apr. 9, 1668, and died May 8th, 1694, at Westfield, Mass.

Lieut. Joseph Kellogg, father of Ensign Stephen Kellogg was born in 1626, died in 1707—8. He lived at Hadley, Conn., and Farmington, Mass. He was in King Phillips Indian War (See Kellogg Genealogy, published in Mass.) His second wife, and mother of Ensign Stephen Kellogg was Abigail Terry, daughter of Stephen Terry. (Noted on Belden and Terry families from Savage Genealogical Dictionary, states John Belden was the father of Lydia Belden, who married Ensign Stephen Kellogg.)

Ruth Root, wife of Deacon Silas Kellogg, was a daughter of Joshua Root, who was born Nov. 23, 1682, and died Sept. 28, 1730, at Westfield, Mass. John Root, father of Joshua Root was commissary of the Garrison at Westfield, Mass., 1675—6 in King Phillips Indian War.

Moses Kellogg, father of May and Polly Kellogg, (the latter wife of Aaron Austin) and grandfather of Franklin Kellogg Austin, was a soldier (corporal) in Capt. Sylvanus Wilcox's Company, Col. John Ashley's regiment. See history Col. John Ashley's regiment in Mass. Archives.

Franklin Kellogg Austin was born Nov. 14, 1846 at Brandon, Miss., Rankin County. He married Mary Ann Catherine Schrock, 1873, Belton, Texas. Franklin Kellogg Austin died Jan. 19, 1920.

In the Original Lists of Persons of Quality who went from Great Britain to the American Plantations 1600-1700 by John Camden Hatten (1874) 40, Richard Austin —tailor of Bishopstocke, his wife 05 and two children. Robert Knight his servants—carpenter. May 1638. Page 298.

Henry Austin's chart does not give the name of Betsy Austin's husband, and Hatten's book does not give the name of Richard Austin's wife, nor does it mention an infant.

Richard Austin died the same year of his arrival in America 1638, and there is no further mention of him.

Many of the Austins believe that Richard Austin's wife was Betsy Austin or Elizabeth, and that they had three sons: Richard, Robert, and Anthony.

The writer had inserted the above genealogical records to preserve the work of Henry Austin of Belton, Texas. Also hoping that records will be found to prove that the three Austin brothers who came from England were three sons of Richard Austin.

Richard Austin came to Charlestown, Mass., in the Bevis from Southampton in May, 1638, with wife and two children. He was aged 40 years, and had been of Bishopstocke in the County of Hants.

Richard Austin, son of Richard Austin, of Charlestown, Mass., was born in Bishopstocke, England, 1632. He married Nov. 11, 1659, Abigail Batchelder, daughter of William Batchelder. He had eleven children as follows:
