Preface

The preface of a book is seldom read. You are requested to read this preface, for three reasons. First, it is short; second, it is written with common simple words; third, it may assist you in understanding what you are about to study.

All knowledge is either in the minds of individual persons, or in books and other records. Memory is not always a dependable agency for safekeeping of knowledge. The mind has a way of playing tricks on its possessor. That information which is handed down by word of mouth often undergoes many changes and the true facts become mixed with each other, and the truth is not always preserved. While information is fresh in the minds of individuals, it should be written down and placed in safekeeping for future generations.

My memory is good enough that I have been able to call between ten and twelve thousand people by name. I began working on Ausmus history when I was a teenager, writing down what my grandfather told me. But the loss of these records, plus the lapse of time, will no doubt lend toward confusion in the data which I have and the loss of other data which have been forgotten. This condition prevails, regardless of the nature of the information. Most families have been negligent in keeping accurate records of their own kin, to say nothing of records of persons whom they have known and with whom they have been closely associated. The Ausmus family has been no exception to general practice. The information compiled for this family history has come from old family Bible records and numerous gravestones in many graveyards. The greatest help on the history of the Ausmuses in Tennessee was compiled by Dr. Lawrence Edwards, author of Old Speedwell Families. I felt that it would be a disgrace not to put into book form my better than forty years of intermittent research. This will make the 210 years of Ausmus history available for future generations to enjoy. I am thankful for the wonderful spirit of cooperation received from so many fine people. After writing almost 700 letters, one becomes enthusiastic and excited about receiving material for a family history.

To help you understand the mechanics of this family history, I am starting with the children of Philip Ausmus. There were six children, four sons and two daughters. The first son and his descendants will be

listed under "1A1"; the second son, under "1B2"; the third son, under "1C3"; the fourth child was a daughter. Her family will be listed under the letter "1D4"; the fifth child, a daughter, under "1E5"; the sixth child, a son, will be listed under "1F6." The prefix-figure will represent the generation, then the capital letter designating the family, and the suffixnumber will designate which child was born first, second, third, etc. For example, "1A1" is the first generation of the "A" family and the last figure shows this was the first child born in that family. Another example, "5B10." The "5" is for the fifth generation, the "B" is for the specific family and the "10" is for the tenth child born of that particular family. You may find "3A3" several times or "3B3," or "4C4" or "5F5" or "3F3" three or four times in each family, but in making reference the full name must be used to distinguish which "3A3" or "3F3" you wish to mention. Another example, "4A1" is Benjamin Franklin Ausmus and "4A1" is also Jesse LaFayette Ausmus. I doubt the occurrence of the same name and same number. However, it could happen. Each family is carried through 1962 before starting another, where the name Ausmus still exists.

In concluding this preface, I want to say in advance that I am not absolutely sure of all my data; I have tried to prove it the best I knew how. But often the most carefully kept records prove incorrect and unless checked and double-checked, may perpetuate an error for all posterity. Any errors which exist in the book may be due to the lack of information or it may be due to a misinterpretation of the material I received. If it is the latter, then I express my humble apology. Nevertheless, I hope you enjoy this book concerning Ausmus history.

Introduction

It was 210 years ago, October 4, 1752, when Johann Peter Assum and his two sons, Philip and Benjamin, anded at the port of Philadelphia, after leaving Rotterdam, Holland, with Captain John Mason on the ship named *Neptune*. My grandfather always claimed they had landed at Jamestown, Virginia, October 2, 1755. But according to R. B. Strassburger's *Pennsylvania German Pioneers*, Vol. I, p. 493, the above date and place is correct. The four of them and their possessions weighed one thousand pounds. The wife of Johann Peter died on the way over and was buried at sea. When they left Rotterdam, they sailed by the way of Cowes, England, and then continued sailing for America.

This family belonged to the Tunker's or Dunkard's religious sect. This denomination first appeared in Germany at Schwartzenau in 1708, on the banks of the River Eder in Westphalia, and they were driven by persecution to Crefeld and Holland. Between the years 1719 and 1729, ninetyfive percent of this religious sect had come to America, most of them were men of education and intelligence. By 1850 there were over 200,000 with 1000 ministers in the United States. The reason the Assum family landed in Pennsylvania rather than another colony, was because Germans were more kindly treated there. The Tunkers were an odd sect of people believing in unpretentious living. For baptism, they believed in dipping three times, face forward in a flowing stream. The rite of foot washing was followed by communion, by a handshake, symbolizing "the right hand of fellowship," and by "the holy kiss of charity" on the cheek. Each man shook hands and exchanged kisses with the man whose feet he washed and the man who washed his feet. This procedure was also done by the women. Many of them made it a point of wearing long beards, wearing coarse clothes, and walking with a solemn pace. Like other German sects, they refused to take oaths or bear arms. I went to Davis Creek Church with my grandfather to a foot washing and baptism. He was very true to his religion, but they called it Hardshell Baptist.

The researchers helping establish the facts could not find where the Ausmuses lived between the time of arrival and 1760. The next account of Peter Assum or Assam was found in Augusta County, Virginia, where he had paid tithables in 1760. During the eight-year period in which there is no account of the Assum family, they perhaps lived in Pennsylvania. The expense involved in tracing that period would have been more than the value.

Doctor John Franklin Vallentine (see under 3F8 Mary Jane Standley, b. October 18, 1860), Miss F. Flavia Converse, Harrisonburg, Virginia, Miss Katherine Anderson, Staunton, Virginia, Mrs. F. N. (Genevieve) Peters, Arlington, Virginia, also working in Richmond, Virginia, and Washington, D.C., did the most effective research. They found where Peter Assum bought 110 acres of land on April 30, 1770, lying between Peaked Mountain and the Shenandoah River in Augusta County, Virginia. This land joined Daniel Link, Prunemor's land, and Peter Fisher's line. The land had been surveyed by Thomas Lewis. According to the Register of Deeds, book 01, page 216, Peter Asam also bought 31 acres in Augusta County, Virginia, on the headwaters of Humes Run, a branch of the Shenandoah River on March 10, 1773.

It seems that every time they changed tax collectors, they changed the spelling of the name. In 1778, the northern part of Augusta County was cut off to help form Rockingham County and this same property and the tax paid on it was by Peter Osmos. Then in 1781, 30 acres of this 131 acres disappeared and Peter Osmus started paying taxes on 111 acres. Peter Osmos, Ousmus, Osmus, kept paying taxes on the same tract of land until 1802. Miss Converse searched through all the years to May of 1815 and could not find what disposition was made of the 111 acres of land. We did find in 1780 where Peter Ossmus paid tax on a 17-year-old daughter and again in 1782, he paid on a 17-year-old daughter, and had two daughters, age 5 and 7, not taxable. The taxable age started at age 16. The Rockingham County, Virginia, tax lists of 1782 states where Philip Asmus paid white tithes on one person, indicating he had no children 16 years of age. He paid tax on three horses and five cattle. He was also on John Thomas's tax returns, Captain Chrisman's Company.

The Shenandoah County, Virginia Wills listed a bill of sale of goods of Benjamin Ausden, who died on January 19, 1807. His name was found again and they spelled it as Ousmas. The administrator was Abraham Strichter. Traditionally, Ben was an herb doctor and was an old bachelor. He was, according to my grandfather, George Washington's doctor while George was a young surveyor in Western Virginia. Ben evidently was born about 1735, since he and Philip were under 21 years of age when they landed at Philadelphia. According to tradition, Johann Peter Assum, Osmos, Osmus, or Asmus was born 1711 and lived to be 95 to 105 years old. But since he stopped paying taxes in 1802, in all probability he died the same year, making him only 91 years of age. It is agreed by the specialized researchers and myself, that Johann Peter Assum or Osmos was the father of Philip Asmus or Osmos and Benjamin Ousden or Ousmas and they were all born in Germany. It seems reasonable that Peter married the second time about 1760 and they had two daughters.

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The older one, Elizabeth Ozman, b. 1763, was given in marriage to John Hunter, Jr., in May, 1781. We don't know what happened to the other daughter. We are of the opinion that Peter married the third time and had two more daughters. These two were five and seven years old, listed on the tax list of 1782.

According to Book I, page 93, in the Register of Deeds Office at Jonesboro, Tennessee, John Hunter, Jr., on August 10, 1783, bought 299 acres on Cherokee Creek, Washington County, North Carolina, which states it was a grant but John had to pay 150 pounds to Hosea Rose, agent for the State of North Carolina. John had two other grants and he paid yearly 50 shillings, until the total amount was paid. Book I, page 282, states that John Hunter, Jr. and his wife, Elizabeth, sold to Peter Ruble, 50 acres for 25 pounds. According to the Register of Deeds office at Jonesboro, John Jr. evidently had brothers, Jacob, Caleb, William, and Joseph, who came to what is now Tennessee and all received land grants with the privilege of paying 50 shillings per year per 100 acres until full amounts were paid. William and John Jr. moved to Claiborne County in 1800.

Philip Ausmus' moving to Claiborne County in 1795 perhaps influenced his sister, Elizabeth, and her husband, John Jr. and John's brother, William to move into the same community. John and Elizabeth Ozmus Hunter had four sons; James, John, Solomon and Joseph. Joseph was born in Washington County, North Carolina, now Tennessee, on March 15, 1791, and married Betsy Moyers in Claiborne County, Tennessee. She was born in Rockingham, Virginia, in 1794. She was the daughter of Michael Moyers and his wife, Elizabeth. Michael and two of his brothers, Jacob and Philip, settled in Rockingham County, Virginia, and one brother, John, settled in Shenandoah County. They were all born in Germany. Michael and Elizabeth brought their seven children to Claiborne County, Tennessee in 1807 and paid \$800 for a farm about three miles from the Ausmus Fort. Their youngest son, John, born in Virginia in 1798, married Lou Ann Ausmus, a daughter of Henry 1A1. The Moyers name in Clairborne County, Tennessee, is pronounced "Myers." The Joseph Hunter who married Betsy Moyers was pastor of the Davis Creek Church for many years after the death of its founder, Philip Ausmus, who was an uncle of Joseph.

My grandfather always said the name was Ausmussin in Germany. In my research, the September 22, 1961 issue of *Time* magazine had an article on page 87 under Religion, about Dr. Hans Christian Asmussen of Hiedelberg, Germany. I wrote the Hiedelberg Chamber of Commerce and they sent his address to me. After corresponding with Doctor Asmussen, he claimed our name in Germany was Asmus and not Asmussen. He said the name was an old family name near Flensburg, which is north of Hamburg about 60 miles. I wrote the Flensburg Chamber of Commerce and they replied in the German language which I had translated. They said there were four families living there but that they were not born in Flensburg. My grandfather claimed that Benjamin and Philip came from the state of Mecklenburg near the city of Schwerin and it was about 60 miles east of Hamburg. Evidently, my grandfather was correct. He said the name, Ausmus, meant "unchangeable" while some have said the word meant "stubborn."

Philip Ausmus was born in 1733, according to my grandfather, and came to America at the age of 22, but according to records, he was 19 years old. Grandfather said that Philip was 40 years old when he married Elizabeth Neva (called Betty) in Shenandoah Valley, Virginia. He said she was a tall black-headed woman, with sky-blue eyes and was an old-maid school teacher 30 years old when she married. I am in doubt about the maiden name "NEVA" but he wasn't. Philip was a Dunkard preacher (today's Church of the Brethren). There was a colony of Dunkards across the river from Staunton, Virginia, also one in the flats at Salem, Virginia, and another across the river from Radford, Virginia. Philip came to Washington County, North Carolina (now Tennessee) sometime in January 1783. He left Rockingham County, Virginia, after paying his 1782 taxes. In the Washington County Clerk's office, Book One, page 236, Minutes of the Quarterly Sessions of the County Court, February 2, 1783, ordered to be recorded a deed of conveyance from Jonathan Tipton to Phillip Ozamus for 200 acres of land and it was acknowledged in court. This deed was recorded October 21, 1783 as follows:

REGISTER OF DEED, RECORD BOOK 3, PAGE 272, Jonesboro, Tenn.

This indenture made the twenty first day October one thousand seven hundred and eighty three between Jonathan Tipton of Washington County and State of North Carolina of the one part and Phillip Ausummuss of the County and state afforsaid of the other Part witnesseth that the said Johnathan Tipton for and in consideration of the sum of two hundred pounds good lawfull money of the state afforsaid to him in hand paid by the said Phillip Ausummus the receipt whereof the said Jonathan Tipton doth hereby acknowledge hath granted allowed released and confirmed and by these presents doth grant allowed release and confirm unto the said Phillip Ausummus all that tract or parcel of land situate lying and being in the county and state afforsaid containing two hundred acres. Beginning at a black oak thence south thereby degrees East 62 poles to a poplar thence south seventy six degrees east one hundred and seventy four poles to a hicory then south seven degrees east one hundred and seventy eight poles to a mahogany or mountain burch thence north seventy six degrees west one hundred and sixty four poles to a stake then South thirty five degrees west one hundred and forty six poles to the place of beginning-together with all woods waters


mines minerals hereditaments and appurtenances to the said land belonging or appertaining to hereunto the said Phillip Ausummus his heirs assigns forever which tract and parcel of land be the said Jonathan Tipton does hereby warrant and forever defend unto him the said Phillip Ausummus his heirs and assign from all and every person and persons claiming the same from by or under him or from by or under any of my heirs execctors, administrators or assigns in all and every case whatsoever and In Testomony where as he the said Jonathan Tipton has hereunto sets his hand and affixed his seal the Day and Year first above written.

This land lies about one mile south of present-day Johnson City, Tennessee, on the east side of Sinking Creek, across the road from the James Boren and Mordicai Price farms. (Incidentally, they were also from Rockingham County, Virginia.)

Philip Ausmus and two of his sons, Henry and Peter, went to Powell Valley in 1792 or 1793, surveyed and staked off 600 acres of land. They started felling tall trees to build a fort-like house. At the same time, they were clearing and cleaning land for the planting of crops. After the buildings were built and crops gathered, Philip moved his family into the wilderness fort-like house. The house was a double log house without a floor or windows at first. The house had three port holes on each side reached by a ladder running up the wall on the inside to the loft. They used these port holes to shoot through when subdueing the Indians. When the Indians made their attacks, the neighbors would run to the Ausmus fort or house because it was bigger and safer. The Ausmus house was 28 feet by 18 feet with a four-foot front door. They also built another house about ten feet away which they used for a place to cook and eat. It was about twelve feet by fifteen feet and had a loft in it for sleeping. It was not a two-story like the main house. According to my grandfather, Philip Ausmus and his two older sons, Henry and Peter met at Yoakum Fort in 1795 with other pioneers and defied the Government when William Blount, the Governor of the Territory South of the Ohio River, had written them asking them to get off the Indian territory. The people at Yoakum Fort agreed to die before leaving their homes and crops and they so informed the Governor. In 1797, Philip Ausmus donated the land and the settlers all co-operated in the building of Davis Creek Church. Philip, being a Dunkard preacher, would take his German gun along with him whenever he preached. Mrs. Blanch Ausmus Hartman 4B4, still has the old Philip Ausmus gun. Philip preached in this church until his death in

1809. He was buried in the backyard of the church, of which he had such a great hand in establishing. The following spring after the death of Philip, there came a flood and Davis Creek overflowed Philip's grave. When Philip's wife, Betty, died in 1811, the family established the Ausmus Cemetery on higher ground, where they buried their mother. This Ausmus graveyard is kept in good condition and is being used today.

Grandfather said that Philip Ausmus was a little short of six feet tall and was sandy-haired, with gray-blue eyes and that he appeared to be the least bit stoop-shouldered. We could not ascertain what disposition Philip Ausmus made of his one-third of the 600-acre farm. Peter sold his 200 acres for \$160 on the 6th day of April, 1802, to Latin Ewell. Peter signed his name, Peter Asmus.

Below is the signature of Philip Ausmus when he sold a farm in Washington County, Tennessee, to Frederick Andrews on September 22, 1802. He visited in Washington County as late as 1806.

1A1 Henry Ausmus, b. February 16, 1774, d. May 3, 1849; m. Malinda Price, February 16, 1799, in Washington County, Tenn. She was born January 14, 1782, and died April 4, 1864.

Henry Ausmus was born in Augusta County, Virginia, between Shenandoah Mountain and the Shenandoah River, not far from present-day Rawley Springs. At that time, the Humes Run branch was the headwaters of the Shenandoah River. This section became the southwestern part of Rockingham County in 1778. Henry came to Washington County, North Carolina, January, 1783, when he was about nine years old. His father, Philip, bought a 200-acre farm from Jonathan Tipton, situated on the east side of the highway across the road from James Boren and Mordecai Price, east of Sinking Creek. This is about one mile south of present-day Johnson City, Tennessee.

Traditionally, Henry and his brother, Peter, and their father, Philip, bought 600 acres of land in Powell Valley in 1792, which later turned out to be Claiborne County, Tennessee, near what is now known as Speedwell, Tennessee. They did not receive a deed for the land until 1802. They built a large double log house near a bubbling spring. The house was two logs long with a four-foot front door and two stories high. The size was about twenty-eight feet by eighteen feet. A ladder was built straight up the inside wall to climb into the loft, where they had three portholes on each side about two feet square. They also built another house about twelve by fifteen feet that was used for cooking and eating. The entire family did not move until the first of January 1795.

During the late fall of 1798, Henry went back to Sinking Creek, Washington County, and stayed until about the first of March, 1799. On


his twenty-fifth birthday he married a little sandy-haired girl, Malinda Price. She was about five feet tall and had a good personality. She was the daughter of Mordecai Price and his wife, Rachel Boren Price. The Prices came from Shenandoah Valley, Virginia, to Tennessee in 1776. Mordecai was born in Virginia in 1749 and died in Washington County, Tenn., August, 1799. His wife, Rachel, was the daughter of James and Sarah Boren or Boring, from Shenandoah Valley, Virginia. The Borens and Prices came to Tennessee together and bought land joining each other. Malinda had the following brothers and one sister: (1) Benjamin, b. 1778, m. Polly Denton; (2) James, b. 1780, m. Frances Threewitts; (3) Thomas, b. 1785, d. 1828, m. Margaret Harrison; (4) Dolphin, called "Doll," b. 1788, m. Mary Swanger; (5) Christopher, b. 1791, m. Mary McInturff; (6) Mordecai, Jr., b. 1794, m. Ines Thompson, b. 1801. They were married January 2, 1817 and moved to Claiborne County. They had two daughters who married Thomas brothers. Sarah, m. Thad Thomas; Julia, m. James Thomas. Mordecai's eldest son, Henry, m. Harriet Hopper, (Her mother was Louisa Carr.) They had five sons; John, James, Henry, Bill, and Dorsey. (7) Sarah, b. 1797, m. Samuel Wright.

Henry Ausmus was fairly well educated. He was a good business man; bought land in Washington County which he sold for a profit. He bought land several times in Claiborne County, totaling over a thousand acres, and also sold it for a profit. He helped James Stewart, a surveyor in Washington County, as a young man. He learned how to lay out roads and property lines, which helped him get a job in Claiborne County building roads. The roads he built from Old Town Creek to Wilson Gap from 1820 to 1843, a part of Highway 63 in Powell Valley, is still being used as he surveyed it 140 years ago. He was a dark brown-haired man, about five feet, ten inches tall, weighing about 180 pounds. His wife was jolly and always had something funny to tell. In her latter days, she would tell about riding along Brush Creek (now Johnson City) and seeing deer on the other side. She would tell about going to see horse racing as a girl. She enjoyed telling about slipping up on a deer, catching and holding on to it until someone came and killed the deer. She shot at three Indians trying to steal something or perhaps trying to kidnap her while the men were in the field working. She evidently shot one, as the other two picked up one Indian and carried him away. She never knew what happened to the one she shot.

Henry and Malinda lie buried in the Ausmus graveyard. The land was donated to the public for a cemetery by the Ausmuses.

2A1 Benjamin Ausmus, b. July 27, 1801 in Claiborne County, Tennessee, d. October 10, 1862, m. Anna Christina Dunn,* b. May 4, 1802,

d. June 23, 1881. They were married January 10, 1822. Anna was the daughter of Thomas Dunn, b. in Wythe County, Virginia, d. September 19, 1839 in Claiborne County, Tennessee, m. Peggy Beeler Smith, d. November 20, 1846. Thomas Dunn settled in Powell Valley, Tennessee in 1783 about on mile north of where the Ausmuses settled in 1795. Anna's brother, Johnny Dunn, married her husband's sister, Rachel Ausmus, the first daughter of Henry and Malinda Price Ausmus. Anna was a large woman. It is tradition that she weighed 300 pounds. She and Ben had 12 children. Ben Ausmus was over six feet tall, weighing about 225 pounds. He bought 160 acres of land from his father for \$600 on January 11, 1834, which included the old Ausmus fort-like house. His father and family moved into the smaller house old German Phillip had

lived in at the time of his death. Ben and his wife, Anna, lie buried in the Ausmus Cemetery on the old home place at Speedwell, Tennessee.



Jr., was killed in an automobile accident, one lived to manhood.





of this Ausmus history perhaps would have never been found or it would have taken two or three years longer.

2A2 Rachel Ausmus, b. August 5, 1803, d. August 15, 1871, m. Johnny Dunn, b. January 30, 1793, d. September 28, 1878. They had fourteen children. Johnny Dunn was the fifth child of Thomas Dunn and his wife, Peggy Beeler Smith. They settled in Powell Valley about one mile north of the Ausmus Fort in 1783. Their children were: Henry, Thomas, William, Benjamin, Madison, John Jr., Rachel, Anna, Malinda, Catherine, Joseph, Marion, and Elizabeth. For a complete history of the Dunn family, see *Old Speedwell Families*.

2A3 Lou Ann Ausmus, b. June 6, 1805, m. John Moyers, b. 1798 in Rockingham County, Virginia. He was the son of Michael and Elizabeth Moyers, born in Germany. John had three brothers and three sisters, Rachel, Henry, Ava, Abraham, Betsy, m. Joseph Hunter. His mother was Elizabeth Osmos, Philip's half-sister.

2A4 Hiram Ausmus, b. December 1, 1807 in Claiborne County, near Speedwell, Tennessee. This was across the creek from Davis Creek Church, which his grandfather, Philip, helped establish in 1797; d. December 13, 1888. He was a sandy-haired man, about five feet, six inches tall, and weighing under 200 pounds. He married Sarah Sharp (called Sally) b. December 10, 1813, d. February 6, 1877. They were married December 24, 1829. She was a little blue-eyed girl with silky black hair. She was the daughter of George Sharp, Jr. b. January 6, 1791 in Virginia, and his wife, Agnes Kirk Sharp, b. November 3, 1792, from Botetourt (Montgomery) County, Virginia. George and Agnes remained in Claiborne County. Sally's brother, Nicholas Sharp, m. her husband's sister, Malinda Ausmus. Her younger sister, Cynthia, m. her husband's brother, John. Her grandfather, George Sharp, Sr., bought land in Claiborne County, Tennessee in 1798, not far from the Ausmuses. He later took eight of his children and moved to Macaupin County, Illinois, in 1832, where he later died at the age of 85. They went along with Nathan Perry and his family.

Hiram and Sally had two sons and four daughters. Hiram lived in what became Union County in 1850, from the time he married until January 21, 1835. At that time he bought 80 acres of land from his father and paid him \$260 for it. The land had the log house on it that his Uncle John, b. 1778, had built on a rise just east of the spring and across the creek from Davis Creek Church. John built the house in 1801 or 1802. A part of the logs are still there, but have been converted into a crib, and another house built where the old one stood. Hiram later returned to Union County. When he died, he was buried beside his wife in Hunter Cemetery near the old home place, near Davis Creek Church.


3A1 Benjamin Ausmus (called Ridge Ben), b. November 24, 1830 in Claiborne County, Tennessee, d. April 12, 1901, m. Elizabeth Proffitt, b. July 17, 1838, d. November 11, 1915. They were married August 14, 1855 in Claiborne County, Tennessee, but moved to Union County soon after they were married. She was the daughter of Enoch Proffitt. Elizabeth had a brother, Joseph Proffit, who married Katie Hunter. Ridge Ben had

a big leg, caused by white swelling. He walked with a cane most of his life. He was a great storyteller, and tried to learn all he could about the Ausmus family. He drilled his son, David, in Ausmus history, and David drilled his grandson, Harry L. Ausmus. Ridge Ben died in Union County, but he and his wife lie buried in Bolinger Cemetery in Claiborne County. Ben and Betsy had nine children.

4A1 David Ausmus,* b. in Union County, Tennessee on May 4, 1856, d. September 9, 1925, m. Amy Wright, b. February 6, 1862, d. November 11, 1898. She was the daughter of William Morgan Wright and Polly Lynch Wright. Amy's brothers and sisters were John, Malinda, Willie,

Easter, Sarah, and Mary Ann. David Ausmus was about five feet, six inches tall, weighed about 120 pounds; had keen blue eyes and real fine black hair. He knew more Ausmus history than anyone in Tennessee. He was drilled by his grandfather, Hiram and by his father, Ridge Ben. David worked hard as a poor farmer all his life. His wife died at the age of 36 and he was about 42 years old. He never married again. He came to live with his eldest son, Harrison, and while there inspired his grandson, Harry Ausmus, about the wonderful Ausmus family, which caused this history to be written. He had three sons and one daughter. David died in the Eastern State Hospital, Knoxville, Tennessee, where he had been for about eight months.

5A1 William Harrison Ausmus, b. December 1, 1880 in Union County, Tennessee, d. March 29, 1939, while eating dinner; m. Mary Blaine Williams, b. November 2, 1884. They were married February 10, 1904. She was the daughter of William David and Mary Harp Williams. Harrison was a tenant farmer until 1910, when he bought a 15-acre farm about four miles southwest of Speedwell, Tennessee, in a community called Well Springs. He went to work in the coal mines and after about a year he took up the carpenter's trade, which he followed over 20 years. He would not do a job of making cabinets or building a house if he could not do a job to perfection. Harrison and Blaine had eight children, one born dead, seven still living. They were Republicans and Methodists. After Harrison's death, Blaine took a very active part in the different organizations of the local church. She remained on the farm alone after her youngest child married.

6A1 Harry Lee Ausmus,* b. January 2, 1905 in Claiborne County, Valley Creek, Tennessee, m. Gretna Ellen Childress, b. November 26, 1909 at LaFollette, Tennessee. They married December 30, 1928. She was the daughter of Alvis Lindsey (called Abb) Childress and Mary Callie Edens Childress. Abb was a very active farmer and very interested in community and county affairs. He served as chairman of the Republican Party of Campbell County, Tennessee. He served seven years on the county school board of education, serving as chairman one year.

Gretna won the All East Tennessee basketball team title in her senior year in high school in 1928. She is Librarian for the Council of Garden Clubs of Johnson City, Tennessee; President of the Spade and Trowel Garden Club, an active member of the W.S.C.S. of Munsey Memorial Methodist Church, The Monday Club, and The Washington County Antiquity Society.

Harry attended East Tennessee State College, Johnson City, Tennessee * Pictured, frontis.



1B2 Peter Ausmus, b. October 12, 1775 in Augusta County, Virginia, d. Feb, 1861 in Adams County, Illinois, m. Rhoda Roberts, b. 1784 in Virginia, d. March 28, 1859, in Marion County, Missouri. They were married in 1799 in Claiborne County, Powell Valley, Tennessee.

Peter Ausmus was born in Augusta County, Virginia near the Northern border of the county. This part of Augusta County in 1778 was taken to form Rockingham County. Peter came to what is now Washington County, Tennessee, along with his parents in January, 1783. The Washington County, North Carolina court records at Jonesboro, Tennessee show that the County Court on February 2, 1783, ordered Jonathan Tipton to convey 200 acres of land to Phillip Ozamus and have same recorded, which was not done until the 21st day of October, 1783. Peter, along with his older brother, Henry, and his father, purchased 600 acres of land in Powell Valley in 1792, which became Claiborne County, Tennessee in 1802, after which they received a deed.

Peter married Rhoda Roberts, believed to be the daughter of Charles and Suzanah Roberts who came from Shenandoah Valley, Virginia. He bought 568 acres of land on February 28, 1778 in Washington County, North Carolina, later removed to Claiborne County. There are recorded deeds made to Ed and James Roberts in 1808 and 1809, who may be brothers of Rhoda. Peter and Rhoda deeded a plot of land March 11, 1844 for the New Salem Baptist Church to be built on.

After the death of the mother of Peter, and the settlement of the estate, Peter took his family to Franklin, Tennessee, the county seat of Williamson County. They lived in Williamson County from 1811 until 1817 when they moved to St. Clair County, Illinois, near Belleville, Illinois. Then in 1825 he moved to Adams County, Illinois where he spent most of his days. Peter was a farmer all his life. He was over 6 feet tall, with black hair, blue eyes and features like his mother.

2B1 Philip Ausmus, b. January 1800, d. February 2, 1877, at the age of 77. Married in Illinois to Elizabeth Hammer, b. 1805 in Washington County, Tennessee, a daughter of Jonathan Hammer. Listed are their children: Peter, b. 1824, Martha, b. 1826, Thomas, b. 1828, Susan, John, Fred, Andrew and Elizabeth. Jonathan Hammer was a Dunkard Preacher. He had a son Isaac.

2B2 Phebe, b. 1802 in Claiborne County, Tennessee; d. in 1824, in St. Clair County, Illinois.

2B3 John Ausmus, b. 1804 in Claiborne County, Tennessee; d. 1885 in Concord, Illinois. m. Ann Rebecca Ballow, b. May 13, 1807, in Girard County, New York; d. March 21, 1899 at Concord, Adams County, Illinois. They were married in 1828.

John was a Christian minister. They had ten children. Reverend John opened up one of the first churches in Concord. John preached his first sermon at the log house belonging to his father, Peter, in the summer of 1832. The congregation gathered under a tree in the yard. John Ausmus was of the faith known in those days as the Emancipating Baptist. The cabin of Peter Ausmus was a favorite place for church gatherings. One Sunday after the congregation had assembled, a disagreeable scratching and fussing was heard in the loft of the cabin. The hens had been allowed to go there and make their nests. The noise was nothing uncommon, nor would it have been out of order if it had not been on Sunday, and quite an audience waiting below. It became more and more annoying until "Old" Peter Ausmus broke out with, "Dave, go into the loft and kick that old hen's tail feathers till her nose bleeds." It was like a thunderclap from a clear sky, but everyone present knew it was only one of Old Peter's oddities.

John and Ann were buried in Ausmus Cemetery, Concord, Illinois.

3B1 Martha Jane, b. 1829, married William Schulls. Their children were: Charles, killed in the Civil War; Priscilla, Arthur, Edward and John.



pounds, had black hair and blue eyes. He married Martha Hudson Ballow,* b. February 14, 1811 in Franklin, Tennessee. Her sister Ann, married John B. Ausmus (2B2). Martha Ballow and Ann Ballow were the daughters of William H. Ballow, b. October 10, 1783, in Cumberland County, Virginia, and his wife, Priscilla Maniere. They came to Williamson County, Tennessee in 1809. William Ballow's father, Charles Ballow, was a Major under General George Washington.

Peter Ausmus moved from Claiborne County, Tennessee to William-

son County, Tennessee as a baby, along with the family in 1812, where they lived until 1817, and his family moved to St. Clair County, Illinois. The Ballows moved to Morgan County, Illinois in April, 1827. Peter Ausmus and Martha Hudson Ballow were married July 9, 1829, and moved to Brown County, Illinois. In 1832 they moved to Adams County. They lived in a small log cabin where curtains served as doors. Martha and her children would be alone for weeks while Peter split rails with Abe Lincoln, working for Governor Wood of Illinois, in Sangamon County. Abe Lincoln and Peter, Jr. would wrestle after the day's work was over. Peter Ausmus was a Primitive Baptist minister and no doubt

had influence on Abe Lincoln while playing and working together. Peter split rails for Governor Wood to pay for the land he had entered at Clayton, Illinois. Lincoln perhaps had great influence in molding the sound and stable character of Peter Ausmus. Copies of letters written by Peter reveal his carefulness in penmanship. His English, punctuation, and technique of expressing himself were surpassed only by Abe Lincoln.

Peter Jr. and his wife Martha, bought the first cook stove ever to be used around Clayton. People came from far and near to see this stove. Peter was one of the first circuit riding preachers. He was pastor of Little Missouri and Bear Creek Churches. He moved to Lynn County, Missouri and was pastor of Liberty Church for three years. In March, 1859, he came back to Illinois and took charge of New Salem and Little Missouri Churches for the next ten years. At the time of his death, he was pastor of Bethel Church. Peter once owned all the land where the town of Clayton, Illinois now lies.

Peter Ausmus and his wife, Martha Ballow, lie buried in Liberty Church Cemetery, Brookfield, Missouri.

3B1 Rebecca Jane Ausmus, b. —, d. 1835; married her mother's cousin, John F. Ballow. They had two daughters, Ida and Mattie. Both died at the age of 16 with tuberculosis.

3B2 Louisa, b. March 28, 1837, d. March 27, 1928, m. Ben W. Burnett, born in Howard County, Missouri, December 25, 1833, d. February 16, 1917. When Louisa died, she lacked one day of being age 91. They were married June 5, 1858 in Lynn County, Missouri.

General John J. Pershing was born September 13, 1860, in the home of Ben and Louisa Ausmus Burnett, and Louisa was the first person to dress and care for the little General.

J. C. Penney was stranded while on a tour and spent the night in the Burnett home, and offered them any amount of money for the old church records showing Abe Lincoln's parents dismissed on the church roll because he failed to contribute three bear hides to the church.

Their children were:

4B1 James Peter Burnett, *b*. February 22, 1863, Laclede, Missouri, *d*. July 5, 1893 with tuberculosis in Denver, Colorado. He never married.

4B2 Charles Burnett, no record except one daughter.

4B3 Opal Liota, *m*. Austin Jones; no children. They were buried at Brookfield, Missouri in 1946.

4B4 William James Burnett, b. June 5, 1859, d. August 15, 1948. Married Ella Cash; they had ten children.

3B3 Mary Ellen Ausmus, b. January 12, 1840, d. August 15, 1880; married Achilles Wilson. One son, Alfred P. Wilson, was prosecuting attorney, studied law at the University of Washington; he was a very successful trial lawyer.

3B4 James P. Ausmus, b. 1843; married Nancy Anderson. They had two sons, Alvin and Irvin. Nancy died with tuberculosis and James married again and he died with tuberculosis before his daughter, Maude, was born. Then his second wife died with tuberculosis. Maude was reared by an aunt at Clayton, Illinois, where she married Lester Woodworth.

James' first son, Alvin was taken to be reared by his Aunt Louisa Burnett, but he died with tuberculosis at age 16. Irvin was taken by his Uncle John Albert, and Irvin graduated from LaGrange College in 1895. He went to Washington, D.C. to work and while working there he traced a great deal of Ausmus history for his Uncle John Albert. While in Washington, D.C., he was working days and attending Law school. Just after he had completed Law, he became sick with tuberculosis and died later in the home of his girl friend, whom he intended to marry. He died in LaGrange, Missouri, June 13, 1908 at the age of 36.

3B5 Elizabeth Ausmus, b. November 2, 1847, d. August 10, 1869, m. Edward Keller from Clayton, Illinois. She died with tuberculosis.

3B6 Henry Peter Ausmus, b. April 4, 1849 in Adam County, Illinois; d. December 4, 1870. He married Hannah Williams. One son died in infancy.

3B7 John Albert Ausmus,* b. in Clayton, Illinois, December 13, 1852; d. in Lorain, Illinois, March 18, 1932 with cancer, age 79.

He was about 5 feet 5 inches tall, weighed about 120 pounds, had black hair, which turned gray-white prematurely, while he was still a young man. He was very prudent, had good business judgment, very little formal education. He was very active in the Methodist Episcopal Church; taught Sunday School class for 46 years. He was Superintendent of Sunday School. He was supervisor of Keene Township for four years, Justice of the Peace, Town Clerk, bookkeeper at Loraine State Bank; also president of the bank. He served on exemption board during World War I. He was half owner in a general store for many years. He owned and operated a 160-acre farm.

John Albert married Mary Anna Johnson of Paloma, Illinois, September 3, 1873. Mary was born February 12, 1853 and died February 10, 1949. She lacked two days of being 96 years of age.

John and his wife moved to Kansas. It took them three months to make the trip with wagon and team. Old Red Cloud, an Indian chief, buried his daughter not far from where John and Mary Anna lived in a dugout. Red Cloud killed his daughter's dog and pony and put them on her grave.

John's wife, Mary Anna Johnson, was born on the same day Pawnie Bill was born. They were friends all his life.

When John and Anna returned to Illinois with their three older daughters, he had four dollars to start life over. But, John always sang and whistled and looked on the bright side of life and after all his early hard-

ships, became quite wealthy and was always helping to improve and make his community and county a better place to live for everyone.

Juanita is supervisor of public schools in Adams County. She has one son, William Robert Jenkins, b. July, 1935. (4) Mary Amelia Reece, b. July 25, 1916, m. Harry Amburn. Mary works in the office of J. C. Penney Co., Quincy, Illinois. She has two daughters, Margaret Lee Amburn, b. April 1944 and Mary Lou, b. 1942.

4B2 Anna Mae Ausmus, b. March 4, 1878 at Clayton, Illinois, d. January 29, 1956 (cancer), m. Dorcy Ruffcorn February 1, 1906. They had one son, Lewis Jerome Ruffcorn, b. April 5, 1907.

4B3 Mabel Medora Ausmus, b. May 21, 1880 in Kansas; m. Joseph F. Hardy, December 5, 1900, d. March 6, 1902, after giving birth to twin daughters, Hazel and Hallie. They lived a few days.

4B4 Blanche Berdena Ausmus,* b. January 29, 1894; m. Grover C. Hartman December 24, 1912. Grover was born Sept. 6, 1891, died October 2, 1956. He was a retired mail carrier. Their children: (1) Paul Albert Hartman, b. August 7, 1914, m. Mary Lee Dwyer June 26, 1938. They have one daughter, Patricia Ann, b. March 20, 1944. (2) Karl Frank Hartman, b. October 2, 1915; m. Blanche Ausmus Hartman has about all the Peter Ausmus family history that could be obtained. She owns the gun brought from Germany by the first Philip. The German gun is pictured beside Blanche. She has made a floor lamp out of it.

Blanche is an accomplished banquet decorator and keeps busy decorating banquet halls for distinguished parties. She creates designs for tables where banquets are being held. Her husband, Grover, carried the mail as a rural carrier for over forty years. He served as postmaster but resigned to take a mail carrying job that he loved so much.

Preacher Jim was too old but they let him go along to take care of the other boys. He was a private in Company One of the 119th Regiment, 58th Illinois Infantry. He enlisted August 12, 1862 and was mustered out on August 26, 1865. Jim and his wife, Elizabeth, moved to Paris, Texas, December, 1875, along with his first cousin, Preacher Henry Ausmus. Jim lived his remaining days as a successful minister. They lie buried in Little Vines Cemetery near Globe, Texas. They had the following nine children. 3B1 Peter Ausmus, b. Adams County, Illinois, July 14, 1845; d. June 9, 1931, m. (1) Elizabeth Ellen Huddleston, b. November 9, 1840, d. July 4, 1872. Her mother was Sarah Ausmus, a sister to Preacher Jim. There were four children born of this marriage. Peter died at the age of 85 and was buried at Arkansas City, Kansas. Peter was in the grocery store business for 35 years. He was active in civic affairs of his town.

Delbert was on Corregidor when the Japanese attacked. He saved a piece of the American flag by sewing it into the cuff of his shirt and when he came back to the States, he presented this piece of our flag to President Harry S. Truman in Washington, D.C.

4B4 Leo Ausmus, b. August 10, 1891, m. (1) Martha ———. There were no children. m. (2) Jessie, b. ———., d. ———. They had one daughter.

5B1 Lee Bernadine Ausmus, b. November 28, 1915; m. William Cale. They had one son, William Bernard Cale, b. January 6, 1937. He is serving as a Sergeant, Army Security, U.S. Army, stationed in Tokyo, Japan. Bernadine m. (2) to James Hawkins. They are divorced. There were no children. She is employed by the First National Bank in Denver Colorado.

3B2 Joseph Brown Ausmus, b. February 22, 1847 in Brown County, Illinois; m. Almira Jane Shane on October 14, 1865. She was born August 3, 1850, the daughter of James B. and Asenath (Guthrie) Shane from Lawrenceburg, Tennessee. They met while he was serving in the Union Army near Memphis, Tennessee. Almira died in Laclede, Missouri, January 24, 1902 and was buried there. Joseph remarried and located in Rogers, Arkansas, where he died September 21, 1935. He was buried in the National Cemetery at Springfield, Missouri. Joseph Brown followed the trade of tinsmith at Laclede all his life. He served as Justice of the Peace at Rogers, Arkansas. He was also an Elder in the Holiness Church. In both these capacities he was authorized to perform marriages. He was kept very busy, as he lived close to the Missouri border.

4B1 Frank William Ausmus. He was an excellent farmer, raising prize corn. He was buried in Laclede, Missouri.

4B2 Ida Lou Ausmus, m. a Davis. They had one daughter, Daisy, m. W. K. Smith. Ida Lou was buried at Laclede, Missouri.

4B3 Joseph James Ausmus, b. September 16, 1881 in Lynn County, Missouri. On September 20, 1905, he married Lula Mae Cotter, b. February 27, 1887 in Lynn County, Missouri.

Joseph spent most of his life operating a hardware store in Brookfield, Missouri. They always took an active part in the Methodist Church. He is retired, but keeps busy looking after his real estate. They only had one son. Joseph likes to fish, and was very active in Elks Lodge and Republican Party. Lula Mae keeps busy with Federated Club work, Eastern Star and White Shrine as well as many civic and church duties. She has been a member of the Official Board of the Methodist Church at Brookfield for many years; was President of the Northeast Missouri Women's Federation of Clubs and served as Worthy High Priestess of White Shrine. They both enjoy good health.

5B1 Reginald Eugene Ausmus, b. December 1, 1906 at Laclede, Missouri, four blocks from the place General John J. Pershing was born. He was married January 25, 1930 to Barbara Miller Beck. Reginald Eugene graduated from Missouri University law school in 1929. He became a successful practicing attorney until January, 1954, at which time he accepted the full-time position with the A. B. Chance Company of General Counsel. He later was elected Secretary of the Company. As a child, he received considerable instruction in piano and used it later to help pay his way through college, by playing with a college dance orchestra. He is a member of the Masonic Order, holding a 32nd deg. (Scottish Rite) and a member of Movlah Temple of Shrine at St. Louis. He frequently plays the organ for the Methodist Church services, of which his entire family are members, and his wife sings in the choir. He is a 30-year member of the Rotary Club. He has served as Treasurer of the County Committee and is now Township Committeeman for Centralia Township, Boone County, Missouri. He is also serving on the City Council. They are all Republicans. Reginald Eugene's wife, Barbara, is a descendant of the early Tiptons of Tennessee. She graduated from Christian College, Columbia, Missouri.

6B1 Reginald Eugene Ausmus, Jr. (called Gene), b. August 19, 1931, m. Lila Virginia Morris, b. October 28, 1909, on December 8, 1951. Lila graduated from Stephens College. Gene graduated from University of Missouri with A.B. and M.A. degrees, majoring in Southern and Western American history. Most of his interest centered in and around Tennessee, Indiana, and the Old Northwest Territory of the 1800 to 1840's. He is interested in teaching history. He is also interested in writing a historical novel centered around the Sevier-Tipton affairs which happened in the late 1700's. He and his wife, Lila, have the following four children:

5B1 Joseph H. Goodrich, b. July 11, 1904. Joe is Assistant General Claim Agent for the St. Louis–San Francisco Railway Company at Springfield, Missouri.

4B5 Authur Ausmus. He had two sons Russell and Carl. He went to Lake Charles, Louisiana. There is a Louie C. Ausmus, Jr. and his wife, Melba M., living in Lake Charles, and they are highly respected. He claims he is not really an Ausmus. He was only reared by Louie C. Ausmus, Sr. and his wife. He doesn't know anything about his foster parents' family.

3B3 Rhoda Ausmus, b. April 27, 1850, m. Charlie Milligan. They had two children, Jim and Oscar.

3B4 Elizabeth Ausmus, b. September 11, 1852 (incomplete).

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3B5 Martha Ausmus, b. February 7, 1855; m. David Watson. They had three children, Edd, George, and Lucy.

3B6 John Ausmus (Haybaling John), *b*. September 29, 1857, *d*. April 6, 1949, *m*. (1) Mary McFatridge, *b*. July 11, 1862, *d*. December 28, 1931. They were married April 3, 1879.

John lived near Paris, Texas (Maxey, Texas and Brookston, Texas), most of his life, working for General W. B. Berry, who owned several thousand acres of Texas land. It is said that John Ausmus could get more hay baled in one season than a half-dozen men. This was the reason he was called "Haybaling John."

John left Texas one morning and no one knew where he was going or when he left. The same day a woman left the community and the people thought the two had gone together. Two years later when John returned, he claimed he did not know anything about the woman leaving, and that he had been building railroads in Arizona. His wife had remarried and when John appeared, they thought he was after a part of his estate, which was quite large. However, this all happened to be a coincidence. "Haybaling John" was very frugal, but used profanity by note. His word was his bond. He was very truthful and trustworthy. John and his wife lie buried in Little Vines Cemetery about 12 miles from Paris, Texas.

6B1 Rodney Max Ausmus, b. October 7, 1937.



Jesse joined the Confederate Army and was hospitalized in Nashville, Tennessee. He left his bed and rejoined his regiment. He was never heard of again. His wife, Louisa, died soon afterwards and the children were placed among relatives of their mother. We find record of the six children. Jesse Ausmus was killed as a Confederate scout.

1C3 John Ausmus, b. July 27, 1778, d. March 6, 1853, m. (1) Nancy Hill, b. December 11, 1783, d. March 11, 1823. He was married in 1802 in Claiborne County, Tennessee, m. (2) Mary —, b. 1789 in Illinois. There were no children born of the second marriage.

John Ausmus, the third son of Philip Ausmus (German) was born in Rockingham County, Virginia, near Humes Run Creek, the upper waters of the Shenandoah River, between Peaked Mountain and the Shenandoah River. When he was five years old, his family moved to Sinking Creek, Tennessee, which is about one mile south of present-day Johnson City, Tennessee. In 1795 his father moved to Powell Valley, Claiborne County, the territory south of the Ohio River, near the presentday community of Speedwell, Tennessee.

John was about five feet, eight inches tall; he had real clear blue eyes and light hair. He was very handsome and enjoyed showing his expert penmanship. He was a Dunkard, or German Baptist Minister. According to tradition, his mother was a school teacher before her marriage, and her children were educated better than the average. John's wife, Nancy, was the daughter of Thomas Hill. She was born in North Carolina. Her mother was Margaret -----. In 1812 John and Nancy took their four children and migrated to Bedford County, Tennessee, along with his brother, Philip Jr. Several of the Hill families went to Middle Tennessee, also. John and Nancy had two children born in Bedford County. They moved to St. Clair County, Illinois, along with his brother, Peter, in 1817. Then in 1818, John took his family to Bond County, Illinois, where his brother, Philip, had moved. (Bond County in 1817 had been taken from Madison County, and Sangamon County was formed from Bond County in 1821.) John settled in the part that became Morgan County at Concord, Illinois, where they took land and settled down, taking an active part in building a community and establishing a church or churches. He was appointed judge of the court the first Monday of November, 1850. He was one of the first settlers in Concord Township, settling on section #17. He and his second wife did not have any children. John and his first wife, Nancy, lie buried in Jefferson Cemetery south of Concord, Illinois.

2C1 Thomas, b. 1803 in Claiborne County, Tennessee. He took up land in 1821 in Morgan County, Illinois. He later disappeared and it is said that he went to the state of Washington. There is no further record. The investigation covered twelve counties and cities in the state of Washington.

2C2 Margaret, b. 1806 in Claiborne County, Tennessee. No record after 1820 in Bond County, Illinois.

2C3 Henry,* b. July 19, 1809, d. September 9, 1887, m. Sarah Riggs, b. 1816, d. April, 1852. Henry, like his father, was a Baptist minister. And also like his father, he liked to write poems and show his penmanship. Henry preached at many places in Illinois. The first of December, 1875, he went along with three of his sons to northeastern Texas, where he

died September 9, 1887. He was buried in Little Vines Cemetery at Sumner, Texas.

3C1 Margaret,* b. 1837 in Mt. Sterling, Illinois, m. Dave Sims. They had six children: Henry, Emma, Frank, Alice, Burton, and Lewis.

3C2 Thomas, *b*. 1840. He traveled extensively, selling pianos in Illinois, then in Missouri. No further record of his whereabouts were found. He was also a Baptist preacher. He had two daughters.

3C3 James,[‡] b. 1843 in Mt. Sterling, Illinois. He left Texas in 1885 and no one ever knew where he went.

3C4 Peter Dudley, § b. December 29, 1845 in Mt. Sterling, Illinois, d. July 1, 1930. He married Mary Ann Brown December 13, 1866. Mary was born October 6, 1848 at Meadville, Missouri. She died in Paris, Texas, October 10, 1933.

Peter Dudley was a blacksmith and a Primitive Baptist minister for fifty years. There were fourteen children born of this union. Peter Dudley was a very determined man and would not settle for less than the best, whether it be in the blacksmith shop or in the pulpit of the church.

4C1 Helen Jane, b. January 8, 1868 at Mt. Sterling, Illinois, d. September 26, 1920, m. John Walker. They had five children: Alta, Claudia, Willie, Carrie, and Lloyd.

4C2 Andrew Lee, b. September 23, 1869 at Mt. Sterling, Illinois, d. January 7, 1952, m. Anne Bunch. They had four children, Otis, Lillie, Eva, and Edgel, none of which could be located.

4C3 Fannie Bell, b. February 3, 1871, d. January 29, 1960. She is buried at Little Vines Cemetery, Sumner, Texas. She married John Alexander (Eck) Wilson, a barber and Baptist minister. His father was also a Baptist minister. The Wilsons were from Lexington, Kentucky. They-had eight children: Donnie, Dessie, Dee, Anna Bell, Carlton F., Martha Hazel, Joseph Alexander, and Nadine E. Joe was a great help in gathering Ausmus information in Texas. He is chief engineer of the Southeastern Division of the Bell Telephone Company, of Dallas, Texas. Joe did not marry until he was about 54 years of age. His wife's maiden name was Della McIntire. Joe has a wonderful personality; he is solid in his thinking. He is about five feet, two inches tall and weighs about 160. He has brown eyes.





The Ellisons and Ausmuses married and intermarried until the two families were closely related.

Berry came from North Carolina to Claiborne County about 1797 along with his two older brothers, Robert and James. After several years he and Sarah moved to Campbell County where he died in 1851 near a place called Flat Hollow. After the death of Berry, Sarah bought 25 acres of land in 1852 from her son, Berry, and Elizabeth Ausmus Ellison for \$50.00 and moved back to Claiborne County.

Philip was born near Johnson City, Tennessee, which was the State of Franklin from 1784 and 1788. John Sevier was the Governor of this new state he helped organize. Sevier later served three terms as the first Governor of Tennessee. John Sevier was a personal friend to Philip's father. Philip was a Primitive Baptist minister. When his parents moved to Powell Valley in 1795, he was only seven years old. He attended church at the Davis Creek Church, which his father helped establish and preached until his death. After the death of his father in 1809 and his mother's death in 1811, Philip went west to Bedford County, Tennessee, where he met and married a beautiful young girl on February 1, 1815. His older brother, John, had married Nancy Hill of Powell Valley. They also moved to Bedford County. At the same time another older brother. Peter, moved to Williamson County, Tennessee, which was near Bedford County. Philip's wife was the daughter of Benjamin Franklin Brattain or Bratton, and Mary Hill Brattain, from Randolph County, North Carolina. Benjamin Franklin Brattain or Bratton was born about 1767 and died about 1820 in Bond County, Illinois. He was the son of Robert and Mary Millikan Bratton. Mary Hill Brattain or Bratton, was born about 1771; died January 18, 1849. She was buried beside Deidamiah and Philip Ausemus in Moss Cemetery in Morgan County, Illinois. Their eldest daughter, Rachel, b. 1796, m. William Moss. Their second child, Delilah, b. 1798, m. John Box. Their third child was Deidamiah. The fourth child was a son, Paul, b. December 30, 1801, m. Elizabeth Carter. Benjamin was born about 1803. He was still single and was living with Deidamiah and Philip in 1830. Their sixth child, Mary, b. 1806, m. Samuel Huddleston. Their seventh child, Elizabeth, b. 1809, m. a Moss. Their eighth child, Jonathan, b. 1813, m. Mary Ellen Trimble. Philip and Deidamiah perhaps had sixteen children, but we can only account for fifteen. Their first two children were born in Bedford County, Tennessee. The next four in Bond County, Illinois, and the balance in Morgan County, Illinois. Philip and Deidamiah lie buried in Moss Cemetery, not far from Concord, Illinois. Her tombstone lists her name as Ausmus, but Philip's stone lists his name as Ausemus. Philip's brother, John, married Nancy Hill, born in North Carolina, and it seems reasonable that his wife, Deidamiah, and John's wife, Nancy, were related, as Deidamiah's mother was a Hill. Six or seven of the Hill families went along to Bedford County with Philip and his brother, John and his wife, Nancy Hill Ausmus in 1812. There were nine Hill heads of families in Bedford County in 1812.







push-button heat control, from tallow candles to electricity, from oxen to tractors, and airplanes traveling from New York to San Francisco in three hours, from a western dugout home to modern farmhouse. To have lived to see this great transition has been a unique experience, granted to few. She taught school during her young womanhood. When she died, she left 153 living descendants, representing five generations.






