PREFACE

The information contained in this book has been gathered from many sources. The descendants of Seth and Lucy Blodgett are to be found today in nearly every state in the Union. From them I have received a great many splendid letters telling of their families and of their work. I have personally interviewed many of the family and they have given me information that in a few years would have been lost forever were it not recorded in these pages. I have studied old deeds and records, and searched the pages of our own town books thoroughly in order to learn more of these people. I visited the graves of Seth and Lucy at Mount Rest and copied the inscription on the plain marble slab that marks their resting place. In this cemetery sleep many of their descendants, their children and their children's children—even up to the sixth generation. In many cases we find no mound—only a stone bearing the name, and the words, “Lost at Sea.”

To all of the family who have so kindly helped me and have made this record possible, I wish to say, Thank you.

ORIGIN OF THE NAME

The name of Blodgett is recorded in "Parish Records of Norfolk and Suffolk Counties," England, as far back as the year 1561, and here we find the name spelled as it is today, B-l-o-d-g-e-t-t.

It is believed by some that the family descended from one Robert Bloct or Blojet who was a Norman, and chancellor to William the Conqueror. Later he was made Bishop of London.

Still others believe that when the Roman Cæsars made their expedition to England, a scion of the Princely House of Blodgnetti was connected therewith and from an alliance with a native maid of Britain sprang the original of the Blodgetts in England.

SETH BLODGETT

HIS ANCESTORS

At Mount Rest, the little cemetery in Brooksville, Maine, in a neglected and almost forgotten plot, lie the bodies of Seth and Lucy (Johnson) Blodgett, the first of that name to come to what is now Brooksville—the founders of one of the town's oldest families.

The inscription on the lichen-covered headstone that marks their graves is as follows:

Captain Seth Blodgett | Died February 2nd, 1817 |
Age 81 years

Lucy, his wife | Died July 9, 1809 | Age 52 years

Elizabeth, his second wife | Died February 27, 1821 |
Age 83 years

They were first laid to rest in a small "family lot" which was a part of the farm that was their home, but later they were removed to Mount Rest. I find no other record of Elizabeth.

When they came here Seth and Lucy Blodgett were very young, probably bride and groom. In this book you will find a record of their descendants, but before we read of those who came after them let us learn some things of those who came before, something of the heritage that these people, Seth and Lucy Blodgett, were able to hand down to posterity.

The first record that we find of this family is the permit for emigration to New England. From a volume now in Rolls Office, Chancery Lane, London:

They arrived safely and settled in Cambridge, Mass.,
where in June 1637 their daughter Susanna was born.
(There was also a son Thomas, who died in infancy.)

Thomas Bloggett was allotted land in 1635 and be-
came a Freeman in 1636. He was a member of the Thom-
as Shepherd Company which founded what is now the
Shepherd Memorial Church. He must have been a man
of some means for it is recorded that in 1639 he owned a
house and land. In 1641 he made his will which was as
follows:

Cambridge in America

I, Thomas Bloggett, being at this time in my right mind,
give to wife Susan, my whole estate, after my decease, as well
within doors as without. She to bring up my children in such
learning and other things as shall be meet for them and pay
eldest son, Daniel, £15 when he is 1 and 20, or in one month
after her decease. To my second son, Samuel £15 as above. To
Susanna £15. Should they have a father at law who does not
treat them well, my will is that the Deacons and our Brother
Fflessington and our Brother Winchship they, or either of them
should have the power to see into it and reform it by one means
or another. Written this 10th day of 5th month 1641.

He died in 1642.

Susan, widow of Thomas, married in 1644, James
Thompson, and moved to Woburn, Mass. Here her sons,
Daniel and Samuel Blodgett, grew to manhood, and in
December, 1655, Samuel married Ruth Eggleden, or
Iggleden, of Boston.

They became the parents of seven children. Their second son, Samuel, Jr., was born at Woburn, December 10, 1658. He married Huldah, the twelfth child of William and Judith Simonds. On the records he is referred to as "Ensign" Blodgett, and in 1693 he represented Woburn in the General Court. He was the father of ten children. Caleb, the fifth child of Samuel and Huldah, was born at Woburn, November 11, 1691. He is referred to as "Captain" Blodgett. His first wife was Elizabeth—family name unknown—she died without children "at the age of 22 years." He next married Sarah Wyman, a daughter of Seth and Ester Johnson Wyman, and a granddaughter of Major William Johnson of Woburn. Sarah died leaving four children and Caleb married a third wife—Elizabeth Wyman. Seth, the eldest son of Caleb and Sarah, was born at Woburn in February 1718. His wife was also named Elizabeth Wyman. She was a daughter of Thomas and Mary Richardson Wyman* of Woburn. In 1754 Seth Blodgett and Elizabeth, his wife, were living in Medford, Mass., and later he kept a tavern in Boston. In 1769 he was one of the assessors of that city. Mrs. Blodgett died in Medford in 1768. She was the mother of three sons. One of these, Seth, Jr., was born at Woburn, December 9, 1747. He married Lucy Johnson, a daughter of Giles and Abigail Reed Johnson and a granddaughter of Dr. Israel Reed. Soon after his marriage he came to Brooksville, Maine.

SETH BLODGETT^a bought a farm in Brooksville in 1788 (now known as the Fred Hawes place). This farm consisted of 200 acres of land and buildings. It was bounded on the West by land of William Stover, on the East by land of Giles Johnson, on the South by land of "Ye Proprietors." This deed is dated Dec. 26, 1788. The price paid was 170 pounds.

Seth Blodgett^a died Feb. 2, 1817. He was buried in a family burial place on his own farm, but the body

was later removed to Mount Rest, North Brooksville, where a stone now marks his resting place.

The Penobscot Town Records give the names of the children of SETH BLODGETT* and LUCY, his wife, granddaughter of Lieutenant Reed†, as follows:

William, born July 14, 1779
John, born June 14, 1781
John King, born Aug. 3, 1784
Betsy (later written Elizabeth), born June 13,
1786
Lucy, born Aug. 11, 1789
Israel, born Aug. 24, 1791
Samuel, born Feb. 25, 1794

We can find no further record of Seth, Jr., born Sept. 3, 1776. It is probable he died in childhood.

Israel and Samuel, the two youngest sons of Seth and Lucy (Johnson) Blodgett, were lost at sea Jan. 16, 1824.

Records of Seth Blodgett's other children follow on successive pages.

WILLIAM BLODGETT

BORN JULY 14, 1779

WILLIAM BLODGETT was the son of Seth and Lucy Johnson Blodgett and was of the seventh generation of Blodgetts in America. We do not know just where he was born but it is probable that it was in that neighborhood where so many of his descendants now live—somewhere in the vicinity of the Aunt Dolly Hill, North Brooksville. He married Dorothy Roberts, and their home was on the right hand side of the road leading from North Brooksville to West Brooksville.

He died January 26, 1853.

His wife, Dorothy, died December 10, 1855.

William and Dorothy Blodgett were the parents of nine children:

- A. Joel, born February 27, 1807.
- B. Exina, born November 24, 1810.
- C. William, Jr., born November 14, 1814.
- D. Polly, born April 30, 1816; died August 31, 1847.
- E. Robert Johnson, born September 30, 1819.
- F. Dorothy, born March 9, 1821; died December 10, 1835.
- G. Seth, born February 14, 1824.

Two other children, Caroline and Sabra, died in infancy.

A. Joel H. Blodgett, son of William and Dorothy Blodgett, married Thankful Snow, a daughter of Isaac and Polly Paine Snow (marriage intentions recorded on Brooksville records, Oct. 12, 1829). Thankful Snow was a direct descendant of Nicholas Snow, whose wife, Constance Hopkins, came to America with her father, Stephen Hopkins, on the Mayflower in 1620. Joel and Thankful made their home on or near what is now known

as the Harry Carter place, then a part of the "old Snow place." Thankful Blodgett died January 5, 1858. Joel married a second wife, Mrs. Sarah Cousins, who died May 16, 1891. Joel died February 5, 1880, aged 72 years, 11 months, 13 days. The children of Joel and Thankful Blodgett were:

A1. Albion K. P. Blodgett, son of Joel and Thankful, married Emily, a daughter of Deacon Simeon and Louise (Babson) Allen. Their marriage is recorded on the Blue Hill records. He was a carpenter and ship-builder and some of the houses that he built are still in use. Mrs. Emily Blodgett is now living with her son Homer, in Chicago. They were the parents of two sons: (a) Ernest Blodgett, born December 27, 1862, died unmarried in Concord, N. H., April 6, 1931; his body was brought from New Hampshire and buried at Mount Rest, Brooksville; (b) Homer Blodgett, born May 11, 1869; married Bertha Rathburn and they have five children: Allen, Emily, Louise, Beatrice and Philip. Mr. Blodgett's present address is 1704 W. 100th St., Chicago, Ill.

The second wife of Albion Blodgett was Mrs. Nancy Crosby of Orland. He died at his home at North Brooksville.

A2. George W. Blodgett, son of Joel and Thankful, was born January 31, 1836. He married Sophronia Allen, a sister of Emily Allen who married his brother Albion. He was known to his townsmen as "*Captain George*." Mrs. Sophronia Blodgett died July 18, 1894. Their children were:

- a. Bathia Annie, born January 26, 1859, married John Snow of Castine. Their home is at Saxtons River, Vermont. Their children are:
 - i. Ralph Snow, mechanic, married Helen Bower of Belfast. They have one daughter, Pearle L.
 - ii. Florence Snow, married David Dunbar, marine engineer, home in New York. They have two children, Donald Dunbar, engineer, New York, and Frances Dunbar who married Guy Casilla, a druggist at Keene, N. H. Frances is the mother of one child, Carol.
 - iii. Lizzie Snow, married Walter J. Wells, a machinist in Springfield, Vermont. She has two children, Kenneth and Arthur.
 - iv. Blanch Snow, married Raymond Tarball, a painter and weaver at Keene, N. H.

- b. Evelyn Maude Blodgett, born November 10, 1873, married Eugene Snow, the second son of Charles E. and Agatha Grindle Snow. For several years after their marriage they lived at North Brooksville and all of their children were born there. In 1921 they moved to Belfast and have since made their home in that city. Their children are:
 - i. Sidney Snow, married Bernice Gray (a teacher in the public schools of Brooksville) and a daughter of Frank and Nettie (Staples) Gray of Sedgwick. Sidney Snow is a carpenter and their home is at North Brooksville. They have three small children, Frank, Nettie and Evangeline.
 - ii. Iva Snow, married Lewis Black in 1914. Mr. Black is a carpenter and their home is at North Brooksville. They have seven children; Arlene Black now a student at Belfast High School; Gertrude, Madeline, Robert, Ernest, Archie and Eugene.
 - iii. Myron E. Snow, born September 3, 1896; died in infancy.
 - iv. Horace Snow, married Mary Gray of Penobscot. Home at North Brooksville. They have three little children, Keith, Nellie and Kenneth.
 - v. Albert Snow, born January 19, 1901. He married Madeline, a daughter of Henry and Addie (Douglass) Grindle of South Penobscot. Albert Snow is a mechanic and their home is at Belfast. They have two children, Mavis and Albert, Jr.
 - vi. Inez Snow, born April 14, 1908, graduate of Belfast High School, employed in the central telephone office of that city.
 - vii. Harvey Snow, born December 9, 1910; home with parents in Belfast and has employment in that city.

A3. John J. Blodgett, son of Joel and Thankful, married Susan Pierce of Castine. She died many years ago, leaving two sons, Harry and Edward. The homes of these sons are in Chicago where Edward is engaged in the insurance business.

A4. Sophronia Blodgett, born July 24, 1842, married Kenney S. Grindle, son of Richard and Annie (Grindle) Grindle of Brooksville. (Note: Richard Grindle was a son of William Grindle, a Revolutionary soldier from Penobscot.)

Twin sons were born to Sophronia and Kenney Grindle on November 24, 1867. She died December 6, 1867. Her sons were:

a. Gage Grindle, married Ruth Young, daughter of James and Sarah (Curtis) Young of Surry, Maine. They had three sons, Harold, George and Roger.

i. Harold Grindle was in service during the World War and was overseas for 13 months. He married Frances Dearborn of Camden, Maine. They have three small children, Ruth, Gage and Paul. Their oldest son died in infancy. Their home is at Camden, Maine, where Mr. Grindle is in the insurance business.

ii. George Y. Grindle is the owner of a public garage at Detroit, Mich. He is unmarried and at present is in Los Angeles, California.

iii. Roger, died in childhood.

b. Dean W. Grindle, married Rhoda Murphy. They had one son, Oscar S. Mrs. Grindle died when her son was small. This son, Oscar, married Luelle Staples of Surry, Maine. Their home is at Mount Desert. They have three children, Clara, Kenney and Bernice.

Dean W. Grindle married a second time, Ester Littlefield of Penobscot. She died in 1922, leaving an infant son, Roger.

In 1930 Mr. Grindle married (third) Mrs. Lucy Dodge of Brooksville. Their home is at Northeast Harbor.

B. Exina Blodgett, daughter of William and Dorothy, was born Dec. 24, 1810. She married James Douglass, November 23, 1833. Their home was first at Blue Hill and later in Brooksville. Mr. Douglass was interested in mining with his brother in Blue Hill. I have not learned the date of Exina's death, but she is buried beside her husband in the family lot at Blue Hill. Her children were:

B1. James Douglass married Mary Stover, of West Brooksville. Mr. Douglass died several years ago. Their home was at North Sedgwick. Their children:

- a. Carrie, who married Leslie Perkins; has three children.
- b. Lottie, who married Nelson Carter; has one son who married Marguerite Gray of Blue Hill.
- c. James, Jr., who married Effie Green of Cape Rozier. He is the R. F. D. carrier at Sedgwick. Their home is at North Sedgwick. They have several children.

B2. Caroline Douglass, born in January 1835, married George M. Dodge of Brooksville; died in 1909. Had two daughters:

- a. Etta Dodge, married Isaac Hooper; they had two girls, Minnie and Belva. Etta Dodge Hooper has been in the Maine State Hospital for many years.
- b. Lillian Dodge, married Irving Young of Brooksville. She was the mother of two children:
 - i. Blanche Young who married first Harry Stover, son of William and Laura Hawes Stover of Brooksville. They were the parents of two daughters, Lillian and Jessie Stover.

Blanche Stover married a second husband, Ronald Rickman of Portland, Maine. She is now living in Mass. Her daughter Lillian is with her. Jessie is married. (See descendants of Elizabeth Hawes.)

- ii. George Irving Young; died in infancy.

B3. Otis Douglass, born January 31, 1842; married Abbie Wilson, daughter of Stover and Abigail McCaslin Wilson of Penobscot. Mr. Douglass was a carpenter; home in Brooksville, built by him about 1890, was burned in 1928. He died in 1916. Mrs. Douglass is now living with her daughter in Bucksport. Otis and Abbie Douglass had two children:

- a. Alton Douglas went to New York when a very young man and was employed on a boat on L. I. Sound. He married Catherine Donovan of Conn. One daughter, Catherine, was born in June 1907. Mrs. Douglass died when her daughter was very small.
- b. Gladys Exina Douglass, born July 1881, married James Staples of Sandy Point, Maine, September 1905. He died the same year. Gladys married the second time, Charles Tillock of Bucksport. She has three children.

B4. Abbie Douglass, daughter of James and Exina Blodgett Douglass, married Charles A. Perkins of Penobscot. She died, leaving three small children, Minnie, James and Fred Perkins. (See descendants of Elizabeth Blodgett).

C. William Blodgett, Jr., son of William and Dorothy Roberts Blodgett, was born in Brooksville, November 14, 1814. He married Elizabeth Walker, a daughter of David and Emma (Wasson) Walker of Brooksville, on December 24, 1840.

(Note: Descendants of William and Elizabeth Blodgett can trace their ancestry back to those who served in the War of the Revolution on both the Wasson and Walker lines.)

William Blodgett died October 24, 1894. Their children were:

C1. Mary E. Blodgett married John Wessel. He was a native of Denmark but came to this country in young manhood and was a soldier in the Civil War. Mary Wessel died in 1917. Their children were:

a. Louisa M., born May 19, 1866. She married William Howard. Mrs. Howard now makes her home with her son Fred in Brooksville. They were the parents of three children:

i. Phebe, who married Edward Carter, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Carter of Sedgwick. They have eleven children: Elmer, married Bertha Nevells of North Sedgwick, and has three children; Louise, married Carl Nevells of Sedgwick and has four children; Vivian, married Arthur Jones and has two children; Shirley, married Roy Shepherd of New York and has one son; Franklin, Willard, Arnold, Evelyn, Malcolm, Belford, Carolyn.

ii. John Howard married Lela Snow, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Snow of Hartland, Maine. Their home is at No. Brooksville. They are the parents of seven children: Manley, Warren, (who died when very young); Phyllis, who married Williamson (Morris) son of Rev. and Mrs. Frank Williamson of Brooksville; Marvis, who married Stanley Gray of Blue Hill; Gordon, Laura, and Donald. (See descendants of John Blodgett.)

- iii. Frederick Howard married Lowena Gray, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Gray of Sedgwick.
- b. George W. Wessel, born January 18, 1868; married Alice Segar Lampher. Their home is in Brewer, Me.
- c. Anna P. Wessel, born September 25, 1869; married Frank Segar of Orland, Maine. She died, 1927. Their children:
 - i. Alta Segar, who married William Sherwood. Their children are: Olive, who is now a student nurse at a hospital in Detroit, Mich., Alta, Frank, Clyde, Janice, Lowell, Earl and Hope. Their home is at Crouseville, Maine.
 - ii. Vernon Segar (in service during the World War and overseas for several months), married Mabel Dodge, daughter of Edward P. and Sadie Douglass Dodge. They have one son, James. Home in Brooksville.
 - iii. Cecil Segar, married first, Christine Butler of Brooklyn. She died, leaving a small child, Adrian Segar. His second wife was Miss Day of Bangor. Home at Nashua, N. H.
 - iv. Flora Segar, now living in Massachusetts.
 - v. Mary Segar, Massachusetts.
 - vi. Margaret Segar, married Walter Gray of Brooklyn.
 - vii. Leland Segar, unmarried, makes home with his father at No. Brooksville.
 - viii. Deliska Segar, married Thomas Choat of Brooklyn. Has four little daughters, Sylvia, Charlotte, Gloria and Laura. Home at Bucksport.
- d. Frederick W. Wessel, born March 11, 1871; married Phebe Durgain, daughter of Curtiss and Joanna Wescott Durgain of Sedgwick. Their home is at No. Brooksville where Mrs. Wessel is employed as a teacher in the Grammar School. They have two children:
 - i. Wentworth, a student at Blue Hill Academy.
 - ii. Rachel Joanna.
- e. Sylvia Wessel, born Feb. 19, 1872, died Feb. 8, 1886.
- f. John I. Wessel, born April 1875, died Sept. 16, 1875.

- g. Jesse B. Wessel, born July 31, 1877; married Mildred E. Durgain, daughter of Curtis and Joanna Wescott Durgain, of No. Sedgwick. Mrs. Jesse Wessel died in Bangor, Me., in 1919. They had two sons:
 - i. Philip, who married Mary Ober of Blue Hill; home at Blue Hill.
 - ii. Paul Wessel, married and employed at Ellsworth, Me.
- h. Edith A. Wessel, born October 19, 1879; married Frank Ducote of Bucksport, Maine, now living at Sebec, Maine. They have two children:
 - i. Louisa, who married a Mr. Young and whose home is in California.
 - ii. Mark.

C2. Laroy H. Blodgett, son of William and Elizabeth Blodgett, born November 24, 1843, married Anna Wilson, daughter of Stover P. and Abigail McCaslin Wilson of Penobscot. He died at sea, Sept. 11, 1898. Mrs. Blodgett now lives with her son, H. P. Blodgett, in Rockland. Their children were:

- a. Charles Edwin Blodgett, born Dec. 5, 1873, home at East Orland, Maine.
- b. H. Perkins Blodgett, married Maude E. Duncklie, daughter of John and Flora Neal Duncklie of Milford, N. H. Their home is at Rockland, Maine, where Mrs. Blodgett is Supt. of Knox County General Hospital.
- c. Addie Belva Blodgett, born February 14, 1886, died April 8, 1896.

C3. Frances E. Blodgett, daughter of William and Elizabeth Blodgett, was born August 11, 1845; married Sylvester P. Limeburner, son of William and Phebe (Parker) Limeburner, in November 1868; died January 19, 1909. Their children were:

- a. Oscar P. Limeburner, born January 10, 1872; married Carrie Roper of Brooksville, Maine in 1921. Their home was at Brooksville where Mr. Limeburner kept a general store. He died December 7, 1926.

John King Blodgett built in 1806 what in recent years was known as the "Ira Cousins House." The house was bought and torn down by Percy Perkins, a great-great grandson of the builder.

John K. Blodgett died October 6, 1861.

BORN AT WOBURN, MASS., APRIL 1, 1724

Little is known of the early life of Samuel Blodgett. His opportunity for education was limited, yet he improved to the utmost whatever opportunity he did have. He was a skilled surveyor and wrote a fair hand. We find him at the siege of Louisburg. Then for 10 years we find no record of his works. In 1757 he was at the siege of Fort Wm. Henry and he narrowly escaped from the Indians, losing even the clothes on his back. For several years he was engaged in the lumber and potash business. During the Revolutionary War he was a commissary to General Sullivan's Brigade and when the army left Boston he retired to the farm. During the continuance of the war he completed a machine for raising ships from the bottom of rivers, etc. After the close of the war he spent four years in Europe operating these machines, but with little success. His greatest and most successful piece of work was building the Amoskeag Canal in New Hampshire. He used his own money for this work, which started May 2, 1794, and was finished early in the spring of 1799. In June 1880 a high freshet carried off the locks and thus was lost the labor of five years at a cost of \$20,000. How he managed to finance and build another and more lasting canal, and the story of the triumphant day when at the "opening of Blodgett's Locks and Canal" he went on a raft with a few friends and passed through the locks and into the Merrimack, will be found in Chapter 22, Potter's History of Manchester. Judge Blodgett was 83 years of age at this time and he died on the first day of September in the same year that the canal was finished.

EXPLANATORY LETTER

Washington, D. C.
December 19, 1930.

Subject: White House Grounds; Original Holders

My dear Mrs. Limeburner:

The Adjutant General of the Army has forwarded your letter of December 6, 1930, for information concerning the original holders of land upon which the White House is built.

There was a Samuel Blodget, Jr., who owned a large tract situated north of N Street north, between 3d and 18th Streets west. This land when laid out into building squares and lots was divided equally between Mr. Blodget and the United States, the streets and avenues being first taken out and given to the Government without cost.

It is believed that Mr. Blodget was a man of means and a very influential citizen because he was selected by the Commissioners who lived away from Washington, to be their agent and to act for them in all things during their absence. The Commissioners appointed an agent to act for them at the suggestion of President Washington who thought that some person representing them should be on the ground at all times.

SAMUEL BLODGETT, JR.

Samuel Blodgett, Jr., was one of the most striking figures in the group of the early promoters of the new capital district. Mr. Blodgett was born in Goffstown, N. H., Aug. 28, 1757. His father, a prominent business man and inventor in that state and the projector of an early canal around Amoskeag Falls, Manchester, N. H., is described as having superior ingenuity, intelligence and enterprise and of inventive genius ahead of his times. His mind was inclined to theory rather than practice and he was interested in what was for the benefit of the community rather than for his personal advantage.¹

The traits of character and disposition of the father were inherited in no small degree by the son who bore his name. When but nineteen years of age, Samuel Blodgett, Jr., was commissioned as captain in the New Hampshire militia raised at the outbreak of the revolution. His company was attached to Colonel Enoch Porr's regiment and also to the regiment of Colonel Nathan Hale. After a service of a little more than a year, Mr. Blodgett resigned, Dec. 22, 1777.²

After leaving the army, Blodgett went into business in Exeter, N. H., but the venture not proving to be successful, he went to Boston, where he engaged in the East India trade and made money. In the year 1789 he removed to Philadelphia, where the next year his wife died. The year 1792 proved to be the most eventful in his history, for it was then that the Insurance Company of North America was started in Philadelphia, which was the successor of a tontine association organized by Blod-

gett. The insurance company had a capital stock of \$600,000 and was the first joint-stock company in the United States. Blodgett was a member of the first board of directors.

He also that year married Rebecca Smith, daughter of Rev. William Smith, Provost of the University of Pennsylvania, then twenty years of age and distinguished for her beauty, wit and vivacity. Previous to the year 1790, Blodgett made two visits to Europe, and while there examined the organization and methods of various universities and became an early and ardent advocate of the establishment at the federal city of a national university.³ To Blodgett the largeness of the scheme of the Federal city must have made a special appeal, and during the months of preparation in the year 1791, Philadelphia was the centre. With his associations of a business and social nature in that city, Blodgett in all probability heard a great deal of what was proposed to promote this enterprise and the various plans which were no doubt discussed there. It seems likely he attended at the new city the first sale of lots in the fall of 1791, although there is no record of his being there.

At any rate, early the next year and on the 12th day of January, 1792, he received a deed of sale from Philip Richard Fendall, of Alexandria, Va., of a tract of land called Jamaica and comprising 494 acres. This tract lay within the lines of the city and extended in a broad belt from Dupont Circle in a northeasterly direction entirely across the city, and overlapped the northern bonds. The consideration named in the deed was 39,520 Mexican silver dollars. By this transaction he became the second in the group of large purchasers who are identified with the city for, as the list of names of the members of the syndicate represented by Mr. Fendall and printed in a previous chapter suggests, he was not the first to avail

himself of the opportunities for land speculation so attractively presented at the Federal city.

The latter part of January 1794 marked the close of a year's service of Blodgett as supervisor, and the commissioners notified him that the engagement would not be renewed. The dismissal was expressed in terms indicating appreciation of the value of his assistance. But it was pointed out that the improbability of his becoming a resident of the city, his private business and especially that of the hotel lottery engaging his attention made his longer continuance impracticable. He was told that his affection for the city and his interest in its prosperity were assurances to them that he would continue to render any aid in his power.

Three months later, however, the esteem and consideration expressed in this letter were exchanged for quite a different sentiment, as the commissioners then wrote, "unhappily we have to do with a man who has lost our confidence. Instead of certainty, we have to guess at the state of things."⁴

Washington also shared in this feeling towards Blodgett, for he wrote on the 23rd of January, 1794, to Commissioner Johnson: "With respect to Mr. Blodgett, I have not hesitated on former occasions to declare, and I think to the commissioners themselves, from the moment his conduct began to unfold itself, that his appointment did not in my judgment answer the end which had been contemplated. At first I was at a loss to account for a conduct so distant from any idea which I had entertained of the duties of a superintendent, but it appears evidently enough now, that speculation has been his primary object from the beginning.

"* * * I wish you may have yet seen the worst features in Mr. Blodgett's conduct. * * * Little confidence I fear is placed in Mr. Blodgett, and least where he is best known."⁵

The change had been as rapid as it was complete, for a few months previously he had been in high favor and Washington records that he was accompanied by Blodgett at the time of the sale of lots in the previous fall as he inspected the site of the new city. But his lottery scheme, the drawing of which had been begun the previous fall, was not then concluded, and in addition he had announced his intention to start Federal Lottery No. 2, in face of the change in the attitude of the president and commissioners, who now opposed what they formerly sanctioned.⁶

It is difficult at this distance of time, and especially in the dim light about the career of a man whose latter years were clouded with reverses and the final defeat of his plans, to understand fully the causes of such a complete change in his standing as is here set forth. The ostensible cause of the irritation felt both by Washington and the commissioners was the second lottery scheme in face of the failure of the first. At first favored, in a few months it met with sharp repudiation from the city authorities, who saw in the term "Federal Lottery No. 2" an attempt to give the enterprise an official character.

Up to this time there is no record of an act of Blodgett in connection with the city indicating that he was unscrupulous or dishonest. All his undertakings in the new city were those of a man of means, and also one of enthusiasm and large ideals. His writings, mainly on economic subjects,⁷ clearly conveyed the impression of these

traits. At the same time his work does not reveal the profound student nor the deep thinker. His mind tended to discursiveness and broad generalizations, and in that particular he was not fitted to handle practical affairs. In his case when the dark days came, his qualities of mind and methods rather served to add to his financial complications, but there is no strong evidence to show deliberate fraud on his part.

COUNT RUMFORD

SUSANNA BLODGETT², daughter of Thomas and his wife Susan, married on the 28th of Nov. 1655, Jonathan Thomson of Woburn. She became the great-great grandmother of Benjamin Thomson, born at Woburn, March 26, 1753 and later known as Count Rumford. Much information regarding this man may be found in Chapter XII "Sewell's History of Woburn."

In the city of Munich there stands a monument erected in his memory. On one side is this inscription in the German language, translated—

"Stay, Wanderer, at the creative fiat of
CHARLES THEODORE RUMFORD
The Friend of Mankind,
By genius, taste, and love inspired,
Changed this once desert Place
Into what thou now beholdest."

On the opposite side of the monument under the bust of Count Rumford are these words:

"To him
Who rooted out the greatest of public evils,
Idleness and mendicity,
Relieved and instructed the poor
And founded many institutions
For the education of our Youth,
Go, Wanderer,
And strive to equal him
In genius and activity, and us
In gratitude."

A replica of this monument stands in front of the Library at Woburn, Mass.

FRAGMENTARY NOTES

From Diary of John Quincy Adams, July 22, 1788
(Name of town not given, but he does mention being in
Woburn, Mass., on July 21st):

I went to see Mrs. Bartlett and saw Mr. S. Blodgett and
his brother Caleb there.

From History of Camden and Rockport:

David Blodgett, born in Dunstable, Mass., December 16,
1744, was a Revolutionary soldier and a prominent citizen of
Mason, N. H. After he came to Camden, Maine, he was prom-
inent in town affairs also one of the founders of the Congrega-
tional Church. Most of his descendants moved to Aroostook
County.

BLISS BLODGETT (I have found no record of his birth-
place) married Miss Thurston of No. Sedgwick. They
made their home in Bucksport, Maine. He was a nephew
of Henry Blodgett, a missionary to China. His father,
George B. Blodgett, was a soldier in the Civil War.

JOHN JOHNSON, son of Capt. Edward and brother of
Major William Johnson, was proprietor of a sawmill in
Woburn. He married Bathia Reed, a daughter of Wil-
liam and Mabel Reed. (See Reed Notes.) They were
the parents of six children. He seems not to have been
as successful in life as others of his family, for we find
him mentioned as follows in the records of his native
town, Woburn:

December 19, 1671.

John Johnson of Oburne (Woburn) appeared according
to summons to answer the presentment of the Grand Jury for
his absenting himself constantly on the Lord's Day from Pub-
lick Worship of God—confessed that he had formerly gone
elsewhere to assembly but now he had left off and for some
time had attended the worship of the Lord with the People
of God in the place where he dwells and was resolved, God
continuing life and health, that he would still do so. The
Court accepted his promise and paying fees of Court, he was
discharged.

John Johnson, admitted to Baptist Church, was excommunicated.

From Town Records under date of January 22, 1679:

John Johnson, Jr., being taken in drunk was sentenced to pay tenne groats.

From Page 618, History of Woburn:

John Johnson becoming sick, enfeebled and poor in his latter years he and his wife Bathia were taken by their sons William and Obadiah in 1712 to Canterbury, Conn., and there maintained by them during life at the *charge of Woburn*.

Can you see them—these feeble old people, our kinsmen and a branch of two of Woburn's most important families, the Johnsons and the Reeds—being taken away from their home and carried to another State to become members of the household of their sons "*at the expense of the town of Woburn.*"

THOMAS BLODGETT was Selectman in Lexington 1713-18-20-22-24.

In 1755 French and Indian War, one of the twenty one men from Lexington was William Blodgett.

In 1757 another call was made for men to march to the relief of Fort William Henry. Josiah, Phinehas, and Josiah Blodgett, Jr., responded.

Eben Perkins, son of Prudence Blodgett Perkins, died at Centerville, Va., July 25, 1861, from wounds received in the Battle of Bull Run.

THE REED FAMILY

There is no proof but strong evidence that William Reed and Mabel, his wife, came from London to this country on the ship *Defence* in 1635. They lived in several Massachusetts Towns. He was known as Captain Reed and was 48 years of age when he reached America. Mabel was 18 years younger. He lived at Charleston, Scituate, Lexington, and Woburn. He was one of the Selectmen of Lexington and represented the General Court for many years. He was a member of the church at Charleston and while living at Scituate sent his wife to Charleston on horseback with their infant baby in her arms, in order that the child might be baptized in the church there. Just why the words "he sent her" are used in the records, I do not know. They were the parents of nine children, the three eldest being born before they left England. About 1654 or 1655 they returned to England with their four youngest children and Mr. Reed died at Newcastle-upon-Tyne in 1656. He left a will but appointed no executor and Oliver Cromwell on the last day of October 1656 named his widow Mabel, as executrix. Four years later she with her family returned to Woburn where her older children were living. They were holders of a great deal of land and as late as 1868—perhaps even now—some of this land was still in possession of the Reed family in Lexington.

Israel Reed, a son of William and Mabel, born 1642, married Mary Kendall, a daughter of his cousin Francis Kendall. He was a butcher and bought land in Woburn in 1683. It was to Israel Reed, Jr., son of Israel and Mary F., that the grant to Woburn of 2000 A. of land was sold in 1734 by the town committee.

Israel Jr., recorded as Lieut. Reed, married Hannah Wyman of Woburn and they were the parents of Abigail who married Giles Johnson.

Lucy, daughter of Giles and Abigail Johnson, married Seth Blodgett, Jr., and came with him to Brooksville, in 1744.

THE WYMAN FAMILY

The family of Elizabeth Wyman Blodgett—the mother of Seth.

The name Wyman is of German origin, first spelled *Weymen*.

Francis Wyman and his brother, John, were among the very first people to settle at Woburn, Mass. They were tanners and were in business together. In their little shop was laid the foundation of the shoe and leather business for which Woburn has ever since been famous.

Francis married October 2, 1650, Abigail Reed, a daughter of William and Mabel Reed (See Reed Notes). Their son, Thomas Wyman, married Mary Richardson of Woburn and Lexington, and Elizabeth (born December 10, 1718), the eleventh child of Thomas and Mary Wyman, married Seth Blodgett and became the mother of Seth, Jr.

Nathaniel Wyman, grandson of Francis Wyman, was killed at Lexington on the morning of the 19th of April, 1775, age 24 years.
