


Preface

The plan of this book is very simple. The charts show the ancestral lines of Veranus Brownell and Margaret Lewis Jenkins and Lois B. Showers. By following the numbers of the charts one may trace back the most of the lines of Veranus Brownell eight generations. The lines of Margaret Jenkins and Lois Showers are not traced so far.

At first the Brownell Line is given from Thomas Brownell the Immigrant down to Veranus Brownell. Short biographical sketches and the families of children in each generation follow.

Then we take up the Descendants of Veranus Brownell, and this is followed by the records of the Families who have married into the Brownell Family. These are arranged in alphabetical order.

I. THOMAS BROWNELL was born in Derbyshire, England, in 1619. His wife's name was ANN British. There seems to be no record of her last name. They were married in 1638 and came to this country the following year. Austin in his Genealogical Dictionary of Rhode Island states that he was the son of Sir Edmund Brownell of Derbyshire. The Brownells of Rhode Island possessed plate upon which was engraved the Coat of Arms, as presented upon the preceeding page, which was the Coat of Arms of the Brownell Family of Derbyshire. That he came to this country soon after their marriage is evidenced by the fact that they are found in Aquidneck in 1647, a small settlement at the North end of Rhode Island now known as Portsmouth. This settlement had been formed nine years before this date by a little group of men and women who had been driven out of Boston because "Mr. and Mrs. Hutchinson had seduced them into dangerous errors." Here in Aquidneck had been signed that famous compact, as important as that other compact signed on the Mayflower. It was as follows:

"The seventh of the first month in the year 1638, We, whose names are underwritten, do hereby solemnly, in the presence of Jehovah, incorporate ourselves into a bodie politick, and as He shall help us, will submit ourselves, our lives, and our estates, unto our Lord of Lords, and to all those perfect and most absolute Laws of His, given us in His Holy Word of Truth, to be guided and judged thereby. Ex. XXIV 2 & 3 and II Chron. II 3, and II Kings II 17."

This compact was signed by fourteen members of the Boston Church, twelve of whom had been required to give up their arms, in the previous year on account of their adherence to the doctrines of Mrs. Ann Hutchinson. It was among these people, who had been driven from Massachusetts on account of their religious opinions, that Thomas Brownell cast his lot. We may judge somewhat of his character by his choice of the people among whom he decided to make his home. His father, SIR EDMUND BROWNELL, was at one time Mayor of Coventry and held other most important positions. The crest above the Coat of Arms bears emblems which indicate royal connections, or ancestors who were Noblemen. The earliest record of his name in Portsmouth is under date of March 10, 1647, when he witnessed the will of John Walker, his neighbor on the South. Thomas and Ann had four children born in England and four born in this country as follows:

A remarkable family, eight children all of whom lived to be married and have children, large families, too. It is also to be noted that two of them, viz Nos. 1 and 3, were 100 and 101 years old, respectively. They all lived in Portsmouth, R. I., and the vital records of that place contain all the above data. Five years after landing in this country Thomas Brownell was made a freeman, i.e. he was given the rights of franchise. He also held many important political offices and always acquitted himself with honor and merit. It is a matter of just pride on the part of his descendants to know that the first one by the name of "Brownell" to live in this land was a man of religious character, and one to be honored by his compeers with many offices of trust. He died in the year 1665 at the age of 46. His

wife, Ann, also passed away the same year. One might be led to wonder why they should have died so young. But in all probability the mystery would be solved if we could know the hardships and trials, sufferings and sacrifices incident to migration to a new land, to pioneer life, and the struggle to raise a large family of children. Savage says that Thomas Brownell was the Progenitor of all the Brownells in this country, except those who may have come over recently.

- VI. JOSEPH BROWNELL, No. 1 above. Was born in Portsmouth, R. I. Sometime, I have not found out when, he removed to Pomfret, Vt. Whether he came directly, or stopped somewhere else before coming to Vermont, I do not know. Owing to the fact that the home lot (now abandoned entirely) was about the most undesirable, looks as though he was a late arrival there and had to take what was left. He married in Pomfret, Vt., RACHEL CHEEDLE, June 11, 1809. She was the daughter of JOHN CHEEDLE and RACHEL ALLEN. The records of Pomfret show the presence of two Josephs, designated "Sr." and "Jr." The one called "Sr." must have been the Grandfather of the one called "Jr." The names, Philadelphia (a very unusual name, especially for girls) and Eleanor (both of which we find in the records of Pomfret and the latter one we find in Veranus' family of children) make me feel sure that this is the correct line. Joseph and Rachel had only one son:
 - 1. VERANUS BROWNELL, born March 16, 1810, in Pomfret, Vt. RACHEL BROWNELL died March 26, 1810.
- VII. VERANUS BROWNELL, No. 1 above. The only child of Joseph Brownell and Rachel Cheedle. Misfortune seems to

have been his birthright. Left motherless in infancy, it was his hard lot, for the first eight years of his life to be cast among people who had for him little sympathy and less care. He knew not what it was to be loved. He was repeatedly and roughly told "He was nothing but a worthless idiot, and would never be anything but a fool." He suffered cruel violence at the hands of the inhuman wretch who stood to him as "foster father." At one time a rope was tied around his wrists and he was drawn up until his toes barely touched the floor and then was whipped until pools of blood had dripped from his lacerated person. He was taken down in an insensible condition and for many days it was not thought that he would recover. From the effects of these brutalities he never fully escaped. Their crushing influence hung like a hideous spell over all his earlier years, and to the last it was manifested in an extremely modest estimate of his own abilities and worth. This, together with his generous and genuine application of the Apostolical precept, "in honor preferring one another," may account for the humble place he held in conference work. Some time after the death of his mother, his father settled in Parishville, St. Lawrence Co., N. Y., where he married again, Ruth ———. good, kind step-mother, learning of the child's unhappy situation, resolutely made the long and perilous journey, through dense forests, and over mountains, on horseback and alone, found him and brought him home, and cared for him as though he were her own. From her dear lips fell the first words of love and tenderness he ever knew. Adversity, however, was loth to quit its prey. At the age of nine he received an accidental blow from an axe, which made him a cripple for life. Then by a strange turn of fortune, at thirteen he was turned out into the world, in midwinter, penniless and almost naked, to care for himself as best he could. Making his way in his stocking feet (shoes he had none) to the distant village of Potsdam, he there served an apprenticeship at the shoe-maker's trade and attained -a proficiency altogether beyond one of his years. Concluding to try his fortune in the "far west," he set out for the rising village of Rochester, on the Genesee River, his only possessions consisting of a brave heart, a slender kit of tools, and a pack of cards, which a friend (?) had generously presented him. Reaching his place of destination his first business was to bury the cards, carefully marking the spot so that they might be

found in case of need. He never had occasion to dig them up! Soon after this he fell a victim to the fever-and-ague, and another friend (?) advised the use of ardent spirits as the best and, indeed, the only remedy. Time passed on and he finally awoke to the fact that he had become "a hard drinker." "What!" said he to himself, "Veranus Brownell a slave to whisky; we'll see!" and from that hour not another drop of the foul stuff ever passed his lips. This was in the year 1826. By invitation of a Christian family, and with whom he had been providentially associated, he accompanied them to a camp-meeting held in Canada, and was there soundly converted, and called to the work of the ministry. This was in his 17th year. Up to this time he had never been in school a single day. Feeling the importance of a thorough preparation for his Great Commission, he at once entered upon a systematic course of study. But at the end of his first term at school the authorities of the Church, very unwisely, as he ever afterwards thought, urged him out into the field, under the specious plea, that, while "gaining knowledge is a good thing, saving souls is better." But, notwithstanding his limited advantages, so keen and constant was his thirst for knowledge, so close and accurate were his habits of observation, and, above all, so implicit was his reliance upon the truth of God's Word and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, the embarrassment of his early disadvantages in this direction was ultimately quite overcome. There are multitudes to be found all over the broad field of his public administrations who are ready to testify to the breadth of his learning, the wisdom and maturity of his counsels, and his masterly grasp of the body of revealed truth. On the 19th of November, 1833, he was united in marriage to Miss Margaret Lewis Jenkins, who proved a companion every way worthy of him, fitted both by nature and by grace, to share the trials and responsibilities of his life's great work. Up to the year 1841 his connection had been with the Protestant Methodist Church. But a wider observation led him to the conviction that the thorough system of the Methodist-Episcopal Church gave greater promise of good unto all the people, and he, therefore, with his. characteristic promptness of action, still retaining unimpaired the affection and esteem of his former associates in labor, united with the old Genesee Conference at its session held in Dansville in 1841, taking the appointments Hornellsville,


Avoca, Naples, Springwater, Rogersville, Angelica, Conesus and Sparta. It was while on this last named charge that he met with the sorest affliction of his life, in the sudden death of the beloved wife of his youth, December 28, 1852. Her departure left him with ten children, the oldest but seventeen years of age. Severe as was this bereavement, he was marvelously sustained through the trying ordeal. He subsequently married Miss Lois Showers, a most devoted and confiding companion, who survived him several years. It was at the home of a Mr. Underhill of Short Tract, N. Y., an uncle of the bride, that he married his first wife. The young people went to housekeeping in Messenger's Hollow, a hamlet in the town of Nunda, Livingston Co., N. Y. They lived here three years, 1833 to 1836. From here they moved to Castile, N. Y., where they lived until 1841, when Veranus joined the Genesee Conference. At his death, December 11, 1874, he left 14 children, ten by the first marriage and four by the second. Nearly all of these, together with the sons-in-law and daughters-in-law, are devoted members of the Methodist Church and one son, John T., and two sons-in-law, Rev. Wm. H. Rogers and the Rev. J. B. Countryman, were members of the Genesee Conference. Were an explanation of this gratifying result to be sought for, it would be found in part at least, in the incorruptible integrity of character which this holy man of God everywhere manifested; and still more in that warm and attractive piety which glowed with unvarying luster through all his domestic life, and made "home' 'the most delightful place in all the world. Moreover, with him, the Gospel Ministry was not a mere "profession," but a great and holy calling. It inspired his deepest enthusiasm. Never through all those years of hard labor and severe exposures, with his "allowance" fixed from year to year at about starvation point to begin with, and never, but in a solitary instance, fully paid, and with the care of his growing family upon him, never did one word of complaint fall from his lips within the hearing of his children. During the several last years of his life he was afflicted with sciatic rheumatism, which ultimately became so disabling as to compel him to ask for a superannuated relation to his conference. This was in the year 1872. Still he continued to preach nearly every Sabbath, for the most part in his own neighborhood near Canaseraga, Alleghany Co., N. Y., where he was held in the highest veneration, beloved as a father,

and listened to as an Apostle. His last sermon was preached in September, 1874, just before the Annual Session of the Conference, when, as some of those who were present said, "It seemed as though an Angel from Heaven had come to declare the unsearchable riches of Christ." His last days and nights were passed in the midst of the most excruciating bodily sufferings, but through it all there flowed the same unruffled peace and cheerful resignation to God's will, for which his whole life had been remarkable. "It will all be over soon," he would say with a smile, "and then I shall be at rest." "I have tried not to flinch at the call of duty, in any manner or place." "But, oh, I am so unworthy, my only hope is in the infinite atonement of Christ." To his son and successor in the ministry he said, "Such visions as I have had on this sick bed, when all alone with God, such revelations of the glory which shall be. Could the world behold what I have seen, no soul but would be charmed to seek after God. Should it please the Lord to raise me up again, how I will tax this poor tongue to tell the wonders. of His grace." At another time, gazing upon his sons and daughters, standing in groups around his bed, he said, "The eight of these affords me infinitely more satisfaction than the accumulated treasures of the world could give. To know that my children are walking in the Truth more than repays me for all the toils and sufferings I have undergone." Then, musing awhile, he continued, "Often through my earlier ministry, when it would be proposed by the Authorities of the Church to send me to this or that appointment, where my children could have the advantages of school and social cultivation, it would be objected by the stewards of those places that, "while Brother Brownell is just the man for the place, and his wife would be an ornament to any society, yet we cannot think of taking the burden of supporting such a family of children." None but the Master knows the heavy weight of sorrow I have borne on this account." But it is all passed now and I freely give into the bosom of the Church, what it was so unwilling to help me to provide for, a band of strong men and women of God, and I am content." And when at length the hour of his dissolution was near, when the mists of the dark river had blinded his eyes to all human sights forever, one of his sons stooped down and repeated in his ear from the twenty-third Psalm, "Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death," at this point he started, and the words, "No fear! No fear!" burst from his lips, while an unearthly radiance suffused his pallid features, smoothing out the deep lines of pain, and lingering there in indescribable loveliness, until he was laid to his final rest.

It was at the home of a Mr. Underhill, in Short Tract, N. Y., that Veranus Brownell met this gentleman's niece, Miss Margaret Lewis Jenkins. An acquaintance was begun which ripened into love, such love as comes to loyal and trustworthy souls, for he surely was one of Nature's Noblemen, and she was a Perfect Woman, nobly planned. After their marriage, as stated above, they lived for three years at Messenger's Hallow, and then they removed to Castile, N. Y. During this period he worked at his trade and preached, and perpared himself to join the Genesee Conference. During the years of his ministry he continued to work at his trade, for his salaries were never enough to support his family. He purchased a farm in Birdsall and built a house, which came to be known as the Brownell Homestead, and on January 1, 1848, he moved his family there while he preached at Angelica (not very far away). In the fall of 1850, six months after the birth of the tenth child, the Conference ordered them to move to Conesus, and so to Conesus they went. It is a wonder to us today how our Grandmother managed, with such a large family, to move every year, or two. Truly, she must have been a wonderful woman. In 1851 Veranus visited friends and relatives in Pomfret, Vt. He went from Conesus to Chralotte with horse and buggy, his son, John, driving. From there he took a steamer down the lake and river, disembarking at some point nearest to his destination. He returned the same way, John, a lad of 15, making the drive through the forest all the way to Charlotte to meet him. While they lived in Conesus, Margaret's married brother, John Jenkins, and her unmarried brother, Isaac, lived in the Homestead, worked the farm and took care of the place. Previous to this time the rest of the Jenkins family had moved to St. Joseph's Co., Mich. (See Jenkins Family.)

In 1852, Veranus and family wished to return to the Homestead, but as above stated, the house was occupied by John and Isaac Jenkins. So they rented a house for the Winter at Birdsall Center, one mile from the farm, and here on December 18, Margaret gave birth to her eleventh child and both mother and child died. They were buried in the cemetery at Canaserga,

N. Y. As soon as possible the family was moved into the house on the farm, and a young cousin, Jane Brownell, from St. Lawrence Co., N. Y., came to be the head of the household. But she was young and lively and when Veranus would return from the circuit, he frequently found her and the older girls away on pleasure bent, while the younger children were "running wild." Something had to be done at once. So, casting about in his mind for a helpmate, his choice fell upon Margaret's most intimate friend, Lois Showers, of Urbana, N. Y. The great marvel is that she would consider stepping into a house, already full of children, ten in all. But she accepted, and while out on a buggy ride, August 11, 1853, she wearing a new calico dress, and a black silk apron, they decided not to wait longer, and drove to the Methodist parsonage and had the "knot" tied. The following is a more orderly and complete record of the family.



1. JAMES EVAN BROWNELL, eldest child of VERANUS and MARGARET (JENKINS) BROWNELL, was born in Messenger's Hollow, Liv. Co., N. Y., April 18, 1835. His early childhood was spent in different places as his father moved according to custom of Methodist itinerants in those days. The places were: Castile, Hornellsville, Avoca, Naples, South Dansville and Birdsall, Angelica and Conesus. While here James secured a position to "clerk" in a store (called Dart's Store) and he remained here when the family moved for the second time to Birdsall. When he was twenty-five years old, November 22, 1860, he married MALINA BRADNER COLLER, daughter of JAMES and CATHERINE (GERNERD) COLLER. She was born May 12, 1838, in Scottsburg, Liv. Co., N. Y., and died March 23, 1909, in Rochester, N. Y. For his entire life James E. Brownell was engaged in the mercantile business.

Before his marriage, he had formed a partnership with Alonzo T. Slaight, who afterwards became his brother-in-law, and they kept a General Store in Scottsburg, N. Y. The firm of Slaight and Brownell was known far and near as a reliable, trustworthy firm, and for many years they did a flourishing business. In the year 1894 they sold the business in Scottsburg to Mr. Chas. A. Bateman, and both families moved to Rochester.

A. T. Slaight engaged in the Wholesale Dental Goods business, with rooms in the Power's Bldg., and James Brownell conducted a store similar to the one in Scottsburg in Lyell Ave., the firm name remaining the same, Slaight and Brownell, Mr. Slaight being a silent partner. He continued in this business with his son, John Laverne, for many years.

In the year 1911 he retired from active work, at the age of 76 years, and the following year went to make his home with his daughter, Mrs. Walter Dryer. Mr. Brownell lived to the great age of 92 years, and died peacefully while asleep in bed. the date of his demise was December 19, 1927. His children were:

1. Flora E. Brownell, born in Scottsburg, January 24, 1862. Her childhood was spent in the place of her birth. In 1879 she went to Genesee Wesleyan Seminary at Lima, N. Y., where she and Adele Larrison were room-mates, and where Adele graduated. Flora's mother being very ill, she was taken to a Sanatorium for treatment, and the home needing a head, Flora was unable to return to the Seminary for the final term, and so did not graduate. Afterward

ADELE LARRISON married HIRAM BROWNELL, brother of James Evan, and so became Flora's aunt, altho there was not much difference in their ages. On December 31, 1885, Flora married Otis Walter Dryer of Rush, N. Y., son of Orrin Carpentrer and Adaline Sophronia (Stull) Dryer. They have made their home in the city of Rochester, where Mr. Dryer has been one of the best known architects for many years. Their home is on East Ave., corner of Penfield Rd.

- II. JOHN THOMAS BROWNELL, second child of Veranus Brownell and Margaret (Jenkins) Brownell, was born in Castile, N. Y., August 24, 1836, and died in Tangerine, Florida, May 26, 1886. He was converted in early life at a camp meeting held at Grove, N. Y. He took his preparatory course at Rogersville Academy, of which at that time Rev. Isaiah McMahon was principal. He entered Genesee College at Lima, N. Y., in 1859, and graduated in 1863 with the highest honors. During the next two years he taught in a seminary at Kent's Hill, Maine. He was married in Ripley, N. Y., to MISS ADELIA SMALL-WOOD, a lady of superior gifts of mind and heart, also a graduated of Genesee College of Lima, N. Y. Though eminently successful as a teacher, he was actuated by a conviction that the ministry was to be his life's work, and, consequently, he joined the East Genesee Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the Fall of 1865 and from that time on he continued to preach serving as appointed the following churches: Tonawanda, Naples, Bath, Lima, Warsaw, Geneseo, Lyons, Mansfield and Auburn. It was while in his first year in Auburn that he met the great loss of his life—the death of his beloved wife. No two were ever more happily and completely united in matrimony that they. And it was consequently a great strain on him to go on alone in the work of the ministry. Still he toiled barvely on until forced by failing strength to resign his work, greatly to the regret of his church. It was while seeking health and strength in the sunny clime of Florida that the end came. The children which had come to bless this so early sundered home were:
 - 1. John Veranus Brownell, born June 18, 1868, and died February 6, 1898. He was a most remarkable young man. After the death of his parents he made his home with his uncle and aunt, Mr. George K. and Mrs. Emma (Smallwood) Powell, of Wilkes-Barre, Pa, graduating with high honors from the schools of that city, he entered Syracuse University in 1887 and graduated in 1891, receiving the degree of A.B. In 1894 the University conferred upon him the A.M. degree. He studied law in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., from 1891 to 1894, and was admitted to the bar in 1894. He specialized in railroad law, and went to Los Angeles, Cal., to begin his practice. But death cut his career short and he went to join his parents in the life beyond.
 - 2. Margaret Brownell, born August 15, 1874, and died in California in 1925. She was but five years old when her parents died, at which

time she came to make her home with her uncle, William H. Rogers, and aunt, Martha Elizabeth (Brownell) Rogers. She graduated at Genesee Wesleyan Semininary, Lima, N. 

Rogers, Principal of Troupsburg Academy, and where she had been teaching during that school year. Rev. David Nutten, the Presiding Elder of Hornellsville District of the East Genesee Conference, performed the ceremony, before the student body as a surprise, closing number on the Commencement Program. William Henry Rogers was born October 21, 1834, in Willing, Alleghany Co., N. Y., son of Charles and Lucy (Chandler) Rogers. He graduated in 1859 from Alfred University as also did Martha Elizabeth Brownell. For a few years they both followed the teaching profession and he had a regular appointment to preach also. For nearly 40 years he carried on the double work of teaching during the week and preaching on Sundays. 

- V. HIRAM BROWNELL, fifth child of Veranus and Margaret Jenkins Brownell, born in Hornell (then Hornellsville), N. Y., January 22, 1842. At the outbreak of the Civil War, Hiram enlisted in the 13th Infantry of New York Volunteers. He was attached to the Army of the Potomac and took part in many of the major engagements of the war, including the Peninsular Campaign and the Seven Days' Battle, the second battle of Bull Run, Antietam and Fredericksburg. In the last named battle he was seriously wounded in the left hip by a bursting shell. He was left on the battlefield as dead, and in fact did nearly die from the loss of blood. All the remainder of his life he has suffered from the effects of this wound. At the expiration of his term of enlistment he was honorably discharged from the army and returned home for a short period of rest. Then he went west to Kansas and New Mexico, at that time a wild, unsettled country. He engaged in hotel work, then railroad construction on the new Santa Fe Lines, cattle raising and general farming, at one time owning a farm on the site of which the city of Great Bend, Kansas, was afterward built. A series of disasters common in the lives of those early pioneers overtook his ranching efforts—grasshoppers, droughts and tornadoes. Broken financially and discouraged over the repeated failures, he returned east in 1882, after 20 years' absence. While on a visit to the home of his sister, Emily, wife of Gurnee Larrison, near Westfield, Penn., he met and in 1884 married Adele Larrison, daughter of William Larrison (brother of Gurnee) and Susan Pemberton Larrison. They had the following named children:

VI. MARY JANE BROWNELL, sixth child of VERANUS and MARGARET (JENKINS) BROWNELL, was born in Naples, N. Y., November 27, 1843. Her childhood was sepnt in South South Dansville, Birdsall, Angelica, Conesus, then Birdsall again, due to the frequent moving as was the custom of the Methodist Itinerancy. From Birdsall, Jennie (as she was called) taught country schools, then attended the Springville Academy, and later became a teacher there, under her brotherin-law, William H. Rogers, the Principal. She was married there on the closing day of school, June 23, 1870, to ALONZO TRU-MAN SLAIGHT, who was then in partnership with her brother, James, in general merchandise business in Scottsburg, New York. He was born in Scottsburg, May 10, 1833, and died in Rochester, N. Y., February 19, 1904. They lived in Scottsburg for several years, where three children were born. (See record below.) In 1878, with proper provision for the care of the children, Jennie entered the Medical Department of the University of Buffalo, to obtain the degree of M. D. She was graduated in 1880 and was a pioneer among woman physicians. That year her husband sold out his partnership in Scottsburg and moved the family to Rochester, N. Y., where he had arranged a partnership with Charles A. Davis in the dental supply business under the name of Davis & Co., and Jennie in the practice of medicine. She became a friend of Susan Brownell Anthony, Sarah A. Dolly and other women interested in the welfare of the so-called weaker sex, and through their efforts the Rochester Free Dispensary for Women was organized and conducted by women in the interest of the poor women of the city. Dr. Slaight was appointed to and accepted the position of the first woman city physician in Rochester, and attended women in hovels day and night as medical attention was required, for the merely nominal salary of three hundred dollars per year. This work, together with the services given the Free Dispensary, left little time to devote to private practice, but such unselfish devotion to the welfare of those less fortunate prevailed throughout her life. After her husband's death in 1904, she discontinued the practice of medicine, but retained her association with women's organizations. She was a member of the First Methodist Church of Rochester until removing to Rye, N. Y., in 1924, after which she attended the Methodist Church of that town. She died in the family home

- at Rye, N. Y., April 6, 1927. After A. T. Slaight's retirement from the Dental Supply business, he entered into partnership with T. D. Snyder under the firm name of Slaight & Snyder, Real Estate, and continued to give his attention to this business until his death. Their life together was a true example of ideal family devotion and unselfish love. Their bodies are laid to rest side by side in the family plot in Mt. Hope Cemetery in Rochester, N. Y. The following is the record of their children:
- 1. Herbert Alonzo Slaight was born in Scottsburg, N. Y., July 23, 1871. He attended the public schools in Rochester, Genesee Wesleyan Seminary, and Rochester University, graduating in the Class of 1893. He was a member of the Delta Psi Fraternity. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge in Albany, N. Y. On June 28, 1899, he married Miss Harriette Hamilton, born November 29, 1878, in Castile, N. Y., daughter of Edward and Frances (Burch) Hamilton, of Perry, N. Y. Their children are:
 - a. Hamilton Truman Slaight, born in New York City, November 1, 1905, graduating from Kenyon College and the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration. He engaged in the Banking Business in 1928 in New York City.







CAREY

In Domesday Book, under date of 1198, Kerri of Torr Abbey is a Tenant in chief. The name also appears in ancient records as "Kari" or "Karry." An Adam de Kari, or Karry, 1170, was Lord of the Castle Karry in Somerset, and the Carys of Devonshire are regarded as of the same family. In 1270 the name appears as de Karry, but by the next century the "de" has disappeared, and Carey, or Cary, becomes the correct orthography. For the last few centuries Cary has been the most common form of spelling. "Carew" is considered by some authorities as one and the same name as Carey, and the story is told of two Walter Carews, members at the same time of the House of Commons, that it was proposed that one should be called CAREY and the other CAREW, in order to prevent embarrassing situations and to end the confusion.

"What Care I? and What Care You?"

was their reply. The history of one branch of the Cary family in America begins with Col. Wilson Myler Cary, son of John and grandson of William Cary, Lord Mayor of Bristol in 1611. Myler received a grant of 3000 acres of land in Westmoreland, Va., in 1654. "Colonel" was the title he brought with him and he earned the title of "Major" here. His tombstone at Cary's quarters in Warwick bears the Coat of Arms herewith presented. His wife was Alice, daughter of Henry Hobson, Alderman of Bristol, and they had four sons and three daughters. Miles, the immigrant, came over as early as 1640. He was a member of the King's Council, under Berkeley. This line claims as ancestor Sir William Cary, who fell at Tewkesbury in 1471. His son, Sir Thomas Cary, married a

granddaughter of the Duke of Somerset. Their son, Sir William Cary, married Mary, sister of Anne Boleyn, Queen. Henry Cary, their son, was Lord Hemsdon, the Honest Courtier, of Elizabeth's reign. The Carys formerly held two earldoms, Monmouth and Dover, also the barony of Humdon and Henry Cary, born 1622, was the first viscount of Falkland. In New England, JOHN CARY'S name is found in Plymouth records in 1634, the year of his arrival. Helped found Duxbury and Bridgewater. In 1656 he was Constable of the latter place. the first and only officer of the town that year. From 1657 until his death in 1681, he was Town Clerk. According to tradition, he was the first Teacher of Latin in the Plymouth Colonly. His sons and grandsons were, like himself, founders of towns in New England. They were also Pioneers in Pennsylvania. "The Society of the Descendants of John Cary" keeps green the family name by Annual Reunions, and have erected a handsome marker at West Bridgewater on the site of John, the Pilgrim's home. John Cary's wife was Elizabeth Godfrey and their children numbered twelve. John Cary was credited with various sums for garrison duty at Dunstable, Mass. Soldier of King Philip's War (see Bodge page 359) Plymouth County records Vol. XI p. 245 under date of July 10, 1677, he is called Sergeant Cary of Bridgewater, Mass. He appears always to have been active in public affairs. The following is a list of his children:

- I. GEORGE CHEEDLE, with his brother, Asa, came to America from England in 1720 and settled in Lebanon, Conn. Another passenger on the same boat was Miss Martha Burge and on the way over a friendship was begun, which ripened into love and within a few months George and Martha were married. The wedding day was August 16, 1721, and record of the marriage may be found in the vital statistics of Lebanon, Vol. 1, page 47, and their nine children are recorded in Vol. A, page 9. George Cheedle was a member of Adonijah Fitch's company of Connecticut Militia from New London, which went to the capture of Louisburg Fortress, Cape Breton Island, July 6, 1745. He was dismissed from service October 9, but died before reaching home. Of course, he was dismissed on account of illness. There is a statement in the American Magazine for February, 1905, page 141, that he fought at Quebec, and was honorably discharged but died before reaching home. Of course, both statements cannot be true. My own opinion, formed from a few clews in the records, is that he fought at both places and that he died in the year 1759, after, or during the battle of Quebec. (See Council of Appointments, Vol. IV, pages ——.) In the list of nine children above referred to, No. 5 was:

The record of the baptism of these four children may be found in the Congregational Church records of Ashford, Conn. I have not found the record of Mary Bosworth's death. the church records just referred to show that John Cheedle and his second wife, Rachel Allen, were received into the Church in 1769, as were also his brother, Asa, and his wife, Martha Paddock. Both the above couples were married by the Rev. Timothy Allen, uncle of Rachel Allen, and pastor of the Church at Ashford. We also find in the same records the account of the dismissal of John and Asa Cheedle and their wives to Pomfret, Vermont. Now, in-as-much as the scene is to shift to the hilly country of northern Vermont, we will give a little history of the settlement of the place where they settled. They called the place Pomfret after the name of the place they had left in Connecticut. Most of the original settlers came from that place. A few of them, however, came from Woodstock and Sutton, Mass. The organization was effected on the first Monday in September, 1761, with Zachariah Waldo as chairman. The first survey and division of lots was made by Simeon Sessions and Isaac Dana (Sarah, daughter of Simeon Sessions, was the wife of Isaac Dana) in 1770. The same committee rearranged the lots in 1771. The boundary line between Pomfret and Woodstock was finally settled in 1778. It was a constant wonder to us (My wife and I), when we visited Pomfret in the Summer of 1924, how our ancestors ever succeeded in making their way up the Connecticut River and then up and over the Mountains (for such they really are), to so inaccessible a location. The scenery is, indeed, beautiful, but so precipitous and rocky are the mountains that we were not surprised to find the lots which fell to Joseph Brownell (father of Veranus Brownell) utterly abandoned now. Here, however, they did settle, and here John Cheedle and Rachel Allen raised the following family of children:

1. GEORGE CORLISS, the founder of the family in this country, was born in Devonshire, England, in 1617. He was son of Thomas Corliss. Before he attained his majority, he, like many others of his time, turned longing eyes toward the opportunities of the great new Western World. Like his famous descendant, seven generations down, viz, George Henry Corliss, the inventor of the steam engine, he knew how to bring things to pass and make dreams come true. So in 1639 he embarked on his great adventure, and came to New England, where he settled first in Newbury, Mass., but soon removed to Haverhill, settling there in 1640 in West Parish, on the place later known as "Poplar Lawn Farm." Here the remainder of his life was passed. He was one of the first settlers and his name appears on the list of freemen in 1645. He was Selectman in years 1648 to 1652, and again in 1657-1659 and 1669. He was Constable in 1650. His will was dated October 18, 1686, and he died the following day. His beautiful home remained in the possession of the family for several generations. By a strange co-incidence he and his son, John, and his grandson, John, all died while sitting in the same chair. George Corliss married October 26, 1645, at Haverhill, Joanna Davis, daughter of Thomas Davis. And their children were:

of their captors with the tomahawk. For which brave deed a monument has been erected to their memory in Haverhill. They and their families were also rewarded by gifts of land, and also of silver tankards and goblets from Governor Nicholson of Maryland. We share in the honor of being descended from a family, one of whom proved her courage and bravery by taking part in so dangerous and terrible a deed for her life and liberty. Mrs. Dustin was a sister-in-law of Mary Neff. Their husbands were away fighting the Indians. Mrs. Dustin had a little baby three weeks old. Mrs. Neff had been taking care of her. When the Indians captured them they dashed the baby's brains out against the tree and compelled the women to walk a great distance without stopping for rest. Then when the Indians were all asleep around a camp fire the two women quietly arose and, seizing tomahawks, inflicted swift and sure death upon five each, one on each side awakened by the confusion escaped. The monument above referred to bears the image of a woman wielding a tomahawk, while the record is inscribed on the base.

CORNELL

At first the name was written "Cornwall." Then for a time it was written Cornewell. The first Earldom was conferred by

- I. KING JOHN (he who signed "Magna Charta," no thanks to him, however, for he tried hard enough to overthrow it, even after he had affixed the royal seal) upon his son,
- II. RICHARD, in 1216, and he became the first Earl of Cornwall and thus the name was started.
- III. SIR JOHN CORNWALL, son of Richard and grandson of King John married Elizabeth, daughter of John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, and his wife, the sister of King Edward IV. Sir John died in 1243 and the title now passes down through three (IV and V) succeeding Earls of Corwall to
- VI. JOHN CORNWALL, Gent., who married Jane Varney. He died April 12, 1561 and his son, who is No.
- VII. THOMAS CORNEWALL, owner of the Manor of Fairsted in Essex, succeeded to the Earldom. His son,
- VIII. HUMPHREY CORNEWALL, was the next Earl and his son,
- IX. JOHN CORNEWALL, was the next and was the father of
- X. THOMAS CORNELL, the American Ancestor, born 1695, in Essex, England, married Rebecca Briggs (sister of John of whom more later); died 1655. Rebecca was born 1600 and died February 8, 1673. He came to America in 1638 with his wife and children, settled in Boston, where by a vote of the town

meeting he is permitted "to buy of William Boulston, his house," yard and garden at the back side of Mr. Coddington's lot, and to become an inhabitant." This property was situated on Washington St., between Sumner St. and Milk St. He sold it in 1643 to Edward Tyng. On September 6, 1638, Thomas Cornell was licensed to keep an inn in the room of William Boulston till the next General Court. Thomas was associated with Roger Williams and Mr. Throckmorton in the settlement of the Antinomian Controversy in New Amsterdam. Roger Williams went to England and secured a charter for this colony. They secured grants of land and permits for peaceful possession from Governor Winthrop and the Dutch Government. Some troubleensued with the Indians owing to the unwise actions of Governor Keifts in which the "Indians destroyed many buildings by fire and killed many whites." Roger Williams said, "Mine eyes saw the flames in these towns, and the flights of the hurrying men, women and children." Governor Winthrop said, "By the intervention of Roger Williams the Indians were pacified and peace re-established." Thomas Cornell suffered the loss of his buildings and stock and Mr. and Mrs. (Ann) Hutchinson were killed. As a result of this loss Thomas returned to Rhode Island, and February 4, 1646, secured a grant of 100 acres of land from the Town of Portsmouth on the south side of the River Wading, to run from the river to the land of Edward Hutchinson (son of Ann). This may be considered the original home of the Cornells and it has never passed out of the hands of the family. In the "Friends" records of February, 1773, we read, "Rebecca Cornell, widow of Thomas Cornell, was strangely killed in her own house at Portsmouth. The body was twice "viewed" by the coroner, buried, digged up and re-interred by the side of her husband." On May 23rd following her son, Thomas 2, was charged with the murder and after a trial which reads like the farce that it was, was convicted and hung. Among the witnesses, was John Briggs, the brother of Rebecca. He swore that she appeared to him after her death and said, "See how I was burned with fire." It appears that she was sitting by the fire, smoking a pipe, and that she probably fell asleep, and the pipe fell into her lap and set her clothing on fire. It was inferred that someone set her on fire, and as her son, Thomas, was the last one with her, and as she had a little property which would have gone to the son, but, if he were out of the way, would go to the brother, John, he was interested in fixing the blame on the son—hence his peculiar testimony. In fact, he did get the property. Durfee, in his "Legal Tracts of Rhode Island," says that this was most unjust execution in the annals of R. I. The children of Thomas and Rebecca were:

He was appointed by the General Court to treat with the Indians in regard to purchasing land for the Extension of the Boundaries of Rhode Island. His will names his wife, "Sarah" and provides that she and her children shall have one-half of his estate, and his children by his first wife shall have the other half. The children were:

In the settlement of the English Colonies in America, there were at least eight individuals who bore the name of Fish. They came from England and settled in various locations in the early part of the 17th century, and have become the progenitors of numerous families of that name scattered throughout the States. These eight were: Jonathan, John and Nathaniel, the first comers in the year 1637. They settled in Sandwich on Cape Cod and received grants of land there in 1640. THOMAS FISH settled in Portsmouth, R. I., in 1643 and died there in 1687. He was son of ROBERT FISH and ALICE FISH (own cousins) of Market Harborough in the Paris of Great Bowden, in Leicestershire, Eng. John Fish was living in Connecticut in 1651. William Fish in 1651 was living in Windser and died in Stonington in 1689. Joseph Fish of Stamford, Conn., 1651, a soldier in the Great Swamp Fight at Kingston, Conn., 1676. Edward Fish of Talbot Co. Md. prior to 1669; died 1696.

The first three mentioned were brothers, sons of Augustine Fish, and all the others were cousins. All were grandchildren of John Fish and his wife, Margaret Cradock. In the Parish Church, in the village of Great Bowden, a beautiful and picturesque building of stone, long and low, with heavy overhanging eaves, and sides and tower all covered with ivy, on the North wall of the chancel is a tablet erected to the memory of Henrietta Fish, wife of Augustine Fish, Gentleman, and daughter of Sir Edward Farmer. Knight, of Middlesex, who died in 1703. On this tablet are impaled the Arms of husband and wife, as follows: FISH, a chevron between 3 owls, engrailed and FARMER—Arms, sable, on a chevron between 3 lamps, arg. burning with flames, proper, 3 mullets, sable. This Augustine was a cousin of Thomas, the American immigrant. The line as disclosed by the records in this Church is as follows:



- I. WILLIAM HALL, of Newport and Portsmouth, R. I., on the 8th day of the 8th month in 1638 was one of fifty-nine persons admitted inhabitants of an island, just off the coast of Rhode Island, now called, "Aquedunk." In 1639 he was an inhabtant of Newport, R. I. On the 27th day of the 5th month in 1644 a piece of land in Portsmouth, R. I., was granted to him and his name appears on the list of freemen there in 1655. He sold land in Portsmouth to Richard Sisson in 1654. He was Commissioner to the General Court from Portsmouth in years 1654 to 1663. He was Deputy to the General Court 1665 to 1673. In 1673 he was appointed Commissioner to treat with the Indians about drunkenness and to seriously counsel with them and if possible find some way to prevent excessive use of intoxicating liquors among them. Five Chiefs are named among which is found the name of "Philip of Mt. Hope" (King Philip of "King Philip's War" fame). We have a trans-atlantic trace of William Hall's ancestry in one, William Hall, a clergyman of London. He was an author and writer who continued the "Fabyon Chronicle," begun by Sir Thomas More. There is reason to believe a connection existed between him and the family of the Lord Chancellor's. This Clement, a near relative of the Mores, was an original founder of Portsmouth, R. I., and was a neighbor of William Hall's. From his will, made in 1673 (Nov. 20), we gather the following record of his family. His wife's name was Mary. Their children were:

- I. THOMAS HAZARD, the progenitor of the Hazard family in America, was born in 1610 and died in 1680. His name is first found in Boston, Mass., in 1635. He was admitted freeman there in 1638. Two years later he was admitted freeman in Portsmouth, Rhode Island. In 1639, April 28, with ten others, he signed a contract preparatory to the settlement of Newport, R. I. 1. RICHARD LEWIS JENKINS was born in Yorkshire, England, October 16, 1791, and died somewhere in, or near, California, July 8, 1853. He had gone out there in 1849 in the "rush for gold" and it has always been believed by his descendants that he met with "foul play," as it is known that he started for home having been quite successful in his prospecting. We do not know just when he came to this country, but it must have been in his youth, for he married here March 30, 1816, ANN MARIA LEAKE. She was born in this country and the family tradition is that she came from Pennsylvania to New York State. They must have lived in Waterloo, N. Y., for their first child, Margaret Lewis Jenkins, was born there. In the old Bible now in possession of the family in Burr Oak, Mich., which belonged to Richard, the following verse is written in his own handwriting:

"Richard Jenkins is my name, England is my nation, Jiniva is my dwelling place, Christ is my salvation."

"Jiniva" is the way he spelled "Geneva." After thirteen or fourteen years the family migrated to St. Joseph's Co., Mich. The name of the village near which they located is Burr Oak. The children of Richard and Ann Maria were:

- I. DANIEL LADD took the oath of Supremacy and Allegiance to pass to New England in the "Mary and John" of London. Robert Sawyer, Master, the 24th of March, 1634. The first record made of him at his arrival in Ipswich is on February 15, 1637. He was given six acres of land, on which he built a dwelling house. Six years later he sold the property to Henry Kingsbury. He is next found in Salisbury and after a few years he removed to Haverhill, Mass. He married Ann ———, probably about 1639 or '40. But we know nothing further about her. She died February 9, 1694. In Vol. II of the New Hampshire Genealogy, page 867, the statement is made that the name "Ladd," is of French origin, and that Daniel Ladd came from Wiltshire, Eng. The Lawton provides a lineage of historic Cheshire, England. - I. THOMAS LEFFINGWELL was born in England in 1620 and died in 1712, being 92 years of age. The earliest record of him in this country is found in Saybrook, Conn., in 1637. He was a freeman of that place and in very important matters of general interest was intimately associated with Matthew Griswold. He also was a people's Advocate and Defender. He stood for the rights of the Indians (Mohegans). For this reason he and his people were saved from hostile attacks. This tribe gave him a deed to the whole of Norwich, Conn., a township nine miles square. He removed from Saybrook to Norwich in 1659. He held the offices of Sargent, Lieutenant and Ensign. He was Representative to the State General Court, and was in actual attendance at Hartford during fifty-six sessions prior to and including 1700. In 1704 he was appointed Captain of Queen Ann's Royal Commissioners, being associated with Governor Dudley of Massachusetts, Thomas Hooker of Hartford, James. Avery and John Morgan of New London. He was a member of the First Church during the pastorate of Rev. Mr. Fitch, taking a prominent part in the work thereof. He ranked high among the real estate owners of the day, holding extensive tracts of land. He divided his property among his heirs prior to his death. He married in England MARY WHITE.? The English home of the Marvin Family more than a century and a half before the emigration of Reinold and Matthew Marvin to this country was in the Northeastern part of the County of Essex. A century before that we find several Marvin families living only about ten miles north of the home of the Grandfather of the emigrant brothers.

In the Church of St. Michael the Archangel, built in the days of the Normans (about 1100 A. D.), with its massive square tower of Purbeck Stone, green the year around with never fading ivy, Rynalde Marvin, the above name Grandfather, in his will dated December 22, 1554, bequeaths his "Soule to Almyhte God, My Maker." Directs that his body be "buryed" in the Aisle North of the Chancel. His signature to this will, which is preserved in Somerset House, London, is given in facsimile here.

The name was originally spelled Wayghte, and is derived from an old Anglo Saxon word meaning, to watch. The first Waits were found in England at the time of the Norman Conquest. William, the Conqueror, gave the Earldom of Norwich to Ralf de Waiet in 1075 A. D. He was the son of Rolf, who married "Emma," a cousin of the Conqueror. She was named after her great-aunt, Queen Emma, who was the wife of two kings and the mother of two kings. William the Conqueror was the son of Richard, the 4th Duke of Normandy, and grandson of Richard the 3rd Duke of Normandy and greatgrandson of William, the 2nd Duke of Normandy, and the 2nd great-grandson of Realf, the 1st Duke of Normandy. The early Waites in England were wandering minstrels. The bugles on their Coat of Arms denote their musical tendencies. They were minstrels and musicians to the King and to his Knights.
