Foreword.

My dear relatives:-

For several years I have had in mind the collection of such of the family records as could be obtained. During the last quarter of a century we have become rather widely scattered and many of the older members of our family who settled the Kansas prairies are no longer living. The task of assembling the available information was begun in the spring of 1938 in the realization that if this work was to be done at all it should be done while a few were still here who had the best knowledge of our origin. Mrs. Anna Emily (Brewster) Graham, who was a girl of eleven at the time of the migration to Kansas in 1871, is still with us and we are indebted to her knowledge of the family history as well as her interest in the work for the success of the undertaking. Webster Ellsworth Brewster has contributed greatly toward the family history during the early days in Kansas. Miss Florence Brewster has supplied the information pertaining to those members of the family who live in or near Portland, Oregon, These latter comprise the people of families 1B and 49-56 inclusive.

Our immediate branch of the family has its origin in Albert Porter Brewster who was a descendant of Elder William Brewster, Mayflower Pilgrim, and was one of the pioneers who helped to settle the western part of our vast country. Born in Connecticut in 1819, he came to Illinois sometime between 1840 and 1847, emigrated to Kansas and took a claim there in 1871 and in 1885 went on to the state of Washington, where he died in 1902. He was married three times and raised a large family of children. The fifty six families, distributed through five generations, recorded in this booklet make a complete list of his descendants to November 1, 1938. This information has been assembled from family bibles and the knowledge of living persons. The line of descent from Elder William Brewster to Albert Porter Brewster is already a matter of record and will be found in the "Brewster Genealogy", 2 vols. compiled by Emma

C. Jones and published in 1908 by the Grafton Press, New York City.

From the signature below you will notice that I have usurped the title of family secretary (at least pro tem.) and I shall be pleased to receive such items of family interest as you may care to contribute. Perhaps on occasion we can publish a news bulletin.

Names of persons and dates of births, marriages, and deaths are of importance in genealogy but by themselves make rather tiresome reading. However, the lives of many of the persons recorded here were filled with great activity and the record of their achievements is a fascinating story. The present generation looks back to the settling of the west and the thrilling narratives of the pioneers but some of the people who are recorded here tramped beside covered wagons across the prairies and lined up with no less than twenty thousand others to make the historic run into Oklahoma. A brief record of their history is therefore given here in order that their descendants may have some knowledge as to the part contributed by members of their family to these historic movements.

Albert Porter Brewster

Albert Porter Brewster, with whom and with whose descendants we are concerned in this record, was born at Coventry, Connecticut, November 27, 1819, the son of Silas Brewster and his wife, Welthea (Richardson) Brewster. Silas was a farmer at Coventry and was a descendant of Elder William Brewster. The books of genealogy do not record any date for his death. There is a tradition in our family that he found the farm insufficiently productive, left home in search of work and was never heard from Thus his wife, Welthea, was left with a family of ten again. children, for all of whom she was unable to provide, and Albert (perhaps some of the other children also) at the age of nine was bound out to a Mr. Talbot with whom he lived till he was eighteen. He then ran away going over into New York state where he worked for, and lived with, a Mr. York for two years. Soon thereafter he joined the western migration and went to Kendall Co., Illinois. This is the narrative of A lbert's early life as related by his eldest daughter, Anna Emily. Albert's brothers, Edwin and Augustus, also came west and for a time all three lived near each other in Illinois. Edwin and Augustus later went on to California.

On February 21, 1847 Albert married Emily Gleason and presumably this marriage occurred in Illinois. Augustus married as his second wife Diantha (Gleason) Phillips, a widow, who was a sister of Albert's wife, Emily. Edwin also married a Miss Gleason who may have been another sister of Emily Gleason. Here is a little problem in genealogical research for us. But let us return to Albert and Emily. Their new home in Kendall County, Illinois was two or three miles southeast of Newark and was the S.W. 1/4 of Sec. 34 Twp. 36 Range 6. Albert obtained the western half of this quarter section by "right of homestead" and the eastern half by purchase. The records in the office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court and Recorder of Deeds at Yorkville show the following transactions.

1. Patent from the United States by James K. Polk, President, to Albert F. Brewster 40 acres S.W. 1/4 S.W. 1/4 Sec. 34 Twp. 36 Range 6. Dated Sept. 1, 1845. 2. Patent from the United States by James K. Polk, President, to Albert P. Brewster 40 acres Sec. 34 Twp. 36 Range 6. Dated Feb. 18, 1846. This was the N.W. 1/4 of the S.W. 1/4.

3. Warranty Deed from Hiram Fickett and Wife to Albert P. Brewster 40 acres N.E. 1/4 S.W. 1/4 34-36-6. Dated Dec. 12, 1854.

4. Warranty Deed from Zacckens E. Brown and Wife to Albert P. Brewster 40 acres S.E. 1/4 S.W. 1/4 34-36-6. Dated July 10, 1866.

In as much as the Homestead Act required five years residence Albert certainly came to Illinois prior to Sept. 1, 1840, and evidently filed on this claim when he lacked about three months of being of legal age. He bought and sold a few small pieces of land in addition to the 160 acres just described. The earliest date of such a purchase is a "Warranty Deed from John C. Hough and Wife to Albert P. Brewster 3.85 acres in Sec. 4 Twp. 35 Range 6" on October 11, 1843. Thus at the time of his marriage Albert had 80 acres in his principle farm and one or two odd pieces of land of a few acres each. He hauled part of the grain raised on this farm into Chicago with an ox team. The four children of Albert and Emily were born on this farm and all went well until the neighborhood became the center of a Sweedish an d Norwegian settlement. Most of these new immigrants spoke their native language though some of the children attended the public school along with Albert and Emily's two sons, Nathan and Henry, and daughter, Anna. Emily suggested that they seek another home and strongly urged Albert to sell the farm and move elsewhere. Before any move could be made, however, Emily died (June 1, 1868) and was buried in the town cometery at Nowark beside the infant daughter, Williamina, who had died of whooping cough five years proviously,

In the autumn of 1868 Nathan A. Brewster (eldest son of Albert and Emily) married Miss Sarah Adams who was a daughter of their neighbors Peter Adams and his wife Sarah (Collins) Adams. The marriage of Nathan and Sarah served to reestablish the home broken by the death of Emily as they lived on the farm with Nathan's father (Albert). In March of 1869 the farm was sold to Mr. Isaac Anderson and all of the family moved to Iroquois Co. Illinois where Albert rented a farm from a Mrs. Borden who was a widow. This farm was located about six miles northeast of Gilman. Here Jobster Ellsworth Brewster was born to Nathan and Sarah May 18, 1370 and in March of 1871 the family emigrated to Kansas.

The emigrating party consisted of Albert, his sons, Nathan and Henry, his daughter Anna Emily, Nathan's wife Sarah and small son Webster. The claim which Albert located as a homestead was about fourteen miles northwest of Sedan and four miles southeast of Leeds. It is the S.W. 1/4 Sec. 9 Twp. 33 South of Range 11 East in Summit Township Chautauqua Co., Kansas. Later Albert bought the northwest quarter of the same section. No sooner had they settled in the new home than Henry died and was buried on the claim as there were no cemeteries in the neighborhood at that time. This section of the state was being settled rapidly and one of the outstanding needs of the settlers was a grist and saw mill. To meet this need Albert bought a farm on Middle Cancy River, a few miles east of his claim and near the country post office called Spring Creek. There he built such a mill and operated it by water power from the river. While the venture was never a financial success it was a great blessing to the people for many miles around. While living on the farm at Spring Creek, Albert met and married Miss Mary Kiger and to them was born one son, George. While George was still very young Mary died and Albert obtained as a housekeeper Matilda Young, whom he soon married.

As the 1880's wore on, Albert felt the urge to migrate farther westward. His brothers, Edwin and Augustus, had gone on to California and in 1885 Albert decided to follow. Webster Ellsworth Brewster (Nathan's son, now a husky boy of fifteen) drove one of the wagons conveying Albert with his family and their baggage to Moline, Kansas, where they took the train to California. Jesse and Myrtle (see Family 1B) had been born to Albert and Malinda before they left Kansas. This journey, however, ended in disappointment. For some reason California did not impress Albert as favorably as he had anticipated and within a year he was back in Kansas. Never the less the idea of going farther west was still strongly in his mind and almost immediately he set out for Washington, where he bought a farm in the southern part of the state not far from Portland, Oregon. This was his home until his death on December 21, 1902. Surely he had done his part as a pioneer. He was a man of kindly disposition, a builder of the community and a godsend to the neighborhood in which he lived. His widow, Malinda (Young) Brewster now lives at 1839 S. E. 35th Place, Portland, Oregon.

Nathan Augustus Browstor

Nathan Augustus Brewster, eldest son of Albert and Emily, was born December 10, 1847 on his parents farm about three miles southeast of Newark, Kendall Co., Illinois and grew to manhood there. In the autumn of 1868, following his mother's death on June 1, 1868, he married Miss Sarah Adams who was a daughter of their neighbors, Peter Adams and his wife, Sarah (Collins)Adams. Peter and Sarah Adams had been married in England about 1840 and came to America, settling in Illinois, when their daughter, Sarah, was seven years old. There were other children in the Adams family at least some of whom were older than Sarah. Three years after the marriage of Nathan and Sarah (March 1871) they joined Nathan's father (Albert) brother (Henry) and sister (Anna) in the migration to Chautauqua County (at that time of Howard Co.) Kansas. Webster Ellsworth Brewster, son of Nathan and Sarah was about ten months old at the time of this emigration. All members of the family had their first residence on the claim which Albert located but early in 1872 Nathan moved with his wife and young son to Boston, Kansas which was about eight miles north of Albert's claim. Here he set up a grocery store and continued in business until the great grasshopper scourge of 1874 destroyed the grocery trade as well as the crops.

While Nathan lived at Boston there was a strong rivalry between the citizens of Boston and those of Longton as to which town should be the county seat of Howard County. This rivalry grew into hatred and broke out finally in a fierce fight of the border warfare variety. During the thick of the fighting Nathan furnished a team and wagon to transfer the county records to a point near Dexter in Cowley county to prevent their being taken by the Longton men. Incidentally it might be said that the citizens of Boston obtained these records by hauling them away from Longton. At the next meeting of the legislature old Howard County was divided into the present Chautauqua and Elk Counties with Sedan and Howard as the respective county seats. Within a few years all of the residents of Boston had moved away and soon no trace of the town remained. For many years it has been merely part of the prairie just as before the white man came. It should be recorded also that while Nathan lived at Boston he found time between waiting on his grocery customers and whatever part he took in the county seat argument to study law under the direction of a Mr. Oliphant and was admitted to the bar as a lawyer.

Leaving Boston in 1874, Nathan rented a farm near the mill which his father had built in the Spring Creek neighborhood and a few years later bought from his father (Albert) the quarter section of land immediately north of Albert's original claim. This was the N. W. 1/4 Sec. 9 Twp. 33 S. of Range 11 East in Summit Township Chautauqua Co. He improved this farm and lived there for ten or twelve years.

Religious services in the community were quite irregular and ministers were few. Nathan and his wife, Sarah, were members of the Free-will Baptist Church and when there was no minister Nathan often conducted the services. He was a man of such exceptionally fine character and deep spiritual nature that the church ordained him as a Minister of the Gospel and throughout the rest of his life he did a great deal of preaching. He always earned his livelihood by farming or business and it could not be said that he held any pastorate but on Sundays he preached in many country churches and school houses in the central and northwestern part of Chautauqua County. For these services he used a small leather-bound bible which his mother had given him as a Christmas present when he was fifteen. The inscription on the fly leaf can barely be read as "Mother's gift. Nathan A. Brewster. Newark, Ill. Dec. 25, 1862. Peruse every sacred page," It is well worn and many marginal pencil markings indicate the texts for his sermons and for the burial services for the pioneer dead. This bible is in the possession of his son, Ray. The Free-will Baptist Church of which Nathan and Sarah were members later disbanded and the people united with the churches of the Northern Baptist Convention.

After Albert (Nathan's father) went to California in 1885 Nathan decided to follow and in preparation for leaving the midwest he took his family in May of 1886 to visit his wife's parents, Peter and Sarah Adams, who in 1872 had moved from Illinois to a farm in the eastern part of Vernon County, No. about six miles west of Eldorado Springs. Nathan's wife, Sarah, had been in poor health for a year or two and it was hoped that a change of climate would prove helpful to her. When they reached Eldorado Springs her parents advised the use of the mineral waters there and since she was unable to make the trip to California, Nathan and his family lived in Eldorado Springs for nearly two years. Sarah's health improved and just as she appeared to be on the way to complete recovery she suddenly died of acute appendicitis on August 14, 1887. This was before surgery had conquered this disease and it was then known as "Inflammation of the Bowels". Sarah is buried at Eldorado Springs, Missouri.

After Sarah's death Nathan abandoned the idea of going to California and early in 1888 brought his three sons (see Family No. 2) back to his Kansas farm (N.W. 1/4 9-33-11) in Chautauqua County. The two daughters, Orpha and May, were quite young and remained in Missouri with their grand parents, Peter and Sarah Adams. On Nov. 10, 1888 Nathan married Mrs. Agnes Jones Roberts (divorced) who had two children, a boy, William A. Jr. 12 years of age and a girl of 9, Ina May. Agnes had been born near Canton, Illinois, the daughter of William Abel Jones, who at the age of eight emigrated to America with his parents from Somersetshire, England, and his wife, Margaret Ann Bennett, born in Ohio. William A. Jones died in 1865 and in 1873 his widow, Margaret Ann, brought her four children, LaForest, Agnes, Inez and Frank to Kansas, settling first one mile south of the present site of Grand Summit in the northeastern part of Cowley County and then a few years later moving to the present site of Leeds. The farm which Margaret bought at Leeds was the N.W. 1/4 of Sec. 36 Twp. 32 Range 9 in Center Township, Chautauqua County. Agnes married William A. Roberts on September 15, 1875 and they had the two children previously mentioned. In 1881 W. A. Roberts went to the Indian Territory (now eastern Oklahoma) to get work and stated he would send for Agnes and the two children. He sent a few letters to her but soon nothing could be heard from him and inquiry revealed that he had "married another woman and left for parts unknown". Seven years after his departure Agnes applied for and was granted a divorce on the grounds of desertion and non-support. (See Chautauqua County Court records 1888).

In 1889 President Benjamin Harrison issued a proclamation that 1,887,800 acres of choice land in the center of Oklahoma Territory would be opened for homestead settlement at 12 o'clock noon, on April 22, 1889. At that hour Nathan and Agnes lined up on the southern Kansas border near Arkansas City to take part with 20,000 others in the most spectacular race in American history. They obtained a claim on the south bank of the Cimarron where antelope creek empties into that river about twelve miles northeast of Guthrie. This land was the S.W. 1/4 Sec. 32 Twp. 18 North of Range 1 West in Logan County, Oklahoma.⁺ While on

' Nathan's son Frank (family No. 2 Child II) obtained a claim in the Cherokee Outlet when it was opened for settlement a few years later. The Cherokee Outlet commonly known as the "Cherokee Strip' was a tract of land extending from the Kansas border approximately sixty miles southward and from the Arkansas River on the east to the Texas Panhandle on the west. Originally it was given to the

this claim Nathan injured one leg by an accident and walked with crutches for about a year and then with a cane for the rest of his life. He hired the farm work done and after obtaining title to the claim, returned to Chautauqua County, Kansas in 1895 where he was urged to run for the office of Judge of the Probate Court on the Republican ticket. This he did in the fall of 1896 and was elected by almost a unanimous vote of the county. After serving two terms in this office he entered the Real Estate and Abstract of Title business with Alonzo Kilmer. Most of the money for their farm loans was obtained from insurance companies through Colonel Wilder S. Netcalf (later Gen. Metcalf) of Lawrence, Kansas. In 1902 and 1903 a few oil wells were drilled in Chautauqua County and Nathan with his friends, Clay and Dee Ewers, H. E. Sadler and Mr. Stafford and Mr. Albright of Winfield were in the midst of this development. Part of the money which Nathan invested in the oil business consisted of the \$2500 which he obtained by sale of the claim in Oklahoma about 1900. The oil venture proved quite successful and at the time of his death on November 7, 1905, Nathan was in very comfortable financial circumstances. The cause of his death was a large carbuncle on the back of his neck. He was fifty seven years of age, in the midst of business activity and his untimely death was a great loss to his family and associates. Few men ever had more friends or were more highly esteemed than he. He was always active in the support of the church and was a great power for good and for God in the community.

Anna Emily Brewster

Men usually are credited with most of the achievements of the human race but very often women contribute more than their share to the success of mens' undertakings. Certainly this was true of Anna Emily Brewster. She was only eight years old at the time of her mother's death and only eleven when the family came to Kansas. She learned to do a woman's part around the household very early in life. Statues have been erected to the Fioneer Mother but no less credit should be given to mother-less girls who helped their fathers and assumed the responsibility of a pioneer home before they scarcely reached their 'teens. "Aunt Annie" was one of these. She has done her full part as one of those who carved a state out of the prairie. She is still with us; the last survivor of family

Cherokee Indians as an outlet from the Indian Territory (now eastern Oklahoma) to the great plains hunting grounds. Frank's Claim was eight miles due north of Perry, Oklahoma in Noble County but the land numbers are not at hand.

No. 1 in this compilation. She married Benjamin Franklin Graham, who was a native of West Virginia and who came to Kansas in his boyhood. He was only fourteen years of age when the Civil War broke out but he managed to take a hand in the conflict in spite of his youth. He explained that when the recruiting officer asked his age another volunteer just behind him called out eighteen and he was permitted to enlist in Company B of the Second Kansas Cavalry. After the war he returned to. Chautauqua County and following their marriage on May 22nd, 1876, "Uncle Frank" and "Aunt Annie" lived for many years on a farm about seven miles southwest of Sedan. This farm (360 acres) consists of two tracts of land; the "home place" of 240 acres being the S. 1/2 of the S.W. 1/4 and the S. E. 1/4 of Sec. 14 Twp. 34 Range 10, and a neighboring 120 acres described as the N. 1/2 of the N.E. 1/4 and N.E. 1/4of the N.W. 1/4 Sec. 23 Twp. 34 Range 10 all in Hendrick's Township, Chautauqua Co., Kansas. Here their children were born and here Anna Emily still lives with her eldest son, James H. who remained unmarried. A strenuous life merits a happy old age. "At eventide may there be light."

Such is the pioneer stock from which we came. All generations may learn much from them. They had some successes and many privations. They contended with drought, grasshoppers and, in years when harvests were abundant, low prices. They traded a dozen eggs for a postage stamp. They saw corn so cheap that it was burned as fuel. Yet by their own efforts they struggled upward. Though they are of a generation which has passed, may their stalwart character live on.

Elder William Brewster to Albert Porter Brewster

Elder William was the lay-preacher of the Pilgrims and "taught twise each Sabbath both powerfully and profitably to ye great contentment of ye hearers and to their comfortable edification". Although he had the care of the church he could never be persuaded to administer the Lord's Supper. He served as chaplain of the Miles Standish military company.

Jonathan did not accompany his father on the Mayflower but arrived in America on the Fortune in 1621. He was a member of the Miles Standish military company and served in the Pequot war. About 1649 he moved from Massachusetts to the present site of Norwich, Conn. and set up a trading post on some land given him by Uncas, Chief of the Mohicans, and began operations there in 1650 without waiting for a license from the authorities of Connecticut who claimed jurisdiction. The general court of their session in May of 1650 censured him for the way of proceeding but legalized the undertaking itself.

"Whereas Mr. Jonathan Brewster hath set up a trading post at Mohigen this Courte declares that they cannott but judge the thing very disorderly, never the less considering his condition. they are content hee should proceed therein for the present and till they see cause to the contrary."

Later Jonathan relinquished the trade to his son, Benjamin.

Peter Brewster and Mary Lee were married Feb. 18, 1730 presumably at Lebanon, Connecticut. The first two children, Martha and Tabitha were baptized there. About 1737 they moved to Coventry, Conn. which was the family home so far as our line is concerned for the next three generations, i.e. till Albert emigrated westward. Mary died at Coventry and Peter married 2nd Marian ______ who died in 1818 at the age of 90.

The records of the Second Church in the North Parish called North Coventry record the death of Jacob Brewster in 1823 at the age of 80; of Delia Brewster, his wife, Oct. 21, 1835 at age of 85 and of Jacob's father, Peter Brewster, in 1802 at the age of 94,
