BOOTH AND ALLIED FAMILIES

Nothing definite is known of the period when the Ι pioneer ancestor, ROBERT' BOOTH, came to New England. He evidently was an inhabitant of Exeter, N. H., in 1645 as his name appears in a petition to General Court at that period (see N. H. State Papers), and a deposition indicates he was there in 1644. In 1647, he served as juror in General Court at Wells, Me. He was sworn as freeman at Saco, Me., in 1653, and doubtless lived there the remaining years of his life, dying there 22 March, 1672/3, aged 68 years. His name frequently appears in Province Court and Land Records, all of which indicate he had an active part in public life. His place of birth has not been found,-doubtless due to lack of systematic effort in searching for it. It is generally believed he came from England and that he descended from the ancient Booths of Lancashire and Cheshire. G. M. Booth of Chicago, Ill., who has accumulated a mass of data on Booths, thinks Robert Booth came from Derbyshire, Eng. Whom, when and where he first married is, also, unknown. Considering the data we have of him, we think it reasonable to believe that he was married before immigrating and that the first three children were born before then. The birth of his children is found in the Vital Records of Biddeford and Saco, Me., probably recorded by him when serving as Town Clerk, as he served in that office several years.

2 SIMEON² BOOTH (*Robert*^{*}) was born 10 May, 1641, and died in Hartford, Conn., 28 Feb., 1702/3. He succeeded his father in the latter's tide mill at Saco, Me., after the death of his father; but was probably driven from there soon after by Indian troubles for he was admitted an inhabitant of Salem, Mass., in 1675 and was there in 1679 when he was admitted to the Church. In 1680, he received a grant of land in Enfield, Conn., where he lived most of his remaining years, serving there as selectman and constable. He married 1st, 5 Jan, 1664/5, Rebecca³ Frost (*Daniel*,² *William*¹) who was born in Fairfield, Conn., 1640, and died in Enfield, 25 Dec., 1688. He married 2nd, 8 Dec., 1693, Elizabeth, widow of Samuel Elmer who died in Hartford, Conn., 26 Jan., 1727/8.

3 WILLIAM³ BOOTH (*Simeon*,² *Robert*¹) was born circa 1664, probably in Maine, and died in Enfield, Conn., 7 Aug., 1753. He probably came to Enfield with his father in 1680. The old Town Plot of Enfield shows his allotment of land to be the third lot south of the Ferry and adjoining that of his father. Enfield records say he married 30 Aug., 1693, Hannah, daughter of John Burroughs. They also record the death of John Burroughs, 25 May, 1693, aged about 42 years, making his birth 1651/2. The wife of William Booth died 8 Sept., 1729, aged 71 years. Consequently, she was born 1658, too old to be daughter of John Burroughs. Hence it would seem more reasonable to believe that William Booth married Hannah, the widow, instead of Hannah, the daughter of John Burroughs. The grant of land, 1680, to John Burroughs was next south of the grant to Simeon Booth of same date; thus it would appear they were neighbors during that period of years. No trace of this Burroughs family has been found previous to its coming to Enfield.

4 JOSHUA⁴ BOOTH (William,³ Simeon,² Robert¹) was born in Enfield, Conn., 16 May, 1697; married 5 Sept., 1722, Ruth⁴ Grant (Nathaniel,³ Samuel,² Matthew¹) who was born in East Windsor, Conn., 19 Feb., 1702/3, and he died there about 1755. He settled in that part of East Windsor now Ellington where he accumulated a good sized estate for that period as is shown by his will which is dated 23 Jan., 1753/4 and proved 3 June, 1755. Sons, Oliver and William, are appointed executors and he mentions wife Ruth; sons, Joshua, Jonathan, and Ambrose; daughters, Ruth, Sybill, and Hannah. No record found of his death or that of his wife Ruth, nor is it known where they are buried. In the cemetery in Ellington are small stones marking the graves of their two youngest children, Sarah and Freegrace; but no evidence of other graves near them.

5 OLIVER⁵ BOOTH (Joshua,⁴ William,³ Simeon,² Robert¹) was born at East Windsor, Conn., 29 Dec., 1725, and died at Lempster, N. H., 25 Aug., 1807. He married 1st, in Hebron, Conn., about 1750, Ruth⁵ Ingam (Samuel,⁴ Samuel,³ Thomas,² Thomas¹) who was born in Saybrook, Conn., 1722, and died in Lempster, 1801; married 2nd, at Lempster, Apr., 1802, Widow Anna Way. No record of first marriage was found but conclusive proof of it is in Probate and Land Records of the settlement of the estate of Samuel⁴ Ingam, father of Ruth (Ingam) Booth, nor is record found at Hebron of birth of children except a baptismal record of Joshua, 1759; but Oliver Booth probably resided there until about 1761 when he appears on the Land Records of Lebanon, Conn. Here his last four children were born and the oldest child, Ruth, was married there, 1769. In April, 1774, he sold land and dwelling house in Lebanon and probably then removed his family to Lempster, where he had already acquired a large tract of land in the then new town. Here he spent the remainder of his life. His five sons and daughter, Susannah, all married, lived and died there.

6 JOSHUA⁶ BOOTH (Oliver,⁵ Joshua,⁴ William,³ Simeon,² Robert¹) was probably born in Hebron, Conn., where he was baptized in 1759; died in Lempster, N. H., of hydrophobia, 17 Dec., 1816. He married at Lempster, 16 June, 1785, Mehitable, daughter of Samuel and Mehitable (Lewis) Slader, who was baptized at Windham, Conn., 20 June, 1756, and died at Lempster, 15 June, 1844. He served in American Revolution from 21 July to 22 Sept., 1777, under the command of Gen. Stark and probably was present at the Battle of Bennington, Vt., in Aug., 1777. After marriage, he settled on a fine farm of 300 acres in Lempster which was continuously occupied by him and his descendants until 1906. The house he first lived in and where his children were born with the large house he built in 1810 are still, 1921, standing, a monument to his thrift and industry.

In the year 1841, he went to Norwich, where his grandfather, John Currier, lived, and engaged in the manufacture of ladies' fine shoes. Later, he engaged in mercantile business. In May 1850, he went to California by the overland route, being six months on the trip; but owing to poor health, he returned in June 1851. In 1854, he engaged in the manufacture of lumber which he continued until 1879 when he retired from active business. He was a respected citizen of the town, taking an active interest in its affairs.

She married 15 Sept., 1849, William Plummer Pierce, son of Samuel and Abigail (Davis) Pierce. He was born in Hopkinton, N. H., 16 Apr., 1818, and died in Boston, 9 May, 1882. After marriage they settled in South Boston where he conducted a livery and boarding stable until his death. She was an active member of the Church and a friend to the poor and needy. Though never strong physically, she never wearied in ministering to the wants of those in need of assistance, and her deeds of kindness and acts of charity entitle her memory to more than this feeble tribute. FROST

FROM HISTORY OF FAIRFIELD, CONN.

I WILLIAM¹ FROST settled in Fairfield, Conn., in 1639. His home lot lay on the southwest of the school and church division of the meeting house green. He was an old man when he came to Fairfield from Nottingham, England, and was, evidently, of a good family. He died in 1645. In his will, dated 6 Jan., 1644/5, he left bequests to his oldest son, [2] Daniel,² also, to Abraham, and to daughters Rebecca, Sarah, Elizabeth who married John Grey, Lydia who married Henry Grey; to daughter Mary Rylie, living in England, he left all his goods in Old England. To the town of Uncoway he left ten pounds towards building a meeting house, to be paid when half built.

2 DANIEL² FROST (*William*¹) was, probably, born in England and came with his father to Fairfield, Conn., in 1639. He settled near his father in Frost Square, but sold his house and home lot in 1648 and became one of the fine Bankside farmers. His home lot at Bankside was situated on Long Island Sound on the east side of Frost Point and commanded a fine view. He married Elizabeth, daughter of John Barlow. In Oct., 1635, he went overland with the party that prepared for the settlement of Windsor, where he assisted in forming a true democracy from which American political institutions have grown. He was the first, and, for many years, the principal surveyor, deacon of the First Church, recorder 1652–77, selectman many years. He

compiled a book of records of town ways in Windsor, also, compiled the old Church records. He was a type of the best settlers of New England. Dr. Styles says of him in his history of Ancient Windsor: "Few men filled so large a place or filled it as well as honest Matthew Grant." He quaintly comments on his own work, "I have been careful to do nothing on one man's desire."

BOWERS

HISTORIC SKETCH OF MARY L. BOWERS BY EDWARD A. MITCHELL, ALSTEAD, N. H.

Mary L. Mitchell was born in Lempster, N. H., 26 Mch., 1831, and died in Bellows Falls, Vt., 5 May, 1917, and was the ninth child of a family of ten children. She was the daughter of Thomas and Mercy (Slader) Mitchell who were types of the true New Englanders of their day and obtained their living from the tilling of the soil. Her father, Thomas Mitchell, was born 24 July, 1783; died 10 June, 1834. Her mother, Mercy (Slader) Mitchell, was born 17 July, 1790; died 11 May, 1871. After her father's death, when she was two years old, she removed with her mother to Acworth, N. H., where she received as good an education as the public schools of those days were able to give and became a school teacher.

She married 6 Apr., 1852, Joseph Symons Bowers of Acworth, who was born 3 Nov., 1825, and died 25 Dec., 1879. Mr. and Mrs. Bowers resided in Acworth until Dec., 1878, when they removed to Bellows Falls. Three children were born to them: Flora Etta, born 26 Oct., 1853, and died 14 May, 1876. Charles Dana, born 24 Feb., 1856; died 20 Oct., 1889. Elbron Symons, born 7 Sept., 1862. Before his father's death Charles was in company with him as miners and dealers in mica under the firm name of J. S. Bowers & Son. After the father's death, Charles D. and Elbron S. formed the firm of Bowers Bros. and opened an office in Chicago, Ill., for the sale of mica, and a successful business was conducted until the death of Elbron S., 25 Oct., 1896.

Mrs. Bowers united with the Congregational Church at Acworth in 1847 and always retained a great interest in that church as well as in subsequent churches in which she held relations, owing to change of residence at different times. She was strong-minded, had good common sense and an unusual amount of executive and business ability, managing her affairs in a thoroughly business-like manner, took a lively interest in religious and political affairs. After the loss by death of her entire family, early and in middle life, she showed heroic endurance of her sorrows in bereavement and gave to those about her many more years of useful life.

Her bequests were many and varied, both public and private. Among those of a public nature were to the Congregational Church of Acworth; Silsby Free Library of Acworth; Congregational Church of Bellows Falls; Second Presbyterian Church of Evanston, Ill.; Vermont Woman's Board of Missions; Kurn Hattin Home for Boys, Vt.; Congregational Church at Lempster; Rockingham Hospital, Bellows Falls, and Kimball Union Academy, Meriden, N. H.

Mrs. Bowers always spoke with much pride of her Slader ancestry and averred that the Slader family was one of the oldest, most influential, and most respected in the town of Acworth; that representatives of the family could be found in many states of the Union who were patriotic, industrious, well-informed citizens. When the first Slader reunion was held at the old homestead of Thomas and Hannah (Holden) Slader at Acworth, on 2 Sept., 1896, she had been a faithful worker to make it a success, and with marked enthusiasm assisted in organizing a permanent association. She was president of this association from 1898 to 1900, and served on executive and other important committees during other years. From her pen came the "Chronicles" for those reunions, in witty references and in scriptural phraseology and, also, a poem, "A Vision," describing the pilgrimage of the original Samuel Slader from England to America and the interesting story of his descendants in Acworth.

MERRICK

The Merricks of America are descended from fine Welsh stock of Cambre Britain origin, the English pedigrees of whom can be found in "Burks" and other works on the English Peerages.

WILLIAM^I MERRICK, the oldest of four brothers, who reached Charlestown, Mass., in the good ship *James*. in the spring of 1636, was born in Wales in 1603. Of his early life nothing is known. He was a farmer by occupation after reaching the Colony; what trade or vocation he had followed in Wales is not known. He served for six years after his arrival in the Colonial Militia under Captain Miles Standish. He is spoken of as ensign, later, as lieutenant. He lived both at Eastham and Duxbury during the decade 1637 to 1647. He was one

of the original proprietors of Bridgewater. He was surveyor of highways in 1646 and constable in 1647. He became a legal voter in Eastham, May, 1655, at which time he took up his permanent residence there. He married, 1642, Rebecca — (surname unknown). She died in 1668. He died in 1688.

PRENCE

THOMAS¹ PRENCE was born in England circa 1600, and died at Plymouth, Mass., 29 Mch., 1673. He was son of Thomas Prence of Lochdale, Co. Gloucester, Eng., and came to New England in the ship *Fortune*, Nov., 1621.

He removed from Plymouth to Duxbury in 1635 and to Eastham in 1644; but returned to Plymouth, later, where he died. He was chosen Governor of Colony in 1635 and 1638 and, frequently, elected Assistant, and after the death of Gov. Bradford, 1657, he served as Governor until his death in 1673. He was a worthy gentleman, very pious, and very able for his office, studious of peace and a terror to the wicked. His death was lamented and his body honorably buried at Plymouth. There is some difference among writers about the number of his marriages. Later investigators place it at four. First, 5 Aug., 1624, Patience² Brewster (Elder William¹), who was mother of first five children and died 1634. Second, 1 Apr., 1635, Mary² Collier (William¹) who was mother of last four children and died previous to Dec., 1662. Third, Dec., 1662, Mrs. Alphia Freeman, who died 1 Aug., 1668. Fourth, Mrs. Mary (Burr) Howes, widow of Thomas¹ Howes.

HOWLAND

Several of the name Howland came over early: Arthur who settled in Marshfield, Mass., as early as 1643; Henry of Duxbury, 1633; John who came in the Mayflower, 1620, from whom the Barnstable, Mass., family descends, and Zoar of Newport, 1656, who may have been son of Henry.

I JOHN^I came over as servant or attendant to Gov. Carver. His name is 13th in the covenant made at Cape Cod, 11 Nov., 1620. Until the recent discovery of Gov. Bradford's Manuscripts it was current tradition that he married Elizabeth, daughter of Gov. Carver. He married, soon after arrival, Elizabeth, daughter of John Tilley and wife, an only child. Her parents died in the first sickness, soon after reaching Plymouth. He was an Assistant to the Governor in 1633-5, and prominent in the Colony. He died 23 Feb., 1672/3, aged over 80 years. Excepting John Alden he was the last male survivor of the adult passengers. John Howland, Sr.'s, will is dated 29 May, 1672, in which he names 10 children, whether in order of birth is not known.

BREWSTER

Elder WILLIAM BREWSTER was born the last half of 1566 or the first half of 1567, and died in Plymouth, Mass., 10 Apr., 1644. The place of his birth is unknown; but it is supposed to be Scrooby, England, in Co. Nottinghamshire, where in Jan., 1575/6, by Archbishop Sandys, his father, also William Brewster, was appointed

receiver of Scrooby and bailiff of the Manor House belonging to the Archbishops, and to have a life tenure of Elder William Brewster matriculated at both offices. Peterhouse, Cambridge, 3 Dec., 1580, but it does not appear that he remained there long enough to take his degree. It is said he was the only member of Plymouth Colony who had University training, until the arrival of Rev. Ralph Smith in 1629. He is next found as a "discreet and faithful assistant of William Davison, Secretary of State to Queen Elizabeth," whom he served until Davison's downfall in 1587. He then returned to Scrooby where he lived in good esteem among his friends and "ye gentlemen of these parts, especially the godly and religious." In 1590 he was appointed administrator of his father's estate, his father dying in the summer of that year, leaving a widow, Prudence. His father was "Post" at Scrooby at the time of his death and, after a short interval, William, his son, was appointed to that position which he held until 30 Sept., 1607. His residence at Scrooby was a part of the old Manor House. In this house, the members of the Pilgrim Church were accustomed to meet on the Lord's day where Brewster in great love entertained them. He early joined the Pilgrim society, removed with them to Leyden, Holland, where he was elected Ruling Elder, 1613, and continuing there until he with his wife embarked with them on the Mayflower for their new home in New England. It can be truly said that none of the original members of Plymouth Colony was more highly esteemed by all than Elder William Brewster. Gov. Bradford in his manuscripts speaks very highly of his character and Christian graces at the time of Brewster's death. He married about 1591, Mary — (surname unknown), who was born about 1569 and died at Plymouth, 27 Apr., 1627. It is thought at least three of his children were born in Scrooby.

HOPKINS

STEPHEN¹ HOPKINS, probably born in England, circa 1585; died at Plymouth, Mass., circa 1644/5. Of his early life but little is known. "History of Plymouth Plantations" says he was of London and not of the Ley-

den congregation. It is thought he was induced to join the Pilgrims by the London adventurers who financed the *Mayflower* expedition. He evidently was married twice in England for he was a passenger on the *Mayflower* with second wife, Elizabeth and three children by a former wife: viz., Gyles, Constance, and Caleb. The "History of Plymouth Plantations" says "That Stephen Hopkins was a man of more than ordinary ability is evidenced by the prominent part he had in the management of the affairs of Plymouth Colony. He was often elected Assistant to the Governor and his name frequently appears associated with others in the management of the larger business affairs of the Colony."

LEWIS

GEORGE^I LEWIS, the ancestor of the Barnstable, I Mass., family, came from E. Greenwich, County Kent, England. He was by trade a "clothier" and, though called of E. Greenwich, circumstances make it probable that he was, for a time, a resident of London and a member of Mr. Lothrop's Church in 1632. He married circa 1626, Sarah Jenkins, a sister of Edward's who, afterwards, was a resident of Scituate, Mass. He probably did not come over until the Church in London was broken up and at the time of the imprisonment of Mr. Lothrop in 1632. He was at Plymouth, Mass., the following year and, though a member of the Church there, his name does not appear on the tax list there of 1633-4. George Lewis was one of those dismissed from the Church in Plymouth in case he joined the Church in Scituate. He became a member at Scituate,* 30 Sept., 1636, and before Oct., 1636, had built a house on Kent St., so named after his native county in England. In 1639, he removed to Barnstable, where succeeding generations of his descendants continued to reside.

His older children were born in England and no records kept of their births, so arrangement of their names is problematical. Beside those listed below some authorities say there was a Nathaniel, born in 1645, Joseph, born in 1647, also a son Jabez, but no records to confirm it.

HUCKINS

I Mr. THOMAS' HUCKINS, ancestor of this family, was born circa 1617. Of his early life little is known. He came over before he was 21 years of age and was resident of Boston, Mass., or vicinity. He was one of the 23 original members of the Ancient and Honorable Ar-

tillery Co. and was elected Ensign. The name is written Hutchins, Huckins, Huckens and Huggins, the last was the way it was pronounced in early times. There was a Robert Huckins settled in Dover, N. H., 1640, George in Cambridge, freeman in 1638, John at Newbury 1640 or earlier, and Joseph in Boston 1657.

Thomas Huckins was an exemplary member of Mr. John Lothrop's Church at Scituate and Barnstable, Mass., and was one of the partners that hired the Cape Cod fisheries, 4 Oct., 1675. He was appointed Commissary General of the Colony and had the sole management in procuring supplies for the soldiers in the Indian War, which duties he performed to the satisfaction of the Court. He held numerous town offices, including Constable, Selectman, Deputy to Colony, and was a man in whom the people had utmost confidence. He owned a large estate at Barnstable and married 1st, in 1642, Mary, daughter of Isaac Wells of Barnstable. She was buried 28 July, 1648. By her he had three daughters of whom two died in infancy. He married 2nd, 9 Nov., 1648, widow Rose Hyllier of Yarmouth, Mass. He was cast away in his vessel in a gale, 9 Nov., 1679, and he and his son, Joseph, perished. He was 62 and his son 24 years old. Widow died 1687.

CHIPMAN

The name Chipman is an ancient one and occurs I as early as A. D. 1070 in "Domesday Survey Book," originally pronounced or written "De Chippenham" or "Chippenham." Elder John Chipman of Barnstable, Mass., it is thought, was ancestor of all of the name in the United States and Provinces prior to 1850. JOHN² CHIPMAN, only son of Thomas¹ Chipman, was born in or near Dorcetshire, England, circa 1621. He had two sisters, Hannah and Tamson, who married and remarried in England. His father died early and he resided with his uncle Christopher Derby. In May, 1637, Richard Derby, a son of Christopher, came to New England, bringing with him his cousin John Chipman then 16 years old, and others in the capacity of servants. It was then customary to send orphaned youths of good habits to be bound for a term of years to the planters and early Richard Derby settled at Plymouth, Mass., settlers. where he remained several years, but no mention is made of his cousin John until the spring of 1642, when he had arrived at a legal age and brought suit against his cousin Richard Derby for a sum of money sent for him by his uncle and not paid over by Richard. It is probable he, during the four years that intervened, had served an apprenticeship with a carpenter as it appears by his will he was a carpenter, though in deeds he is styled "yeoman." He was a resident of Plymouth in 1646, but in 1649 was of Barnstable, and that year bought the homestead of

Edward Fitzrandolph. After his second marriage in 1684, he removed to Sandwich, which was greatly regretted by his townspeople and the Church, which voted to pay him six pounds if he would return and resume his office as Ruling Elder, and the town voted a liberal grant of land. His connection with the Barnstable Church was most happy. His wife, Hope, joined the Church 7 Aug., 1650, he joined 30 Jan., 1652/3. Henry Cobb and John Chipman were chosen and ordained to be Ruling Elders of the same church and were solemnly invested with the office upon "Ye 14 day of April 1670." He served his town and Colony faithfully and well in all the various offices, and for his services to the Colony received a grant of 100 acres of land.

John Chipman² married 1st, circa 1646, Hope, daughter of John Howland of Plymouth; married 2nd, widow Ruth Bourne. She was the daughter of William Sargent, born in Charlestown, Mass., 25 Oct., 1642; married 1st, Jonathan, son of Josiah Winslow; married 2nd, Richard Bourne. She died in Sandwich in 1713, leaving no issue. Elder John Chipman died in Sandwich, 7 Apr., 1708.

WILDER

The widow, Martha Wilder (said to be the widow of Thomas Wilder), was an inhabitant of Hingham, Mass., as early as 1638 when she had a grant of land of five acres for a house lot on Main St. near Pleasant St., also other lots at subsequent dates, of pasture, planting and meadows. She is said to have come from Shiplock, Co. Oxfordshire, England, with her son Edward, daughter Mary, and perhaps Elizabeth, who married in 1638–9, Thomas Ensign of Scituate. The widow, Martha, died in Hingham, 20 Apr., 1652.

EDWARD^I WILDER, the ancestor of all who bore this I surname in Hingham and vicinity, had a first grant of land there containing ten acres, on 8 Oct., 1637. Subsequently, he received other grants from the town, including a tract situated next that given his mother, widow Martha Wilder, in 1638. He also owned all the land between Tomer's Bridge and Wilder's Bridge and, without doubt, was one of the earliest planters of the locality. He was a farmer, freeman 1644, selectman 1667, 1675. He was one of sixteen Hingham soldiers impressed into the country's service at the outbreak of King Philips War. He resided on Main St., between High and Friend Sts., on the estate purchased of Samuel Ward. His wife, whom he married circa 1650, was Elizabeth, daughter of Anthony Eames of Marshfield Mass. She outlived him and died 9 June, 1692. He died intestate 18 Oct., 1690, having been suddenly stricken with ma-
lignant fever. Elizabeth, his widow, and his son Jabez, were appointed administrators.

Very little is known of his wife, Margery, and her family name is unknown, but it is thought to be "Prisse." One sidelight of her manner of passing leisure time is given in the fact that when her granddaughter,

Mary Wilder, married Dr. Francis LeBaron, the French physician of Plymouth, Mass., one of the treasures she took with her to her new home was the "muslin curtain" embroidered by Grandma Eames. He was one of the signers of articles of agreement between the old and the new town in 1654 and, evidently, was one of the prominent citizens, his name appearing in the records as serving in various town offices. He was born circa 1609, and died in July, 1700. The first mention of him in this country is in Newbury, Mass., when he built a barn for John Spencer in 1640. He shortly joined the new settlement at Salisbury, for that year. Being on a hunt with some friends, his ear caught the sound of running water and, on investigation, he discovered the falls of Powow River and soon built a mill for sawing lumber, and that section was called for many years, Osgood's Mills. ABRAHAM¹ MORRILL came from England with his I brother, Isaac, in 1632, and first settled in Cambridge, Mass. They were passengers in the ship Lion which arrived in Boston, 16 Sept., 1632. He was a landowner in Cambridge in 1636, and a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery in 1638. He was a planter, millwright and ironfounder. He removed to Salisbury, Mass., about 1640 and received land in the "first division" of lots in the new settlement. In 1642, he and Henry Saywood, built a "corn mill" on the Powow River in Salisbury, the first to be erected in that section. He married, 10 June, 1645, Sarah Clement, who was born in England, daughter of Robert Clement, one of the first settlers of Haverhill, Mass., who, it is claimed, came from England in his own ship in 1640. Abraham Morrill died 20 June, 1662, while on a visit to his brother, Isaac, in Roxbury, Mass. His will, dated 18 June, 1662, was proved 14 Oct., the same year. CARTER

I THOMAS^I CARTER of Salisbury, Mass., came to the Massachusetts Bay Colony from England, but the time of his arrival is not definitely known. There were several people of that name that arrived about the same time

and it is difficult to determine which is which. A Thomas Carter was a passenger on the Planter from Southampton, Eng., 2 Apr., 1635, 25 years of age, as a servant to Geo. Giddings. Whether this was the Thomas who settled first in Ipswich, Mass., and afterwards in Salisbury, or whether he was the one who latterly was the Rev. Thomas Carter of Woburn is not known. It is certain a Thomas Carter was granted a lot of land in Ipswich in 1638, his master testifying to his good conduct. He did not remain long in Ipswich for he received land in the "first division" in Salisbury in 1640. In Apr., 1661, he deeded a part of lands in that section to Anthony Stanyan of Hampton, and removed to the highland district, four miles away, near the Powow River at Brown's Hill, adjoining land of William Brown and Stephen Flanders. The maiden name of his wife, Mary, is unknown. He acquired considerable property in Salisbury and was highly respected. His will was dated 30 Oct., 1676, and proved 14 Nov., 1676. His wife survived him but date of her death is unknown.

He was living in 1718, in the northern section of Salisbury; what now, owing to the change in the boundary line between Massachusetts and New Hampshire is a part of South Hampton, N. H. There was a Martha Hubbard born in Salisbury, 8 Oct., 1698, dau. of John² Hubbard (*Coronet Richard*¹) and Jane (Follansbee) his wife. John² Carter served under Coronet Hubbard in the war above mentioned. There was a Hubbard Carter who went from Warner, N. H., and served in the Revolutionary War in Col. Timothy Beddell's Reg. In 1638, the widow, Christian, and three sons (the fourth son, Abraham, having died) immigrated to New England and settled in Colchester, afterwards Salisbury, Mass. She died three years later. Henry and William Brown lived, married and died in Salisbury and left many descendants. George moved to Haverhill, Mass., and though twice married, left no children. He was a soldier in King Philips War, 1676.

Among the signers from the North of Ireland of a memorial dated 26 Mch., 1718, addressed to Gov. Shute of Massachusetts, asking for a grant of land, are: John, Andrew, Alexander, James, John, William and B. Cochran. William Cochran was one of the original proprietors of Londonderry, N. H., in 1722. Soon after, there were in Londonderry: John, John, Peter, William and Andrew Cochran. From the first John, descended the Antrim, N. H., branch. The one known as Dea. John is claimed as the ancestor of the Pembroke families."

From the History of Antrim, N. H.: "John Cochran, a Scotch Patriot and sturdy Protestant, son of John and Elizabeth (Arroin) Cochran of Londonderry, Ireland, was born in that city in 1703. His father shared in the defence of that city against the Catholics in 1689. It is supposed that this John and his son, only 15 years old, were the two Johns that signed, in 1718, the memorial to Gov. Shute of Massachusetts for a grant of land, but this is not certain, because there was another John Cochran, probably a cousin of the above and somewhat older, who was one of the Elders at the formation of the original Church of Londonderry, N. H. This one, known as Dea. John, may have been one of those that signed the memorial. For some reason his father did not come The son arrived in 1720, settling in Londonderry; over. this place now occupied by William Cochran, Esq."

Thus it seems probable that the above named are the progenitors of most of the Cochran families of this section of New England. The name Cochran is found among the "Scotch-Irish" immigrants of that and a later period in other sections of America. Some have spelled the name Cofran, Cofrin, and Coffrin.

I Dea. JOHN' COCHRAN had among his children:

James,² John, and Ninian. The first two settled in Pembroke, N. H., the latter in Londonderry. John² Cochran (*Dea. John*¹) was the first to settle in Pembroke. In consideration of his building and operating a sawmill and gristmill, the proprietors of Suncook granted him lot No. I known as the Mill lot. The mills were built about 1728.

2 JAMES² COCHRAN (*Dea. John*¹) was probably born in Londonderry, Ireland, settled in Londonderry, N. H., where he married before 1739, Janet —; in 1750 he removed to Pembroke, N. H.

3 JOSEPH³ COCHRAN (*James*,² *Dea. John*¹) was born in Londonderry, N. H., 17 Aug., 1739, and died in Goshen, N. H., 20 Mch., 1816. He married in Pembroke, N. H., where he settled, Margaret Murray, who was born 1740, and died in Goshen, 17 Aug., 1830. He served in the American Revolutionary War from New Hampshire. Soon after, 1800, he removed to Goshen, when he changed the spelling of his name from Cochran to Cofran. The latter name his descendants continue to use.

4 BETSEY⁴ COCHRAN [or Cofran] (*Joseph*,³ *James*,² *Dea. John*¹) was born in Pembroke, N. H., in 1777, and died at Hanover, N. H., 6 Apr., 1859, and was buried beside her husband in Norwich, Vt. She married at Concord, N. H., I Jan., 1800, John⁶ Currier (*William*,⁵ *Ezekiel*,⁴ *Dea. Thomas*,³ *Thomas*,² *Richard*¹) who was born in Concord, 5 Oct., 1770, and died in Norwich, 3 Jan., 1843.

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
