Nashua, Iowa, Jan. 15, 1900.

GOVERNOR WILLIAM BRADFORD was baptised on March 6, 1589, at Austerfield, in Yorkshire, England. In 1608 he went to Holland and there joined the Pilgrims and came to Massachusetts in the MAYFLOWER in 1620 with his wife, Dorothy, who was drowned Dec. 20, 1620. He married as his second wife, Aug. 14, 1623, Mrs. Alice (Carpenter) Southworth, b. 1591, d. March 26, 1670, at Plymouth, Mass. She was the widow of Edward Southworth and daughter of Alexander Carpenter of Wrentham, Eng. He died in 1657.

MAJOR WILLIAM BRADFORD, son of Gov. Wm. Bradford, b. June 17, 1624, at Plymouth, d. Feb. 20, 1704, at Kingston. He married in 1652 Alice Richards, daughter of Thos. Richards. His third wife was Mrs. Mary Holmes, widow of Rev. John Holmes and daughter of John and Sarah (Masterson) Wood or Atwood, d. June 6, 1714.

SRAEL BRADFORD, son of Maj. Wm. Bradford, b. 1679 at Kingston, Mass., d. March 26, 1760, m. 1701, to Sarah, dau. of Benj. and Ruth (Pabodle) Bartlett b. 1684 at Duxbury, d. April 2, 1761, at Kingston.

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JOSHUA BRADFORD, son of Israel and Sarah Bradford, b. June 23, 1710, at Kingston, d. May 27, 1756, at Maduncook, Me., m. 1737, his 2nd cousin, Hannah, dau. of Elisha and Hannah (Cole) Bradford, b. April 10, 1717, at Plymouth, d. May 27, 1756. They moved from Kingston to Maduncook, Me., now called Friendship, where on May 27 he and his wife and little girl were killed by the Indians and two of their sons were taken into captivity and sold to the French, where they were held until 1759.

James Warren Bradford was born at Milford, Jefferson County, Wis., Aug. 17, 1863. In the spring of 1864 he came with his mother and grandfather's family to Chickasaw County near the old town of Williamstown. In November, 1865, on the return of his father from the war they removed to Nashua, Iowa. He attended the Public Schools until the spring of 1881 when on the 25th of April he hegan teaching at Pearl Rock where he taught two terms. He then taught two terms as principal of the Ionia schools.

In July, 1882, he entered the Iowa Agricultural College and spent four years there, teaching four terms of school at Ionia, and Chickasaw during the winter vacations. He graduated with honors, being third in a class of twenty-two, on Nov. 10, 1886, receiving the degree of Bachelor of Civil Engineering. The winter of 86-87 he spent in the South, most of the time in New Orleans, La. In 1887 he was a candidate for County Superintendent of Chickasaw County but was defeated. Soon after, he entered the Nashua Schools as teacher of the Junior Grammar room, and was shortly after transferred to the Senior Grammar room where he remained until May, 1890, when, on account of sickness, he was compelled to resign. The same year he entered into partnership with his father in the Furniture business. They remained together until 1893 and then he continued the business alone until Oct. 19, 1896, when he sold out.

In January, 1897, he purchased The Weekly Nashua Post and since then has been conducting the same as a Republican Family Newspaper.

He is a member of Bradford Lodge, No. 129, A. F. & A. M., and the auxiliary Nashua Chapter No. 248 O. E. S. and several other orders.

Since December, 1891, he has been Town Clerk, and since 1894 he has been a member of the School Board, having served as its President for the past three years.

GRANDFATHER

BRADFORD—At his residence in Nashua, Iowa, July 13, 1877, after a lingering illness, James Bradford.

He was born in Cushing, Knox Co., Maine, Sept. 21, 1805. In 1833 he removed from his native city to Clinton, Kennebec Co., Maine, where he remained until 1849 when he came to the great Northwest and settled in Monroe, Green Co., Wis. And in 1864 he came to Chickasaw Co., Iowa. For the last thirteen years he has resided in Nashua an honored citizen and a faithful christian. He had been a member of the M. E. church over 40 years, during which time he held the office of Class Leader, Steward, and Trustee in all of which he was faithful and efficient.

A little over two years ago his health began to fail and he was obliged to give up his business. For the last six months he has been confined to his bed, at times suffering the most excruciating pain, but he bore it all with patience and with resignation to God. A few hours before his death while prayer was being offered he joined heartily in the service in responses, and when asked how he felt in regard to the future he said "all is well." Thus he died peacefully trusting in his Redeemer.

The funeral services were held Sabbath morning in the M. E. church, Rev. E. W. Jeffries preaching the sermon. Having resided so long in Nashua, Father Bradford had a large circle of friends and acquaintances in the city and vicinity and a very large concourse gathered at the church to participate in the services, a very large number of which could not get into the house at all but stood around the doors and windows. A large procession followed the remains to their resting place in Nashua cemetery. His mourning widow and large family have the sympathy of the entire community. For their faithful care, during those long months of terrible suffering, of him who has now left their family circle, they will be rewarded every hour of their lives .--- Nashua Post, July 19, 1877.

FATHER

From The Nashua Post, Mar. 17, 1898

Thomas Seavey Bradford was born in Clinton, Kennebec County, Maine, July 22, 1834, and died at the home of his sister, Mrs. M. E. Dowd, on Saturday, March 12, 1898, at the age of 63 years, 7 months, and 20 days. He was the oldest of thirteen children, eight of whom are now living. They are William J. of Murrietta, Cal.; Isaac and Jennie of De Queen, Ark.; Mrs. M. E. Dowd of Nashua; Charles A. of Republic; and Isaiah H., Dilla E., and David R. of Hubbard, Minn.

He spent his early days in Maine, until the fall of 1849, when he came west with his father's family to Monroe, Wis. Shortly after the death of

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his mother, in 1852, he went overland to the gold regions of California where he remained until the fall of 1857. He then returned to Missouri, and soon afterwards went to Pike's Peak, where he remained until the war broke out, when he came home to Wisconsin. He was married, Oct. 10. 1861, to Mary J. Hudson, who died July 30, 1889. He enlisted at Milford, Wis., in company "F" 29th Wisconsin Infantry, and was later on transferred to the 14th Wisconsin Regiment, from which he was discharged at the close of the war at Mobile, Ala., in October, 1865. From thence he came to Nashua, and since November, 1865, he has made this town his home.

When Nashua was incorporated in October, 1869, he was elected as the first Mayor and he has served in the same capacity six times since, in the following years: 77-78-81-82-83-90. His administrations were always acceptable to the people and it was mainly through his influence that the present council room was erected in 1877.

From 1882 to 1885 he was a member of the County Board of Supervisors. He held many minor offices during the years and was always a faithful public servant.

For three years he was in the employ of E. P. Greeley at the Mill, three years with Spindler & Sutherland, Hardware Dealers, and duing those years he held an interest in the Blacksmith and Wagon Shops of Bradford & Co. After 1872 he devoted his whole time to the increasing business of the firm which shortly afterwards became Bradford & Sutherland. The old Red Shops located

on the ground now occupied by the M. E. parsonage, were familiar landmarks for years, until they were destroyed by fire, June 5, 1884. He was then out of business for a few years, but in November, 1889, he bought out the furniture business of J. P. Parish, and continued the same with his son until 1893, when on account of ill health, he was forced to retire from active business.

He was married a second time, Dec. 1, 1890, to Augusta Dexter. For the past eight years his health has been gradually failing. He spent three winters at Excelsior Springs, Mo., endeavoring to regain his health but received only temporary relief.

His friends have of late noticed his failing health, but he had been able to be about the house until Feb. 25, when he was taken ill, and from that time until his death he was confined to his bed. For ten days he suffered with the hiccoughs but a ter those had been stopped, he seemed to be getting better and he ate a hearty supper Saturday evening. Soon after he was taken with pains, and he died at eight o'clock. Medical assistance was of no avail for the heart refused to perform its natural work. For over thirty-two years he lived among the people of Nashua, and he did as much as any one man to advance the interects of this town.

He was a member of the Masonic order, the Knights of Pythias, the Grand Army of the Republic, and other societics. At his request, the funeral was held at the M. E. church, under the direction of Bradford Lodge, No. 129, A. F. & A. M., of which he had been a member for over 30 years.

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He was at one time, and for many years, a prominent and useful member of the M. E. church of this place. He possessed a strong and rugged character and a positiveness which well constituted him a leader among men. He was well known throughout the County and during the many years of his residence here made a host of friends. It is impossible at this time for me to write what I would like to say, but I can most truthfully say that he was always a kind and good father to me, reproving where reproof was necessary, and always giving good fatherly advice at all times. I will miss his counsel and the kindly word he always had for me.

The funeral services were held at the M. E. church, Rev. W. B. Davis officiating. The members of Bradford Lodge No. 129, together with members of the order from New Hampton, assisted in the services, and the burial was under the auspices of the Masonic order. He was laid to rest in Oak Hill Cemetery beside his wife he loved so well and his aged father, to await the resurrection morn.

We can but say: "Farewell, Dear Father."

Death of Mrs. M. J. Bradford

The many friends of Mrs. Bradford were greatly surprised and pained to hear of her sudden death early Tuesday morning. She had been quite poorly for some time but few supposed her so near the grave. The funeral took place at the house yesterday (Wednesday) afternoon. The following in brief are the facts of her life.

Mary J. Hudson was born at Sardinia, New York, Feb. 7, 1837. She removed with her family to Wisconsin in the year 1850. She married T. S. Bradford on Oct. 10, 1861, in Jefferson Co., Wisconsin. She removed to Chickasaw County, Iowa, in 1864 and since the fall of 1865 her residence has been in Nashua.

Mrs. Bradford united with the M. E. church some seventeen years ago and has manifested a Christian spirit in her daily life being best known and best loved in the home. As a wife, mother and neighbor she will be sadly missed, but our loss is her gain. She is at rest.

Old Letters From California

The following letters are two of a series of letters written by T. S. Bradford from California to his father at Monroe, Wis. The first was after his arrival there and when he was only eighteen years old. They have been preserved all these years and were recently given to me by MIS. Sarah Bradford of Hubbard, Minn.

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(First Letter)

Diamond Springs, California, Sept. 26, 1852.

Dear Father:

I take this opportunity to let you know that I am well at present and hope these few lines may find you the same. After a long journey we reached Hangtown or Placerville, Cal. Here the boys began to scatter, one, one way, and another, another way. I stayed about Hangtown a few days. I went to all the shops to get work but could not get to work. I went from there to Diamond Springs, about 3 miles from Hangtown, here I found Millman to work at blacksmithing. His partner died about a week before I got here. I asked him if he wanted to hire any help. No he said he had not tools enough but if I could get another set of tools we would go into partnership. So I borrowed 100 dollars of Condee to get tools. I sent 115 dollars and Millman 72 to get tools and stock. We got 1 pr. 42 inch bellows for 60.00, anvil 180 lbs. 45.00. Now for the plains! We left Council Bluffs, Iowa, May 22. Condee was captain of the train. It consisted of 28 teams and about 90 men. The 28 of May one man died out of our train, from Ind.; the 29 one died from Wis. pinery; the next one that died out of our train was Macune the Blacksmith from Kenosha died the 18 of June. He was dving when I wrote my letter at Ft. Laramie. He was the only one that died out of Condees company that started from Monroe. Condee and Moulton are about Hangtown. Wickwire went to Sacramento City, and Millman saw him about a week ago. He is going to go back this fall or next spring. I heard that Machin was going back this fall. Clark went to work somewhere about Hang-I saw O'Neel at Hangtown. town. He told me that he sold his part to his partner. Sunday is the greatest business day in Hangtown. I have been to work since the 8th of Sept. with Millman and in about a week more if work comes in well, I can pay Cordee the 100 dollars. For horse shoeirg, new shoes we get 5 dollars, 75 cts. for setting old ones, for setting tire 8 dollars per set. Flour is worth 16 cts per lb. here now. We go in to Hangtown the 5th of Oct. Write to me as soon as you get this letter. Direct the letter to Placerville. California. I will send you in this letter a small sample of California gold. I have nothing more to write now, perhaps I will have more to write the next time. Be sure and not forget to write to me as soon as you get this.
