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THE BURNETT FAMILY

A. THOMAS BURNAP^(a), the earliest progenitor of the Burnap-Burnett family, to whom it has been possible to trace an unbroken lineage, was living in Stanstead Abbots, county Hertford, England, as early as 1532, and probably was there before that time. He was living there as late as 1538. Between 1532 and 1538 he was concerned in various transactions involving property in Stanstead Abbots, some of which came to him through his wife. He married, probably several years before 1532, Johanna Nobbys, daughter of another Johanna Nobbys, who was dead by 4 April, 1532. Mrs. Johanna Nobbys, at her death, held certain lands, and it was found that her eldest daughter and heir was Johanna, wife of Thomas Burnopp. In some transactions Thomas Burnap was called "of the Homage" apparently the name of his place in Stanstead Abbots.^(b)

Children of Thomas and Johanna (Nobbys) Burnap:

B. THOMAS BURNAP, son of Thomas and Johanna (Nobbys) Burnap, was born probably at Stanstead Abbots, county Hertford, England, possibly before 1512, for in 1533 he was old enough to be mentioned in a land document. He died in March 1596/7, probably very aged. He married, before 1564, Alice Cramphorne, daughter of Mrs. Alice Cramphorne. She was living in 1600, but the date of her death has not been determined. Thomas Burnap was executor of his mother-in-law's will in 1564, in which she mentioned her daughters Ann Rawlings and Alice Burnap, as well as John, Alice and Thomasin Burnap, apparently her grandchildren. In 1566 Thomas Burnap witnessed the will of Alice Nobbs, a widow, probably a relative of his mother. After that date he was frequently connected with wills and the administrations of estates, and appears to have been a man of some standing. His will, dated in January, 1593, was amended 28 February, 1596/7, and administration of his estate was granted to his widow 21 March, 1596/7. He mentioned his wife, Alice, eldest son, Thomas, and Thomas' sons John and Thomas, and also his daughter, Johan, wife of Thomas Reddington, of Hunsdon.^(c)

C. THOMAS BURNAP, son of Thomas and Alice (Cramphorne) Burnap, was undoubtedly born at Stanstead Abbots, county Hertford, England. In 1593/4 he was named the "eldest son" in his father's will, and he was still alive in 1610, when his daughter Dorothy was married. In 1600, 1605, and 1627 he paid subsidies from Stanstead Abbots. The name of his wife has not been determined, but he undoubtedly was the father of the following children:^(d)

1. ROBERT¹ BURNAP, the immigrant ancestor, was the youngest son of Thomas Burnap of Stanstead Abbots, county Herts, England. He was born there about 1595 and died at Reading, Massachusetts, 27 September 1689. He married about 1624, Ann Miller, daughter of Thomas Miller, M. A., of Bishop's Stortford, county Herts. Her father was a graduate of Cambridge and a man of considerable influence in his parish. She was baptized, 3 May 1600, and died at Reading, Massachusetts, 27 April 1681.^(e) Robert Burnap lived in Hoddesden End, Great Amwell, county Herts, where he purchased land in 1634. He sold this property in 1638 and followed his wife's oldest sister and her husband, Isaac and Elizabeth (Miller) Heath, to Roxbury, Massachusetts. He was a proprietor at Roxbury in 1640, and in 1646 settled in Reading, Massachusetts. As his land bordered that of Governor Thomas Dudley, the two families were probably acquainted. He was selectman

in Reading in 1654-56, 1658-60, 1662-69, 1670-71, and took part in many transactions.

His will was dated 15 November 1688, and proved 1 October 1689. He mentioned his son Thomas, daughter Ann Jones, daughter Sarah Brown, son Robert, cousin (i. e. nephew) Thomas Burnap (son of his brother John), and grandchildren, Joseph and Thomas Burnap, Sarah and Isaac Southwick.^(f)

2. ROBERT² BURNAP (*Robert*¹), son of Robert and Ann Burnap, was baptized at Hunsdon, county Hertford, England, 28 November 1627, and died in Reading, Massachusetts, 18 October 1695. He married 1653, Ann ———, who died in Reading, Massachusetts, 25 June 1661. He married, secondly, 28 May 1662, Sarah Brown, sister of John Brown "of the Hill." She was living as late as 2 June 1703. He came to New England with his parents in 1638, and lived with them in Roxbury and Reading. In 1655 he was chosen to keep the pound. He shared in a division of land in that same year. In 1665 he was sealer of weights and measures. He was a selectman in 1670-72, 1674-75, 1677-78, 1681, 1693, and 1694.^(g)

3. BENJAMIN³ BURNAP, (*Robert²⁻¹*), youngest son of Robert and Sarah (Brown) Burnap, was born in Reading, Massachusetts, 8 June 1677, and was living in 1740, but no record of his death has been found. He married, in Reading, 18 June 1700, Elizabeth Newhall, daughter of Thomas and Rebecca (Greene) Newhall. She was born in 1678, and was living in 1740. In 1711 he served on an expedition against the French and Indians. He was probably the Captain Burnap who was on a committee to look after rights in Lynn. In 1722, he was in John Shipley's company for service in Maine. In 1723, he sold his property in Reading and removed to Hopkinton, Massachusetts, where he purchased land of Jedediah Brigham on the Sudbury River. As his sons grew to manhood he deeded farms to them, which probably accounts for the lack of probate record for his estate. His children were all born in Reading, Massachusetts.^(h)

4. JONATHAN⁴ BURNAP, (*Benjamin³, Robert²⁻¹*), youngest son of Benjamin and Elizabeth (Newhall) Burnap, was born in Reading, Massachusetts, 19 January 1711/2, and died in Windham, Connecticut, between March and June 1785. He married, first, at Christ Church, Hopkinton, Massachusetts, 10 July 1735, Dorothy Kimball, daughter of Ebenezer and Elizabeth (Carr) Kimball, of Wenham and Beverly. She died in Hopkinton, 21 October 1740. All their children were born in Hopkinton, Massachusetts. He married, secondly, at Windham, Connecticut, 21 April 1747, Elizabeth Averill, daughter of William and Ruth (Bemis) Averill. She was born in Windham, 17 February 1725/6, and was living in 1785, at the time of her husband's will. Jonathan Burnap sold his land in Hopkinton in January 1745, and it was probably at that time that he removed to Windham, although he may have lived in Hampton, Connecticut, for a short time. He was a lister in 1755, and a tithing-man in 1760. In 1753 he was a member of the Scotland Church and then joined the Canada Society. In 1769 the Society had a controversy with the pastor, the Rev. Samuel Moseley, who had assumed undue authority of his people. Jonathan Burnap was one of a committee of five prominent men appointed to remonstrate with him. The controversy lasted several years and both sides were accused of scandalous conduct, before the dispute was finally settled. He made his will 19 March 1785, which was certified 11 June 1785 and proved 5 July 1785. He mentioned his wife and all his living children.⁽¹⁾

5. JAMES⁵ BURNETT, (*Jonathan⁴, Benjamin³, Robert²⁻¹*), son of Jonathan and Elizabeth (Averill) Burnap, was born in Windham, Connecticut, 5 April 1756, and died at Hampton, Connecticut, 27 January 1840. During most of his lifetime he used the surname Burnett. He married at Hampton, Connecticut, about 1780, Chloe Martin, daughter of David and Elizabeth (Hendee) Martin. She was born about 1765 and died at Hampton, Connecticut, 8 February 1847, aged 82 years. After her husband's death she received a pension, beginning 26 March 1844, as the widow of a Revolutionary soldier.

James Burnett served in the Revolutionary War, enlisting first, in 1776 for two months, in Captain James Stedman's Company, Colonel Douglas' Regiment, Connecticut troops. Later he served five months with Captain Vine Elderkin's Company, Colonel Mott's Regiment. He enlisted again 21 May 1777 and served for three years as corporal and sergeant in the companies of Captain Thomas Abbe, Captain Stillwell, and Captain Jonathan Heart in Colonel Samuel Wyly's Regiment. He

was allowed a pension on Claim W25317, executed 27 July 1832.^(j) All his children were born in Hampton, Connecticut.^(k)

6. CLARISSA⁶ BURNETT, (*James⁵, Jonathan⁴, Benjamin³, Robert²⁻¹*) born 20 June 1781, married Elisha Griffin at Hampton, Connecticut. He was born 6 May 1777, son of Ebenezer and Elizabeth (Martin) Griffin. They removed to DeKalb, New York, soon after 1805, where they were among the earliest settlers. Elisha Griffin died at DeKalb in 1855. She died December 1, 1865.

7. JAMES⁶ BURNETT, (*James⁵, Jonathan⁴, Benjamin³, Robert²⁻¹*), born 16 September 1782, was married three times. He first married 5 January 1805, Amanda Parke, born 2 March 1785, in Canterbury, Connecticut. They moved to DeKalb, New York, where she died in

1824. On 30 March 1825, he married, secondly, Clarissa Kennan, daughter of Rev. Thomas and Sally Kennan, who died in East DeKalb, New York, 19 March 1831, following the birth of a child. On 25 January 1832, he married, thirdly, Asenath Styles, at DeKalb, New York. In 1833 he removed to Livingston County, Michigan, accompanied by his wife, Asenath, and several children, including George, Averill, Calvin T., and Henry. Asenath (Styles) Burnett died 10 March 1852, and was buried at Hamburg, Michigan. James⁶ Burnett died 29 March 1860, in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and was buried in Hamburg, Michigan.

8. DAVID⁶ BURNETT, (*James⁵, Jonathan⁴, Benjamin³, Robert²⁻¹*) born 20 November 1797, at Hampton, Connecticut, and was married to Asenath Mosely, 5 September 1820, at Hampton, Connecticut, by the Rev. Ladivious Weld. They moved shortly afterward to Gouverneur, St. Lawrence County, New York, where he taught for several years and then removed to Watertown, New York, where he taught in the Old Academy. About 1840 he bought a small farm two miles east of the village of Cape Vincent, to which he soon removed, and there he lived until his death in about 1875 or 1876. An article in a Watertown, New York, paper dated

August 5, 1901, has a report of a reception given Mrs. Asenath Mosley Burnett, his widow, by the Le Roy de Chaumont chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution at her farm home on the occasion of her 102nd birthday. She died at her home in Cape Vincent, New York, October 24, 1901.

In 1825 he taught school in St. Lawrence County, New York, and in 1826 at Trumansburg, Tompkins County, New York, where he was head instructor until 1834. On 20 October 1831, he married Sarah Clough, daughter of Ephraim and Sarah (Richardson) Clough, who was born in Madison County, New York, in 1808. She received her education at Hamilton College, Hamilton, New York, and taught school for many years in Trumansburg, where she met Jonathan Burnett. In 1834 Jonathan⁶ Burnett and his wife Sarah moved from Trumansburg, New York, to Livingston County, Michigan, where he bought a farm of 80 acres through the Government Land Office. The deed was issued 8 October 1835, certificate number 11040, United States to Jonathan Burnett, by Andrew Jackson, President, A. J. Donelson, Secretary. The legal description was, the SW¹/₄ of SE¹/₄ and the SE¹/₄ of SW¹/₄, Section 19, Town 1 North, Range 6 East, Green Oak Township, Livingston County, Michigan. He built a log house on the farm, which was completed late in 1834 or early in 1835. They lived in this house until they built a frame house on the farm in 1869.

They first attended church services in the Holden schoolhouse near by and, when the Presbyterian Church was built in Brighton, they united with that church and drove six miles with an ox team on Sunday in order to worship God with their friends. When the Episcopal Church was erected at Hamburg, probably in 1843, they united with it and were faithful members until Jonathan's death. He read the service when there was no pastor, especially after Dr. Gallatin passed away. Jonathan's daughter, Ella (Ellen) Harriet Beach, from whose letter most of the above facts are quoted, says: "They often had midweek services in their home. I can recall how the young people would gather at our home and my father would lead in the singing for hours. He was a very fine singer and would give the key with a tuning fork. Those were happy days and I still love that old log house. I dream of it and of my father and mother and wish it might have remained as a monument of their achievements."

Amelia Melissa, the eldest child, was born at Trumansburg, New York, and the other children on the farm in Michigan where Jonathan lived until his death. After Jonathan died in 1881, Albert sold the farm and moved with his family and his mother to Jackson, Michigan, where she died in 1884. She is buried beside her husband in the Hamburg, Michigan, cemetery.

In 1850 he married Ann Eliza Turrill, daughter of James and Ruby (Bell) Turrill, who was born in 1831 and died in 1906. Dr. Kenny was a member of the Michigan legislature, 1865-7, and member of the constitutional convention of 1867. In his home city he served as alderman, school inspector, member of the board of education for twenty years and mayor two years. He died at Lapeer, February 17, 1896.^(b)

TURRILL

This surname occurs in America in various forms, especially as Terrill. In this country the name comes chiefly from two sources, from Roger Terrill of Milford and from William Tirrill and his two brothers, who are said to have reached Virginia about 1656.

1. ROGER¹ TERRILL, first of the name in America, left London, England, in the ship Hector, with the Davenport-Eaton Company. They probably sailed April 28 or 29, 1637, to avoid the proclamation of April 30, 1637, forbidding any persons to pass to the plantations unless they had taken the oath of Allegiance and Supremacy, and were certified by the minister of their parish as to conformity to the orders and discipline of the Church. The Davenport-Eaton Company were mostly non-conformists, Davenport having been deprived of his church, St. Stephens, Coleman St., London for non-conformity, and knowing that the proclamation was to be issued, the Company slipped away a very short time before April 30, 1637.

The company remained in Massachusetts until March 30, 1638, when the whole company started by sea for Quinnipiac (New Haven) which was reached in eighteen days, April 17, 1638.

August 31st of the previous year, Mr. Eaton with a part of the company started and explored as far west as New Haven, leaving seven men at the place to hold the land until the arrival of the company. With this company Roger Terrill went to Quinnipiac and remained with them until June 1639, when, on the organization of the Church of New Haven in the barn of Mr. Robert Newman on the 4th day of July 1639, it was decided by the Company that only members of the church should be free burgesses of the Colony and enjoy the rights of planters. Roger Terrill was not a member of the Puritan Church and so with seven others was denied the rights of a free planter.

With the Davenport-Eaton Company had come a small company with Peter Prudden as their minister, who did not desire to settle at New Haven and who formed a church about the time of the New Haven Company. This company admitted the eight rejected Church of England men to their company with all the rights of free planters, and with them Roger Terrill went to Wepowang (Milford) where they had purchased land from Ausantawac, chief of the Wepowangs, reaching that place September 2, 1639. Roger Terrill remained in the Milford Colony until his death. In July 1644 he was baptised and admitted to full membership in the Milford Church and continued until his death a prominent man in the colony and church. He married about 1639, Abigail Ufford, daughter of Thomas and Isabel Ufford, who was ad-

mitted to the Milford Church, November 1644. Major St. S. Turrell says, "Roger Terrill evidently came to New England an unmarried young man, he did not belong as far as can be ascertained to either of the colonies with which he came to America. He was evidently from a good family and had means. He seems to have been a companion of Lord Leigh, son of the Earl of Marlborough who came to Boston in the Hector. Roger Terrill also had a private charter from the government to locate lands in any of the colonies, and it was his charter that was used by the Peter Prudden Company and which gave them the legal right to purchase lands from the Indians." He died in 1682.^(a)

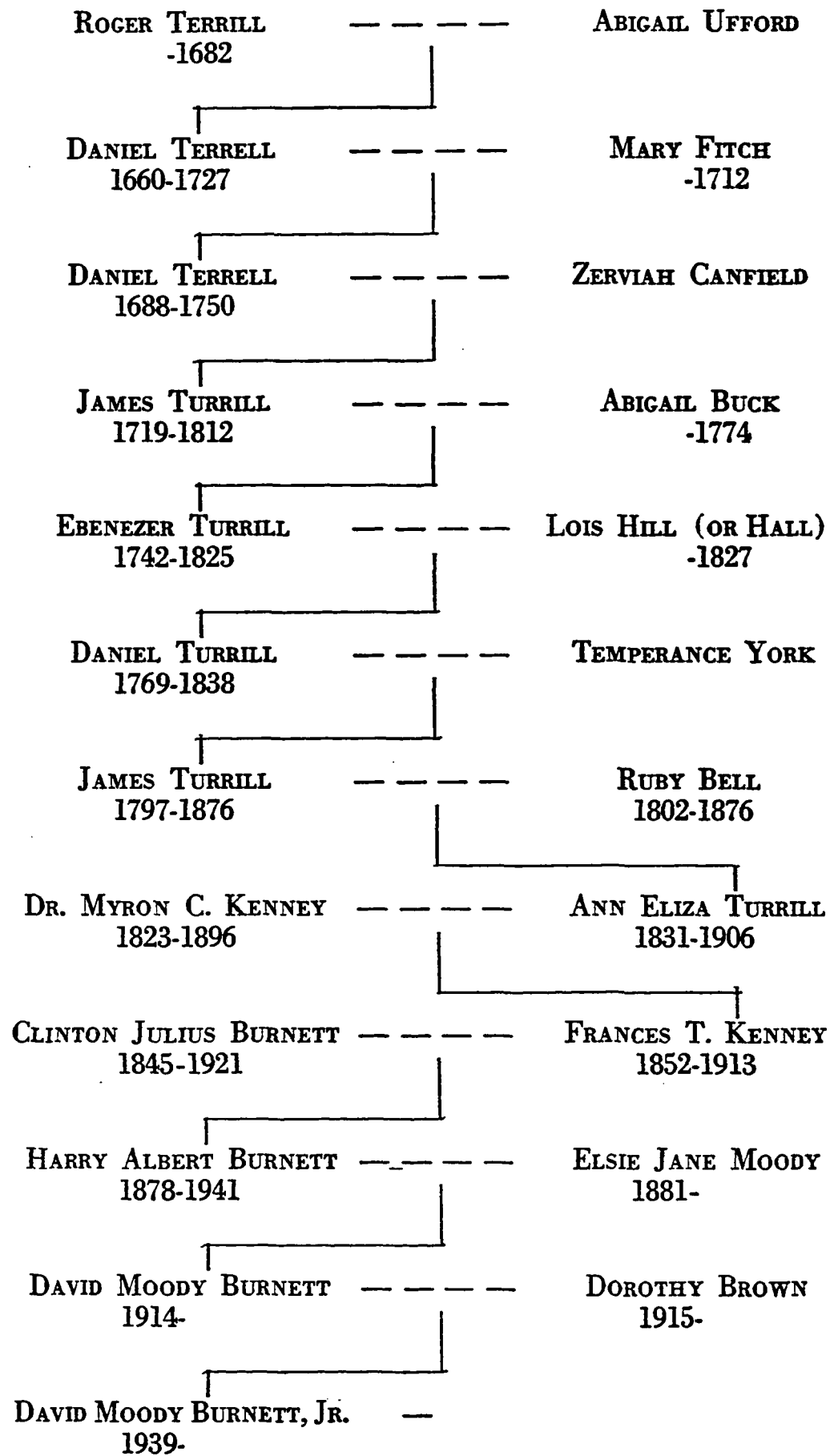

RUNYON

1. VINCENT¹ RUNYON, from the city of Poitiers, was in New Jersey as early as July 1668, when he married Anne Boutcher, daughter of John Boutcher of Hartford, England. On 25 March 1671 he was living in Elizabethtown, New Jersey, and on that date bought a home lot from Francis Barber. He was a carpenter. In the spring of 1677 he bought a tract of 154 acres on the Raritan river in the Baptist community at Piscataway in Middlesex county. The family moved to Piscataway at about that time. He died before 5 December 1713 on which date administration of his estate was granted to his widow, Martha Runyon. There is a controversy as to who was the mother of Vincent Runyon's children. Since his son, John Runyon, named one of his older daughters Martha and did not use the name Ann, it seems likely that Martha was the mother of most or all of his children. Eight children have been identified, but some writers assign him four others. Vincent Runyon's surname appears in the original records under various spellings, Rongnion, Rognion, Roginion, Rugnion, etc.^(a)

I. WILLIAM¹ SUTTON is first recorded in America at Eastham, Massachusetts, on Cape Cod, 11 July 1666, when he married Damaris, daughter of Richard and Alice Bishop. Between 1672 and 1674 he removed from Eastham, and settled in Piscataway Township, Middlesex County, New Jersey. Whether he went directly to New Jersey or stopped a year or two in some Long Island town, as many other New England families did, is not definitely known. Here he was known as a Quaker, belonging to the Woodbridge Monthly Meeting. By 1682 he was owner of 349 acres of land on which he paid a nominal rent of a half cent annually.^(a) Damaris Sutton died 6 February 1682/3, and William Sutton married, secondly, 3 January 1684/5, Jane Barnes. In 1713 he was spoken of as an aged man. He died April 1718.^(b)

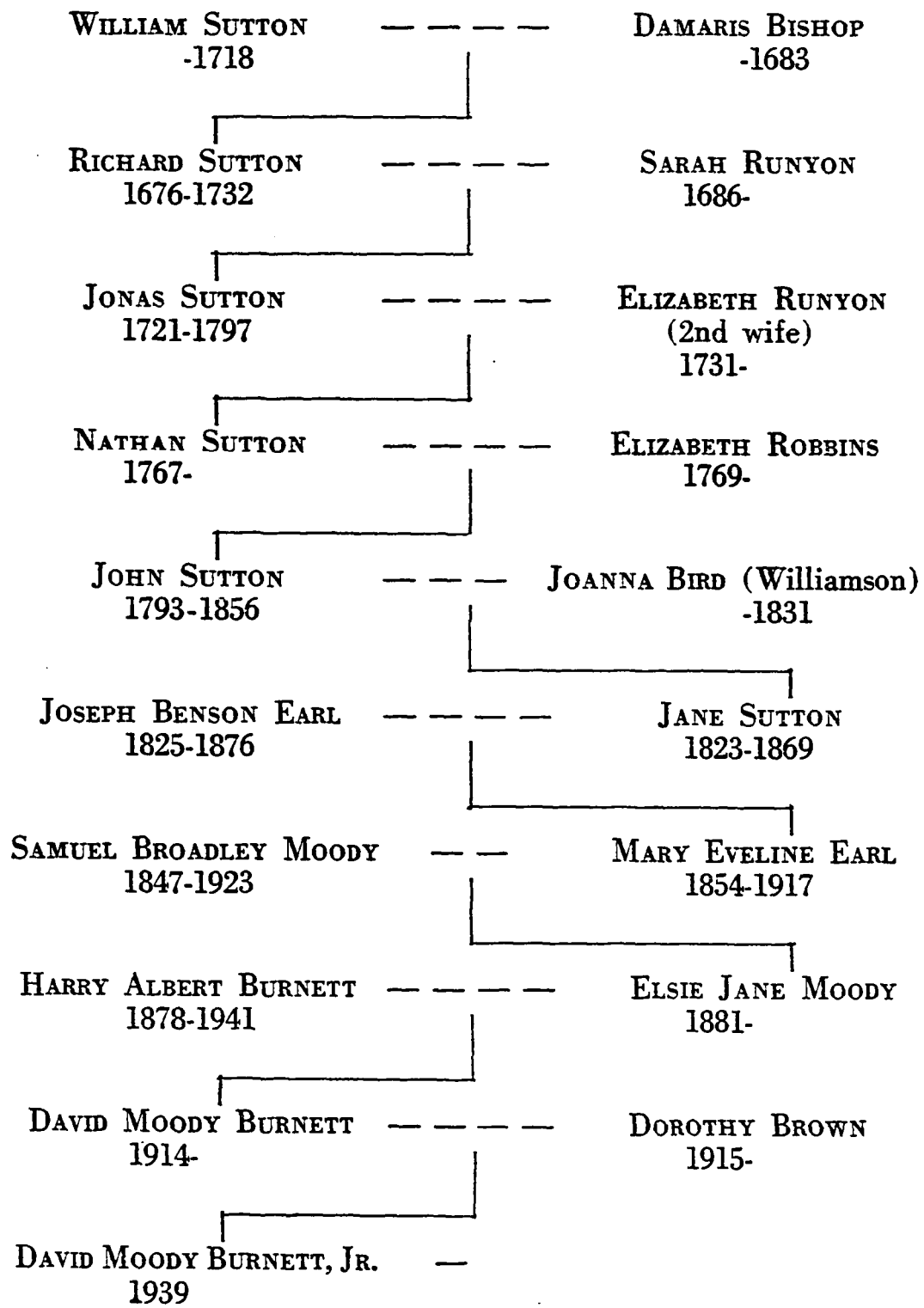

He married, first, about 1818, at Beattystown, Hunterdon County, New Jersey, Mrs. Joanna (Bird) Williamson, daughter of Elisha Bird and widow of Peter Williamson. She died in 1831, and he married, secondly, before 1833, Susan Williamson, a native of Warren County. EARL

OLIVER EARL was born 26 December 1791 in what was afterwards the town of Cairo, New York. As Cairo was formed from territory taken from the towns of Catskill and Coxsackie, it is evident that he was born in one of these two towns. He served six months in the Fifth Lincoln Militia, Canada West, in 1812, and took part in the battle of Queens-^(a)ton. According to family tradition he was impressed into the service. It seems likely that he was living in Canada West at that time and that he was required to serve in the militia with all other able bodied men. He returned to New York after this experience and married 24 February 1814, Hartland, Niagara County, New York, Elizabeth Williams, born 9 March 1797, Township of Saltfleet, Canada West. He entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church and was ordained as deacon 1 August 1830 at Rochester, New York. In 1833 he removed to Pontiac, Michigan. Here he continued as a minister and was ordained an elder at Detroit, 10 September 1837.^(b) He died in Oakland County, Michigan, 24 February 1864. His wife had died 24 June 1861. JOSEPH BENSON EARL born 19 May 1825, Hartland, New York, was the sixth child of Rev. Oliver and Elizabeth (Williams) Earl. He removed with his parents in 1833 to Pontiac, Michigan. He married Jane E. Sutton, born 12 November 1823 in New Jersey, daughter of John and Joanna (Bird) Sutton of Lapeer County, Michigan. Of their children Mary Eveline Earl was born 14 December 1854 at Waterford, Michigan. She married at Waterford, Michigan, 24 December 1872, Samuel B. Moody. Joseph B. Earl died 27 December 1876. His wife had died previously, 22 May 1869.

BRADLEY

1. ISAAC¹ BRADLEY was born in England about 1650 and died in East Haven, Connecticut, 12 January 1712/3, aged 62 years. He married Elizabeth ———, who was born about 1656, and died 3 January 1712/3, aged 56 years. Isaac Bradley appears first in Branford, Connecticut, as one of the signers of an agreement, dated 20 January 1667, for the settlement of a minister, although he was apparently only 17 years old at the time.^(a) He received a grant of land in Branford 29 October 1674, and another six weeks later. He sold this land 10 March 1682/3 and removed to East Haven, Connecticut, where he had a grant of land 14 October 1683. His house, erected on that land, was standing in 1917 and was then in the possession of one of his descendants. In an affidavit, dated 1 December 1685, his age is given as "35 years or thereabouts."^(b) Letters of administration were granted to his two eldest sons, William and Isaac, 3 February 1712/3.^(c) He is said to have come from London to Boston, and thence to Connecticut. It is probable that he was in some way related to William Bradley of New Haven.^(d)

It is possible that he died at the home of his daughter, Rhoda Skinner, who was living in Jericho at the time of his death.^(g)

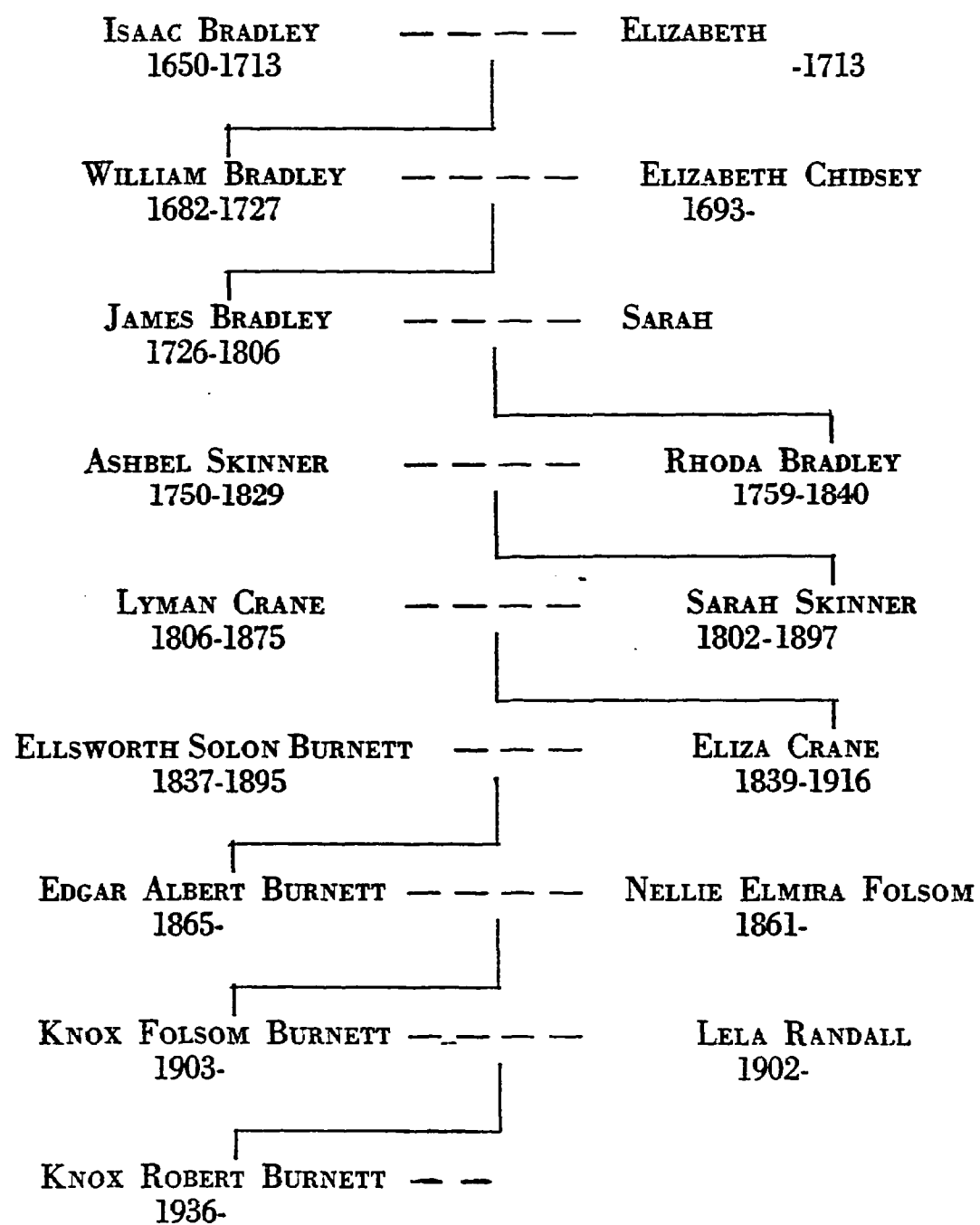

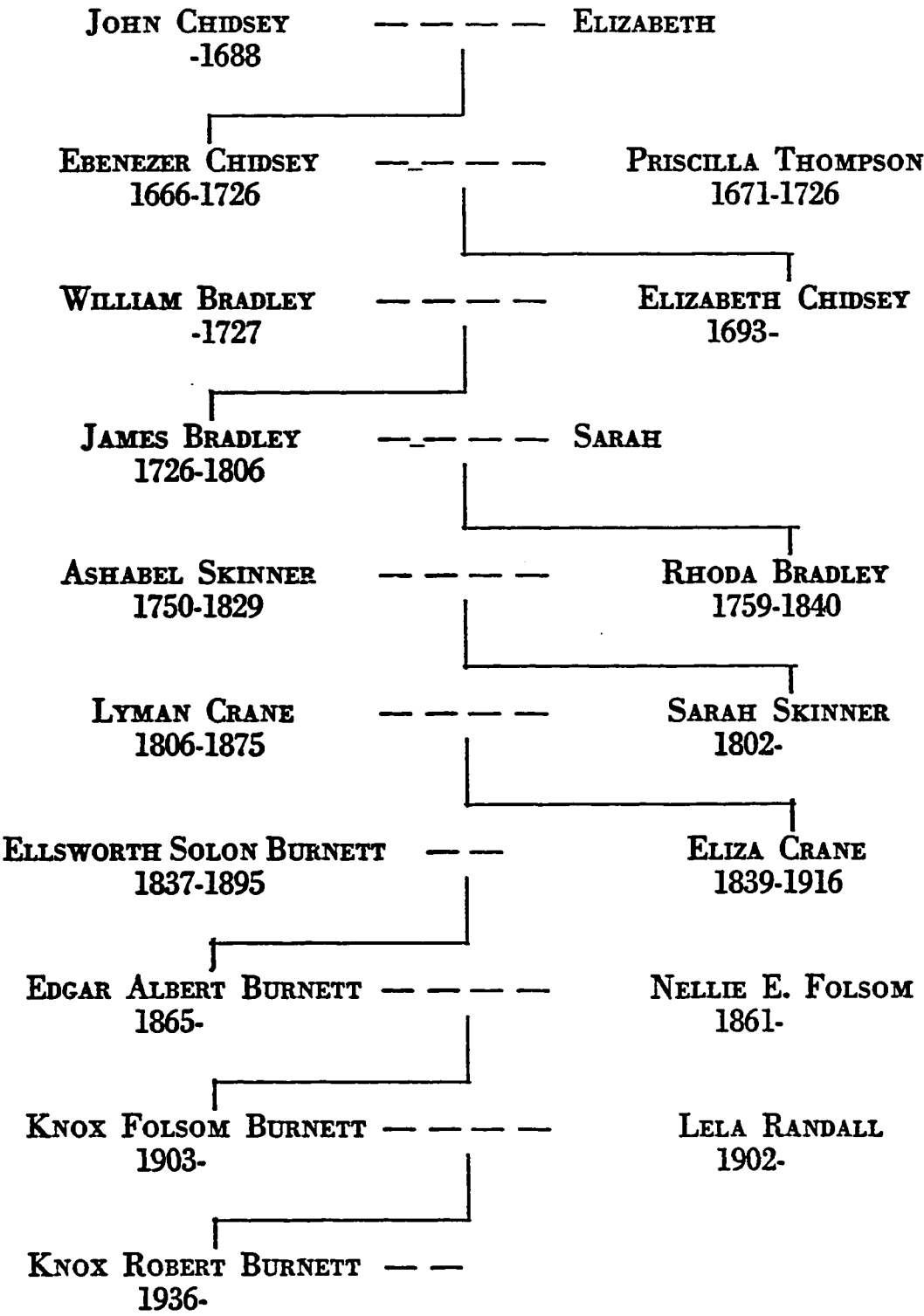

CLOUGH

1. JOHN¹ CLOUGH^(a) was born probably in England about 1613 and died at Salisbury, Massachusetts, 26 July 1691. He came to America about 1635, probably on the Elizabeth, and was known as Jo. Cluffe in the log of the Elizabeth. He received land in the first division of the land at Salisbury in 1640, took the oath of fidelity in 1650 and served as tax commissioner in that year. He is said by some to have lived in Watertown before settling in Salisbury, but it appears that he is not identical with John of Watertown, Massachusetts.

He married, first, Jane, who died 16 January, 1679/80; married secondly, 15 January, 1686, Martha Cilley, who survived him.^(b)

In 1728 he was moderator of the town and later served in the general court, or legislature, of Connecticut. was a member of the Committee of Safety in 1775, 1776 and 1778. An Ephraim Clough sold land at Belchertown in 1782, 1783 and 1792.^(e) There was also an Ephraim Clough, born about 1750, who served in Colonel Porter's Regiment in 1777 and in Captain Stebbins' Company in 1782. The Archives Division, Commonwealth of Massachusetts, reports Ephraim Clough as a private only, having served twenty-five days in 1777 and three days in June, 1782.

According to H. W. Clough, 29 Pearl Street, Arcade, New York, Abel Clough, his great grandfather, who married Esther Richardson in 1788, and Ephraim, Jr., who married Sarah Richardson, 7 February, 1793, were brothers. Abel went to Fabius, New York in 1795, and Ephraim, Jr., to Madison, New York, before 1796.

5. EPHRAIM⁵ CLOUGH (*Ephraim⁴, Jonathan³, John²⁻¹*), was born about 1771. He married Sarah Richardson, daughter of Jeremiah and Dorcas (Hall) Richardson, and was living at Belchertown, Massachusetts in January 1794, at the time his first child was born. He moved to Madison, New York, soon afterwards, where he and his brother, Abel, and a certain Luther Clough, perhaps another brother, were among the early settlers, the first settlers having come to Madison in 1793^(f). In 1803 Ephraim Clough was appointed captain in a company of cavalry in the state militia and in 1810 he was appointed second major in Lieutenant Colonel Erastus Cleveland's regiment. This latter position he resigned in 1816.^(g) Ephraim Clough kept a tavern at Madison and Clough's Tavern was well known in the central part of the state.^(h) It was one of the places where drovers, from farther north in the state, stopped on their way to market at New York or Philadelphia. After Ephraim's death Otis McCartney bought the property and converted it into a private residence. He died probably in April 1826. His widow died at Madison, 23 January, 1848, aged 74 years.

SYNOPSIS OF THE WILL OF EPHRAIM CLOUGH OF MADISON, NEW YORK, DATED SEPTEMBER 1, 1825

The last will and testament of Ephraim Clough was probated in Madison County, New York, April 20, 1826, Sally Clough, his wife, being named executrix.

By said will he devised all his real and personal property to his said wife except for the following bequests of cash to his children.

\$50.00, Electa, oldest daughter; m. Mr. Miller.

500.00, Solomon Clough, oldest son.

400.00, Dorcas, 2nd daughter; m. Mr. Holt.

500.00, Hamilton, 2nd son.

100.00, Diademia, 3rd daughter; m. Mr. Doolittle.

400.00, Luana, 4th daughter.

400.00, each to three youngest daughters: Sally, Juliana and Amelia Melissa.

There is no will of a Sally Clough estate, on file in Madison County, New York. Upon the death of her mother, Sarah Clough Burnett wrote the following obituary:

"Sarah Richardson Clough, widow of Ephraim Clough, died at Madison, New York, 23 January, 1848, aged 74 years. Mother Clough was born in Newton, Massachusetts, April 16, 1773. At the age of 22 she was baptized by Elder Grafton, who for 40 years was pastor of that church, and shortly after she removed with her husband to Madison, New York. Two years later she, with a few others, organized a church, probably a Baptist church, at Madison, New York. For this church she felt such a deep solicitude that all her acquaintances felt the appropriateness of the text used at her funeral, "A Mother of Israel." She loved her Bible and it was her study till her death. When past 70 she was in her Bible class giving and receiving instruction, and on her dying bed would often inquire the meaning of some passage of the scriptures. Her faith, her heart, her conduct and her conversation were moulded by divine truth. Her life was blameless, her conversation was edifying and her faith full of assurance. She seemed as much to expect heaven as to expect death. She had many months of sickness, often in great distress. She died of consumption and we doubt not is now enjoying eternal life."

He was pastor of a church at Perrysburg, Ohio, where he died 25 May 1832.⁽¹⁾ His wife and the date of his marriage, are not known. Two of his sons served in the Civil War from the State of Ohio.

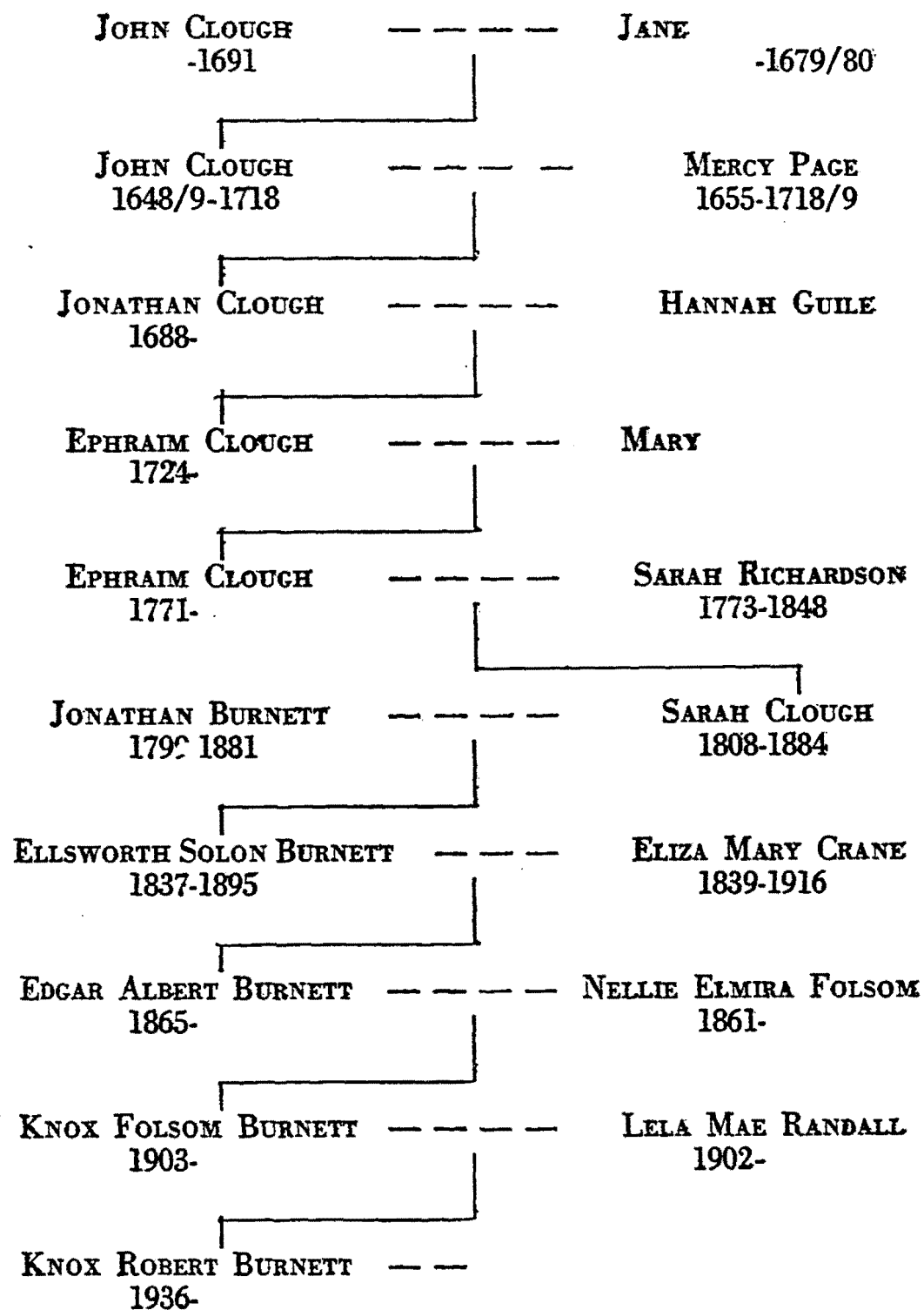

GREENE

1. THOMAS¹ GREENE was born probably in England, perhaps in Leicestershire, and died in Malden, Massachusetts, 19 December 1667. He married, first, Elizabeth ———, who was probably the mother of all his children. She died in Malden 22 August 1658. He married, secondly, 5 September 1659, Frances (Wheeler) Cook, daughter of Isaac Wheeler, of Lynn, Massachusetts, and widow of Richard Cook, by whom she had issue. She was born about 1608, and probably died before December 1667, as she was not mentioned in Thomas Greene's will. The time of Thomas Greene's arrival in New England is unknown. It is probable that he was in Ipswich or Roxbury, Massachusetts, as early as 1649, but the first positive record of him is in 1653, when his youngest daughter, Dorcas, was born. He was a selectman of Malden in 1653, 1658 and 1659. He owned a farm in the nothern part of Malden, now within the limits of Melrose, which was still in the possession of descendants late in the 19th Century. His will, dated 12 November 1667, was proved 15 January 1667/8. He did not mention a wife but named his "eldest son" Thomas, sons John, William, Henry, Samuel, and daughters Elizabeth, Mary, Hannah, Martha and Dorcas. The inventory of his estate amounted to £264.^(a)

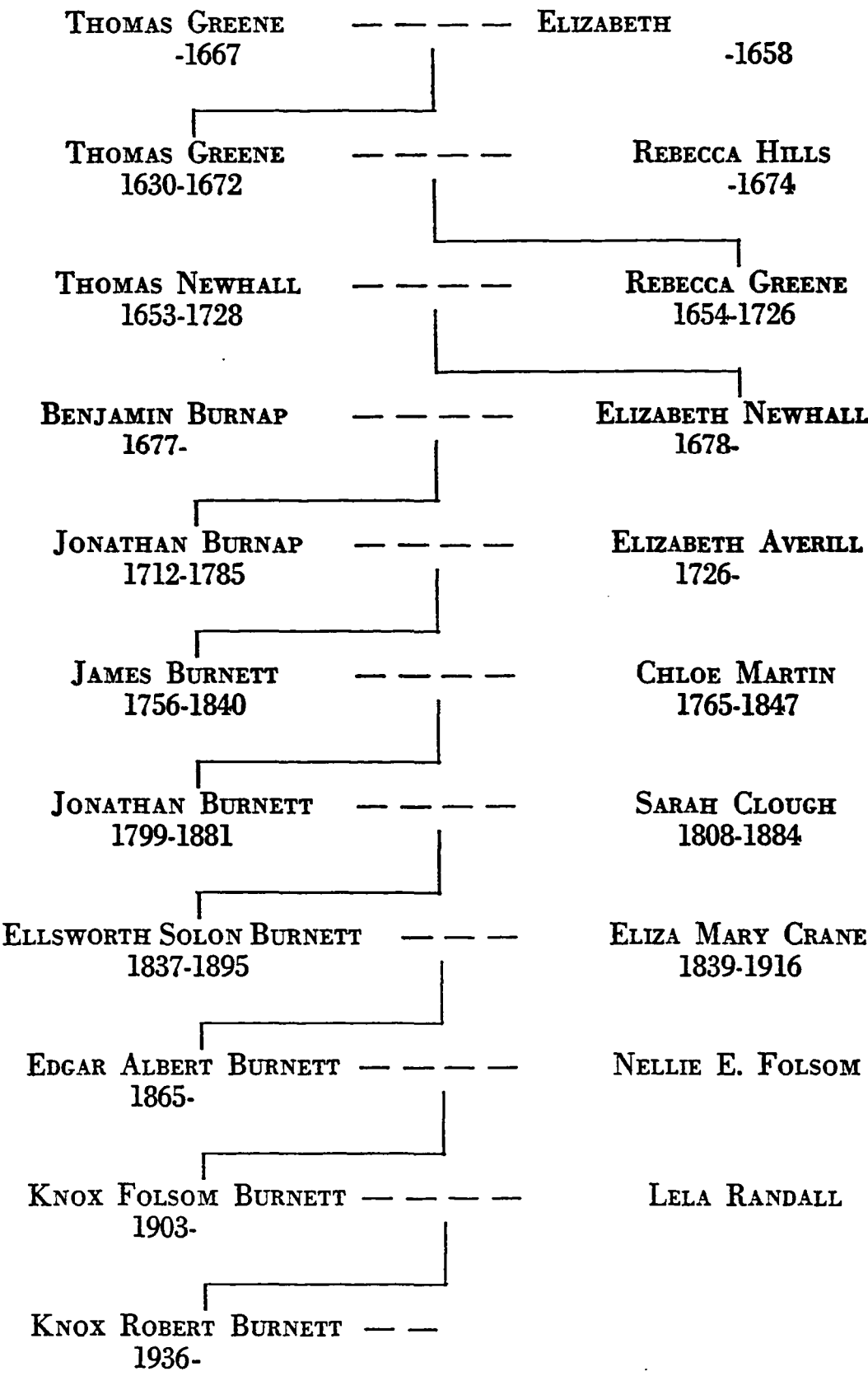

HAYWARD

1. SAMUEL¹ HAYWARD was born, probably in England, about 1613, and died in Charlestown, Massachusetts, between 5 March 1680/1 and 20 June 1681, the dates of the signing and of the probate of his will. He came to New England on the Elizabeth in 1635, aged 22 years, and settled in Charlestown, probably that part which later became Malden. He and his wife were admitted to the church 9 July 1648. He married, first, Sarah Stower, daughter of Nicholas and Amy Stower of Charlestown. It is possible that he had a second wife named Martha, for the Malden records contain the death of "Martha wife of Samuel Hayward," 6 May 1662. He married again, probably late in 1662, Mrs. Elizabeth (————) (Oakes) Sweetser, widow successively of Thomas Oakes, of Cambridge, Massachusetts, and Seth Sweetser of Charlestown. As Seth Sweetser died 21 May 1662, she could not have married Samuel Hayward before that date. She died in Malden, 12 May 1686.^(a)

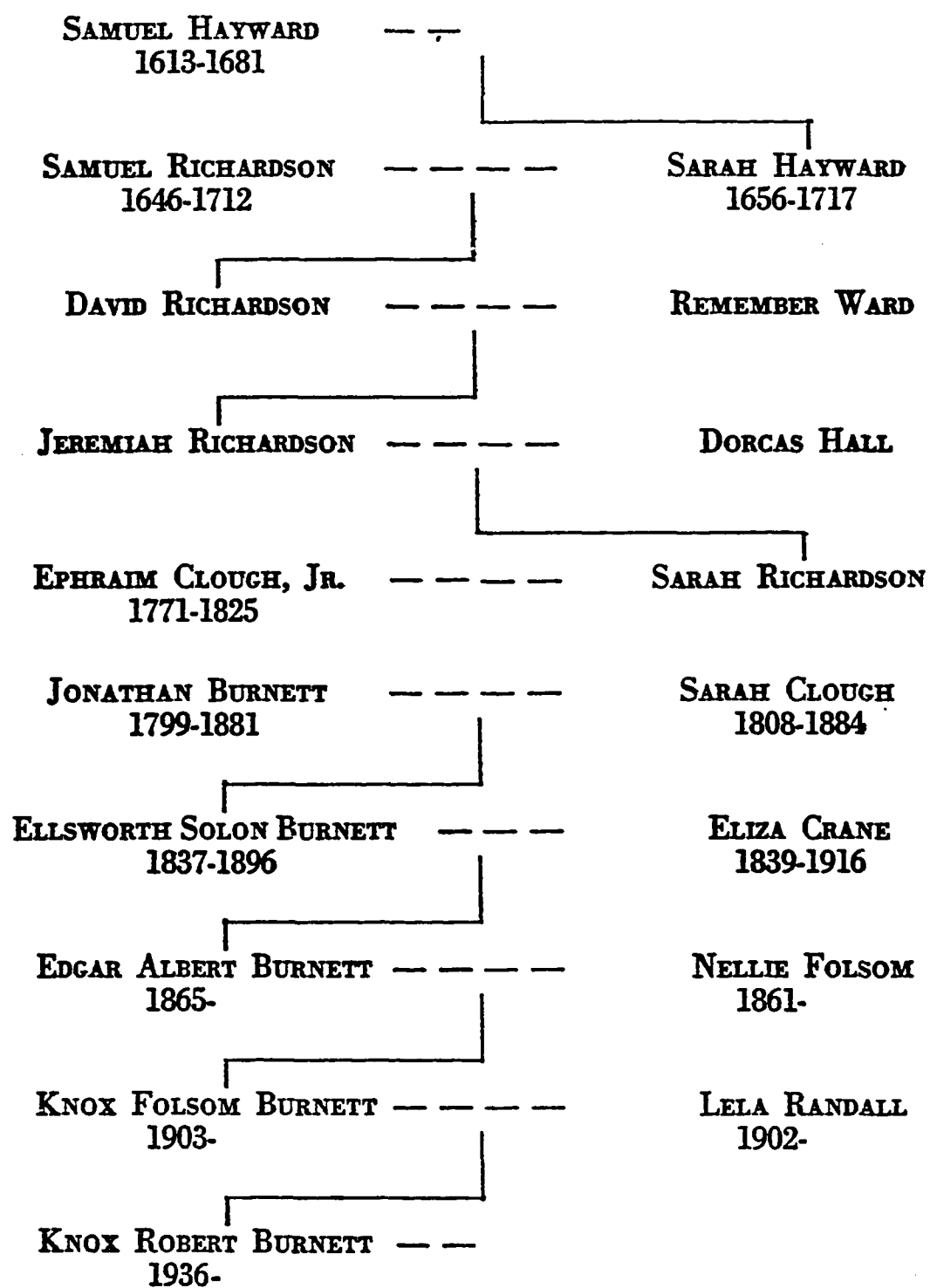

HILLS

1. JOSEPH¹ HILLS, son of George and Mary (————) (Symonds) Hilles, was baptized in the parish of Great Burstead, Billericay, county Essex, England, 3 March 1602/3. He died in Newbury, Massachusetts, 5 February 1688/9. His father was a linen draper and his mother was the widow of William Symonds, a tanner at Billericay. They were married by a general license of the Bishop of London 13 October 1596. Joseph Hills, who never used the second vowel in the name, was married at Great Burstead, 22 July 1624, to Rose Clarke, whose birth and parentage have not been discovered. She died in Malden, Massachusetts, 24 March 1650. He married, secondly, 24 June 1651, Hannah (Smith) Mellows, widow of Edward Mellows of Charlestown. He married, thirdly, in January 1656, Eleanor Atkinson, daughter of Hugh Atkinson of Kendall, county Westmoreland, England. She died in 1662. He performed this marriage himself, following the example of Governor Bellingham, and was admonished for it by the Middlesex County Court. He married, fourthly, in Newbury, in 1665, Anne, widow of Henry Lunt. Joseph Hills, his first wife, and elder children came to New England in the "Susan and Ellen" which arrived in Boston 17 July 1638 and settled first in Charlestown on the "Mystic Side" of the river. He was named selectman in 1644, and in 1646 was elected to represent Charlestown in the General Court. In 1647 he was chosen Speaker of the House of Deputies. This part of Charlestown later became known as Malden. About 1666 he removed to Newbury on the Merrimac River, having served as a Deputy to the General Court for nineteen years. He took a prominent part in the affairs of his town and of the Colony, and served on many committees and commissions. He lost his eyesight about 1678, according to a petition presented to the General Court.^(a)

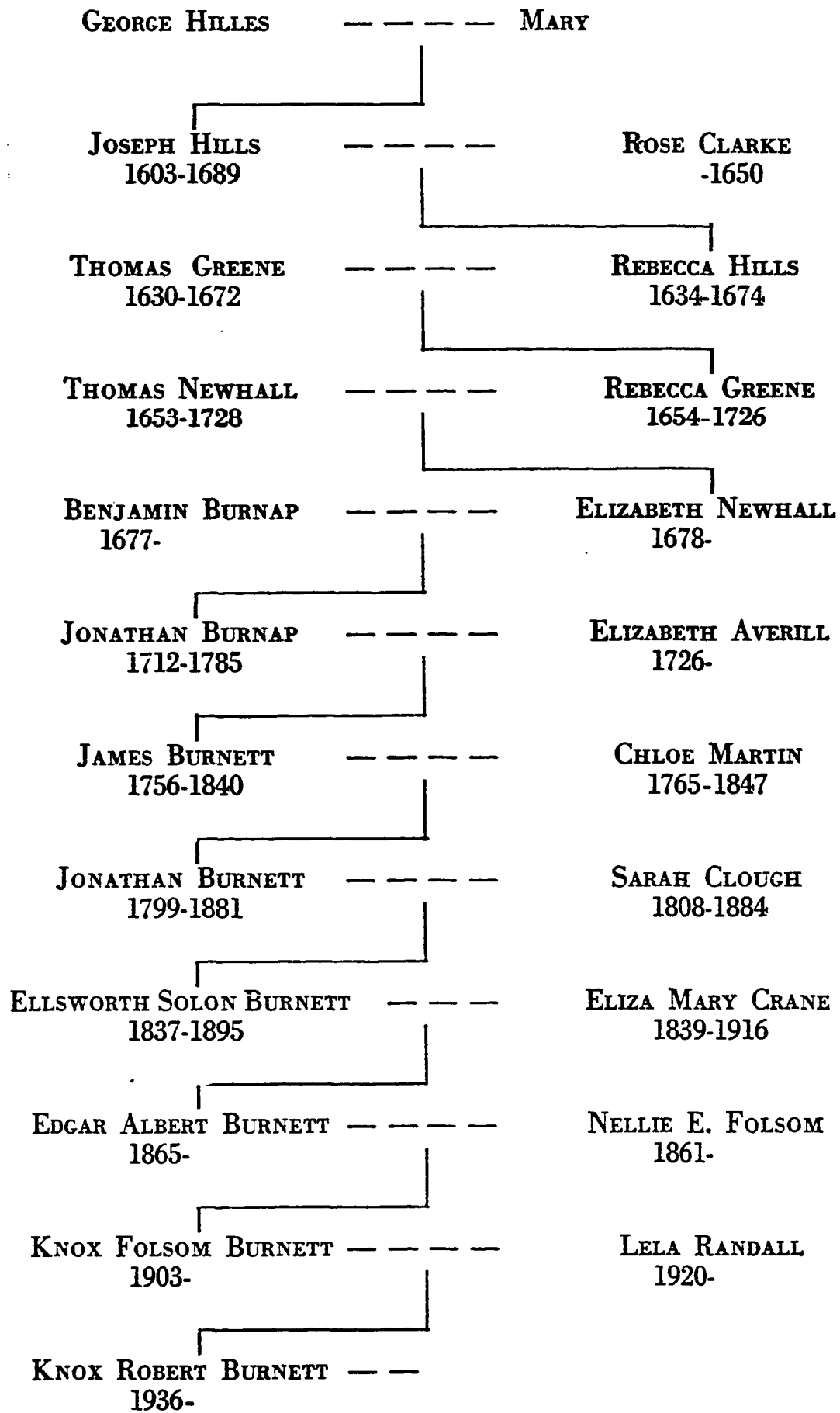

JACKSON

1. CHRISTOPHER JACKSON, of London, was a resident in the parish of Stepney, and was buried there 5 December 1633, according to the parish registers of Whitechapel and Stepney. He married and had at least the following children, baptised in the parish of Stepney.^(a)

2. EDWARD¹ JACKSON, son of Christopher Jackson, was baptized in the parish of Stepney, London, England, 3 February 1604, and died in Newton, Massachusetts, 17 June 1681, aged 79 years, 5 months, according to his gravestone. He migrated to New England about 1642 and first purchased land in Cambridge, Massachusetts, in 1643. He took the Freeman's Oath in 1645, and was admitted freeman. In 1646 he purchased the Mayhew farm in Cambridge Village, which later became Newton. Here he built a "spacious mansion, with a hall," according to the inventory of his estate. He was chosen a Deputy to the General Court from Cambridge in 1647, and was re-elected for the following seventeen years. He took a prominent part in the public life of the community, and served on many committees. An admirer and friend of the Rev. John Eliot, he attended many of Eliot's lectures to the Indians, and took copious notes on them. Incidentally, he was the first slaveholder in Newton, and when he died his inventory included two male slaves valued at £5 each.

The inventory of his estate was £2,477. 19s. 6d., a large estate for colonial days. He divided his property among his children, after leaving four hundred acres of land in Billerica to Harvard College. He married first, in England, Frances ———, who is supposed to have died on the voyage to New England. He married, secondly, 14 March 1648/9, Mrs. Elizabeth (Newgate) Oliver, daughter of John Newgate, and widow of the Rev. John Oliver (Harvard, 1645). She died in Newton, 30 September 1709, aged 92 years.^(b) All the children of his second wife were born at Cambridge.

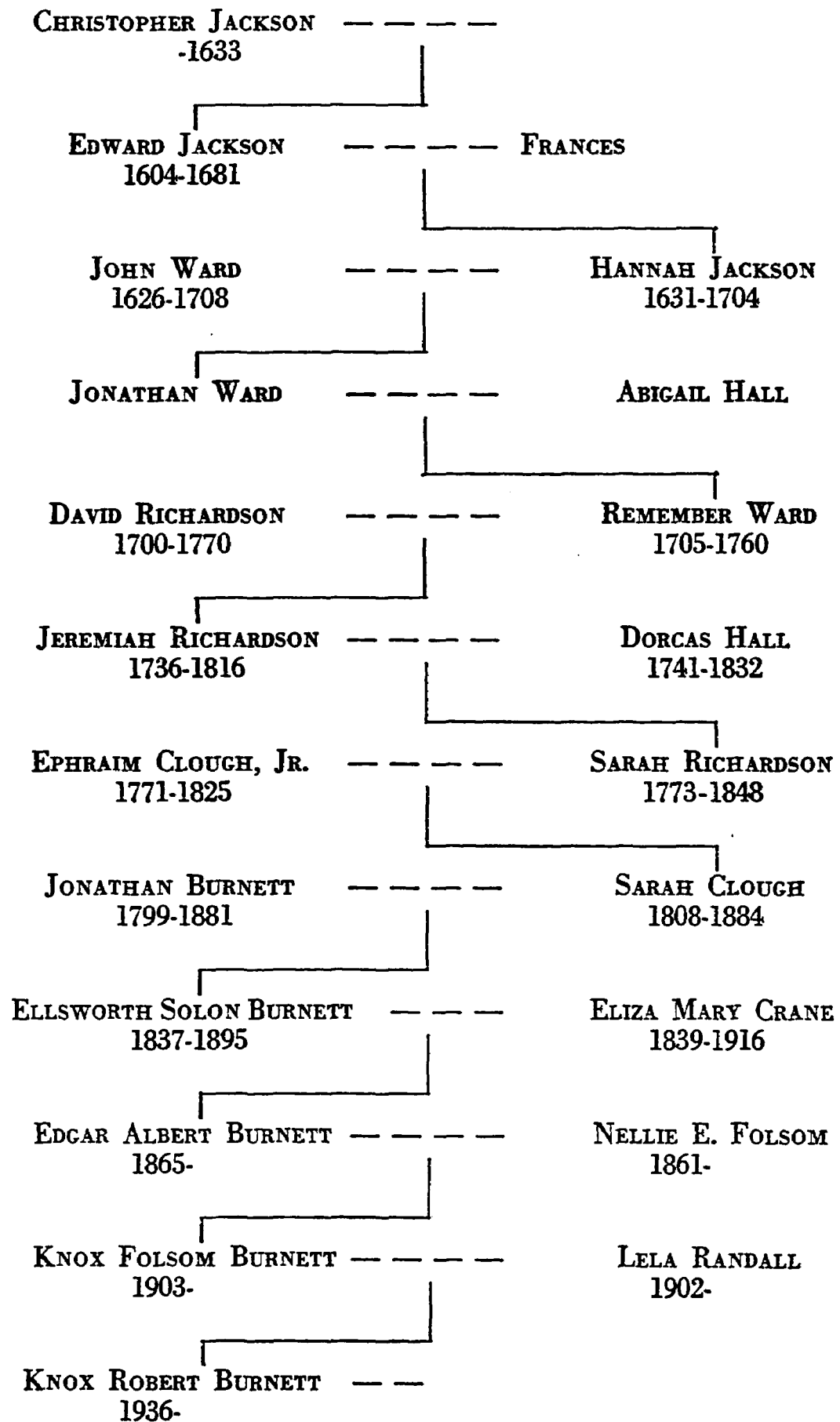

NEWHALL

1. THOMAS¹ NEWHALL came to Salem, Massachusetts, probably from England, in 1630 and died in Lynn, Massachusetts, 25 May 1674. He married, undoubtedly in England, Mary ———, who died in Lynn 25 September 1665. It is believed that Thomas Newhall had a brother Anthony, who came to Salem, and a sister Mary, who married Matthew Farrington. In the division of land at Lynn in 1630 he received thirty acres and probably settled there soon afterwards. Little is known about him, except that he was a farmer, and probably a quiet man. His will was dated 1 April 1668, and proved 3 June 1674. He mentioned his sons Thomas and John, his daughters Susanna Haven and Mary Browne, his "sons" (i.e. sons-in-law) Richard Haven and Thomas Browne, and several of his grandchildren. The inventory of the estate was £173, 1s, 7d.^(a)

2. THOMAS² NEWHALL (*Thomas¹*) was born in Lynn, Massachusetts, in 1630 and was buried there 1 April 1687. He married, 29 December 1652, Elizabeth Potter, daughter of Nicholas and Emma Potter, of Lynn. There is no record of her birth. She was buried in Lynn 22 February 1686/7. He was the first white child born in Lynn, and at the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of the town he, "a man of respectability," was seated with the dignitaries at the head of the table at the old Anchor Tavern, where a banquet was held. He was noted for the cider produced in his mill, which, aside from the accident of his birth, was his only claim to fame. He was involved in a lawsuit in 1663, when he was accused of striking the wife of William Longley with a pole, but the evidence in the suit is conflicting and it is difficult to say who provoked the assault. All his children were born in Lynn^(b)

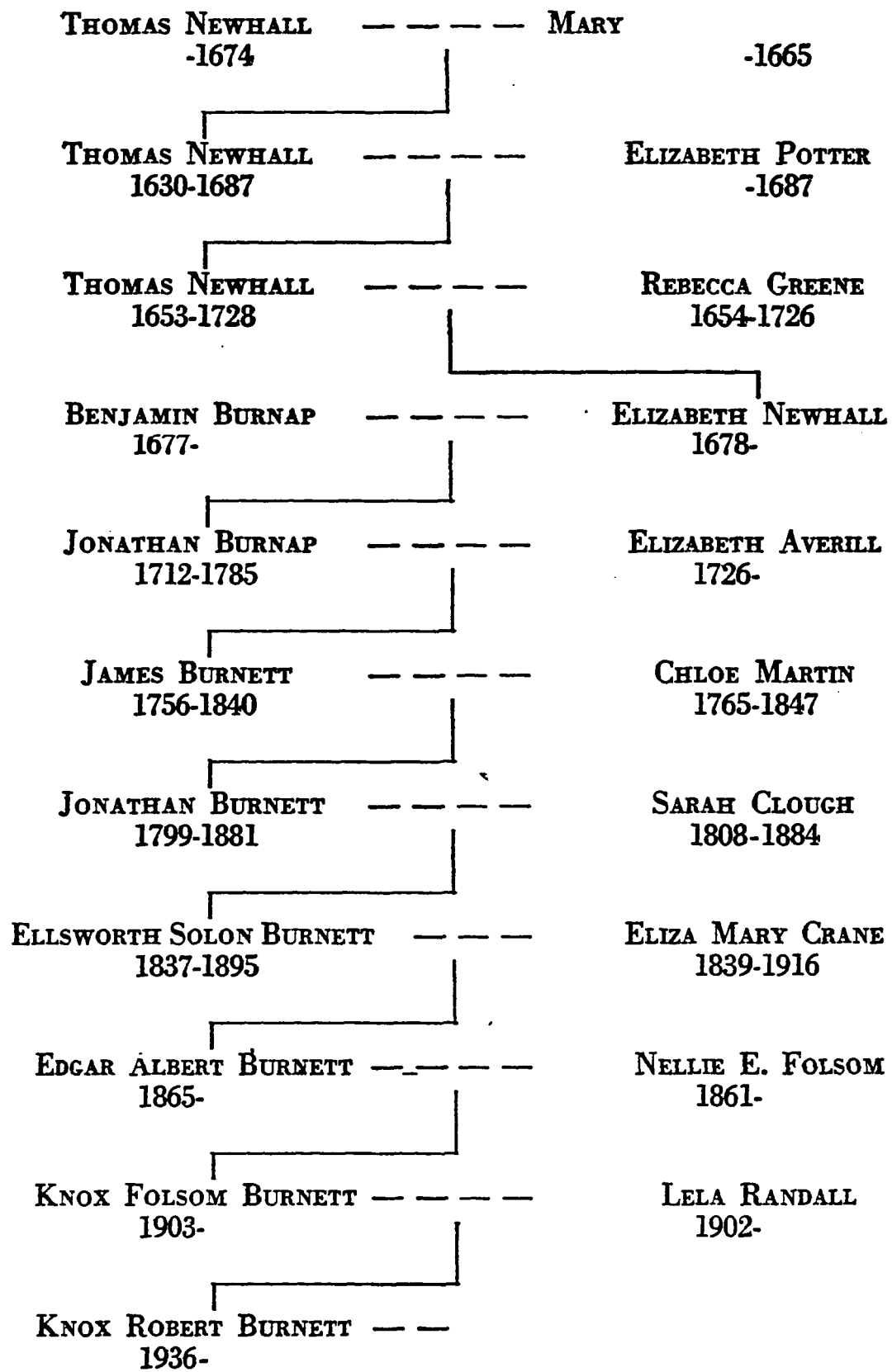
3. THOMAS³ NEWHALL (*Thomas²⁻¹*) was born in Lynn, Massachusetts, 18 November 1653, and died in Malden, Massachusetts, 13 July 1728. He married, in November, 1674, Rebecca Greene, daughter of Thomas and Rebecca (Hills) Greene of Malden. She was born about 1654 and died 25 May 1726 in the 73rd year of her age, according to her gravestone in Malden. All their children were born in Malden. It is probable that Thomas³ Newhall moved to Malden at the time of his marriage, for Joseph Hills, grandfather of Rebecca (Greene) Newhall, deeded land to him and his wife in Malden 9 November 1674. On the death of his wife's mother, he was granted administration of her estate, 4 March 1674/5. He was a soldier in King Philip's War, and later became a Lieutenant in the local Train Band. He was a selectman of Malden in 1700, 1701, 1702, and 1712.^(c)

1. NICHOLAS¹ POTTER was in Lynn, Massachusetts, as early as 1634; he died there 18 October 1677, eight days after he made his will. He married, first, Emma ———, about whom there is no further data to be found. He married, secondly, probably late in 1658, Alice, widow of Thomas Weeks, who had died 26 January 1658. She died 26 January 1659. He married, thirdly, Mary Gedney, daughter of John and Sarah Gedney of Salem, Massachusetts. She was probably born about 1640-1645. She married, secondly, Joseph Boyce, of Salem, and was living as late as 1696, when she quit-claimed some property to the Potters. Nicholas Potter was a mason. In 1646 he was licensed by the court to draw wine, and in 1660 appears to have removed to Salem. His will was dated 10 October 1677, and proved 9 November 1677. He named his wife, his father-in-law John Gedney, and his children Robert, Elizabeth Newhall, and Samuel, Benjamin, Sarah, Mary, Hannah and Bethiah.^(a)

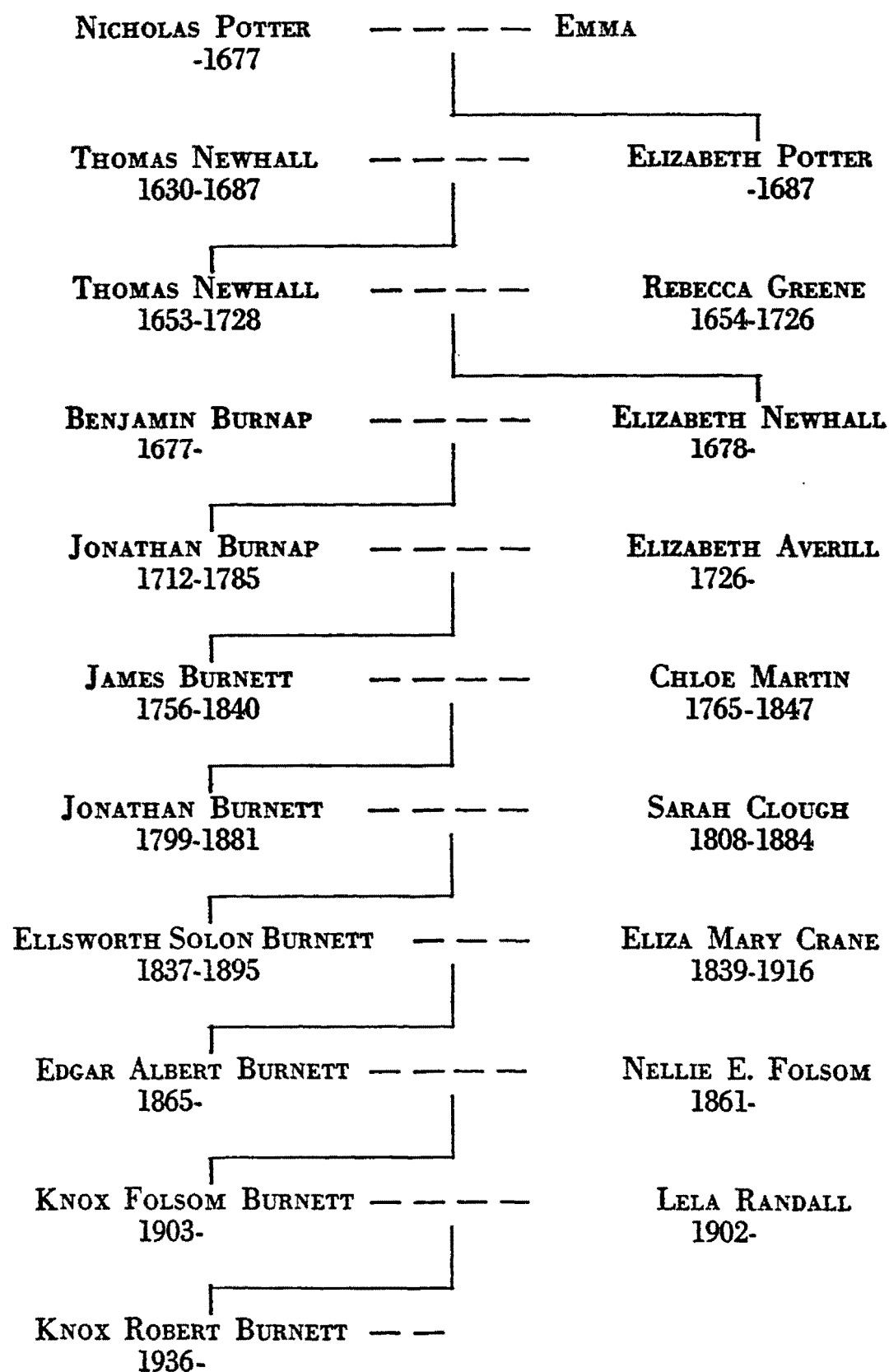

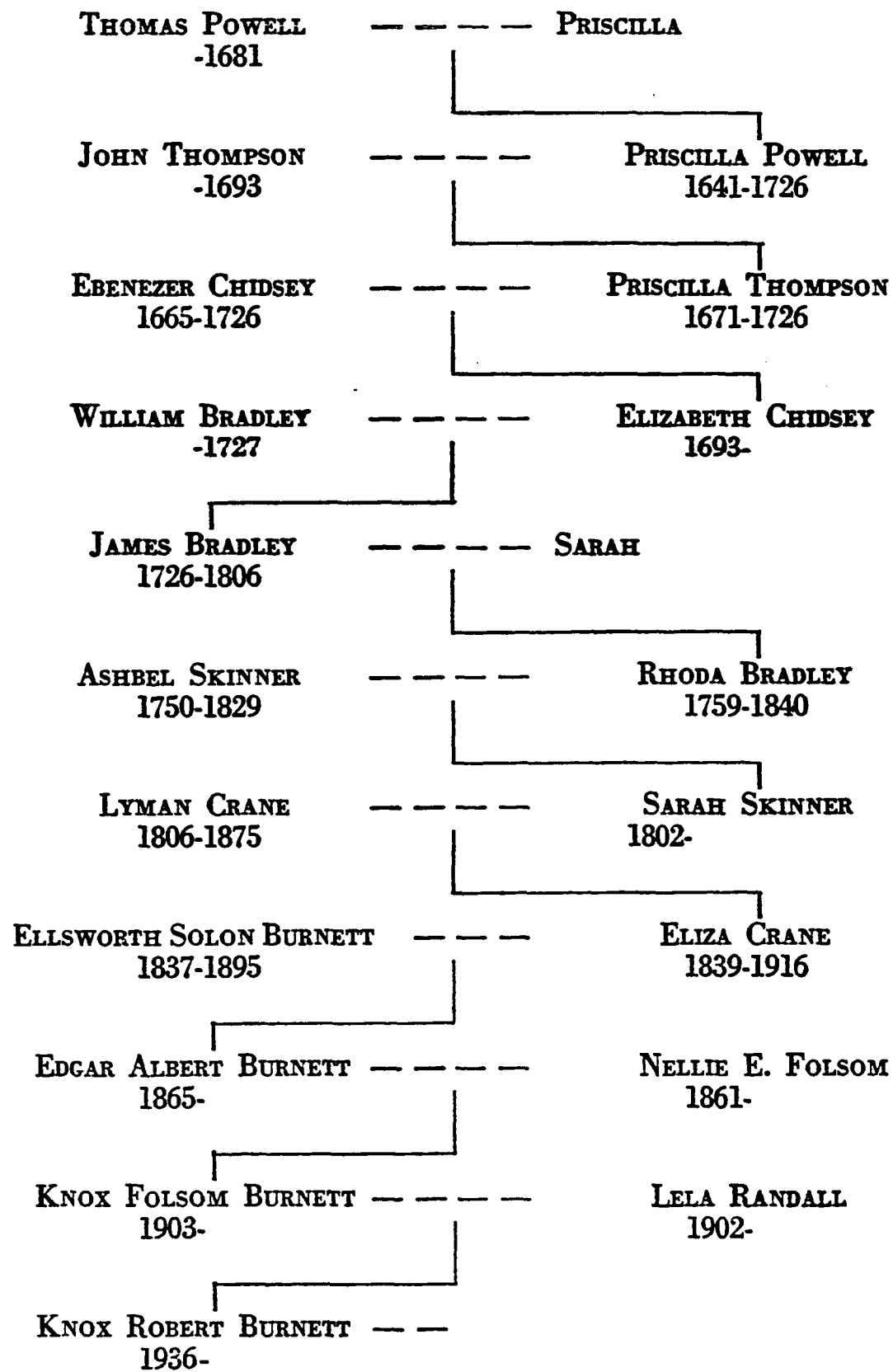

RICHARDSON

1. THOMAS RICHARDSON was of Standon, county Herts, England, in 1590; he died in West Mill, the neighboring parish, and was buried there 8 January 1633. He probably removed to West Mill about 1592-93, as the first child to be baptized in that parish was brought to the font in January 1593. His will was dated 4 March 1630, and proved by his son Samuel 31 July 1634. He mentioned his wife Katherine, and sons Samuel, John, James, and Thomas. Ezekiel was not mentioned, probably because he had migrated to New England and had perhaps received his share of the small estate. He married, at West Mill, 24 August 1590, Katherine Duxford, of West Mill. All their children were baptized at West Mill, county Herts, except the first. She was buried in West Mill, 20 March 1631, after her husband's will was drawn, but before it was probated.^(a)

2. SAMUEL¹ RICHARDSON, son of Thomas and Katherine (Duxford) Richardson, was baptized at West Mill, county Herts, England, 22 December 1602 (or 1604), and died in Woburn, Massachusetts, 23 March 1658. He was living in England as late as 1635, and probably emigrated to New England that year, for he appeared in Charlestown, Massachusetts, 1 July 1636. He removed to Woburn, Massachusetts, before 1642, and lived there the remainder of his life. He married, before 1633, Joanna ———, who died in Woburn, Massachusetts, about 1666.^(b)

4. DAVID³ RICHARDSON (*Samuel*²⁻¹) was born in Woburn, Massachusetts, 14 April 1700 and died in Newton, Massachusetts, 25 July 1770, aged 71 (another record says aged 70—he was in his 71st year). He married, first, in Newton, 21 May 1724, Esther Ward, daughter of Edward and Grace (Lovering) Ward. She was born in Newton 1 March 1702 and died there 20 February 1725/6. He married, secondly, her cousin, Remember Ward, daughter of Jonathan and Abigail (Hall) Ward. 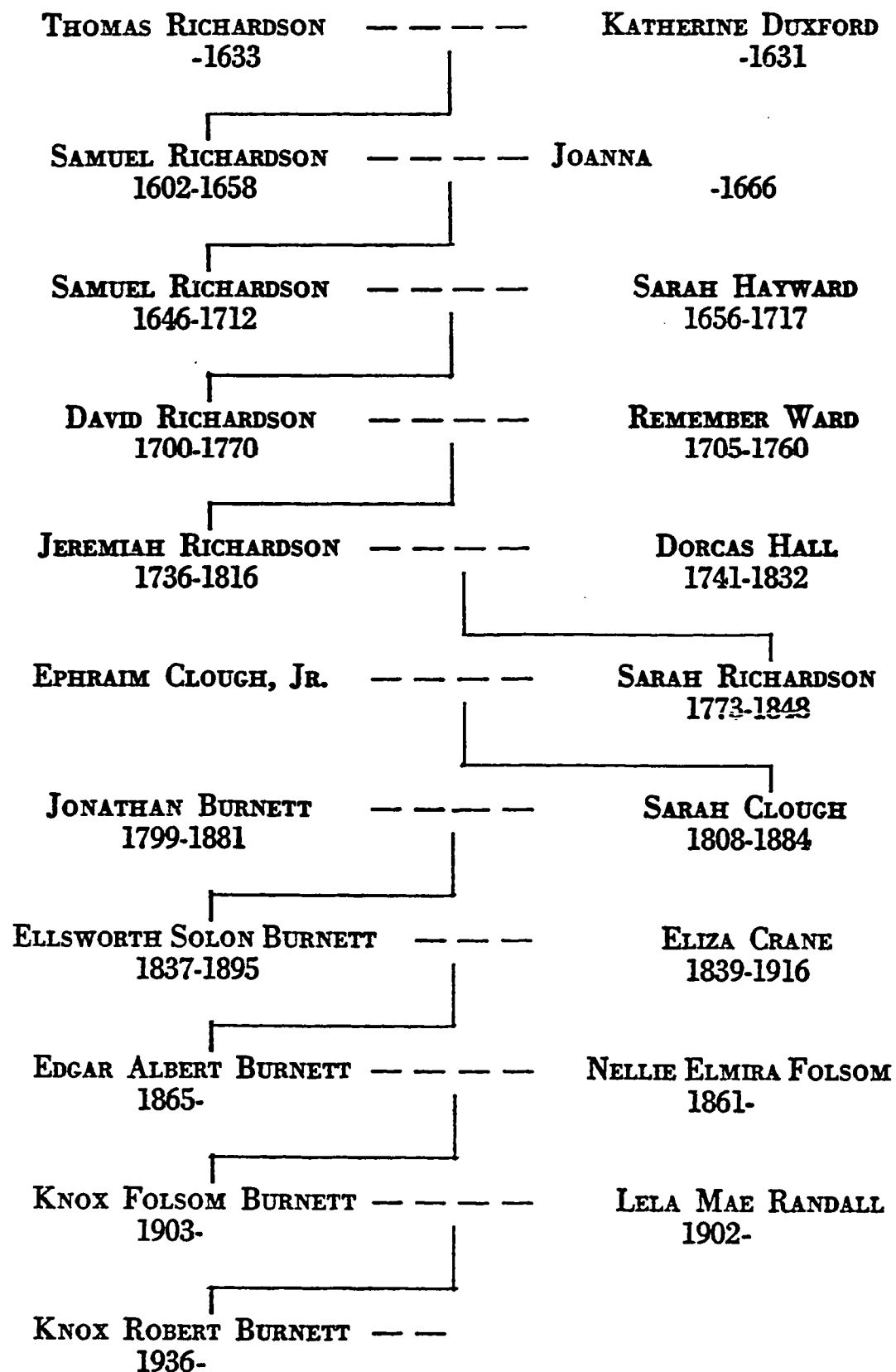

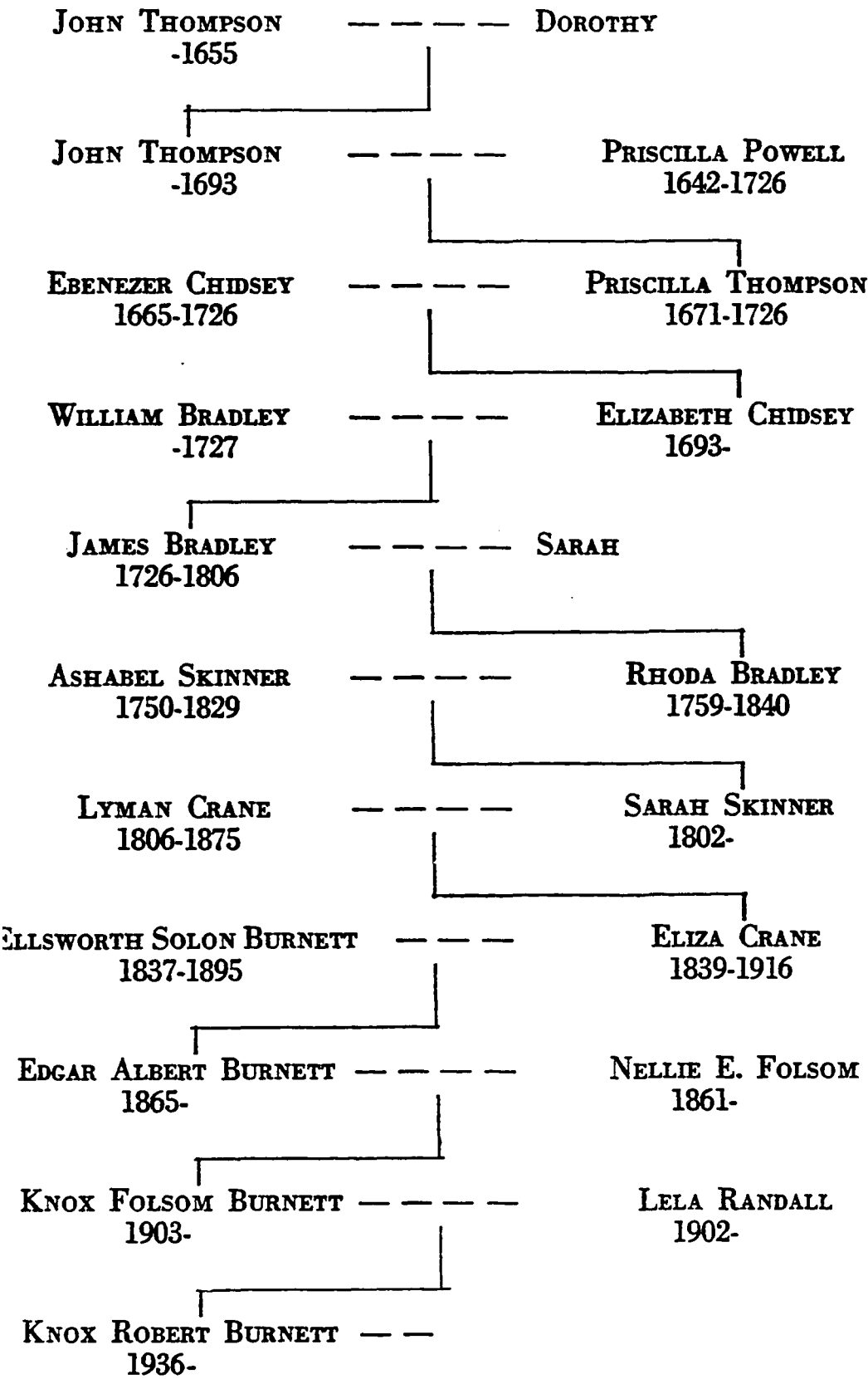

2. JOHN² WARD (*William*¹) was born in England about 1626, died in Newton, Massachusetts, 2 July 1708, aged 82 years, and was buried in the Centre Street Cemetery. He came to New England with his father and probably lived first at Sudbury. Later he settled in Newton, where he became a prominent man. He was chosen one of the first board of selectmen, 27 August 1679, and sat on that board for nine years. He was the town's first Representative to the General Court, after the organization of the town, and continued in that office eight years. He gradu-

ally acquired lands in Newton until, by 1701, he owned five hundred acres, which he then distributed by deed of gift among his sons. 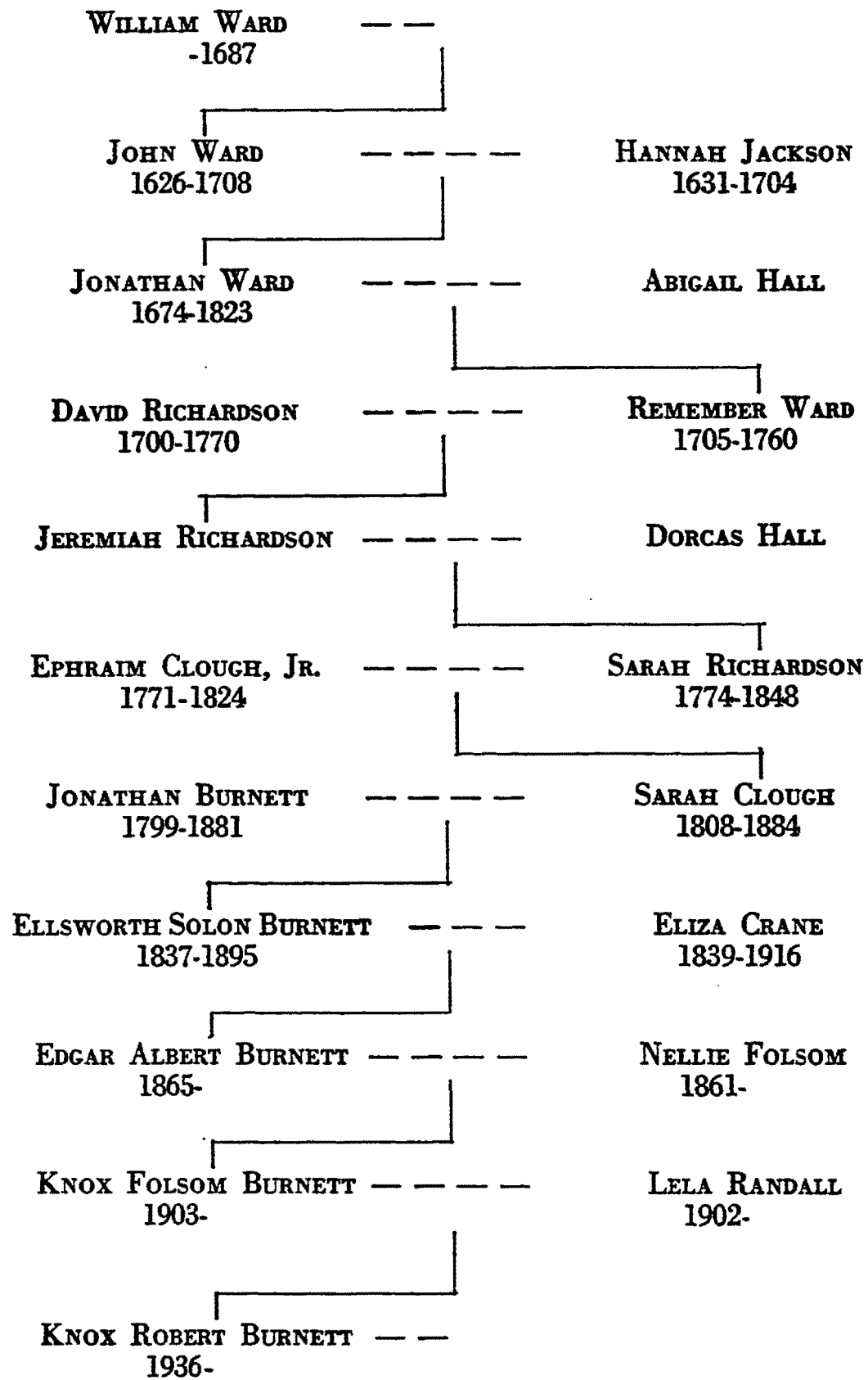
