## PREFACE.

This record of one branch of an early Rhode Island family was at first intended as a brief memorial of near kindred. It has, however, extended its limits beyond the author's original purpose and includes a goodly number of the descendants of William Bailey, an early resident of Newport, R. I.

As the record covers a period of nearly two centuries, it will readily be seen that completeness is far from being possible; much, however, has been accomplished in gathering up the records from various sources and placing them in a compact and durable This work of copying and arranging records, of corresform. ponding with distant members of the family and tracing relationship, has occupied considerable time and has been largely a labor of love; indeed, the bringing together the widely-scattered members of the family from the east and the west, the north and the south into one family circle and around one common fireside has been a labor not unmixed with pleasure, and it is hoped that what has been accomplished may be an incentive and a help to some one of larger opportunities to engage in the preparation of a more comprehensive genealogy of the descendants of William Bailey of Newport.

#### PREFACE.

No attempt has been made to discover the parentage or ancestry of William Bailey, or to trace the relationship, if any there be, between him and Richard Bailey, a genealogy of whose numerous and widely-scattered descendants was published some years ago, as all such efforts seem futile.

It has been the endeavor to carefully guard against errors. They will doubtless appear, however, either from inaccuracy in the source of information, or mistake in transcribing, any notice of which will be thankfully received.

The author sincerely expresses her gratitude to all and every one who has in any way contributed their kind and generous assistance in the preparation of this work. Special mention should be made of assistance kindly rendered by Mr. Charles W. Hopkins, of Providence, R. I.

## WILLIAM BAILEY.

WILLIAM BAILEY, the ancestor of the branch of the Bailey family whose record appears in the following pages, probably became a resident of Newport, R. I., soon after the settlement of the town. The partial destruction of the town records during the war of the Revolution leaves but meager gleanings concerning the lives of the early settlers of Newport. It is a matter of record, however, that June 14, 1655, William Bailey of Newport, bought of Gabriel Hicks certain land bounded partly by the sea, etc. Also, March 5, 1656, "he, called William Bailey, Sr., with Gabriel Hicks, sold Joshua Coggeshall of Portsmouth, twenty-one acres in Newport."

The tradition among the older members of the family is that he was a resident of London, and that his occupation was that of a weaver of silk ribbon.

His parentage, the place of his nativity, date of birth and death are alike unknown. His death, however, is known to have occurred some time previous to July 20, 1670.

He married Grace Parsons, daughter of Hugh and Elizabeth Parsons of Portsmouth, R. I. This would indicate that he probably came to this country while a young man and unmarried. After the death of her husband, Elizabeth married Thomas Lawton, and died some time subsequent to 1677.

Concerning Hugh and Elizabeth Parsons, the parents of Grace, the following appears upon record : Hugh was born 1613 and died 1684. July 3, 1662, he and his wife Elizabeth sold eighteen acres to Wm. Wood. Hugh was made freeman in 1663, and Aug. 10, 1667, enlisted in a troop of horse.

The date of his marriage to Elizabeth, who was the widow of Wm. England, is not known, nor is her maiden name known.

The children of Hugh and Elizabeth Parsons were Grace above mentioned, who married Wm. Bailey, and Hannah, who married first Henry Matteson of East Greenwich, from whom descended the numerous family of Mattesons of East Greenwich and West Greenwich, and secondly Charles Hazelton.

July 20, 1670, Hugh Parsons declares, "that, having taken into my custody the estate of my grandchild, Hugh Bailey, left and given him by his deceased father, William Bailey, I covenant in the sum of  $\pounds$  100, that at my death and death of present wife, my aforesaid grandson shall be true and absolute owner of all my land I now possess, with build-

ings, etc." Also April 15, 1672, "If said Hugh die before decease of wife or self, then above mentioned land shall return to my daughter Hannah or her next heir, and to daughter Hannah, to bring up grandson, is given a cow." In the will of Hugh Parsons, which was dated January 11, 1684, and proved March 14, 1684, he gives to his grandson, Hugh Bailey, at decease of wife, his house and land, and a third of his stock of movables, but if Hugh Bailey die before he enjoy it, then to his heirs. Wife to bring up grandson, and he to be helpful to her. Hugh Parsons was deputy in 1678. He and his wife were both born about 1613. He died in 1684 as above indicated, his wife some time later.

According to Austin's Genealogical Dictionary of R. I., the evidence is conclusive as to Wm. Bailey's having sons John and Hugh, and that there is ground for belief that Joseph, Edward and Stephen were also his sons.

**2.** JOHN<sup>2</sup> BAILEY (William<sup>1</sup>) married — Sutton, and resided at Portsmouth, and at Newport, R. I.

April 20, 1677, he leased a dwelling house, land and orchard of his stepfather, Thomas Lawton of Portsmouth, and agreed to pay therefor £10 per year to his mother, Grace Lawton, and  $\pounds 3$  per year to Elizabeth Sherman, a married daughter of Thomas Lawton. The agreement was to hold till the death of Grace Lawton, or until she changed her name from Lawton. On same date John Bailey gave a bond for  $f_{,80}$  to Thomas Lawton, the obligation being that he, said John Bailey, should pay £44, in such specie as is mentioned in a will or bond made by Town Council of Portsmouth, for and in behalf of Grace Bailey, widow and relict unto William Bailey, and their children; and John Bailey agrees to fulfill terms of the instrument after the death of his mother Grace. He removed to Newport, where, Sept. 25, 1682, he purchased fifty acres of land, building, garden, etc. In his will, dated May 8, 1733, and passed February 2, 1736, he makes numerous bequests to his children and grandchildren of lands in Little Compton, Portsmouth and Newport, of cattle, bills of public credit, silver, looms, weaving tackle, hay fodder, beef, butter, cheese, grain, etc., "laid in store for my use and family."

In his will, dated Aug. 18, 1711, he bequeathed to his son Edward and daughter Sarah Bailey, all his estate, real and personal, excepting his interest in Pocasset, which he gave his son John; Edward and Sarah, to allow their mother Frances a comfortable maintenance for life; his daughter Elizabeth, wife of George Manchester, had as her part a three-year-old heifer.

**5.** HUGH<sup>2</sup> BAILEY (William<sup>1</sup>) was made a freeman of the Colony at Newport, May 2, 1702. He married, 1st Anna. She died Feb. 20 or 26, 1720–1 (E. G. Records), and he married, 2d, at East Greenwich, on the 30th of May, 1724, Abigail Williams of Voluntown, Conn., by Thomas Spencer, Justice. Abigail brought £30, 15s. with her, as seen in inventory of Hugh's estate. Hugh died shortly after this marriage, in 1724.

Hugh Bailey removed from Newport and became a resident of East Greenwich some time during the period from 1696 to 1703, as appears by the record of the birth of his children.

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Abigill Bealey Late wife & now Widow to the said Hugh Bealey appered before the Town Councill to whom administration was offered to which she refused."

"Whereupon administration was offered to William Bealey Eldist son of the said Hugh Bealey who refused."

"Whereupon administration is offered to Samuel Bealey son of the said Hugh Bealey who accepts of the same, the which is allowed him he bringing such security as the Law directs."

## "Sep. ye 7<sup>th</sup> 1724."

"Samuel Bealey appeared before the Town Council with bondsmen, viz.: Joseph Wever & John Tillinghast of said Town which persons the Councill allows of & orders yt ye said Samuel Bealey hath a Leater of Administration Granted him. Ord. that the Clerke of the Councill sign & seal the same with the seal of the Councill and the said Samuel Bealey exhibited an Inventory of the Reall and Personall Estate of Hugh Bealey foresed amounting to the sum of  $\pounds 6_{36:2:}$  which Invintory is Proved according to Law."

"Joseph Bealey & Hannah Bealey chose their Brother Wm. Bealey their Guardian and Sarah Bealey chose her Brother Samuel Bealey her Guardian, ye which two persons accepts of the same."

## "Oct. 31, 1724."

"Whereas there is three Children Left by Hugh Bealey desesed wants Guardians — Whereupon the Council doe appoint Jonathan Nickols of said town Guardian to John Bealey son of the said Hugh Bealey who accepts of the same and Elisha Johnson of said Town the Council doth appoint Guardian to Jeremiah and Anne Bealey orphans of ye said Hugh Bealey who accepts ye same."

## " Dec. 27, 1724."

"The Town Council according to the Law of this Colony doe order the whole Real Estate to William Bealey Eldest son to the said Hugh Bealey deseased he paying the rest of the children their proportion of the Peart of the said Real Estate with the interest thereon according & soe soon as they or either of them shall attain to Lawful age."

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The Hugh Bailey farm is located in the westerly part of the town of East Greenwich, on the west side of the highway about one mile south of the "Seminary," so called, and is now owned and occupied by Mr. Thomas B. Cook. The estate has been in the possession of the Cook family about sixty years. The house occupied by Mr. Cook is said to have been built in the year 1782 by a Mr. Cole. It is in a good state of preservation, and is said to occupy the site of the original residence of Hugh Bailey. Easterly about one mile may be found the few remaining vestiges of the village and orchard of the unfortunate French families who were the early settlers of Frenchtown. The above location of the farm of Hugh Bailey is verified by copies of an early plat of that portion of the town.

It is probable that there have been changes in the original boundary line of the farm, and that the present farm does not include all the real estate owned by Hugh Bailey at the time of his death. It appears that on the settlement of his estate his oldest son came into possession of this farm, and that later his third son Joseph became owner of a farm in the northwesterly part of the town. This also may have been a part of his father's estate. This farm has for many years been known as the "Bailey brook farm," and has remained in the possession of the Bailey family and its descendants to the present time. George Bailey, grandson of Joseph, was the owner for many years, and after his

death it was inherited by his daughter Isabel (Mrs. George Arnold), in whose possession it now remains.

According to the family tradition, three graves located on the Hugh Bailey farm, about twenty-five rods in a northerly direction from the Thomas B. Cook house, are the graves of Hugh Bailey and his two wives. Although no inscription is found upon the rough stones that mark these graves, the conclusion is undoubtedly correct that this is their last resting place.

Caleb Bailey resided in East Greenwich until 1754. Later on, until about July, 1758, he resided in Coventry, near the "Patt Factory," so called. How long he remained here is not known, but from the West Greenwich Town Records it appears that Caleb Bailey of North Kingstown, in 1764, bought a tract of land in West Greenwich of William Waite of Exeter for £230. Here he found a more permanent dwelling place. He at first occupied a dwelling which was located about twenty rods south of the house now standing. This latter house he built, and moved into about the first of October, 1765, and occupied until the time of his death in 1803. This house has remained in the possession of the Bailey family until the present time. It is located about one mile west of Noose Neck Hill, and is

known as the Gideon Bailey House. Caleb Bailey is said to have been of a pleasant disposition, and in his old age devoted much of his time to the care of his grandchildren.

Silas<sup>5</sup> Bailey settled in West Greenwich, R. I., previous to 1779, about three miles westerly of Noose Neck Hill, on the Remington Straight farm (so called), whence he removed in 1806 or 1807, to Plainfield, Ct., and in company with his son Silas bought the Stearns place, a large stock farm on Walnut Hill, about one mile south of the village of Moosup, Ct. After living there a few years he removed with his daughter Polly (Bailey) Gardner and her two children to the town of North East, Pa., arriving there on the 27th day of June, 1819. The journey occupied one month; while on the way they stopped at Brookfield, N. Y., to visit his son, Dr. Eli Stillman Bailey. It is said that he was small of stature and active, very tenacious in his views of the seventh day Baptist Christian Sabbath; often had long discussions with his son, a Baptist minister, concerning the Sabbath day, which always ended in each of them being more fully convinced that he was in the right. They both had the true grit, which made them hold fast to what they considered right. Previous to 1827 he removed with his son, Rev. Jacob Bailey, to Kingsville, Ohio. His wife Amey died there in 1829 or 1830. After the death of his

wife he married a widow by the name of Miriam Marks, with whom he lived until his death. Joseph Bailey and wife Elizabeth had thirteen children. The eighth child died when about six months old. The remaining five sons and seven daughters were all brought up by their parents "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." They all married with the exception of the youngest, who unfortunately became weak of mind at the age of 25 or 30 years. Joseph Bailey owned and occupied the farm in West Greenwich next adjoining his father's on the south. During the war of the Revolution he served as a soldier in the Rhode Island Militia stationed to guard the shores of

the bay from the depredations of the enemy. At the expiration of his term of service he was honorably discharged, and having become permanently lame from exposure, he was granted a pension by the government of the United In those early times the usual method of travel States. was on horseback, and in this way on saddle and pillion Joseph and his wife visited their relatives and friends in Genesee, in the State of New York. Early in life Joseph became an active and devoted member of the church at Noose Neck Hill, then under the pastoral care of Elder Stephen Allen. Being an excellent singer he was chosen their leader in singing. He was fond of music, and until late in life continued to sing sweetly many hymns. One of his favorites was the well known "How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord." He was very fond of his grandchildren, and often sang to them and taught them many things from the Bible—the Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments, and also taught them to repeat the names of the books of the Bible from memory. His wife Elizabeth died in the 81st year of her age, and soon after his much loved brother Caleb, who had resided near him all his life, was also removed by death. These bereavements left him very lonely. These aged brothers had been much in each other's society, and in their advanced years were often seen walking out together, loseph supporting himself with one cane and his brother Caleb by two. Joseph survived the



death of his wife but a little more than two years. He was stricken down with apoplexy, and lived only three or four days, and passed peacefully away in his 85th year. The following lines, inscribed upon his tombstone, seem to be a just and fitting tribute to his memory : —

> "This spot contains the ashes of the just. He sought no honors and betrayed no trust; But proved in every path he trod, An honest man's the noblest work of God."

"George Bailey Brayton was an inventor of engines. He constructed a number of different patterns of these engines, some of which he put into small boats or launches; they were the primitive naphtha launches now in general use. Probably the most highly finished engine he ever built was sent to the Centennial at Philadelphia, after-

wards it ran the shop on Potter Street, Providence, R. I., and later it was sent to Sayles' Bleachery; he invented an eyelet and rivet machine. The patents of these machines were probably the most remunerative of any he ever obtained, netting him nearly fifty thousand dollars. He went to England on business in Oct., 1892, and while there died; his body was brought home in 1893. His home was Boston; his family still reside there."

Silas Bailey became owner of the homestead farm near Moosup Village, Ct., and being a carpenter and contractor

made many improvements on his farm and buildings. He was small of stature, of a nervous temperament, fond of music, a teacher of vocal music for many years. He was a strong abolitionist and an earnest temperance worker. He was benevolent to the worthy poor, and to charitable institutions and churches. He gave largely to the building fund for erecting the Academy at Plainfield, Ct., and for the maintenance of the same. His later years were saddened by the death of his wife Anna, that of his only son Silas Martin, and also by the loss of his favorite daughter Louise, who had been her father's housekeeper, and had cared for her invalid mother for many years; and later by the great misfortune of blindness. His youngest daughter, Mary Ann Smith, now a widow, came to live with him to assist and care for him in his old age. Early in life he united with the Congregational Church, of which he was a devout member until the time of his death. He died peacefully at the ripe age of 87 years. His remains are buried in the family lot at Moosup Cemetery.

Benoni Smith and two of his daughters died in the South just previous to the Civil War. The widow, Mary Ann (Bailey) Smith and her children, suffering from malaria, their physician advised immediate change of climate. She
therefore came North with her children, leaving her estate in the hands of attorneys for settlement. During the War a large part of the city was burned, and all her documents destroyed and the greater part of her property lost. She located at Putnam, Ct., for a while, where she carried on the millinery business. Later she purchased her father's homestead near Moosup, Ct., and settled down to private life. She was social and generous, fond of entertaining company. She read much, and was possessed of an excellent memory. She was also accomplished in fine needle work and painting. She used much of her time and means in educating her children and teaching them to be good and honorable members of society. Her sons are all temperance advocates and opposed to the use of tobacco. Early in life she united with the Baptist Church, of which she was a consistent member, and finally, after a long and painful illness, passed away at her childhood's home, "strong in faith and rejoicing in the Lord."

Later, however, he attended private schools, and still later public schools. He took an academic course under the private instruction of Professor Hall. He studied medicine three years with Dr. William A. Lewis of Moosup, Ct., and one year with Dr. F. S. Abbott, a popular surgeon of Norwich, Ct. He then

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took a medical course at the University of Vermont, after which he graduated from the University of New York City in 1873. He is a prominent member of the Baptist Church, was formerly a staunch republican, but is now an earnest worker for the Prohibition party, and a member of the Prohibition State Central Committee. He is strongly in favor of Woman Suffrage, and is a member of the State Association; also a member of the Women's Suffrage League of his own town. He is a member of the Rhode Island Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and one of the officers of the Executive Board. He is in fact a moral reformer in general. He is a member of the Rhode Island Medical Society and the American Medical Association. He began the practice of his profession in Greene, R. I., in the spring of 1873. About six years later he married Miss Evangeline H., dau. of Dr. Allen and Lois (Waite) Tillinghast of Washington, R. I. After the death of Dr. Tillinghast he succeeded him in his practice, where he is now residing and doing a large and successful business.

Concerning Eli Stillman Bailey, his youngest brother, Rev. Jacob Bailey of Beloit, Wisconsin, writes: "Previous to his fifteenth year his advantages of education were very small. He was an apt scholar for one of his opportunities, and at early life developed a great desire for intellectual culture. In his 15th year he went to the village of Pawcatuck to attend school, preparatory to the study of medicine. He continued there, pursuing literary and medical studies, about five years. His medical preceptor, Dr. Lee, having died, he went to Exeter, R. I., and completed his studies with Dr. Thomas Moore, after which he became his successor by purchase. About this time, in 1806, he married Marcy Clarke, dau. of James Clarke, Esq., of Exeter, R. I. He continued in the practice of his profession at that place until the autumn of 1809, when with his brother-in-law he removed from Rhode Island and settled in Brookfield, N.Y., in the valley of Beaver Creek. Here he endured the privations and hardships of a new country in the practice of his profession. Some three or four years after his settlement at Brookfield he established himself near the cross-roads or four corners, near the centre of the town, and the place became known by the name of Bailey's Corners. On his set-

tlement in Brookfield he connected himself with the Seventh Day Baptist Church. After a few years the church encouraged him to commence preaching the Gospel. He had been deeply exercised upon the subject for years, but he wished to be fully satisfied in his own mind before undertaking so great a work. After repeated calls from the church, taking this as a confirmation of the correctness of his own convictions, he made the attempt, and was soon after licensed to preach. From that time, about 1815, during the remainder of his active life, he continued to labor as physician and preacher, honorably and successfully. He also became a popular lecturer in the several reforms, Temperance, Moral Reform and Anti-Slavery. At the formation of the Second Seventh Day Baptist Church in 1823, he became a member thereof and was elected its pastor. Most of his pastoral labors were with this church. He possessed a most vigorous physical constitution, enabling him to perform a great amount of labor and endure much fatigue until old age. He seldom was unable to perform his professional duties. In person he was tall and crect, with a full chest. His physical temperament was a combination of nervous and sanguine. He lived about fifty-six years in the town of Brookfield, and nearly fifty years in the same house; his wife, with whom he lived about half a century, died about four years before him. His children having all left him, he went to live with his eldest daughter. In 1861 he

decided to spend most of the year in visiting his friends, and also in visiting the churches and associations. He visited his former acquaintance, then living in Wisconsin, and spent some time with his brother, Rev. Jacob Bailey, at Beloit. After this he went to Illinois to visit his second daughter. While there he was stricken down with paralysis of the right side. In a few months he so far recovered as to be removed to his home in Brookfield, where he wished to die and be buried. As soon as he could talk he would often exclaim, "Glory! Glory!" and would often say, "tell it to the family, tell it to the church." He lived some four years after this, and on the sixth day of October, 1864, closed his earthly pilgrimage, aged 81 years. His funeral sermon was preached by Rev. J. M. Todd, from the language of the great Apostle, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith : henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give to me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing." The inscription on his tombstone, "Earnest, Faithful and True."

He sold his property in Kingsville, and bought in Perry, about thirty miles away, and removed to that place, his father and mother going with him. After four or five years the Baptist Church at Ashtabula gave him an urgent call to become their pastor. He remained with them some four or five years, then went to his farm in Perry, Lake County, Ohio. During his pastorates he was active in all the interests of the Baptist denomination, was chosen moderator of the association for ten consecutive years, was foremost in all the reforms of the day, was an ardent anti-slavery man. He handled the great national wrong without gloves, thereby making enemies; but "right was right," and his mission was to preach the truth. Also the great evil of intemperance he fought with all the force and power there was in him. He was small of stature and in personal appearance very much like his father. He removed to Beloit, Wisconsin, in 1851, where he died Oct. 21, 1867.

At a meeting of the Clinton County bar, held at the Court House, the following was adopted, accompanied by glowing eulogies from members present: —

BRETHREN OF THE BAR: — Since the last meeting of the Court, Major E. S. Bailey, a member of this bar for the past thirty-six years, has been removed from his place among us by the hand of death.

He was one of the ablest and most eminent lawyers of this

State, and as a lawyer and business man he was well known throughout a large portion of the Northwest. He was profound and far seeing in the management of the business of his profession in all its departments, and he was also frank and honorable, and everywhere maintained a high character for integrity, both in and out of his profession.

In the argument of his cases he was always clear, forcible, and oftentimes, when the magnitude of his case inspired it, he was profound and eloquent.

His presence and bearing among his brethren of the bar was always gentle, yet dignified. He was kind and sympathetic, yet his mental poise was such that he seldom manifested excessive emotion, either of joy or sorrow, and his powers of mind were always under manly and appropriate control.

Though of fine presence and in apparent good health, he nevertheless suffered from physical infirmity, and, no doubt, those ills and pains softened and mellowed his views of life. But if he suffered he bore it like a philosopher, and in his short, last illness, when the end was nearing and he was called to walk through the "valley and shadow of death," he feared no evil. He even gracefully waived his adieus, as was his wont in life, with apparent composure, and then tried to soften the bitterness of last farewells with the sunshine of his gentle smiles. Surely such a life has not been lived in vain, and such a death is a triumph so complete, a victory so magnificent, that we must rejoice while we mourn mourning his absence and his loss, we exult that our brother so courageously accepted the most momentous challenge that falls on mortal ears and so signally triumphed over the last enemy, Death.

His warfare is ended. His last cause in earthly courts is tried; and we humbly hope that in that Court where there is no error and from whose august decrees there is no appeal, he will hear the welcome "Well done, good and faithful servant."

Mary<sup>5</sup> Bailey married Amos Carpenter, son of John Carpenter and Sarah Stone of West Greenwich, R. I. She was a very intelligent but quiet woman, and spent her life in working for her family. Amos Carpenter followed the business of farming for a few years. Was a natural mechanic and an excellent boot and shoe maker, measuring the foot and making boots and shoes to order. Was a good cooper and carpenter, and was employed for a while as overseer in cotton mills in Rhode Island. During the depression of business in 1837, he with his family moved to a farm in the eastern part of Pomfret (now Putnam), Ct., where he and his wife died. Amos and his wife were earnest and devoted Baptists,

and when it was thought best to build a Baptist meeting house in Putnam, Amos with his boys and ox team worked earnestly to prepare the foundation for the building, as well as to use his influence and money in establishing the church on a firm foundation.
