DERIVATION OF THE NAME, AND ORIGIN OF THE FAMILY OF
BRIGHT (BRYGHT, BRITE, BRIGHT, BRECHT, ETC.)

Bright is a word derived from the Anglo-Saxon language (beorht, bryht), meaning "radiant, brilliant, shining, sparkling," etc. The surname Bright originated, like many other family names, from what was at first a Christian or baptismal one. Thus, the personal name Bright came to have the meaning: "the son of Bright." In early English records, the name is found in various forms, as Brighte, Bryght, Brite, Bright, Brecht, etc. It was often used combined, as an affix or suffix, to form such names as Brightwen, or Albrecht (now Albert). See "A Dictionary of English and Welsh Surnames," by Charles T. Bardsley, London, 1901.

There were Brights in England from early times. Bardsley mentions those of the name (in combined forms) in County Suffolk at the time of "Doomsday Book" (the census or landowners' list, taken by command of William of Normandy when he conquered England in 1066 A. D.). The Hundred Rolls, 1273 A.D., list a number of Brights, including a Hervey Brite, in County Norfolk, and a William Bright, in County Norfolk. Many more Brights are to be found in early English records.

Although our branch of the family traces its earliest authentic history to one Christoph Brecht, born 1591, Heudorff, Germany, it is supposed that at some more ancient period, the family was domiciled in England. One of the reasons for this belief is a general tradition which has come down in the family from the first Bright in America, that his ancestor went from England to Germany, whence he fled to save his life, because of political or religious beliefs adverse to those in power in England.

The name was spelled "Brecht" in Germany; Michael Brecht, Sr., the Emigrant, spelled it that way, but his son, Michael, signed himself as Michael Bright. Judge Albert Gallatin Green, in his paper on the Bright family prepared for the Berks County, Pennsylvania, Historical Society, in commenting on this change, says: "The original spelling of the name was 'Brecht.' . . . The first usage of the word Bright I find in the signature of Michael, third son of Michael, the Elder. . . . Why, in Anglicizing the word Brecht, it took the form Bright is not clear. The word Brecht is not to be found in the German lexicon. . . . It is not unlikely that the Bright family of England may have been descended from the Brechts of Germany and that this change in the name was known to the emigrant's family." ("Historical Sketch of the Brights Family," prepared at the request of the Historical Society of Berks County, Pa., by Albert Gallatin Green, 1900.)

ANCESTRY OF HENRY BRIGHT, SR.

Henry Bright, Sr., founder of the Bright family of Lincoln County, Kentucky, came to Kentucky when a young man from Pennsylvania, where he was born in 1760. He was the oldest of ten children of John Brecht (Bright) and Margaret Schaeffer, his wife. One of the first entries in the old book of the Reformed Church of Schaefferstown, Pennsylvania, records the baptism, on November 24, 1760, of Henry, son of John Brecht and wife, with sponsors Alexander Schaeffer and wife. (See Biographical Sketch of Alexander Schaeffer, further on.)

Henry Bright, Sr., was a third-generation American, his grandfather, Michael Brecht, the Elder, having emigrated to America from the Palatinate in 1726, and settling first at Germantown, Pennsylvania, married 1728, Margareta, daughter of Jacob Simone, recently emigrated from France.

Regarding the family of our ancestor, the late Judge Green, in his work previously mentioned, states:

"It is not often that a family is so fortunate as to trace its remote ancestors beyond the first immigration. But in the case of the Bright family, by the recent efforts of George D. Bright, a great-great-grandson of the emigrant's eldest son, Jacob, the dusty and mutilated records of the Lutheran Church at Schriessheim have been carefully searched at some expense. From them it appears that a certain Christoph Brecht died there in 1665, at the age of 74, and his wife, Anna, in 1683, at the age of 85, and had removed thither from Neudorff, where he was born in 1591.

"The same records further disclose that Christoph Brecht had a son named Balthaser, born in 1636, who was married on the 24th of August, 1658, to Anna Margareta Christman; that he was a councilman and almoner of the town; and had 14 children, and that his death occurred September 9, 1703, at the age of 67. Of the 14 children, the third was named Johannes. He was born October 12, 1662, and was married July 29, 1684, to Anna Katharine, daughter of Hans Yost Hoffman, a councilman of the village. Among the children of Johannes Brecht was one named Johann Michael, who was born, says the church record, May 30, 1706, and who had sponsor at his baptism Hans Michael Hoffman. It would appear that Johann Michael dropped his prenominal, probably to distinguish him from his father, Johannes, as he was known after he left his home for America only as Michael Brecht. This Michael Brecht was the emigrant who first settled at Germantown."

Soon after his arrival in America, Michael Brecht moved on westward, to the fertile valley of the Lebanon, settling in the locality known as Heidelberg Township, near the present town of Schaefferstown. There he acquired land, engaged in the occupation of farming, which proved prosperous. He and his wife

raised a family of ten children, all of whom married and went to establish homes of their own. His children having scattered, in 1762, Michael Brecht sold his estate, but continued to reside in Schaefferstown until after the death of his wife in 1778. About 1782, he removed to Reading, Pa., where two of his sons were living. There he lived until his death, which occurred on September 13, 1794, at the ripe age of 88.

Michael Brecht was a naturalized citizen, he having appeared before the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania on September 14, 1744, and subscribed to the oaths required. The lists of persons taking the Oath of Allegiance, 1777-78, in Schaefferstown and vicinity, include the names of John Brecht, his two sons, Jacob and John, and his brother-in-law, Alexander Schaeffer.

ALEXANDER SCHAEFFER, born at Wurtemberg, Germany, January 8, 1712; died in Pennsylvania, April 10, 1786; emigrated to America with his wife, Anna Engel; arrived at Philadelphia, Pa., in the ship "Robert and Alice", September 11, 1738. He settled in the Lebanon Valley, in the vicinity of the present town of Schaefferstown (named for him, as its founder). In 1758, he bought a tract of land in Heidelberg Township, and laid out city lots, and systematically planned the town which after his death came to be known as Schaefferstown. He subscribed to the Oaths to the Government in 1738; he took the Oath of Allegiance in 1777.

Alexander Schaeffer's wife, Anna Engel, died in 1772, and he subsequently married again; his second wife's name was Catharine.

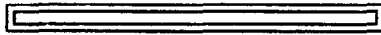

HENRY BRIGHT, SR., "THE PIONEER"

(Born 1760; died 1858)

When Henry Bright, Sr., came to Kentucky, it was mostly a wilderness, filled with Indians and wild animals. Only a few permanent settlements of civilized inhabitants existed; one of the first of these was at St. Asaph's Spring, one mile from the present town of Stanford; it was established by Gen. Ben Logan, in the year 1775.

Kentucky (then a part of Virginia) had been opened to civilized habitation by the daring explorations and trail-blazing of Daniel Boone and his companions. Boone was born in Pennsylvania near the city of Reading, and a boyhood companion is said to have been a neighbor youngster, George Bright (1732-1769). The latter supposedly accompanied Boone in his incursions into Kentucky, and was there killed by the Indians in 1769. This George Bright was an uncle of our ancestor, Henry Bright, the Pioneer.

Henry Bright, Sr., came to Lincoln County, Va., and settled in the vicinity of "Logan's Fort." The date of his arrival is not known, but it was supposedly some years prior to his marriage - one of the first recorded in Lincoln County - in 1785. He married Elizabeth Pope, daughter of George and Christina Pope, on January 3, 1785.

"The Pioneer" Bright formed Bright's Settlement, around the old Bright farm, where resided Henry Bright, Sr., his family and children, and their kin. The location is in the northern part of present bounds of Lincoln County, near the Garrard County line, the present village of Hubble, Kentucky. Henry Bright, Sr., lived to the extraordinarily ripe age of 98 years, and is buried on the old Bright farm (now the Noe place).

The Lincoln County tax lists of 1789 list Henry Bright as a property owner. (These old tax lists are preserved in the Kentucky Historical Society, Frankfort, Kentucky.)

A number of grants of land to Henry Bright are recorded in the old Kentucky land records, as follows (from Jillson):

264 acres on Caney Fork, Lincoln County, Kentucky, on January 13, 1804;

26 acres on Hanging Fork, Lincoln County, Kentucky, on June 18, 1805;

13 acres on a Fork of Dicks River, Lincoln County, Kentucky, on February 23, 1825.

The United States Census returns of Lincoln County, Kentucky, list Henry Bright therein for the years 1810, 1820, 1830, 1840, and 1850. (The 1790 and 1800 returns were destroyed when the U. S. Capitol was burned by the British during the War of 1812). These records indicate, among other things, that Henry Bright was born in the year 1760, and that he was a native of Pennsylvania.

ADDENDA

REVOLUTIONARY WAR SERVICE OF HENRY BRIGHT AND BROTHERS.

HENRY BRIGHT, SR. (born 1760) and his brothers, LICEAEL BRIGHT (born 1762) and JOHN BRIGHT (born 1764), were soldiers in the American Revolution with the Lancaster County, Pa. Militia. Their names appear on two Muster Rolls of 8th Company, 2nd Battalion, Lancaster County Militia. (Penn. Archives). Muster Roll for the year 1782, with Captain Mathias Henning as commander 8th Co. 2d Batt.. Lancaster Co. Militia). Another roll, with Capt. John Fassett as commander, is undated, probably being the final muster roll at the end of the War in 1783.

HENRY SCHAEFER (uncle of Henry Bright and brothers), was Captain in the same Battalion (2nd.).

CONCERNING HENRY BRIGHT, SR.

Revolutionary Soldier

Henry Bright, Sr. (1760-1856), was, it is said, a soldier of the American Revolution. He probably came to Kentucky soon after the conclusion of his service in that conflict.

11 Children; Died in 1856 (~~or 1858~~)

Although we have been able to locate records of only seven children of Henry Bright, Sr. and Elizabeth Pope, his wife, they were, it is said, the parents of 11 children. Authority for this statement is a biographical sketch of Henry Bright, Jr., youngest child, who emigrated to Lawrence County, Ind., where he was known as "Harry Bright." This sketch states: "Harry Bright, farmer of Guthrie Township, Lawrence County, was born in Lincoln County, Kentucky, on Jan. 15, 1809, being the youngest of eleven children of Henry and Elizabeth (Pope) Bright. The parents were honest and industrious people, of German descent, and were married in Kentucky. When Harry Bright was 9 years old his mother died, and he lived with his father until the latter died in 1856. About nine years later, he moved to Lawrence County and bought land upon which he now lives. He married Lucretia Greenwood, April 5, 1830. . . ." (From "History of Lawrence, Orange, and Washington Counties, Ind.," published 1884.)

(The above article places the death of Henry Bright, Sr., as in the year 1856; while family tradition is that he died in the year 1858, at the age of 98 years.)

Built First House With Running Water.

In the Kentucky Progress Magazine, several years ago, appeared an article by Miss Esther Whitley Burch, of Stanford, Ky., concerning the "Old Stage Coach Inn," built near Stanford, in 1816, by Capt. John Bright, son of Henry Bright, Sr. Among other interesting things, Miss Burch states that Henry Bright built a cabin in Lincoln County, over a spring, "which must have been the first house west of the Alleghanies to have running water."

OTHER BRIGHTS OF LINCOLN COUNTY, KENTUCKY.

Besides Henry Bright, Sr. and his known descendants, the records of Lincoln County indicate that there were others of the name in the county from early days. Likely, Henry Bright was accompanied to Kentucky by relatives and others, but of such persons no definite information has come down in family tradition. Hence we are unable to identify the following:

Marriage record: Elizabeth Bright and John Miller, December 21, 1784. (On July 10, 1791, the inventory of the personal estate of John Miller, deceased, was filed in Lincoln County; one of the appraisers was Henry Bright.)

Marriage record: Fanny Bright and Hugh Shannon, January 19, 1785. (On July 23, 1792, marriage bond of Janiney Bright and Armstead Miller; consent by Fanny Shannon, mother of Janiney.)

Inventory of personal estate of George Bright, deceased, February 21, 1786; appraisers: James Logan, Richard Jackson, and John Dougherty. (The Bright genealogy, by Judge Green, lists a George Bright, son of Jacob Bright - uncle of Henry Bright, Sr. - who was born 1753; died 1786; married Mary Moulton.)

Lincoln County Tax List, 1789, includes besides Henry Bright, a Jacob Bright and a John Bright.

CAPT. JOHN BRIGHT, son of Henry Bright, Sr., and Elizabeth Pope, his wife, was born 1786 in Lincoln County, Kentucky; died there, 1848. He married, August 14, 1816, Elizabeth Morrison, daughter of ~~SEBA~~ Morrison.

The following information concerning Capt. John Bright is from Mr. Stout Lillard's book, "Lillard, a Family of Colonial Virginia," page 131 (quoting Hon. John Turner Lillard, of Bloomington, Illinois, a descendant of Capt. John Bright):

"John Bright was born in 1786 of Dutch parentage. He was a man of unusually large size, being over six feet in height, and his normal weight being over 350 pounds. He was a soldier and Captain in the War of 1812, and all of his after life was called 'Captain Bright.' He died in 1848. He was a man of social position, and for that day, a rich man. Capt. John Bright's wife, Elizabeth Morrison Bright, was of French descent. She was a tall, strong, commanding woman, physically and mentally, and after her husband's death she conducted his affairs, which passed to her, with marked ability and prosperity. She died about 1880, at the age, I think, of 84."

GREENBERRY BRIGHT

"A few lines in our last issue told of the death of Mr. Greenberry Bright, which occurred at the home of his son, George P. Bright, at 3 P. M., December 3rd, space at the hour that the news was received barring further notice at the time. Death was the result of a general giving away of the vital forces and it came without struggle or apparent pain. He was born in this county in 1803, making him nearly 94 years old. In 1826 he went to Tennessee to live and located at Bolivar, where he carried on the business of tanning, and made considerable money. The same year that he went to Tennessee he married Miss Betty Crisp. Five children were born to them, four of whom are: Mrs. L. B. Adams, Mrs. R. L. White, Mrs. G. A. Swinebroad, and Geo. P. Bright. Mr. Bright returned to Kentucky in 1865, and later all of his children returned. The widow of his other son, Mrs. Jennie Bright, lives in Middleborough and has two children. All told, the old gentleman leaves four children, 27 grandchildren, and 25 great-grandchildren, making 56 descendants.

"Mr. Bright and Squire John S. Murphy learned the tanning business at the same place, and both made money out of it. At Bolivar Mr. Bright conducted a very large tannery and his business grew in immense proportions till the war came and nearly destroyed it. When he returned to Lincoln County, he said that he had come home to die, and although that was 34 years ago he did die on the farm on which he was born. He followed the business of farming and stock raising and made a success of it. At the time of his death he owned over 1,600 acres of bluegrass land, which he valued at \$40 or \$50. Though he left his son, Geo. P. Bright, and the Farmers Bank and Trust Co. his executors, practically his (illegible) days before his death he deeded 600 acres of land to Mr. Bright, 400 to Mr. White, and 200 to Mrs. Swinebroad, all in the Hubble neighborhood; 160 acres near Hustonville to Mrs. Adams, and his Middleborough property and 300 acres of land at Hubble to John W. and Miss Luella Bright, children of his dead son. He had 34 shares of stock in the Farmers Bank and Trust Co. of Stanford, and 15 in the Boyle National, besides money and other property which is yet to be divided. The apparent difference in the amounts given his children grows out of the fact that he had given all of them money and other valuables in various amounts, which he named with wonderful clearness and exactness to Mr. John Bright the day before his death, and which was written down by him. Though known as a very close man, his honesty and integrity were never questioned. He

never failed to pay every cent he owed and he wanted every cent due him. For 50 years he was an elder in the Caldwell Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Boyle County, and was always its most liberal contributor. In fact, though, he made no show of it, he gave much to the church and to charity. Not long ago he gave \$500. to a church in Louisville, and he has frequently paid the salary of a preacher who had an appointment in his neighborhood. The comforts of religion were his in the dying hour and enabled him not only to be resigned but anxious to go and be at rest.

"The funeral service was preached at McKendree Church by its pastor, Rev. W. S. Grinstead, and the remains were brought here at noon Saturday, followed by hosts of relatives and friends, and laid away in Buffalo Cemetery."

GREENBERRY BRIGHT

Greenberry Bright died at his home near Danville, Kentucky, December 4, 1896, in the ninety-third year of his age. Deceased was formerly a citizen of Bolivar. He moved here from Kentucky about 1826, in the early settlement of this country, and established a tan yard, near the residence now owned and occupied by Mr. I. M. Emerson. While residing here, Mr. Bright married a Miss Crisp, by whom he had several children, four of whom are still living. All of our older citizens remember Mr. Bright. He is said to have been a man of rugged honesty, fine sense, good judgment and splendid business tact. He amassed a fortune. Shortly after the war he returned to Kentucky, where he resided until his death.

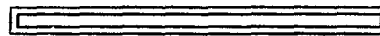

Biographical Sketch of
DR. JAMES G. CARPENTER.

(Abstract of a lengthy article in The Herald-Post, Louisville,
Kentucky, October 8, 1925.)

Dr. James Givens Carpenter, 71-year-old Stanford, Kentucky, practitioner, still rides horseback for exercise and visits his patients behind a fast trotting horse. He devotes seven hours a day to his practice and the rest of the time is spent on his "Kentucky Ranch," which contains 1,150 acres of fertile Bluegrass land.

Few rural communities are blessed with a mind as brilliant as that of Dr. Carpenter, whose life has been devoted to the relief of pain and to the general welfare of his neighbors. He has written hundreds of treatises, papers and lectures, and is recognized as an authority and has been honored in his profession throughout the country.

Dr. Carpenter was born August 24, 1854, near Hustonville, Ky., son of Hugh Logan and Elizabeth (Bright) Carpenter. He is a direct descendant of John Carpenter, who with two brothers came from Rockbridge County, Virginia, and settled Carpenter's Station, the fourth fort to be established in Kentucky. He was educated in private and public schools, and at Christian College, Hustonville, Ky. He received a teacher's certificate at the age of 17, taught school one year. The following year he began to read medicine with Dr. P. W. Logan; after which he attended lecture courses at old Louisville Medical College, and at the University of the City of New York, receiving his degree from the latter institution in 1875, which he followed up with post-graduate work in New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis, and Chicago.

After his post-graduate work, Dr. Carpenter returned to his home at Stanford and began practice in 1882. He has been located there since. He has been active in medical societies, state, and national. Was U. S. examining surgeon for pensions; councilman at Stanford; has been chairman of the Board of Health of Lincoln County and Health Officer of the same county for 25 years.

He married at the age of 22 years, Miss Lillian B. Fish, of Crab Orchard, Ky. Their children are: Lucille, Hubert Craig, James Givens, Jr., and Josephine Price Carpenter. Mrs. Carpenter was a highly educated woman, a fine musician, and considered a model wife and mother. She died in 1919, and Dr. Carpenter was married the second time, in March, 1922, to Miss Lizzie Beazley, of Stanford.

Dr. Carpenter's hobby is his farm. His crops of corn, wheat, oats, tobacco and vegetables are regularly considered to rank among the best in his section of the state, and his stock always brings the highest prevailing prices. His numerous friends are of the opinion that he is making as much of a success as an agriculturist as he has made as a medical man, and all declare him to be an enormous asset to the community.

David Bright was a son of Henry Bright, the Pioneer, who formed Bright's Settlement; this man lived to be 98 years old and was buried on the pioneer Bright farm. Henry Bright, the Pioneer, and his wife, Elizabeth (Pope) Bright had children: Sons, Henry, Jr., John, David, ----, ----, and Greenberry Bright; daughters, Elizabeth, who married John Robinson; Catherine ("Kitty"), who married David Luck, and Sallie, who married a Culbertson.

Capt. John Bright (son of Henry Bright, the Pioneer), "of Bright's Inn", near Stanford, Ky., and Elizabeth Morrison, his wife, had the following children: America, married Frank Gentry; Mary, married Thomas Lillard; Sallie, married John Metcalf; William, married Mary Bruce; John, married Sarah Dunn; Henry, married Mariah Gentry; and Elizabeth, married Hugh Logan Carpenter. My parents were Hugh Logan and Elizabeth (Bright) Carpenter.

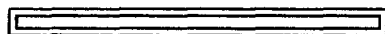

For the past seven years, Mrs. Dixon, (nee Alice Louise Dwelle, a lineal descendant,) and myself have been on the trail of the ancestry of Sarah Bright who, in 1805, married David Culbertson in Lincoln County, Ky. Dr. L. R. Culbertson, in the second edition of his book on the Culbertsons of Culbertson Row, Pa., made the following statement:

"Sarah (Bright) Culbertson died in Bedford, Indiana, in 1869. Her husband died about 1830, in Lincoln County, Kentucky. He owned no property. His wife inherited her property from her father John Bright of Kentucky. Family tradition had it that David came from Culbertson Row, Pa."

As to the date of Sarah's death, this statement is known to be in error. Mrs. Kate Rout Stafford of Crawfordsville, Ind., has in her possession a funeral notice published at Bedford, Ind., March 31, 1873, placing Sarah's death in the latter year and month. I believe the quoted statement is also in error respecting the parentage of Sarah Bright.

The descendants of David Culbertson and Sarah Bright have been led on all sorts of wild goose chases and into all sorts of box canyons and blind alleys, trying to find her father "John Bright". Another note, not now indetifiable as to authorship, states that David Culbertson married Sarah, daughter of John and Ann Brite of Lincoln County, Ky.

Mr. Harry W. Mills and myself have searched meticulously for many months in the records of Lawrence County, Indiana, Augusta and adjacent counties of Virginia, and Lincoln and adjacent counties of Kentucky. We have found Sarah Brights and John Brights. But we have failed to find a Sarah, daughter of John Bright, who married a David Culbertson. There was a John Bright, Soldier of the Revolution in Augusta County, Va., who married Anne Fawcett, and may have come to Lincoln County, Ky., in 1779, with William McBride. But there is no evidence that he had a daughter Sarah who married a Culbertson.

On the other hand we have assembled many notes from descendants of both Brights and Culbertsons, and Mr. Mills has uncovered a vast amount of record material (census, marriage and probate) -- all of which supports the claim of the Bright Clan that David Culbertson married Sarah, daughter of Henry Bright, Senior, and Elizabeth Pope, his wife.

Until corroborative evidence is discovered, therefore, I must conclude that the quoted statement above as to Sarah's parentage is in error. The thesis presented by the Lincoln County records appears to be the correct one, namely: that our Sarah Bright-Culbertson was the oldest daughter of Henry Bright, Senior (born 1760), of Lincoln County, Kentucky.

DAVID CULBERTSON, OF LINCOLN COUNTY, KENTUCKY

David Culbertson was born Jan. 16, 1789, at Culbertson Row, near Chambersburg, Cumberland County, Pa.

He was the son of Col. Samuel Culbertson and his second wife, Elizabeth McClay. Samuel Culbertson was born at Culbertson Row, Pa., Dec. 21, 1741. He was a colonel of the Cumberland County Militia, American Revolution. He died February 4, 1817.

David was a grandson of Capt. Alexander Culbertson, who was born at Culbertson Row, Ballygan, County Antrim, Ireland, May 17, 1714. About 1730-1735, he removed with two brothers to Pennsylvania and settled in Cumberland County. He married Margaret Duncan, Nov. 4, 1740. He was a captain of provincial troops, and was killed in the Battle of Bloody Run, near McCord's Fort, April 2, 1756.

David ran away from home, age 16, to Kentucky, where he married Sarah Bright, born about 1788, oldest daughter of Henry Bright, Senior, and Elizabeth Pope. He was a tall man and a great wrestler. The exact date of his death, between 1830 and 1840 is unknown.

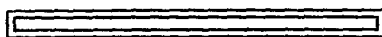

While a young man, he emigrated to Indiana, settling in Lawrence County, near the town of Bedford. On July 7, 1859, he married Maria Louisa Hamer, of Mitchell, Indiana. She was born August 26, 1841, daughter of James and Sophia (Wood) Hamer, the former a native of Ohio and the latter a native of North Carolina.

In the year 1860, Samuel Bixler Bright, with his wife and baby son, removed from Indiana to Ray County, Missouri. The trip was made in a covered wagon. On the way to Missouri, they were joined by a party including William Wade Waters and his wife, Sarah (Bright) Waters, and children; William H. Bright, unmarried, and Margaret (Mag) Bright, also unmarried, sisters and brother of Samuel Bixler Bright. Four years later, Samuel Bixler Bright and his family returned to Indiana. In 1883, he again left Indiana for Ray County, Missouri, where he lived until his death, which occurred on December 13, 1909. His wife died December 31, 1915.

JOHN H. BRIGHT, son of David and Lydia (Bixler) Bright, was born in Lincoln County, Kentucky, on November 29, 1833. He married Susan Margaret Dawson (born Sept. 10, 1843), daughter of John Logan and Mary Ann (Swope) Dawson, on November 20, 1860. The year 1860 was an important one for the sons and daughters of David Bright. Already two or three of them had answered the call of the West; now the others felt that same irresistible urge, so the year 1860 saw all the brothers and sisters of John H. Bright leave for Missouri. His father-in-law wished him to stay near the home fireside. He did.

For many years John H. Bright owned and operated a water-powered grist-mill on Hanging Fork Creek in Lincoln County. The mill had previously been in the Dawson family and was known as "Dawson's Mill." Some years before his death, John H. Bright sold the mill property, dwelling house and farm on Hanging Fork and retired to a smaller place on the outskirts of the town of Stanford. The mill formerly owned by Mr. Bright, in later years, having outlived its usefulness, was torn down.

John Bright, the miller, was known as "Black John" Bright - to distinguish him from a cousin, "Red John" Bright (son of Capt. John Bright). The one had jet black hair, the other had red hair.

"Black John" Bright was even-tempered and unassuming; he was well liked and respected by all who knew him. He and his wife were members of and regularly attended the Christian (Campbellite) Church. He died on January 28, 1909, in his 76th year. His widow survived him nearly a quarter of a century; she was in her 91st year when she passed to the Great Beyond on January 6, 1934.

MRS. BRIGHT DIES FOLLOWING LONG ILLNESS.

After an illness of years, Mrs. Sue Bright died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Charles H. Carter, on East Main Street Saturday evening at a late hour. She was the widow of John H. Bright, who preceded her to the grave many years. Her husband was known as "Black" John Bright to distinguish him from "Red" John Bright, a relative. She was the daughter of John Logan and Mary Ann Dawson, of sacred memory, and was married to Mr. Bright in 1860. Joining the Christian Church in early life, she served in the Master's vineyard nearly three-quarters of a century. She was a Bible student and during the years of her confinement to the home by reason of her physical condition she spent much of her time searching the scriptures.

Mrs. Bright is survived by two daughters, Mrs. C. H. Carter of this city, with whom she had lived many years and whose devotion and ministrations to her impressed everyone. The other daughter is Mrs. Roberta Mills, of Louisville, who was denied the sad privilege of attending her mother's burial by illness. She leaves four grandchildren: Mrs. Earl Broadus, Lancaster; Mr. R. B. Carter, Middlesboro; Mrs. Roberta Fulford, Louisville, and Mr. H. W. Mills, also of that city; seven great-grandchildren and a number of nieces and nephews, the latter including Mr. J. B. Bryan, who resides on the Danville Road.

Deceased was a most excellent Christian woman and was the last of 12 children, all of whom lived to a ripe old age. In his funeral service Rev. C. N. Barnette referred to Mrs. Bright as a beautiful Christian, one who had implicit faith in her Maker. Mr. William Severance assisted in the funeral service which was held in the Carter home and Mr. and Mrs. Barnette sang at the home and at the grave in Buffalo Spring Cemetery. A large number of friends and neighbors gathered at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon for the funeral. The pallbearers were Robert B. Carter, Earl Broadus, Robert Franklin Carter, Fred Wilkerson, W. B. Biographical Sketch of

SILAS C. ROBINSON

(From "History of Ray County, Missouri," published by Missouri Historical Company, St. Louis, Mo., 1881.)

SILAS C. ROBINSON. This gentleman is a native of Kentucky. He was born October 24, 1832. His father, Michael Robinson, was a native of Virginia. He was born December 14, 1804, and died December 27, 1861. His mother, Margaret Robinson, was born in Kentucky, on April 1, 1812, and is still living in that state at this time - April, 1881.

Our subject lived in Kentucky until after he had acquired his education and attained manhood's estate. In the spring of 1854 he came to Missouri, and locating in Jackson County, remained for about three years. He then went back to Kentucky, but, remaining only a few months, came to Ray County, Missouri, in the spring of 1857, and bought land here. Soon after he went again to Jackson County, Missouri, and lived there about eighteen months.

Returning to Ray County in 1860, he located upon his present farm, Section 10, Township 53, Range 26. Here he owns 270 acres of good land, 240 acres of which is in cultivation, under good fences of rail and hedge. The farm is well watered, having one running spring and a half dozen wells.

Mr. Robinson has a handsome and commodious dwelling house, a good barn and other buildings; also, a fine bearing orchard, and an abundance of small fruits and berries. He is devoting his attention largely to raising and dealing in the best classes of live stock.

Mr. Robinson was married on the 17th day of January, 1861, to Miss Margaret J. Bright, a native of Lincoln County, Kentucky. They have seven children, as follows: Lillian, William F., John Bright, Mollie M., Lucy May, Lettie Belle, and Charles Edgar.

Mr. Robinson is a member of Wakanda Grange, No. 935, P. of H. He is a successful, prosperous farmer and stock raiser, and a valuable citizen.

Biographical Sketch of

WILLIAM H. BRIGHT

(From "History of Ray County, Missouri," published by Missouri Historical Company, St. Louis, Mo., 1881.)

WILLIAM H. BRIGHT was born in Lincoln County, Kentucky, October 10, 1839. His father was a farmer, and young Bright was reared on a farm and taught to work. His education was acquired in the manner common with so many farmer's sons, by attending school during the winter and working on the farm in the summer.

When he reached his twenty-first birthday, Mr. Bright left Kentucky, in company with two brothers and a number of other persons, to come to Missouri. They came overland with a train of wagons direct to Ray County, and here our subject commenced farming for himself.

Mr. Bright was not engaged on either side during the War of the Rebellion. He was drafted for Union service just before the close of the war, but was never ordered to service.

He was married in the year 1864, to Miss Nannie Frazier, daughter of Mr. James Frazier, a resident of Ray County. The issue of this union was seven children, five of whom, four girls and a boy, are now living. Mr. Bright and his excellent lady are both worthy members, and have been for many years, of the Christian Church. Mr. Bright is a good, practical, intelligent, and industrious farmer, and has done much toward the improvement of that branch of industry to which he belongs.

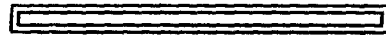

Henry Bright, Jr., was the youngest of 11 children born to Henry Bright, Sr., and Elizabeth Pope, his wife, in Lincoln County, Kentucky. He was born January 15, 1809, and married Lucretia Greenwood, April 5, 1830.

Ten children were born to this union, the first in 1831, the last in 1848. They were all born in Lincoln County, Ky. About 1864, Henry Bright, Jr., and his family removed to Lawrence County, Ind. There he became well known as "Harry" Bright. He died after 1884, exact date not being known to the compiler. The children, whose records are given on the following pages, and the order of their births as shown by Lincoln County census returns, were: Sarah, Greenberry, Nancy, William Richard, Martha, America, Mary, Amanda, Catherine, and John.
