# PREFACE.

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ABOUT four years since, Mr. Joseph E. Bulkeley, of New York, who has a country seat in Rocky Hill, engaged the publisher to prepare a full and complete genealogy of the Bulkeley family in America, descended from the Rev. Peter Bulkeley, of Concord, Mass., who arrived in New England in 1634 or 1635. Most of the four intervening years have been faithfully devoted to this work. No pains have been spared to make out a correct list of all the descendants. The usual difficulties attending such an enterprise have been fully experienced. More than one thousand letters have been written to different members of the family. Two different circulars have also been sent to all whose residence has been known. The writer has also visited the offices of town clerks and clerks of probate, and examined church and parish records, searched burial-grounds, visited numerous families, and made as thorough investigation as practicable to include all of the race in the country. In order to gain all of historical interest that could be gathered, many days have been spent in the largest libraries of New York, Boston, New Haven, Hartford, and Worcester, the superintendents of which have afforded every facility in their power. The task of collecting materials for this memorial has of course been laborious beyond what any one can realize who has not been engaged in similar labors.

In multitudes of instances, no response has been given to letters repeatedly sent to individuals requesting dates and other important facts, which could be gathered from no other source. In some cases we have been obliged to address letters to professional men in the vicinity of the delinquents and offer them a compensation for gathering the needed information for us. The chirography of

those who have returned answers, in cases not infrequent, has been such as was impossible to decipher, obliging us to write a second time, requesting an explanation. Many families have kept no record, but have forwarded lists from memory, and different members of the same family have often disagreed in the dates furnished. The history of the earlier generations has been made as complete as could be by a diligent search of public records, which are the principal sources of information respecting the earlier families; but all the facts sought were not recorded. Records in some instances have been lost; in others the desired items of information are omitted, and such records often disagree. In all such cases the writer has selected such names and dates as seemed sanctioned by the highest authority. The later generations have been collected mainly by examining family records and by correspondence with members of the various families now living. Great perplexity has been experienced from the fact that, until quite recently, there has been during the last hundred years unwarrantable neglect to register on public records the births, marriages, and deaths which have occurred in the various towns and parishes. These explanations are given, that those persons who do not find the account of their families as perfect as they expected, may understand that all reasonable effort has been expended to secure completeness and accuracy. The compiler has carefully examined all the records within his reach and the various manuscripts furnished him, and has diligently sought information from all available sources. It has been his constant aim to furnish a reliable record and history of the family in its numerous branches. For the errors of recorders and correspondents he cannot be held responsible. Manifest errors in the spelling of names have been corrected according to his best judgment, while some peculiarities in the earlier generations have been purposely retained. It is hardly possible in a work of this kind to avoid mistakes in deciphering and transcribing so many thousand names and dates, many of which are found in records and manuscripts scarcely legible. It is exceedingly difficult to avoid all errors in printing a volume containing so many dates and figures, even where the copy is complete. Although the sheets, as they have come from the press, have been carefully read before the last impression by some half dozen different individuals, some errors have escaped the notice of the compiler and his assistant proof-readers.

It is to be regretted that a few families have been so separated

from their relatives that no trace of them and their descendants have been found. Still, with few exceptions, we think a full and accurate record has been given.

The thanks of the compiler are due to those members of the family who have aided him in his researches. He is under especial obligations to Mr. Joseph E. Bulkeley for records and historical matter relating to the family, collected by him in this country and in England, previous to his engagement with the author; to Mr. James H. Bulkeley, of Philadelphia, for the family records of descendants in Pennsylvania; to Miss Anna L. North, Cheektowaga, N. Y., for assistance in tracing the descendants of Prescott and Lois Williams Bulkeley; to Mrs. M. S. Converse of Elmira, N. Y., for records of Benjamin, Brownell, and Francis Bulkeley; to Dr. Edward Bulkeley, of New Haven, for valuable statistics relating to the descendants of Edward and Diana Bunce Bulkeley; and especially to Miss Eliza Ann Bulkeley, of Southport, for aid in collecting the descendants of Thomas and Peter Bulkeley, sons of Rev. Peter Bulkeley, of Concord, and without whose assistance their records would unavoidably have been very incomplete; and to numerous other persons not connected with the family for the assistance they have rendered him in his investigations.

As the work will probably fall into the hands of some not extensively versed in genealogies, the author has endeavored to make it as free from intricacies as possible. The descendants of each child of the first settler who married and had offspring are distinctly traced by themselves, according to their generations, and are all numbered from the beginning. The marginal numbers give each descendant his place in the order of descent, while the head numbers in the middle of the page, corresponding to those in the margin, give the marriages of such as have entered the family relation, and as far as possible the names of their partners, with the dates of their marriage and decease.

A full index of the baptismal names of those whose surname is Bulkeley is furnished, the number of the individual being opposite to the Christian name on the left and the date of birth on the right; also an index of the descendants of other names than those of Bulkeley, with numbers and dates to correspond; and a list of those who have married into the Bulkeley family, with the number of their respective partners on the left and date of marriage on the r.ght.

In conclusion, the volume is sent forth in the hope that it will

be acceptable to the numerous living members of the family, and that it may stimulate the present and future generations to emulate the piety, the love of civil and religious liberty, and that devotion to the common welfare which characterized the early settlers of New England.

## THE BULKELEY FAMILY.

This family descended from remote antiquity. Its surname is derived from a ridge of mountains in the County Palatine of Chester. The name was spelled in the reign of John-1199 to 1216 and generations succeeding-Buclough, or larger mountain. In the 20th of Henry IV., and on the visitations of Edward IV., its designation was Bucclogh-Lord of Bulclogh in Cheshire; and of the manor of Eaton, Presland and Almon. Norbury and Steuben, and in the inquisitions of Post Mortem, of later dates, of Stoke and Mayfield.

Robert Bulclogh, Lord of Bulclogh.

Wm. Bulkeley, first son, 1302, married Miss Maud, daughter of Sir John Davenport and wife. Alice, and their descendants bore the manor of Norbury.

The following sketch of the Buckeleys is taken from Lyson's Magnulia of Great Britain:

The township of Bulkeley, or Buckley, lies about nine miles N. N. West from Nantwich; the manor was the inheritance of an ancient family of that name, the elder branch of which became extinct in the 4th century. After this period, we find two estates in this township, each called the manor of Bulkeley; one of these passed, by marriage, to Thomas Holford, Esq., of the body to King Richard II., and is now the property of George James, Earl of Cholmondeley, whose ancestor. Sir Hugh Cholmondeley, marvied the daughter and heir of Christopher Holford, Esq. The other passed, by marriage, from the family of Bulkeley to that of Calveley, and was purchased by Lord Cholmondeley in 1659, of Lord and Lady Byron, having been conveyed by Sir Hugh Calveley to Lady Byron—then Mrs. Elisabeth Booth—in 1646.

Robert Lord Cholmondeley, Thomas Bulkeley, and Edward

Bressey (or Brassay), are described as joint Lords of Bulkeley in a manuscript of 1662; the Brassays possessed their estates in Bulkeley by marriage with the heiress of Hadleigh, about the beginning of the 15th century. Webb, in his Itinerancy, written in the year 1662, speaks of a fair new house in this township, then belonging to Thomas Brassey, Gent. The mansion and its demesne still belong to the Brassey family. Thomas Bulkeley, the last male heir of that ancient family, resided in the township of Bulkeley, in an house now called Bulkeley Hall, which had been built by his father, till his death, which happened in 1802, at the advanced age of ninety-eight (98). This mansion passed, by bequest to Mr. Thomas Orton, the present proprietor. Old Bulkeley Hall, the property of the Earl of Cholmondeley, is occupied by a farmer (Vide Lyson's Magnalia, Vol. 3, p. 681).

In Cheshire noisiemen's scats is a scat of Lord Viscount Bulkeley, in right of his lady, the heiress of the Warrens. (Page 353.)

The Baskerayles, a younger branch of this family, settled at Bulkeley, by marriage with the heiress of Hadley, descended from a branch of the Bulkeleys. (Page 362.)

Richard Bulkeley was Sheriff of Chester in 1457. (Vide King's History of Chester, page 73.)

The Bulkeleys were Lords of Bulkeley in the reign of King John. Robert De Bulkeiev, who was Sheriff of Cheshire in 1309. had three sons. William, common ancestor of most of the Cheshire branches; Thomas, whose posterity soon failed in the male line; and Peter, ancestor of the Bulkeloys of Ware in Shropshire, and the Bulkelevs of Boxton, who became extinct after three descents, William, above mentioned, had several sons, viz., William, who left an only daughter, married to Thomas Holford, in consequence of which match the Choimondeleys of Vale Royal, by marriage with the heiress of Holford, are representatives of the elder branch of the Bulkelevs. Robert, the second son of William, settled at Eaton, in Devenham, and had two sons, Robert, ancestor of the Bulkeleys of Eaton, which family became extinct after six generations; and Richard, who married the heiress of Chedle and of Whatcroft in Devenham. The elder branch of these Bulkelevs removed to Beaumaris, in the Isle of Anglesea, and were ancestors of Lord Viscount Bulkeley, who has a seat in Cheshire, in right of his lady, as heiress of the Warrens. A younger branch of this house continued for some descents at Chedle. Roger Bulkeley, third son of William Bulkeley, above montioned, settling at Norbury, his posterity assumed the name of Norbury, and became extinct in the elder branch, after four generations. The posterity of Richard, fourth son of William Bulkeley, settled at Prestland, near Bunbury, took the name of Presland, were for several descents of Wardle Hall in the same parish, and continued in the male line till the middle of the 17th century, if not later. *Thomas* Bulkeley, the fifth son, who was of Alpraham, left an only daughter, married to Thomas Arderne, whose heiress married Thomas Stanley of Elford.

David was the youngest son of William Bulkeley, Esq., by whose death this branch of the family became extinct in 1812. (Lyson, page 363.)

Lawrence Wright, Esq., who became thus possessed of Offerton about the year 1600, was grandson of Thomas Wright, of Nantwich, whose pedigree is traced a few descents higher to Thomas Wright, *alias* Bulkeley. (Page 369.)

The Prestlands, descended from a younger branch of the Bulkeley family, were for many generations of Wordle in Bunbury. They became extinct in the early part of the 17th century. (Page 472.)

The manor of Austersan, or Alstanton, was at an early period the property of the Alstantons, from whom it passed by successive female heirs to the families of Bulkeleys, Weterhall, Praers; and Bromley. (Fage 477.)

A free school was founded at Wrenbury by Mr. Ralph Bulkeley in 1605. It is endowed with the interest of £230, the interest of which is appropriated to bind their apprentices. (Page 515.)

The other moiety of the manor of Timperly was held, at a very early period, under the Barony of Durham Massay, by the Cheadles and their representatives, the Bulkeleys of Cheadle. This estate belonged to Lord Bulkeley in 1702. (Page 552.)

The Township of Wardhull, or Wardle, lies about five miles north-west from Nantwich. The Manor is the property of the Earl of Dysart, by inheritance from the Wilbraham family. Sir Thomas Wilbraham, who was possessed of this Manor in the middle of the seventeenth century, purchased the Hall which is now a farm-house, from the Prestlands, who had been settled there for several descents from a younger branch of the Bulkeley Family. (Page 552.)

The township of Eaton, or as it was anciently written, Ayton, lies near three miles south by west of Norwich; the Manor was at an early period in moities, between the families of l'raers, succeeded by the Manwarings and that of Bulkeley in the reign of Henry VIII.

Thomas Bulkeley sold his estate in Ayton to the Breretons, who seem eventually to have been possessed of the whole Manor which before the year 1672 had passed, by successive sales, to the families of Lendsay and Cholmondeley. It is now the property of Thomas Cholmondeley, Esq., of Vale Royal, M. P. The Bulkeleys had a seat at Ayton. Bishop Gartrell mentions a monument, formerly in Davenham Church, for William Bulkeley, Esq., of Ayton, who died in the reign of Edward IV. Leland says that the two Bulkeleys, *i. e.* the Bulkeleys of Whatcroft and Ayton, contended either to be the Elder house of that name; he adds Bulkeley of Eaton Stakam to a daughter and Leftwich had her but Sir. Gul'. Breton of brought Eyton. (Vol. 3, p. 647. 1810.)

The township of Whatcroft lies three miles south-east of Norwich; the manor was for many generations in that branch of the Bulkeley family from which the present Lord Viscount Bulkeley is descended. This branch of the family had removed into North Wales before Leland's-time but continued to possess Whatcroft till after the year 1756. (Page 650.)

In the sixth year of the reign of Edward II., David Bulkeley, Sergeant of the Peace, to Richard Sutton, presented the heads of two felons executed for burglary. (Page 686.)

A branch of the Bulkeleys resided at Hollyhurst in the seventeenth century. (Page 687.)

Roger, a younger son of William Bulkeley, having settled at Norbury, upon an estate given him by his father about the latter end of the thirteenth century, took the name of Norbury. (Page 687.)

In the parish church of Middlewich are two chapels which belonged to the Barons of Kinderton, one fitted up in 1615, the other in 1632, ornamented with the Arms and quarterings of that family. In the north-east chapel which was purchased of Sir Richard Bulkeley in 1858 are several memorials of Venables and Levera. (Page 688.)

In the parish church of Mothan are memorials of the Bulkeleys. (Page 696-7.)

On Page 262—and onward of Playfair's British Antiquity, published at London in 1809—is the following entry :

#### VISCOUNT BULKELEY IN IRELAND.

This ancient and noble family appears, by a curious illuminated pedigree in his Lordship's possession, to be descended from Robert Bulkeley, Esq., Lord of the manor of Bulkeley in the County Palatine of Chester, in the reign of King John, who was succeeded in his estates by his son William, who had five sons.

Robert Bulkeley of Bulkeley, Esq., the eldest son, married a daughter of Thomas Butler, Baron of Warrington in Cheshire, by whom he had two sons and four daughters. William, the oldest son and heir, was living at Bulkeley in the year 1302, and twice married, 1. To Maud, daughter of Sir John Davenport Knight. 2. To Alice, daughter of Vigan St. Piere. By the latter wife he had one son, Richard, to whom he gave the manor of Prentland, in Cheshire, whereupon he assumed that name which his descendants continued to use. The issue of the former (marriage) was five sons.

Robert Bulkeley, 2d son of William, became seated at Eaton in Cheshire, which he had of his father's gift. He was sheriff of the County in 1341, and married Isabel, daughter of Philip Edgerton of Malpas in Cheshire, and had by her a daughter, Cecily, who married Thomas Weaver, of Cheshire, and had two sons. Robert, from whom the Bulkeleys of Calemand Burgate in Cheshire are descended, and Richard, ancestor to Lord Bulkeley. Richard married Agnes, daughter and co-heiress to Roger Chidel, of Chid-. el, in Cheshire, and had with her that estate in which he was succeeded by his only son William Bulkeley, Esq., of Chidel, who, in the reign of Henry VI., being Constable of Beaumaris in the Isle of Anglesy, prevented the Duke of York from landing there on his return from Ireland to join the Earl of Warwick against the King. He married Ellen, daughter of Gwilliam ap Griffith of Pentrie Esq., by whom he had six sons and four daughters. Rowland Bulkeley, of Beaumaris, Esq., the eldest son, married Alice, daughter and heiress to William Beconsal, of Beconsal in Lancashire, Esq., and had issue five sons and two daughters.

Sir Richard Bulkeley, the eldest son, succeeded his father Rowland at Beaumaris; was honored with knighthood and made chamberlain of North Wales in 1534. He married Catharine, daughter of Sir William Griffith, Jun., of Penrhyn, in the county of Carnarvon, chamberlain of North Wales, and had, by her, four sons and two daughters. Sir Robert Bulkeley of Beaumaris and Chedd, the eldest son, was knighted in 1576; represented the county of Anglesey in several Parliaments, in the reigns of Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth, to the latter of whom he proved an excellent soldier and faithful subject on many occasions. He was also chamberlain of North Wales. He was married to his first wife, Margaret, daughter of Sir John Savage of Rock Savage and Clifton, in Cheshire, Knight, and to his second, Agnes, daughter of Thomas Needham, of Shavington, in Shropshire, Esq., and had, by her, eight sons and two daughters.

Dr. Launcelot Bulkeley, the sixth son of Sir Richard, was admitted a commoner of Brazen Nose College, Oxford, in 1587, the eighteenth year of his age, and taking his degree of A. M. in 1593, was, on the 13th of November in that year, ordained deacon, and the same day inducted to the rectory of Llandyffran, to which was added, on the 4th of March following, the rectory of Llandegvaine, otherwise Beaumaris, of which Lord Bulkeley is patron. On the 25th of March, 1594, he was admitted into priest's orders; after which, being Archbishop of Dublin, he took the degree of D.D. in that University, and by letters patent, August 11th, 1619, was promoted to the Archepiscopal See, soon after which, he was sworn of the privy council, and on the 15th of April, 1624, appointed one of the commissioners for the preservation of the peace in the provinces of Leinster and Ulster, during the deputy Lord Falkland's absence to visit the new plantations in the north. He died at his palace of Tallayht, September 8th, 1650, in the 82d year of his age. He married 'Alice, daughter of Rowland Bulkeley, of Beaumaris, and had issue by her of two sons and two daughters.

William Bulkeley, D.D., Archbishop of Dublin, at Miltown, which, with many other houses and castles belonging to the Protestant nobility and gentry in the counties of Dublin and Wicklow, were burnt in 1641, to prevent the English from planting any garrisons in those parts. He was a person of great virtue and piety, one who made it his chief occupation to serve the church, and his anusement to improve and adorn his estate with plantations, whereby from a rude, desolate, and wild land he brought it to be a most delightful patrimony. He married Elisabeth, daughter of Henry Manwaring of Kilkenny, Esq., one of the masters in the high court of chancery in Ireland, by whom he had three sons and three daughters. Sir Edward, the eldest son, who succeeded to Old Bawne, was also seated at Dunlaven, in the county of Wicklow. He was created a Baronet of Ireland by patent, December 9th, 1682. In 1650 he married, first, Catharine, daughter and co-heiress of John Byhe, Esq., chief baron of the exchequer if Ireland, and by her, who died in 1624, had two sons, and his second wife was Dorothy, daughter of —— Whitfield, Esq., by whom he had no issue. He died in 1635, and was succeeded by Sir Robert Bulkeley, Bart., and their oldest son and heir, who had his education in the Universities of Oxford and Dublin. and took the degree of A.B., May 21st, 1680. He was a person of good understanding and reason, which in many respects were set off by the imperfect symmetry, or rather deformity, of his body. In the course of his childhood his faculties were so extraordinary that in a few years he acquired a very great share of learning, and, being blessed with a great memory, his knowledge and learning were thorein most securely treasured up. At sixteen years of age he had a large stock of human learning, with talents that have rarely been equalled, wit, fancy, and ready apprehension, with a memory almost iniraculous. Yet with all this fund of reason and literature, he was strangely deluded and led away by the absurd ravings of a set of enthusiastic pretenders to prophecy, who first appeared among the French Camisards and Huguenots. With these he engaged so deeply that not only his estate partly supplied their extravagance, but he prostituted his excellent pen in defense of their phrenzy and misapplied his great capacity and good sense by endeavors to support their groundless delusions, and was only prevented by death, from selling his estate to distribute amongst them. He married Lucy, daughter of Sir George Downing of Hatley, in Cambridgeshire, Baronet, and leaving no issue, the title became extinct, for his brother John Bulkeley, who died July 18th, 1699, left by Elisabeth, his wife, daughter of Henry Whitfield, Esq. an only daughter, Hesther, who became heiress to the estate and was married April 15th, 1702, to James Worth Tynte, Esq., younger son of Mr. Baron Worth, and died August 9th, 1723.

Sir Robert Bulkeley, eldest son of Sir Richard Bulkeley, of Beaumaris, by his first wife, Margaret Savage, received the honor of Knighthood, and by King James I. instructions to Wm. Lord Compton, President of Wales, dated November 12, 1617, was appointed one of the council of his Lordship, for that principality. He died June the 28th, 1621, and was buried at Beaumaris, having been twice married, first, to Catharine, daughter of William Davenport of Bromhall, in Cheshire, Knight, and, second, to Mary, daughter of William Lord Borough of Gainsborough, in Lincolnshire. By the former he had one son and one daughter; by the second, two sons and four daughters.

Thomas, first Viscount, the younger son, was seated at Barnhill, near Beaumaris; and being a person of great merit and strict loyalty to King Charles I., was advanced, by patent under the privy seal, dated at Oxford, June the 6th, 1643, to the dignity of Viscount Bulkeley of Cashel, in the Kingdom of Ireland. He married Blanche, daughter of Robert Coytmore of Coytmore, in Carnarvonshire, Esq., and, secondly, the daughter of Robert Cheadle, who was some time his Lordship's steward. By the latter he had five sons and four daughters.

Robert, 2d Viscount Bulkeley, the eldest surviving son and heir, was sheriff of the county of Anglesey, in 1658, and served for that county, in the Parliament which restored King Charles II., continuing to be its representative, till his death, which happened Oct. the 16th, 1688. He married Sarah, daughter of Daniel Harvey, of Coombe, in Surrey, Esq., and had issue three sons and six daughters.

Richard, the 3d Viscount, was born in 1658. He represented the county of Anglesey in Parliament, from 1680 until his death, and in 1701 was appointed Vice Admiral of North Wales. He married 1st, Mary, daughter of Sir Philip Egerton, of Egerton and Dublin, Knight.

Richard, 4th Viscount, who succeeded his father Aug. 9th, 1704, was representative for the county of Anglesey, from 1705 till his death, the constable of Beaumaris castle and constable of North Wales, on the 2d of Nov., 1713, was made constable of Carnarvon castle, and died at Bath, June 4, 1724, having always distinguished himself by a steady adherence to principles of loyalty, and disinterested zeal for the good of his country, and the strictest regard to every social virtue. He married Lady Bridget Bertie, eldest daughter of James, Earl of Abingdon, and by her left issue two sons and four daughters.

Richard, 5th Viscount, born in 1708, was, in March, 1730, elected member of Parliament, for Beaumaris, and was re-chosen at the next general election; he was likewise Governor of Beaumaris castle and chamberlain of North Wales. On the 12th of Jan., 1731, his Lordship married Jane, daughter and heiress of Lewis Owen, of Penairth, in Merionithshire, Esq., but, dying without issue, March the 15th, 1738, the title descended to his brother, James, 6th Viscount, who on the 19th of April was elected representative in Parliament for Beaumaris; was also constable of the castle there and chamberlain for North Wales. In August, 1747, he married Emma Isle, daughter and heiress of Thomas Rowland, of Cærn, in the Isle of Anglesey, Esq., by whom he had two daughters, and also a posthumous son.

Thomas James, 7th Viscount Bulkeley of Ireland, and 1st Lord Bulkeley, Baron of Beaumaris, in the Isle of Anglesey, was born on the 12th of Dec., 1752. At the general elections in the years 1774 and 1780 his Lordship was chosen representative, for the county of Anglesey ; was created a peer of Great Britain by the title of Lord Bulkeley, Baron of Beaumaris in the Isle of Anglesey, by patent dated May the 14th, 1784, and was likewise Lord Lieut. and Custos Rutulorum of the city of Carnarvon. His Lordship on the 27th of April, 1777, was married to Elizabeth Harriet, only daughter and heiress of Sir George Warner, Knight of the Bath, but has no issue. He made the grand tour in conjunction with the Marquis of Buckingham.

Note.—Thomas James Warner Bulkeley, Baron Bulkeley of Beaumaris, in the county of Anglesey, also Viscount Bulkeley of the kingdom of Ireland, Lord Lieut. of Carnarvon, third chamberlain of North Wales and hereditary constable of Beaumaris' castle, May. 14, 1784.

### THE BULKELEY PEDIGREE.

Prepared for the Genealogical Register by Miss H. A. BRAINBRIDGE, of London.

The Bulkeley, or Bulkley, or, as it is sometimes spelt, Buckley, family, is of very ancient origin, and thrived in Cheshire for many years. They were afterwards scattered far and wide; several branches taking other names.

William Bulkeley, one of the early lords of Bulkeley, who married the daughter of Sir John Davenport, had six sons : the eldest William, took a share of Bulkeley ; Robert took Eaton and Alstanton ; Roger assumed the name of Norbury and took that estate ; Richard took Prestland, and assumed that name ; Thomas married a daughter of Matthew do Alpraham, and seems to have taken Alpraham ; and David took a share of Bulkeley.

From these sprang the lords Bulkeley ; the Bulkeleys of Ireland, Beaumaris, Davinham, Haughton, Cheadle, Burgate, Porthamel, Wore (or Woore), Broxton, Stanlow, Odell, and America.

A paragraph in Neal's *History of the Puritans* relative to Peter Buckeley of Odell, afterwards of America, reads thus :---

. "But notwithstanding this prohibition, numbers went to New England this summer [1635]; and amongst others the Reverend Mr. Peter Balkley, B. D., fellow of St. John's College, Cambridge. He was son of Dr. Edward Bulkley of Bedfordshire, and succeeded him at Woodhill or Odell in that county. There he continued above twenty years, the Bishop of Lincoln conniving at his non-conformity; but when Dr. Laud was at the helm of the church and the Bishop of Lincoln in disgrace, Bulkley was silenced by the vicar-general, Sir Nathaniel Brent; upon which he sold a very plentiful estate and transported himself and his effects to New England, where he died in the year 1658-9, and in the seventy-seventh of his age. He was a thundering preacher and a judicious divine, as appears by his treatise of the Covenant, which passed through several editions and was one of the first books published in that country."

As regards Edward, the father, the registers at Woore, where he was born, are not perfect. He was the son of Thomas, and was curate of St. Mary's, Shrewsbury, in 1550; afterwards prebend of Chester, then of Lichfield, and minister at Odell, where he died.

# INTRODUCTORY HISTORY OF THE BULKELEY FAMILY IN AMERICA.

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As the Rev. Peter Bulkeley was one of the organizers and the first pastor of the church of Concord, Mass., and was identified with the town in all its interests, we have deemed it fitting to extract from Shattuck's History the following :--

This church was organized at Cambridge, July 5th, 1636, and was the thirteenth established in the colony. The meeting was called by the Rev. Peter Bulkeley\* and the Rev. John Jones who, with others, had previously begun the settlement of Concord. The Governor and Deputy Governor were invited to be present on the occasion, but because they supposed there was an informality in the invitation, at variance with their over-precise notions of etiquette, they did not attend. They sent word three days before, to the Governor and Deputy, to desire their presence, but they took it in ill-part, and thought not fit to go, because they had not come to them before, as they ought to have done, and as others had done before, to acquaint them with their purpose.

On the 6th of April, 1637, the church kept a day of humiliation at Cambridge, preparatory to the ordination or installation of Mr. Bulkeley, whom they chose teacher, and of Mr. Jones, whom they chose pastor. Delegates were present from most of the churches in the colony to assist in the ordination, but, says Winthrop, "the Governor and Mr. Cotton and Mr. Wheelright, and the two ruling elders of Boston, and the rest of that church which were of any note, did none of them come to this meeting. The reason was conceived to be because they counted there as legal preachers, and therefore would not give approbation to their ordination."

<sup>\*</sup> The name is also spelt Bulkley, Bulkly, and Buckly. The Rev. Peter and his family wrote it Bulkeley, and the leading families among his descendants write it Bulkeley.

The ordination, however, proceeded. Shattuck continues his narrative. "I have a long letter before me, written by Mr. Bulkeley, before his ordination, to the Rev. Mr. Cotton of Boston, in which this subject is discussed in his usual style. Its great length prevents its insertion here. In a l'ostscript he says, 'I should have acquainted you yesterday that the ordination of the elders of the church of Concord is to be on Wednesday, come seven, night. It is to be here at Newtown. I pray take notice of it. If it be necessary to give any other notice to other persons, or in any other way, we would not be wanting therein for avoiding of offense, and I have spoken also to Mr. Wilson.' The distinguished reputation of Mr. Bulkeley, of noble family—a man of wealth, a scholar and divine-might have excited the envy of his fellow clergymen. He, however, received their approbation and, on the 30th of the following August, was chosen one of the moderators of the first great ecclesiastical council or synod of the colony, which was then held Winthrop mentioned the Rev. Mr. Hooker as also a in Cambridge. moderator. This assembly was attended by nearly all the clergy and magistrates, and many other distinguished laymen of the colony. It continued in session twenty-four days, and examined and condemned eighty-two opinions which had crept into the churches, "some blasphemous, others erroneous, and all unsafe.".

"Litchford's Plain Dealing" mentions the church in Concord as the first one in the colony which had adopted the practice of catechising children. Mather says this was one of the constant exercises of the Sabbath. All the unmarried people were required to answer questions, after which expositions and applications were made by Mr. Bulkeley to the whole congregation. This exercise was, however, soon adopted in the other churches. The church was unanimous soon after its organization, and continued some time in harmony. But the unexpected pecuniary difficulties of the town, occasioned by its peculiar local sitution, and its condition at that time, induced many to remove, which rendered it difficult for the remainder to support two ministers, Mr. Bulkeley's salary as teacher being £70 per annum. Some difficulties arose in the church on this account. The subject of a separation was often discussed, and on the 28th of July, 1642, some of the elders went to Concord, being sent for by the church there, to advise with them about the maintenance of their elders, and they found them wavering about removal, not finding their plantation answerable to their expectation, and the maintenance of two elders too heavy a burden

for them. The elders' advice was, that they should continue, and wait upon God, and be helpful to their elders in labor, and what they could, and all to be ordered by the deacons (whose office had not been formerly improved this way amongst them), and that the elders should be content with what means the church was able, at present, to afford them, and if either of them should be called to some other place, then to advise with other churches about their removal.

"The advice of this council was followed a short time; but about October, 1644, a separation took place, and Mr. Jones removed to Fairfield, Conn." Thomas Bulkeley, the second son of the Rev. Peter by his first wife, having married a daughter of Mr. Jones, and Peter, Jun., youngest child by his second wife, removed to Fairfield, and are the ancestors of the numerous families of the name in Fairfield County. Cotton Mather, who has written an outline of the life of Mr. Bulkeley in his Magnalia, gives the following account of this affair in his own peculiar style :

"Upon Mr. Bulkeley's pressing a piece of charity, disagreeable to the will of the ruling elder, there was occasioned an unhappy discord in the church of Concord, which was at last healed by their calling in the help of a council, and the ruling elder's (Mr. Jones) abdication. Of the temptations which occurred on these occasions, Mr. Bulkeley would say, he thereby came: 1. To know more of God. 2. To know more of himself. 3. To know more of men. Peace being thus restored, the small things in the church there increased in the hands of their faithful Bulkeley, until he was translated into the regions which afford nothing but concord and glory, leaving his well-fed flock in the wilderness under the pastoral care of his son, Mr. Edward Bulkeloy. The Rev. John Jones was born, educated and regularly ordained as a preacher of the gospel in England, but at what place is not known. He arrived in New England, October 2d, 1635, with the Rev. Mr. Shepard, afterwards of Cambridge, and the Rev. John Wilson of Boston. After remaining as the colleague pastor of the church in Concord about eight years, he removed with a part of his society to Fairfield and there undertook the charge of a newly organized church, where he spent the remainder of his life. Le attained an age exceeding "three score years and ten," and died about 1664. Few records are preserved concerning this early devoted friend to the cause of Christian liberty, or concerning his family. Tradition gives him a highly respectable character. He left six children. John was graduated

at Harvard College in 1643, and Eliphalet, born January 9th, 1640, who studied divinity and was the first minister of Huntington, L. 1., where he died aged about 100 years. One daughter, Sarah, married Thomas Bulkeley, second son of Rev. Peter, as already stated.

After Mr. Jones' removal the whole care of the church of Concord devolved on Mr. Bulkeley for the remaining 14 years of his life. At this time according to Johnson it contained about seventy communicants. The following letters of Mr. Bulkeley are deemed worthy of publication :

"To his dear and loving friend Mr. Shepard, pastor, of the Church at Cambridge."

Dear Sir-I hear the Lord hath so far strengthened you as that you were the last Lord's day at the assembly. The Lord go on with the work of his goodness towards you. Being that now the Lord hath enabled you, thus far, I desire a word or two from you what you judge concerning the teacher in a congregation, whether the administration of discipline and sacraments do equally belong unto him with the Pastor, and whether he ought therein equally to interest himself. I would also desire you to add a word more concerning this, viz : What you mean by the execution of diseipline, when you distinguish it from the power. We have had speech sometimes concerning the church's power, in matters of discipline, wherein you seemed to put the power itself into the hands of the church, but to reserve the execution to the eldership. Here also I would see what you comprehend under the word execution. I would gladly hear how the common affairs of the churches stand with you. I am here shut up and do neither see nor hear.\* Write me what you know. Let me alsoe understand which way Mr. Phillips doth incline, whether towards you or otherwise, and which way Mr. Rogers is like to turn, whether to stay in these parts or goe into Conticote (Connecticut). I wrote to you not long agoe advising you to consider quid valent humeri. I know not whether you received that letter. The Lord, in mercy, bless all our labors, to his churches' good. Remember my love to Mrs. Shepard with Mrs. Harlakenden. Grace be with you all.

<sup>\*</sup> Mr. Bulkeley often laments his situation. In a letter to the Rev. Mr. Cotton, dated Dec. 17, 1640, he says: I lose much in this retired wilderness in which I live, but the Lord will, at last, lighten my candle. In the meanwhile, help us with some of that which God hath imparted unto you.

"To his reverend and loving friend, Mr. Cotton, teacher of the church at Boston :

Reverend in the Lord. These are to desire you to convey this letter in one of your own to Boston. I do the rather send it to you, because, I suppose those you commit your letters to, will be careful of the delivery, and this letter concerns matters of some moment, in regard whereof I desire you to take the more notice of it, and convey it by a safe hand. If the business concerning Virginia be finished, I desire to know how it stands; or if not finished what is intended or thought upon. My wife hath been ill ever since our coming home, but now I thank the Lord, begins to recover. This day she began to go down into the house. Remember her in your prayers and us all. And so with both our loves to yourself and Mrs. Cotton, I leave you with all yours to the Lord's rich goodness and grace, resting yours ever on him.

To the Reverend, his honored friend, Mr. Cotton, Teacher of the church at Boston, give these.

Reverend in the Lord.

Some other things I am full of, but will not write with paper and ink; only in a word, I bless God for what I hear, -how the Lord doth fill your ministry with abundance of grace, life, and power, to the exceeding joy of those that are true hearted towards the Lord. But with all, I stand amazed and wonder at God's forbearance, considering what I hear in another kind; which I do also believe to be true in some parts: true, I mean, as done and spoken by some, though untrue in respect of any cause given on your part. Truly, sir, it is to me a wonder that the earth swallows not up such wretches, or that fire comes not down from heaven to consume them ! The Lord hath a number of holy and humble ones here amongst us (in the country generally) for whose sake He doth spare and will spare long; but were it not for such a remnant, we should see the Lord would make quick work amongst us. Shall I tell you what I think to be the ground of all this insolency which discovers itself in the speech of men? Truly I cannot ascribe it so much to any outward thing as to the putting of too much liberty and power into the hands of the multitude, which they are too weak to manage, many growing conceited, proud, arrogant, self-sufficient as wanting nothing. And I am persuaded that except there be some means used to change the course of things on this point, our churches will grow more corrupt day by day and tumult will arise, hardly to be stilled. Remember the former days which you had in Old Boston, where though (through the Lord's blessing upon your labors,) there was an increase daily added to your Church, yet the number of professors is far more here than it was there. But answer me, which place was better governed? Where matters were swayed there by your wisdom and counsel matters went on with strength and power for good. But here, where the heady or headless multitude have gotten the power into their hands there is insolency and confusion. And I know not how it can be avoided, in this way, unless we should make the doors of the church narrower. This we have warrant for from the Word, which course if it should be taken, would bring its inconveniency also in another kind. But of these things no more. Only I pray the Lord to heal the evil of the places and times we live in and remove that woful contempt of His gospel which doth abound. Oh, what mischief doth one proud, lofty spirit that is in reputation for understanding among a number of others that are weak 1 and some of both such there are in every place. But our comfort is God's end and work shall go forward. Some shall be converted, some hardened. The God of mercy carry on II is work in our hearts and hand to the glory of His rich grace in Christ Jesus. I pray remember my hearty love to good Mrs. Cotton, thanking her for her kind remembrance of my little ones. I pray God give us both to see IIis grace increasing in those that He hath continued toward us. Farewell, dearly beloved and honored in the Lord, comfort yourself in Him who is most ready to be found in time of need. In Him I rest.

"I could wish you would write to Mr. Goodwin to deal with those that are in place of authority in England to take care that the Scripture may be printed more truly. 'I have a Bible printed 1648, which hath (little and great) above 100 faults in the printing of it. And I have an old Bible printed 1581 which hath but one or two, and those very small ones. I intend to write to my nephew St. John about it. A word from yourself to Mr. Goodwin, who is a man of so much respect there, would do much good." The following is a copy of his will.

#### WILL OF PETER BULKLEY.

I PETER BULKLEY, Minister of the Word, being now in the seventysixth year of my age, and ready to go the way of all flesh, do make this my last will and testament, as followeth: first I do hereby testific unto all that I do dy in the fayth of that doctrine which I have here preached in Concord, among my hearers, testifying and sealing the same with this my last confession, that it is the saveing truth of God, and therefore do humbly desire of God that those who have opposed and gain-sayed may in time bethink themselves and repent, that they may find mercy with the Lord in that behalfe, even the same mercy as I desire unto myne own soul, desireing also that though I have manifested much weakness in my dispensacion yet the hearers would labor to express the power of what they have received so that both I and they may rejoice together in the day of Christ. Now as touching my worldly estate, which is now very little in comparison of what it was when I first came to this place, I do dispose thereof as followeth: first, I do give unto my sonne Edward Bulkley, (to whom I did at the time of his marriage give such a portion as I was then able to give,) if he continue and stay in this land, these books following hereafter to be set down in a schedule annexed to this my will, or if he should remove from this country to England then (instead of ye books) before expressed, in gen'all and to be particularly named in the schedule, I give unto him five pounds of English money, to be paid him there in England, by my sonne John. Item, I do give unto my daughterin-law, the widow of my son Thomas, deceased, the vallue of one kow, to be payd unto her by my executor hereafter named, only with this exception, that if her necessity do require the same to be payd unto her while I am liveing, then that so given in my life time shall be instead of the other here before named, to be payed by my executor, and my executor to be discharged of that legasy.

Item. I do give to my sonne Eliezer, either the farme which is now used by Widow Goble and her sonne Thomas Goble, adjoining to Mrs. Flent's farme, or my mill here in the town, or the hunded acres of land be the same more or less, which lies at the neerer end of the great meadow, liing towards the further end of the great meadow, beyond the poynt of upland, which *shooles* down into the meadow towards the River, one of these three, namely, either the farm or the mill, or the hundred acres of land, with the twenty acres of meadow. I do here give unto my said sonne

Eliezur, but which of the three to settle upon him I do not at present resolve, but, I leave the consideracion thereof to my executor and the overseers of this my will hereafter named, desiring them to let him have that which will be most usefull and profitable to him when he is fit to make use thereof. Item, 1 do give and bequeath to my some Peter, the next in vallew of these three things before named so that when Eliezur's portion is set out, then the next in worth to be for Peter, and the third of the three to remayne to those that shall inheritt mine house in which I do now Item, I do give to my Sonne John, Mr. Cartwright upon live. the Rhemish Testament and Willett Synopsis. Item, to my son Joseph, Mr. Wildersham upon the one and fiftieth psalme and ye history of the Council of Trent in English, and Cornelius Tacitus in English and Mr. Bolton on Gen. 6: concerning a Christian walk-Item, 1 do bequeath to my Lord Oliver St. John, ing with God. Lord Chief Justice of the Common Please, my great English Bible, in folios which hath the letters of his name (O. G.) upon the cover of it; intreating him to accept this small token of my due love which I owe unto him and as a testimony of my thankful acknowledgement of his kindness and bounty towards me, his liberality having been a great help and support unto me in these my later times and many straytes. Item, I do give unto my cousin, Mr. Samuel Haugh, Dr. Twiss, in folio, against the Arminians. Item, I do give to my daughter Dorothy, the hundred and lifty pounds of English money, which I have in England, in the hands of my some John, the most part thereof came to me and my wife by the death of one of my wife's sisters. I mencion here £150 be the same more or less,—and though I suppose it is some what more, but what it is in just and exact amount I do not know but whatsoever it is, to my daughter Dorothy I give it which being lesser than to suffice for her suteable disposall in marriage I do therefore desire my wife, when God shall take her to himself, to add something more to the £150, as God shall enable her, and in the mean time I will that if my some do make any profit thereof, that then not only the said £150, be it more or less, but the profit of it also shall be reserved to the increase of my daughter's portion. The rest of my estate unbequeathed before, whether moveables or unmoveables, as, namely, my house, land, whether granted me first by the town or bought by money from others, cattle or money, or household stuff, or plate or whatsoever, I do give unto my dear wife, and her heirs by me begotten, giving her power hereby to

dispose by sale, or otherwise, to her benefit of any part of the lands I have in the town (except before bequeathed and given) to her own benefit as her need shall require. And in case any of my children before named by me in this my will to whom I have bequeathed the legacies named, should prove disobedient to their mother, or otherwise vicious and wicked (which God of his mercy prevent), then I will that the legacy before bequeathed to any of them, so proving disobedient and wicked, shall be wholly in the power of my said wife, their mother, to deal with them therein as shee herself in Christian wisdom shall think meet, either to give them their legacy, or to keep it to herselfe, and my will further is, that if any the three children before named, Eliezer, Peter or Dorothy, should dy before their legacyes be paid them, that then the legacy of the deceased shall go to the other two survivoing, if my wife do not stand in need of it, but if she do stand in need thereof, for her necessary maintenance, then she shall have power to take it to herself. It may perhaps be expected that I should bequeath something to the publique use of the country, which practice I wish were observed more than it is by those that are of ability. But were my estate better than now it is, I suppose I may be therein excused, in regard to what I have done formerly, in the beginning of these plantations, wherein what I have done, some few do know, but I will here be sparing therein. This only I know and may say, that which I did then 'was an help to the weake beginning, which then were, more than what was then done, I do not thinke God requires of me now, considering my wasted estate, which I have here consumed, haveing little to leave to the children what God hath given me and to pretious wife whose unfeigned piety, and singular grace of God shining in her, doth deserve more than I can do for her. Her and her children by me, I do now leave to the goodness, and mercifull providence and care of God, my mercifull father in Christ Jesus beseeching him that as he hath given them to me so he wont take them again as a gift from my hands, owneing them as his owne, being a father to the fatherlesse and a Judge unto the widow: to defend her case, in case any should go about to do her wrong. And of this my will and testament I do make my loveing wife mine only Executrix, desireing my loving Bretheren Robert Merriam and Luke Potter, the faythfull Deacons of our church, and William Hunt and Timothy Wheeler to be overseers of this my will, and to assist my said wife in any thing wherein shee shall stand in need of their help,
giving to Robert Merriam Mr. Rutherford's treatise upon the Wonders of Canaan, to Luke Potter Mr. Rutherford's upon the Dying of Christ on Jno. 12th. To William Hunt, Mr. Cooper on the 8th chapter to the Romans, and to Timothy Wheeler Mr. Dike on Jeremiah 17th concerning the deceitfulness of man's heart, which small tokens though they be unanswerable to the care or paynes they may meet with upon these occasions, yet my hope and confidence is that they will afford there helpe herein more out of conscience toward God, than out of respect of reward from man. And to this my last Will and testament I have set my hand and seal this 14th day of April in the year one thousand six hundred and fiftyeight—1658. By me, Poter Bulkeley, a seal and 17th of Feb'r in the same year.

An addition to this my Will, added Jan. 13, 1658. Be it known also that as a part of my will now written, I do add this, namely, that whereas I have agreed for a sixteenth part of the mill and for a like sixteenth part in the Iron Works which is now in frameing, I do give all my interest in both these unto my beloved wife.

PETER BULKELY, Jan. 13: 1658.

A request to the overseers of this my will and testament. These -I do earnestly intreate not to suffer any materiall or substantiall part or point of my Will to be changed, on any pretence whatsoever, especially if it do concern my dear wife, whose interest and welfare I do cheifely respect, so that be the pretence either color of law or matter of conscience, yet I desire them to retain the substance of my Will as I have set it downe as being that I have herein discharged my duty to each one so farr as my weake decaied estate will beare.

In Witness whereof I have here subscribed my name this 26th of Feb'r, 1658.

6. Mr. Aynesworth's Notes upon the 5 Books of Moses and upon the Psalmes.

Item, whereas I above bequeathed the vallew of one kow to my daughter-in-law, the widow of my son Thomas. I do hereby discharge mine Executor of that legacy, I haveing already disposed the vallew expressed to her use and benefitt.

# GENEALOGY OF THE FAMILIES IN AMERICA.

# FIRST GENERATION.

The REV. PETER BULKELEY, B. D., was of honorable and noble descent. He was of the tenth generation from Robert Bulkeley, Esq., one of the English barons, who in the reign of King John, (who died in 1216) was Lord of the Manor of Bulkeley in the County Palatine of Chester.\* He was born at Woodhill, in Bedfordshire, Jan. 31, 1583. His father, the Rev. Edward Bulkeley, D. D., was a faithful minister of the Gospel, under whose direction his son received a learned and religious education suited to his distinguished rank. About the age of sixteen, he was admitted a member of St. John's College at Cambridge, of which he was afterwards chosen fellow, and from which he received the degree of Bachelor of Divinity. He succeeded his father in the ministry, in his native town, and enjoyed his rich benefice and estate; where he was a zealous preacher of evangelical truth about twenty years. and, for the most part of the time, lived an unmolested non-conformist. At length, his preaching meeting with distinguished success, and his church being very much increased, complaints were entered against him by Arch-bishop Laud, and he was silenced for

The motto adopted in the Family Coat of Arms was "Nec temere nec timide"-Neither rashly nor timidly, and contains a beautiful sentiment characteristic of the eminent father of the American family.

his non-conformity to the requirements of the English Church. This circumstance induced him to emigrate to New England, where he might enjoy liberty of conscience.\*

He arrived in Cambridge in 1634 or 1635<sup>†</sup> and was the leader of those resolute men and self-denying Christians who soon after "went further up into the woods and settled on the plantation at Musketaquid Concord." Here he expended most of his estate for the benefit of his people; and after a laborious and useful life died March 9th, 1659, in his 77th year.

Mr. Bulkeley was remarkable for his benevolence. He had many servants, on whom, after they had lived with him several years, he bestowed farms, and then received others to be treated in a like benevolent manner. By great familiarity of manners he drew around him persons of all ages; and his easy address, great learning, and eminent piety, rendered his society pleasing and profitable to all. Persons seldom separated from his company, without having heard some remark calculated to impress the mind with the importance of religion. Though sometimes suffering under bodily infirmities, he was distinguished for the holiness of his life, and a most scrupulous observance of the duties of the Christian ministry. He avoided all novelties in dress and wore his hair short. Being strict in his own virtues, he was occasionally severe in censuring the follies of others. He was considered as the father of his people, and addressed as father, prophet, or counsellor by them, and all the ministers of the country. Had the scene of Mr. Bulkeley's labors been in Boston, or its immediate vicinity, and not, as he expresses it, "shut up" in this remote spot, then difficult of access, his name would have appeared more conspicuously in the published annals of the country. He was a thorough scholar; an elevated devotional Christian; laborious in his profession; and, as a preacher, evangelical, faithful, and of remarkably energetic and persuasive He often wrote a series of sermons on a particular eloquence.

book or passage of Scripture. One of these series on Zachariah 9: 11, was published as "The first born of New England," and passed through several editions. The latest edition bears the following title, "The Gospel Covenant, or The Covenant of Grace Opened," wherein are explained-1. The difference between the Covenant of Grace and Covenant of Works. 2. The different administration of the Covenant before and since Christ. 3. The benefits and blessings of it. 4. The conditions. 5. The properties of it. Preached at Concord in New England by Peter Bulkeley, sometime fellow of St. John's College in Cambridge. (Here follow quotations; Gen. 17: 1-7, and Isaiah 55: 3-7). The second edition was much enlarged and corrected by the author. And the chief heads of things which were omitted in the former distinguished into chapters. London, printed by Matthew Simmins, dwelling in Aldersgate Street, next door to the Golden Lion, 1651, pp. xvi, and 442 Quarto. It was dedicated "to the Church and Congregation at Concord;" and to his nephew "The Rt. Honorable Oliver St. John, Lord Embassador extraordinary from the Parliament of the Commonwealth of England, to the High and Mighty Lords, the States General of the United Provinces of the Netherlands; and Lord Chief Justice of the Common Pleas."

It is a work of great merit for that age, and considering it was preached in the remote ends of the earth, "the Church of God," says the Rev. Mr. Shepard of Cambridge, "is bound to bless God for the holy, judicious, and learned labors of this aged, experienced, and precious servant of Christ." After reading this book, President Stiles observes: "He was a masterly reasoner in theology, and equal to the first characters in all Christendom and in all ages.

Two of Mr. Bulkeley's manuscripts are preserved in the Library of the American Antiquarian Society. One contains answers to several theological questions, and is addressed to the Rev. Mr. Phillips of Watertown. The other is on the character and government of the Church. The following analysis is given at the close of this work: "Part I. The visible Church is: 1.—For the efficient cause, called of God. 2.—For the material cause, a number of visible saints and believers in the judgment of men. 3.— For the formal cause, union by an explicate and implicate covenant together. 4.—For the final cause, to set out God's praises. Part II. The Church's government: 1.—Is originally in the people's hands. 2.—Which people are to elect their own officers, teachers, elders, and deacons. 3.—By which officers they are to rule and govern,—by admitting fit members, and by watching over, admonishing, and casting out those that be bad." This is a most able defence of Congregationalism in opposition to Episcopacy, and touches with the author's peculiar power and clearness the ecclesiastical questions in discussion at that period.

Mr. Bulkeley was twice married. 1. To Jane Allen, daughter of Thomas Allen of Goldington, whose nephew was Lord Mayor of London. By her he had twelve children, ten sons and two daughters. He lived eight years a widower, and then married 2d, Grace Chetwood (or Chitwood). By her he had four children. She survived him and removed to New London, where she bought a house in 1663, and died April 21, 1669.

# THIRD GENERATION:

#### 2.

REV. EDWARD BULKELEY, son of Rev. Peter and Jane Bulkeley, born at Odell, England, June 17, 1614, where he was chiefly educated; emigrated to this country; was admitted a member of the First Church in Boston, in 1634. Having acquired a professional education, under the instruction of his father, he was licensed to preach the Gospel, and ordained at Marshfield, Mass., in 1642 or 1643. On the death of his father, in 1659; he was dismissed and installed over the Church in Concord, as his successor, with an annual salary of  $\pounds$ 80. He died in the 53d year of his ministry, at Chelmsford, Jan. 2, 1696, probably on a visit to his grandson, and was buried in Concord, aged 82.

Few records are preserved concerning his ministry or himself. He is represented, by tradition, to have been lame and of a feeble constitution. He was however greatly reputed for his talents, acquirements, irreproachable character, and piety. He preached an election sermon in 1680, from 1 Sam. 2: 30, and one before the Ancient and Honorable Artillory Company in 1679 from 1 Pet. 2: 11. He also preached one in 1676 in commemoration of the safe return of Capt. Thomas Wheeler and his associates, after the Battle of Brookfield. The duties of his office increasing with the growth of the town, assistance was judged necessary and the Rev. Joseph Estabrook was ordained as his colleague in 1667. His salary was also  $\pounds 80$ , of which  $\pounds 40$  was to be paid in money, and  $\pounds 40$  in grain, wheat to be estimated at 5s., rye at 4s., and corn at 3s., per bushel.

March 12, 1681, the town voted "That every householder that hath a teame, greater or lesser, shall carry yearly one load of wood to the minister, and every other householder or votable person shall cut wood one day for the minister, and that the wood be equally divided to the ministers, as the selectmen shall appoint." The arrangement which the following vote specifies was made March 5, "Whereas the Rev. Pastor, Mr. Edward Bulkeley, is under 1694. such infirmities of body by reason of great age, that he is not capable of attending the work of the ministry as in times past, being also sensible of the obligations the town is under to afford him a comfortable maintenance during the term of his natural life, that thereby the people may testifie their gratitude for his former services in the Gospel, they do hereby oblige the town to pay Mr. Bulkoley, yearly, during his natural life, the sum of £30 in lieu of his former salary." This proposition was assented to by Mr. Bulkeley, on condition that he should have liberty to preach or not as he please.

Mr. Bulkeley married and had a family, but the date of his marriage and the name of his wife has not been ascertained.

#### 18.

HON. PETER BULKELEY, oldest son of Rev. Edward Bulkeley, born Nov. 3, 1641, graduated in 1660. He settled in Concord, and in 1673 and the four subsequent years represented the town in the General Court of Massachusetts. In Feb., 1676, he was chosen speaker of the house of Deputies; and in August of the same year was appointed with the Hon. William Stoughton, Agent to England, on the complaints of Georges and Mason, and re-appointed in 1682. They sailed on the first mission, Oct. 30, 1676. On the 27th of February, 1679, he was re-appointed by King Charles the II, with Stoughton as agent to England, respecting the Naragansett coun-They returned Dec. 23, 1679. In 1677 he was chosen one of try. the Judges, or Court of Assistants, and re-elected eight years. He was also one of the commissioners of the United Colonies the greater part of that time. On the 8th of October, 1685, he was appointed by King James the Second, one of the counsel of which Joseph Dudley, Esq., was President, which constituted the government of the Colonists, after the charter was forfeited. In 1680, the militia of the county was divided into two regiments and Major Peter Bulkeley appointed to command one of them. This was an office in those days of great distinction. In all these and other important offices he acquitted himself with honor and general acceptance. He was one of twenty who in 1683 made the "million" purchase, in Now Hampshire, and had several special grants of land for public services. He died May 24th, 1688, aged 44, and "was buried," says Judge Sewall, the "27th, because he could not be kept, word of which was sent to Boston the same day to prevent any going in vain to his funeral. He married Rebecca Wheeler,

only daughter of Lieut. Joseph Wheeler, April 16, 1667. After his death, his widow, Mrs. Rebecca Bulkeley, married Jonathan Prescott, as his third wife.

In the name of God, Amen. I, Joseph Bulkeley of Littleton, in the county of Middlesex, in the Province of Massachusetts Bay, New England, gentleman, being of a disposing mind and memory and in usual health, but calling to mind my frailty and being desirous to dispose of my worldly estate, do make this my last Will and Testament, recommending and committing my soul to God, who gave it, and my body to the earth, to be decently buried, at the discretion of my executors, hereafter named. As to my worldly estate, I dispose of the same as follows:—

I give unto my beloved wife *Silence Balkeley*, all my moveable estate within doors forever, to be improved and disposed of by her as she shall think best, and also the liberty of dwelling in and improving a room in my dwelling house, in said Littleton, with a chamber over it, as she shall choose, and so much of the cellar room as she shall need during her widowhood, all to be improved by her; also firewood brought to the door and cut fit for the fire, bread, corn, rye, and Indian, meat, malt, eider, and all manner of provisions, to be procured and provided for her from time to time and yearly, as she shall need, during her widowhood, by my son Peter Bulkeley hereafter named, or otherwise I allow and give to her the free use and improvement of the one-third of my lands at Littleton in the room of said provisions, with the improvement of said house room during her being my widow as she shall chose.

2. I give to my son John Bulkeley of Groton, five shillings old tenor, he having had already his part of my estate.

3. I give to my daughter Rebecca Hubbard, of Concord, five shillings old tenor, she having had before her part of my estate.

4. I give to the children of my daughter *Dorothy 11unt*, of Littleton, deceased, five shillings old tenor among them, she having had her part in my estate.

5. I give to my daughter *Jane Dwight*, of Sutton, five shillings old tenor, she having had her part in my estate.

6. Item. I give to my daughter *Silence David*, of Harvard, five shillings old tenor, she having had her part in my estate.

7. I give to my son Joseph Bulkeley, his heirs or assigns, the sum of two hundred pounds old tenor, to be paid by my son Peter Bulkeley within a year after my decease. Also I give the sum of one hundred pounds old tenor, to my son Charles Bulkeley, his heirs or assigns, to be paid by said Peter Bulkeley within a year after my decease, in which time, also, the aforesaid small sums are to be paid to my daughters and the children above named by said Peter Bulkeley. Also I give to my son Peter Bulkeley aforesaid, his heirs and assigns forever, my dwelling house and barn, together with all my lands, in said Littleton, as also my stock of creatures and moveables abroad, as husbandry tools, and also I give to said Joseph and Charles Bulkeley, their heirs or assigns forever, all those rights of land that may belong to be my right in any town or place whatever, excepting Concord. And my will is that said Peter Bulkeley, besides the legacies above mentioned, pay all my just debts and likewise pay the cost and charges of my funeral, and I make him, said Peter, the sole executor of this my Last Will, desiring that James Minot, of Concord, Esq., would give his advice and assistance to my said executor. It may be needful also that I give to said Peter those debts which may be due to me at my decease, if any there should be. Allowing this and no other to be my Last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 17th day of December, 1744, in the 18th year of his majestie's reign.

THOMAS BULKELEY, son of Rev. Peter and Jane Allen Bulkeley, born in England April 11, 1617, was made a freeman March 13, 1639. He married Sarah Jones of Concord, Mass., daughter of Rev. John Jones. He had by her five children, of whom the name of one is recorded on the Concord Records, and the rest are found at Fairfield, Ct. Lands are recorded there in 1653, bounded by land of Thomas Bulkeley. The precise date of his death is not known. It was previous to Feb. 26, 1658, for his father, in his Will of that date, gives property to "his daughter-in-law, the widow of his son, Thomas Bulkeley." An inventory of Thomas Bulkeley's estate was presented to the Court of Probate the 4th day of June, 1658. After his death his widow married Anthony Wilson, by whom she had no children. Mr. Wilson died in 1662, leaving a good estate to his only child, Sarah, by his former wife. After his death, Mrs. Wilson gave, by Will of April 26, 1667, lands to her two sons, John and Joseph Bulkley, besides books and other property, and to her daughter Sarah, the wife of Eleazer Brown, Rebecca, wife of Joseph Whelpley and daughter Hannah (probably unmarried), books and other property.

 10, 1669, John Bulkeley hath received three parcels of land following, due to him as his portion from his mother, Sarah Wilson, to be to him and his heirs forever, these parcels as followeth:—One home lot, being in quantity two ackers and a half, being more or less bounded on the south with an highway, on the north-east with the land of Henrich (?), on the north-west with land now in possession of said Sarah, on the south with the highway. Also a third part of the meadow before the house, being in quantity one acker, more or less, bounded on the north-east with the land of Will Ward, on the south-west with the land of said Sarah, on the north-west with an highway. Also one third part of the meadow in the Middle Meadow, being in quantity two acres, being more or less, bounded on the north-east with the lands of George Squire, on the south-east with the Creek, on the south-west with the land of the said Sarah, on the north-west with the Old Field ditch.

Also two acres of land lying over the Creek, more or less, being in quantity bounded on the north-east with the land of Mr. Gold, on the south-west with the land of John Odell, on the southeast with an highway.

Also one parcel of land in Sascoe field, being in quantity one acre, more or less, bounded on the north and south with highway, on the east with the land of Jacob Gray, on the west with the land of Mr. Wakeman." Feb. 15, 1672, The Town hath granted to John Bulkeley one parcel of land in the Sascoe field, being in quantity an hundred and twenty-two rods, more or less, bounded on the south-east, north and south-east with highways, on the south-west with the lands of Francis Bradley, on the north-east with the land of John Hide.

There are also several other deeds of gift from the town, and also deeds of purchase of land from individuals.

He married Eliza —, the surname not known. He died in February, 1709. An inventory of the estate, which was quite large for the times, was presented to the Court Feb. 7, 1709. He being intestate, Sarah Bulkeley, his oldest daughter, and Joseph Whelpley, were appointed administrators. The estate was divided between his five daughters.

JOSEPH BULKELEY, son of Thomas and Sarah Jones Bulkeley, born 1644, married Martha Beers of Fairfield. The Fairfield Records show that he was a large land-holder, as was his brother John. The following are some of the entries:—Feb. 15, 1672, Joseph Bulkeley hath received three parcek of land due to him, as his portion of his mother, Sarah Wilson, to be to him and his heirs forever.

The lands are as followeth:----

One home lot, being in quantity two and a half acres, being more or less bounded on the south-east with the land of John Bulkeley, on the south-west with the highway, on the north-west with the lands of his mother Wilson, on the north-east with the land of (Henrich?) and George Squire, so much of the orchard as falls to his lot. Also a parcel of land in Sascoe field, being in quantity one acre and a half, more or less, bounded on the south-west with the land of Thomas Bennet, on the southeast with a highway, on the north-east with the salt marsh, on the north-west with the land of said Sarah, his mother. Also one parcell of meadow in Sascoe north, being in quantity half an acremore or less, bounded ye north-east with a highway, on the southeast with the land of Joshua Knowles, on the south-west with the land sometime pertaining to George Godwin, deceased, on the north-east with the land of Thomas Beers. The first parcel above mentioned, viz., ye home lot, was given to Mr. Thomas Bulkeley, deceased, by the last Will and Testament of his brother, Daniell Bulkeley, deceased. On the 7th of July, 1776, Gov. Tryon, with his army, sailed

from New Haven to Fairfield, and the next morning disembarked upon the beach. The Hessians who accompanied Tryon were his incendiaries. To them he entrusted the wielding of the torch, and faithfully they obeyed their master. When the people fled from the town, not suspecting that their homes would be burned, they left most of their furniture behind. The distress was, consequently, great, for many lost every earthly possession. Among the buildings saved was that of Mr. Bulkeley. Tryon made it his headquarters. The naval officer who had charge of the British ships, piloted them to Fairfield, was Mrs. Bulkeley's brother, and he had requested Tryon to spare the house of his sister. Tryon acquiesced and, feeling his indebtedness to her brother, the general informed Mrs. Bulkeley that if there was any other house she wished to save she should be gratified. After the enemy left, the enraged militia under Captain Sturges placed a field piece in front of the dwelling, and then sent Mrs. Bulkeley word that she might have two hours to clear the house and leave it, or they would blow her to atoms. She found means to communicate a notice of her situation to General Silliman, who was about two miles distant. He immediately went to the town and found one hundred and fifty men at the Common. By threats and persuasions, he induced them to withdraw. The next day Col. Benjamin Talmadge, with his regiment, arrived from White Plains and, encamping on the smoking ruins, made Tryon's quarters his own. Mrs. Bulkeley was not a friend of the enemy.

According to her testimony under oath, she was badly treated by the soldiery, notwithstanding she had a protection from General Garth, the second in command. They plundered her house, stripped the buckles from her shoes, tore a ring from her finger, and fired the house five times before leaving it."

# WILL OF JOHN BULKELEY.

# Recorded in the Records of the Prerogative Court, of Canterbury, Englund. Copy procured by Horatio G. Somerby, Esq.

The last Will and Testament of John Bulkeley, of the Precincts of St. Katharines, near the tower of London, Gent., made and ordained this 11th day of October, 1689, Witnesseth and declareth as followeth : Imprimis that I, the said John Bulkeley, having first resigned my Imortal soul into the gracious hands of him that gave it, with good hope and humble confidence, founded on the Scripture of faith, through the sole morits of Jesus Christ, that blessed and only mediator between God and man, who is himself both true God and true man, in one person, received and applied, by the renewing work of the Holy Spirit, that he will receive it into his everlasting glory.

As for my mortal body after its decease, I leave it to the care of my executor and joint executresses, hereafter named, to be decently buried, in such place and manner as by special direction, in a small schedule, under my hand given, shall be by me hereafter ordered, only having long observed the general dislike of and complaint against late burials. As to the time of my bodie's interment, my express will is that, if it shall happen in the winter, or when the daies are shorter than the nights, that then the said interment be actually made, at the furthest by half an hour before sunset. If in the summer, when the daies are longer than the nights, that it be at the furthest by six o'clock in the afternoon. As to the portion of worldly goods, which God, of his free bounty, hath bestowed upon me, my just debts and funeral charges being first paid and, that as soon as may be, I give and bequeath the same, in manner and form following.

Imprimis, I give and bequeath unto my loving wife Avis over and above what is and was settled upon her by special covenant and agreement, by me, to and with her, had and made before our inter-marriage, the sume of thirty pounds of good and lawful money of England, to be to her paid by, five pounds a quarter. within eighteen callendar months next after my decease. Moreover, I hereby give and grant unto her my said wife the possession and use during her natural life of all of those rings, necklaces. jewels, pieces of plate, and other household stuffs, which she had before, and brought with her at our said inter-marriage, or hath been by me since given, willing with all, and desiring that her best diamond ring be, immediately after her decease, given, taken by or delivered to my loving daughter Elizabeth, the now wife of Edward Falkner, Grocer, for her sole proper use and dispose, if she shall happen to be then living, otherwise to be and come to her sole and eldest daughter, if she leave any. But if she my said daughter shall happen to decease before my said wife, and leave no daughter

of her own surviving, then my mind and will is that the said best diamond ring, with the rest of the said rings, necklaces, jewells, &c., be sold and equally divided between my two sons, *Edward* and *Thomas Bulkeley*; and their brother-in-law, my son-in-law before named.

Item. I give and bequeathe unto my loving sister, Mrs. Eleanor Frye, the sum of five pounds, and unto my brother and sister Vicaridge, if at my decease surviving, and to every of their children, then living, the sum of ten shillings apiece, and also to my late nephew, Trye Vicaridge, his eldest son, the like legacy of ten shillings.

Item. In like manner I give and bequeathe unto my three brothers, in New England, Vizt., Edward, Gershom and Peter twenty shillings apiece, if then living. As above, the sons of my deceased brother Thomas, if to be heerd of and then living, to my nephew, Edward Bulkeley, here in England, and to my nephew, Thomas Trye, the son of my late brother-in-law, Mr. Wm. Trye, the sum of ten shillings apiece, if then living, to be to them and every of them respectively, paid as soone as may be after my decease, and as for the remainder of my personal estate, my mind and will is that it be forthwith sold and turned into money, and to equally divide between my sonnes and son-in-law, Edward, Thomas and Everard, afore mentioned, and in case of any of their personal decease before me, my mind and will then is that the part of the said dividend which should have come to such said child, son or son-inlaw, shall be and come to his or their oldest child, respectively, if any such shall be then living. If any of them shall decease before me, then the said dividend to be proportionably to the then survivors.

As to the land in Kings IIall, Suffolk, settled upon me and my heirs, after my wife's decease, my mind and will is that that also be forthwith sold, and that of the product thereof, within two months of the said sale, two hundred pounds of good and lawful, money of England be paid to my son Falkner as the full remainder of his present wive's portion by me before marriage, promised, and as for the remainder of said product, my mind and will is that it be equally divided between my two sons *Vidward* and Thomas aforesaid, only in case either of them happen to decease before the said last dividend made, and shall leave lawful issue behind them, my will is that their respective parts thereof do and shall come and be to the use and behoof of such issue, and accordingly to them or
their guardian paid within six months after the said sale, and the money thence arising received, or else to be otherwise put out upon good security for the benefit of the said issue as my executor shall think safest and best. All other of my estate, whether reall or personal, together with my seal ring (which I hereby particularly exempt and reserve from all foregoing bequests), I give and bequeath fully and wholly to my son Edward, whome, together with my said wife, Avis, and my daughter Elisabeth Falkner, I hereby nominate, ordaine, and appoint joynt executor and executresses of and to this my last Will and Testament, revoking and disannulling hereby all former wills whatever. Written with my own hand this eleventh day of October, 1689, in the first year of our sovereign Lord and Lady William and Mary, by the wonderful grace of God, of England, Scotland, France and Ireland, King and Queen whome God of his mercy to those nations grant long to live and continue their sovereign blessings thereunto. In the name of God, amen, I, Everard Faukner, citizen and grocer of London, being of sound and perfect mind and memory, thanks be to God for it, do make and declare this to be my last will and Testament, as followeth: And first, I give my soul into the hands of my Almighty Creator, resting myself on the hopes of His infinite mercy, through the merits of Christ my Redeemer. As to my body, I commit it to the earth, to be decently interred at the discretion of my executors herein after named and, as to what worldly estate I have of what nature, kind or qualitye soever the same is, I dispose of in manner following, that is to say,

Imprimus, my will and mind is that my debts be duly paid and satisfied.

Item. I give, devise and bequeathe to my dear and loving wife Elisabeth Faulkner, all my goods, house hold stuffe, debts due to me, moneys and plate, jewells, chattels and personal estate, whatsoever, to her own sole use and disposing.

Item. I give, devise and bequeathe to my said dear wife, Elisabeth Faukner, all my reall free and Copy hold messuages, lands, tenements and hereditaments whatsoever and wheresoever the same are or is or shall hereafter be. To have and hold the same and every part thereof to her, the said Elisabeth Faukner, her heirs and assigns forever, to her and their own use.

Item. All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate (if any there is or if any hereafter shall arise or come to me,) and of what nature, kind or quality soever, either real, personal or otherwise, the same is or hereafter shall be, I give, devise and bequeathe the same to my said dear wife Elisabeth Faukner, and to her executors and assigns forever. And I do hereby constitute, nominate and appoint my said dear and loving wife, Elisabeth Faukner, sole executrix of this my last will and Testament. And I do herewith appoint and direct my said wife that she make provision that, at her death such of my relations as are hereinafter named may have such moneys as are herein after expressed, if my or her estate will at such her death bear and pay the same. To wit, that she provide for and give to Everard Faukner, the son of my brother John Faukner, three hundred pounds, and to all the other children of my said brother John, borne or to be borne, that shall be living at my decease, two hundred pounds apiece, and in case any of them die in their minority, the same to go to the survivors, Everard included, and that share and share all alike, and if my said wife shall think fit at any time to advance, dispose or pay any sume or sumes of money, for the benefit or placing out of any or either of such child, or children.

Then what monies she shall soe advance, disburse or pay to be deducted from the part or sume limited or hereby intended, to any such child or children whose receipt the minor shall be a valid discharge, in Law, to my said wife. And I do hereby declare and also appoint that if any of the children of my said brother John Faukner, or if my said brother John, prosecute, sue or trouble my said wife in any court of law or equity for touching or concerning this my will, or such monies or legacies as I have hereby devised my said dear wife to give them or any of them, at the time of her death or otherwise. That then every such child or children so prosecuting, sueing or troubling my said wife, either by him, her or themselves, or any person in his or her or their behalf, be prevented and excluded from the money or legacy hereby intended to him, her or them, in like manner as if he, her or they were not the child or children of my said brother John or had not been herein named or mentioned, any aforesaid to the contrary notwithstanding. And I do hereby revoke and annull all other wills by me at any time heretofore made, and do declare and appoint this writing as and for my only last will and Testament. In witness whereof I, the said Everard Faukner, have unto this my last will set my hand and seal the tenth day of December, in the fourth year of the reigne of our Sovereign, Lady Anne, by the grace of God, Queen of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c.

This fourth day of June, in the sixth year of the reign of his Majesty King George, over Great Britain, France, and Ireland, Annoque Domini 1720, I, Elisabeth Faulkner, of Epsom als Elisham, in the county of Surrey, widow, being weak in body, but of sound and disposing mind and memory, praised be God for the same, and being desirous to settle my affairs. do make this my last Will and Testament, in manner following: First and principally I resign my soul into the hands of Almighty God, my Creator, looking and believing in and thro' the atonements of Jesus Christ, my only Lord and Savior, to obtain everlasting happiness in his eternal kingdom. My body I commit to the earth from whence it was taken, in faith of a joyful resurrection, willing the same to be decently buried at the discretion of my executors, hereinafter named, with and by my late indeared husband, Mr. Everard Faulkner, deceased, and inasmuch as he now lies crowded, or liable to be, in the church of Epsom aforesaid, my will and mind is, and I do hereby direct my executors, to prepare and provide with all convenient expedition after my decease a fit and proper vault, in the church-yard of Epsom aforesaid, or some other fitting and convenient place, and thereunto to remove and lodge the corps of my said husband together with my own, the arrangement of which together with my funeral, I leave unto my executors, so as they lay out therein a sum not exceeding six hundred pounds. And as to such temporal good and estate as it hath pleased God to bestow upon me, I give and dispose thereof in manner following, that is to say, I give, devise, and bequeath, all those my lands, tenements and hereditaments, scituate and lying in the Town and Parish of Epsom aforesaid, held by Copy of Court Roll of the Manor of Epsom aforesaid, and which I have surrendered to the use of my will, (except a small piece of land or ground, (parcel of the premises,) by me allotted and set out or agreed and intended to be allotted and appropriated for the erecting thereon, a meeting place for religious worship, and also all other my copy Hold and customary estate in England, unto my nephew, Thomas Bulkely, now or late Factor at Fort St. George, in the East Indies, and the heirs of his body lawfully begotten, or to be, together or for want of such issue, I give and devise the same premises (except before excepted) unto Stanley West, of London, Gent', and the Revd. William Harris, of London aforesaid, minister of the gospel, my executors hereinafter named, and their heirs upon trust, to make absolute sale thereof, for such price as can be reasonably obtained for the same, and to bring in and add all such money as shall arise unto my personal estate, to the end and intent the same may go with, and be applied in like manner, as the surplus and residuum of my personal estate is herein by me willed and appointed. Also I give and devise the aforesaid piece or parcel of ground so allotted, designed, or intended, for the building thereon such an erection as aforesaid for religious worship, unto the said Stanley West and William Harris, and their heirs in trust, to devise, surrender, convey, and settle the same for the use and purpose aforesaid for such term of years, or other estate as they or the survivor of them shall see meet. And I do desire and direct my said nephew, Thomas Bulkely, and the heirs of his body, to confirm and corroborate the same estate by such waies and manners as my said Trustees or their counsel, learned in the law, shall reasonably advise. Item. I give and bequeathe all my share and interest (being one thousand pounds nominal stocks) in the capital stock or fund of the Bank of England, and the growing dividends and profits thereof, and all benefit and advantage of the same unto my executors herein after named and appointed in trust, to permit and suffer my cousin, Edward Bulkly, and his assigns, to take and receive to his and their own proper use, the interest, dividends, or profits of my said stock for and during the term of his natural life, and from and after his decease to permit and suffer my cousin, Sarah Bulkeley, now wife of the said Edward Bulkely, and her assigns, to take and receive to her and their use one moiety or equal half part of the dividends, or interest, or profits of my said stock, for and during the time of her natural life, and as to the same moiety from and immediately after the decease of the said Edward Bulkeley, and all the dividends, profits, and proceeds thereof.

In trust for Elisabeth Bulkeley, daughter of the said Edward , and Sarah Bulkeley. Nevertheless if the said Elisabeth Bulkeley shall happen to die or depart this mortal life before she shall attain her age of one and twenty years, or day of marriage, then my will and mind is and I do hereby provide that my executors and the survivor of them, and the executors and administrators of such survivor, shall stand and be possessed of and entitled to my said stock, and all the dividends, profits, and proceeds thereof, in trust for such person or persons who, at the time of the decease of the said Elisabeth Bulkley, shall be the heir at law of me, the said Elisabeth Falkner, and the executors and administrators of the same heir at law forever and upon their further trust, nevertheless, and I do hereby will and provide that my said executors and trustees, and the survivor of them, shall and may by and with the privity and consent of my said cousins, Edward Bulkeley, Sarah Bulkeley, and Elisabeth Bulkeley, or the major part of them, or of the survivors or survivor of them, at any time after my decease, absolutely sell and transfer my said stock, or any part thereof, at such price as they can reasonably obtain for the same, and take and receive all or any part of my said capital stock, and likewise shall and may place at and dispose of the moneys thereby accruing upon such securities, or in or for such purchasers of houses, lands, annuities, or other public stocks as they in their discretion shall think fittest, and settle, or cause the same to be settled, upon the like trusts as are herein before mentioned and declared of and concerning my said stock, any thing contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding. Item, I give and bequeath unto the said Elisabeth Bulkeley, if and when she shall attain her age of one and twenty years, or day of marriage, the sum of five hundred pounds, to be paid unto her without interest at her attainment of the said age or day of marriage first happening. Item, I give and appoint unto my nephew, Everard Fawkner, four hundred pounds, and to my three neices, his sisters, Sarah, Jane, and Susannah, three hundred pounds a piece, which said last mentioned summes make together the summe of one thousand and three hundred pounds, and is the sum directed, intended, and appointed them, in and by the last Will and Testament of my said late husband, and is the whole amount and in full of what my said husband so in-

tended or appointed them. But inasmuch as I have already paid and advanced, and may yet advance and pay unto or for them respectively, several sums of money in part of such their said intended gifts or legacies, and hereby expressly provide and do direct my executors to deduct and take from the same gifts and legacies respectively all such sum and summes of money as by receipts or otherwise shall appear to have been by me at any time or times in my life time advanced or paid unto or for them, my said nephew and neices, the Fawkners, or any of them respectively, for or in respect of all or any moneys or legacies given, appointed, or intended them, or any of them, in and by my said late husband's will or otherwise, and if they are grateful and quiet under his and my will, (and not otherwise,) I further bequeath of my own free gift unto each and every one of them, my said nephew and nieces, the Fawkners, the further sum of three hundred pounds. To my brother-in-law, William Bradenall, fifty pounds. and to him and his wife forty pounds for mourning; to the lady Catharine Taylor, one hundred pounds; to the Revd. Mr. Thomas Valentine, of Epsom aforesaid, one hundred pounds, and ten pounds more for mourning; to Mrs. Reddall, of Northtoneshire, twenty pounds; to Mrs. Martha Barrow, daughter of my cousin, Thomas Barrow, fifty pounds; to my said cousin, Edward Bulkeley, and his wife and daughter, every said nephew and neices, the Fawkners, ten pounds a piece for mourning; to Mr. ----- Barrow and Mrs. Elisabeth Barrow, ten pounds a piece for mourning, and to the Bishop and his lady ten pounds a piece for mourning. Item, I give unto the Revd. Mr. Woodford, minister of Epsom aforesaid, ten pounds; to Mr. Anderson, of the same place, twenty pounds; to Mrs. Drury, five pounds, to whom I also remit four pounds of the debt she owes me; to Jane Furness, ten pounds; to my God daughter, Elisabeth Herkins, twenty pounds, and do will and appoint my executors to pay unto or for the benefit of Mrs. Elisabeth Herkins, wife of John Herkins, the sum of ten pounds, for her separate and peculiar use, apart from her said husband, whom I will shall not meddle therewith, nor shall the same be subject to his control or debts; and the receipt or direction in writing of the said Mrs. Herkins I will shall be a sufficient discharge to my said executors for the same. Item, I give unto Izan Patrick ten pounds; to my maid, Susannah Fletcher, twenty pounds, together with mourning at the discretion of my executors, and to John Stone

Street five pounds. Item, I give unto my said executors one hundred pounds in trust and to the intent, that they or the survivor of them, or the executors and administrators of such survivor, shall pay and apply the same for and towards the building of the aforesaid house or place for the religious worship of the dissenting congregation at Epsom aforesaid, when and as they shall see fit. Item, I will and direct my executors to give and distribute the sum of one hundred pounds sterling, to and amongst twenty such dissenting preachers or teachers in the county as they or the survivor Item, I give and bequeath unto such the of them shall see fit. children and grandchildren of my uncles, Edward Bulkeley, Peter Bulkeley, and Gershom Bulkeley, late of New England, as shall be living at the time of my decease, the sum of five hundred pounds sterling, in such parts and proportions, at such times, and in such manner, as my executors, or the survivor of them, or the executor and administrater of such survivor shall see meet. Item, I give to his grace, the Archbishop of Canterbury, and his lady, twenty shillings a piece for rings; to Mrs. Hester Vicarage, fifty pounds; to Rachel Dent, of Coleman Street, ten pounds; to the Revd. Mr. Joshua Bayes, five pounds; to the lady Ward and her four daughters each a ring of twenty shillings value; to Mrs. Poyston and her two eldest daughters, and Mr. Thomas Wooley and his wife, and their two daughters, each a ring of twenty shillings value, and to Mrs. Elizabeth Dirton, Mrs. Casey, Mrs. Bridges and her nephew, John Bridges, and his sister, twenty shillings a piece for rings. Item, I give unto my coachman, George, his livery, together with a mourning (suit), at the discretion of my executors, and do will that they pay him half a years wages from my death, and permit him to live that half year at my house at Epsom, clear of all charges for board and diet; and my will is that all my aforesaid money legacies to be paid at the end of six callendar months next after my decease, or as soon as conveniently may be and not before, save only those given for mourning and rings, and as to such plate, jewells, rings, goods, or other things, whereon I have or shall write, or by any note under my hand or of my own hand writing, I shall signify to whom I would have the same respectively go, my will is and I do hereby desire my executors to give and devise the same over accordingly. And my will is and I do hereby direct that my said cousin, Edward Bulkeley, and his said wife and daughter, and the survivors and survivor of them, do inhabit in my present dwelling house in Epsom aforesaid, while and until my said nephew,

Thomas Bulkeley, shall arrive in England, or my executors have certain advices of his death, and that they take care to keep my said house and the gardens and appurtenances thereto belonging in the mean time in good repair and condition, and the charges and expenses thereof I will to be paid out of my estate by my executors, together with such the provision for my said cousins, Edward and wife, and daughter, during their abode here, as my said executors or the survivor of them shall from time to time adjudge, or think fitting, necessary, or reasonable, and all the rest and residue of all and singular, my monies, securities for money, goods, chattels, and personal estate, that shall be and remain after my debts, funeral charges, be paid and discharged. I give and bequeath unto my executors hereinafter named and appointed in trust for my said nephew, Thomas Bulkeley, if and in case he shall be living at the time of my decease, equally to be divided between, (if more than one,) part and share alike, and if but one of them, in trust for that one, so that such child or children live to attain the age of one and twenty years. Then in trust to pay to my said nephew and nieces, the Fawkners, or such of them as shall be then living, the sum of sixteen hundred pounds sterling, in equal parts and shares, and upon further trust to pay unto such of the children of the said sister, Vicarage, except he, that is the Chirurgeon, as shall be then living, the sum of fifty pounds a piece, and upon further trust to pay unto the child or children, or grandchild, or grandchildren of my said late uncle, Edward, Peter and Gershom Bulkeley, as shall be then living, one-half part of the then remaining surplus of my said personal estate, in such parts and proportions, at such times and in such manner as my executors, or the survivors of them, or the executors or administrators of such survivor, shall think fit; and upon further trust to pay unto every legatee in this my will named, (other than and except my said relations, the Fawkners and Bulkeleys, and the legatees for mourning and rings,) the like sums of money and legacies by way of addition, as I have ordered by this my will, give, allot, or intend, unto or for them respectively, and as to all the rest and residue of the said overpluss in one residuum of my said personal estate upon the further trust and to the intent and purpose. That my said executors and trustees, and the survivor of them, shall pay, apply, and dispose of the same, and every part thereof, unto such person or persons, and to and for such charitable uses, intents and purposes, in such proportions, at such time, and in such manner, as I have or

shall direct them, or as they or the survivor of them, or the executors or administrators of the survivor of them shall see fit, and to, for, and upon no other use, intent, or purpose whatsoever. And I do earnestly desire and entreat my good and faithful friend, Stanley West, to take upon him the burthen of being one of my executors, and I do name, ordain, and appoint him, the said Mr. Stanley West, and the said Mr. William Harris, executors of this, my last Will and Testament, having an entire confidence in their integrity, and as a token of my respect unto them for their care and trouble to be had and taken therein, I do give unto each of them two hundred pounds sterling; and I do desire and direct my said executors in the first place to pay all my just debts as I shall truly owe at the time of my decease, according to equity and good conscience; and I do hereby give full power and authority unto my said executors and the survivors of them, and the executors and administrators of such survivor, to make such occupation and to give such discharge for any debts or sums of money as at the time of my decease shall be due, owing, and payable unto me as they in their discretion shall think fit. And I do hereby also empower and direct my executors either to sell or continue my stock, subscription, or interest in the South Sea Company, as they shall think fittest; and my will and desire is that my said nephew, Thomas Bulkeley, and other my legatees who may be concerned therein, do entirely acquiesce in what they, my said executors, or the survivor of them, shall see meet to do in and about the same, and I do hereby declare my express will and mind to be, and do provide that it shall and may be lawful to and for my said executors, their executors and administrators, and each and every of them, in the first place to satisfy and reimburse him and themselves by and out of my estate, and the several devises and legacies herein before given and made unto them, all such costs, charges, and expenses, as they either or any of them shall reasonably lay out and expend in the execution of this my will and performance of the trusts hereby in them reposed. and that they either or any of them shall not be charged or chargeable with, or answerable for any part of my estate, save what shall actually be in or come into their respective hands, or be actually received by them respectively by their respective express orders. Nor shall either or any of them be answerable for the defaults, neglects, or misdoings of the other of them, nor shall either or any of them be answerable for any monies they shall place out at interest, or otherwise dispose of by virtue and in pursuance of this my

If the same shall hereby happen to be lost in part or in all, will. so that it be done with the joint consent and concurrence of both my said executors during their joint lives, and so that in the writings or securities taken for the same, or by some indorsement thereon, or other writing made and executed at the time of taking such securities, it be from time to time expressed that the same is or are taken in trust for or for the account or benefit of my legatees interested therein, some one of them respectively. And lastly, I do hereby revoke and make void and null all former and other wills by me made, and do publish and declare this present writing, contained in eleven sheets of paper, including this present sheet, all of them written on one side only, to be and contain my last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I, the said Elisabeth Fawkner, the testatrix, have to every of the said sheets set my hand and seal, and also put my seal to the top of the first sheet, the day and year above written. ELISABETH FAWKNER.

## DESCENDANTS OF REV. GERSHOM BULKELEY.

THERD GENERATION.

## 1-1.

Rev. GERSHOM BULKELEY, son of Rev. Peter Bulkely, the Puritan settler of Concord, Mass., and his second wife, Grace Chetwood Bulkeley, born Dec. 6, 1636, graduated at Harvard College in 1655, before completing his nineteenth year. He married Surah Chauncey, daughter of President Chauncey of Harvard, the emigrant ancestor of the name, Oct. 26, 1659. She was born in Ware, England, June 13, 1631, and was admitted to the church in Cambridge Dec. 10, 1656. She died June 9, 1669. In the year 1661, Mr. Bulkeley located at New London as the second minister of the church in that place. The following entry in regard to him is in Miss Caulkin's History of New London (page 131): "The year 1661 presents us with a new minister, Mr. Gershom Bulkeley of Concord, in the Bay Colony, who, having preached several months in the place, entered into a contract to become the minister of the town. This was merely an engagement for a term of years, and contained no reference to a settlement or ordination. The town pledged a salary of £80 yearly, for three years; and afterwards more, if the people found themselves able to give more, or as much more as God shall move their hearts to give, and they do find it needful to be paid." It was to be reckoned in provisions or English goods, and for the first three years he was to have all such silver as weekly contributed by strangers, to help towards the buying of books. The town was to pay for the transportation of himself, family, and effects from Concord, provide him with a dwelling house, orchard, garden, and pasture, and with upland and meadow for a small farm ; and supply him with firewood for the use of his family, and do their endeavors to suit him with a servant or youth and a maid, he paying for the time. Finally, if Mr. Bulkeley should die during the continuance of his ministry, his wife and children should receive from the town the full and just sum of £60 sterling." The contract was afterward modified, to obviate some difficulty which occurred in building the parsonage. Mr. Bulkeley proposed to provide himself with a house and free the town from an engagement to pay  $\pm 60$  to his family in case of his decease for the sum of  $\pm 80$  in hand. To this the town consented, on condition that he remained with them seven years; but they added this clause: "In case he remove before the seven yeer, he is to return the  $80 \pm$  agen, but if he stay the 7 yeere out, the  $80 \pm$ is wholly given him, or if God take him away before this time of 7 yeeres, the whole is given his wife and children."

Mr. Bulkeley, after having freed the town from their engagement to build a parsonage, purchased the homestead of Samuel Lothrop, who was about to remove to the new settlement of Norwich. The house is said to have stood beyond the bridge over the mill brook, on the east side of the way toward Mohegan. Here Mr. Bulkeley dwelt during his residence in New London, probably where the Hallam house now stands.

The following entries are found on the records of the town:

"15th Jan. 63-4. James Rogers, Levt. Smith, Cary Latham, John Smith, and William Hough are appoynted to go to Mr. Bulkeley for the settling him amongst us."

\* "25 Feb. Old Mrs. Bulkeley's request be read."

"Mr. Buckley, for enlarging maintenance yt he may keep a man, and also take the geting wood into his own hand—if not, let 10*l*. more be added to our town rate for wood cutting and carting, and 4*l*. for raising the pulpit."

"At a town meeting, Feb. 25, 1664-5:

"The town having desired to declare their myndes concerning Mr. Bulkeley, it was propounded whether they were willing to leave Mr. Bulkeley to the libertye of his conscience, without compelling or enforcing him to anything in the execution of his place and office contrarye to his light, according to the laws of the Commonwealth. Voted to be their myndes."

This is the first intimation of any uncasiness between Mr. Bulkeley and the people. There are no church records reaching back to this period, and his reasons for leaving are but obscurely intimated. He had not been settled, and no great formality was necessary to his departure.

"At a town meeting, June 10, 1665:

"The town understanding Mr. Buckley's intention to go into the Bay, have sent James Morgan and Mr. Douglas to desire him to stay untill seacond day come seven night, which day the town have agreed to ask againe Mr. Fitch to speak with him, in order to know Mr. Buckley's mynde fullye whether ha will continue with us to preach the gospell."

The overtures made to him seein to have proved unsuccessful. A vote, however, was passed, showing that no embittered feeling had grown up between Mr. Bulkley and the people. Though he had ceased to be considered as their minister, he remained in town and occupied the pulpit with acceptance until a successor was obtained. The following vote appears on the town records:

"It is voted and agreed that Mr. Bulkeley, for his time and paines taken in preaching the Word of God to us since the time of his yere was expired, have thirty pounds to be gathered by a rate."

Mr. Bulkeley is supposed to have removed from New London to Wethersfield in the early part of the year 1667. He was installed pastor of the church in Wethersfield the same year of his removal, as successor to Rev. John Russel, who had removed to Hadley, He continued the pastor there about ten years, when he Mass. was dismissed in the year 1677. He then devoted himself to the practice of medicine and surgery. He was appointed by the General Court, in 1675, surgeon to the army that had been raised against the Indians, and Mr. Stone was directed to supply his place in his absence. In 1676, while the party to which he was attached was in pursuit of the enemy, he was attacked by a number of Indians near Wachuset Hill, in Massachusetts, and received a wound in his thigh. As a clergyman, he stood at the head of his profession, and ranked among the first in medical science. He devoted much time to chemistry, with its useful researches, and to philosophy as a cardinal branch of medical knowledge. He was master of several languages, among which were the Latin, Greek, and Dutch. He was famous as a surveyor, pre-eminent, in his time, as a chemist, and highly respected as a magistrate. His sympathies were not always on the popular side. He was a man of peace; but was, at the same time, one who expected unqualified obedience to authority. At least, as a politician, he was opposed to the assumption of the government by the Colonial authorities in 1689, after the time of Sir Edmund Andross. His political sagacity and foresight enabled him to foresee that the course the colonists were

pursuing would finally lead to the triumph of those democratic principles which they all disavowed, and consequently he set his face against them. In 1689, he published at Philadelphia, a pamphlet on the Affairs of Connecticut; but no copy is known to exist of it in this country. The same year he wrote an elaborate work, with the curious title: "Will and Doom, or the Miseries of Connecticut, by and under an usurped and arbitrary power, being a narrative of the first erection and administration of Government in their Majesties Colony of New England, in America. 1689."

The work was never printed, but was sent to England by the Governor of New York, some dozen years after, as the most reliable account of New England to be found.\* At a subsequent period, a copy elegantly transcribed was procured, and may be seen in the State Library at Hartford, Conn. He died at Wethersfield Dec. 2. 1713, aged 77 years and 11 months old. On his monument is the following testimonial: "He was honorable in his descent; of rare abilities, extraordinary industry, excellent learning, master of many languages; exquisite in his skill in divinity, physic and law, and of a most exemplary and Christian life. "In certam spem beate resurrectiones repositas."

Soon after Mr. Bulkeley's devoting himself to the practice of medicine, he located on the east side of the river, in what is now Glastonbury, and became quite a landowner.

During the year previous to his decease, he made his will, of which the following is a copy:

The last will and testament of Gershom Bulkeley, of Wethersfield (alias G. Bulkely of Glastenbury), in the county of Hartford, in her Majestics Colony of Ct., in New England, Practitioner of Physick, made on the 26th day of May, in the year of our Lord 1712, and in the eleventh year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Anne, by the grace of God Queen of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, and of the Dominions thereto, Defender of the Faith, &c., is as follows: The said Gershom Bulkely having much more than twenty years walked upon the very mouth of the grave, under so great infirmity that I cannot but wonder how I have all this while escaped falling into it, have not been wholly unmindfull of that which nature and common prudence calls for in such cases. But in the mean time, sorrowful changes from the Most High have

passed over me, and some that I had hoped would have survived me, have prevented me and left me behind them, whereby together with some incident considerations, I am moved to alter some things which otherwise I should not have done. And therefore remaining, tho' very weak in body, yet (through divine mercy) of sound mind and memory, I do now make this (I hope) my Last Will and testament, hereby unmaking and annulling all former wills whatsoever made by me. In the first place, casting myself upon the riches of Sovereign Grace (if God hath wrought any truth in my most deceitful heart), I commit my sinful soul into the merciful hands of my most gracious Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, whom God hath exalted by and at his own right hand to be a Prince and a Savior, to give repentance and remission of sins unto Israel. To him, therefore, I fly for both, with that humble and comprehensive petition of the Publican: 'God be merciful to me a sinner;' and my body I commit to the dust as it was, to be (as near to my late dear wife as, conveniently, may be) decently but obscurely buried, without much cost or ceremony. I neither deserve nor desire those things, yet desire a part in the first and better resurrection of the just.

In the next place I will that all my just debts, due from me (which I thank God are now and I hope shall be very few and small, if any) be well and duly paid, by my executor hereafter named, and as for those poor children which I shall leave behind me in a most sinful calamitous world to grapple with difficult times, the best bequest I have for them is Luther's short, but significant and pertinent prayer, "To domine nutri servatore": To him, therefore, I commend and give them all, humbly beseeching him that he will graciously accept them and theirs; and make them all his own and faithful to the death, and be their portion a God and father to them, in Christ his son, from generation to generation. Amen. As for that little real estate which I had, I have already, by acts executed in my own life time, disposed of it, some to others and the rest of it among my sons or, to their use and behoof, respectively, as occasion hath required, and some also part of my personal estate I have bestowed upon my children already; the remnant thereof of my personal estate I dispose of as follows: Imprimis to my son Charles his daughter, Hannah Goodrich, (not to say what I have already done for her since her marriage which she knows, yet to her) or to the next Representative or Representatives I give and bequeath eight pounds in current money of Connecticut or equivalent thereto, to be paid by my executor hereafter named, as soon as conveniently he may after my decease, except only, that in case her occasion should require, and I live to pay the same or any part thereof myself; that then my executor shall be discharged of so much as I shall pay or cause to be payed.

Item, to my good daughters in law, *Hannah Avery* and *Rachel Wolcott*, I give each of them a golden Ducat (or ten shilling piece) if I happen to have a couple.

Item, to my son Edward's present wife, Dorothee, I give a golden guinea (or twenty shilling piece) if I happen to have one.

Item, to my brother Peter's children (Gershom, Peter, Grace, Margaret and Dorothee) I give each of them ten shillings in current money of Connecticut or equivalent thereto, and if any of them happen to owe me anything at my decease not exceeding ten shillings, I will that it be remitted to the debtor, and in particular to the said Grace, I give my great red rugg which was once her mother's, provided that she the said Grace do survive me.

Item, to my son Edward, I give and bequeath the clock, now standing in its case in his house as also my Seal Ring, the great gilt spoon, the least of my two silver porringers and all the books and manuscripts that I have touching matters of law, except the notes which I had at some time written out of Coke's 1st, 2d, 3d and 4th Institutes, which notes I formerly gave to my son, and which tho now in my hand; my will is that he shall have them again, if they may be of use to him. I give my son Edward also, my whip saw, tension saw and timber chain, being of use for his mill.

Item, to my son John, aforesaid, besides what I have otherwise done for him, to the utmost of my ability (and I wish I could have done as well for the rest of his brethren) I have already given the greatest part of my books and my silver pocket watch (which last I mention that my executor may not be at a loss what is become of it) but besides, there are some other parcels needless to be mentioned and besides what I may and shall yet do for him, if God give me life and further ability I give and bequeath to him all the rest of my books which I now have and also my manuscripts, written by my grandfather, my father, or others, I say all such my books and manuscripts, as concern only divinity and other learning, except the law (which books and manuscripts I have given to Edward as aforesaid), and except also medicine and chymistry and some few other books, which with those that concern medicine and chymestry I shall otherwise dispose of by and by.

Item, to my grandson Richard Treat, (the son of Thomas and Dorothy, I give and bequeath all my books and manuscripts, which any way concern medicine and chymestry, among which 1 include all Glaubus and Boyle's Books\* which I have, whether in Latin or English as also Georgics, Agricola, De Re Metallica and Lazarus, each retranslated by St. John Pettus, called Fleeta Minor, or the art &c. of Metalls ; and the same St. John Pettus, his Fodine Regales, and such like books, and also Littleton's Dictionary, for the Latin tongue, and my Dutch Grammar for the Dutch language, together with my manuscript Dutch Dictionary, which may help him to read and understand Hehwart's Degerend, &c., i. e., the Day Spring, a new resurrection of the art of Medicine, which book is in the Dutch language, and together with all my vessels and instruments usefull thereabout, of glass, brass, or copper, iron, stone or earth. All these I give to him provided he hold and pursue his inclination to that study, but if by death or otherwise he be diverted or depart from it, then I give them all to the next of his brethren, that will apply himself to the study, but if none of them then I give them all to his mother (my daughter Dorothy) to dispose of at her discretion or to his father, in like manner, if he survive her.

Item to my daughter Catharine Treat (now deceased), I have already given a competent portion in proportion to my tennity, yet her only child and daughter Catharine Treat, I give and bequeath my lesser silver tankard, my lighter silver cucurbite to be distinguished by its weight from that which I have already given to my daughter Dorothe, (tis not that which belongs to the silver retort but is much better and bigger than that), I give her also the silver salt sellers and the small silver dram cup, all which I had intended for her mother, had she survived me, and which are (I doubt not) worth at least twenty pounds in money. Yet I reserve and give liberty to my daughter Dorothy, to redeem any of the silver vessels aforesaid for the full value thereof if she desire so to do. This Legacy I will to be paid to the said Catharine Treat, at her age of eighteen years, or day of marriage which of them shall first happen, but if neither of them happen, then, at her decease, to her father, (my grandson in Law, Richard Treat) if he be then living, but if not then this legacy to be divided equally, in value, between my son Charles, his daughter Hannah Goodrich aforesaid and my daughter Dorothy Treat aforesaid or their next legal representatives, by nature and blood respectively.

Lastly to my daughter, *Dorothy Treat*, aforesaid, who as yet hath had but little and what she hath had is not now to be accounted for (to her), I give and bequeath all the rest of my personal estate, whatsoever it be, without mentioning or apprizeing of particulars, whether it be in my own hands or in the hands of others, or due and owing from others to me; except only that if there shall be any poor widow or widows or other truly poor persons not able to pay their debts to me, my will is that my executor shall remit it and not trouble them for it,—which I must leave to his discretion, yet with this advertisement, that by poor I mean such as are indeed poor, at least by divine Providence, not by idleness, nor such as may say they are poor and yet can find wherewith to drink, swell, and swagger, and make themselves poor and others, too.

And in particular, To her, my said Dorothy Treat, I give and bequeath my negro maid Hannah, willing and solemnly requiring that into whose hands soever she may happen to come they use her well, and consider that she hath a soul to save as well as wee, and is a Christian; and therefore that they make conscience to promote her in her reading, catechism, and all Christianity, that she may profit and grow in religion and godliness, and attain the end of baptism to the glory of God; and this I earnestly require on her behalf, as they will answer the neglect thereof before God.

To conclude, there is a manuscript of my own concerning the Divinity of the Scriptures, which I did not intend to be included among the theological manuscripts above given to my son John, tho' I forgot particularly to except it there, and therefore I do except it here; and this manuscript I give and bequeath to all my children, Edward, John, and Dorothy, for the good of themselves and their's for whose sakes I principally wrote it (not excluding but including Hannah Goodrich, aforesaid, and Catharine Treat, aforesaid also), that they may know whom and what they believe, and especially such of them as have not these other (and possibly better) helps, which my said son John hath or may have. But the trust and custody of it for the use of them all I commit to my said daughter, Dorothy Treat, to whom all the rest may resort for that end as their behoof and desire shall move and direct them. Finally, for the execution of this my Last Will and Testament, I nominate, constitute, and appoint my loving and trusty son-in-law, Thomas Treat, to be my sole and only executor, and in testimony and confirmation of all the premises, I have to these presents put my hand and seal, in Glastonbury, aforesaid, on the day and year first above written.

DR. CHARLES BULKELEY, born about 1663. Studied medicine, probably with his father. The following entry is found in the court records of New London county:---"1687. This court grants liberty unto Mr. Charles Bulkeley to practice physick in this county, and grants him license according to what power is in them so to do." He married and had one child, but died young. The family name of his wife is not known, nor the date of marriage. He died before his father, Rev. Gershom Bulkeley, as appears from the following instrument, contained in the sixth volume of the New London Records, page 203:

To all people to whom this present writing shall come, greeting: Whereas I, Gershom Bulkley, Late of New London, in the county of New London, in her Majesties Colony of Connecticut, in New England, in America, and now resident in Glassenbury, in the county of Hartford, in the Colony aforesaid, practitioner in physic, have formally, by my deed of gift under my hand and seal, enfeoffed my son, Charles Bulkley, late of New London, aforesaid, of all my land and tenements in the same New London, to have and to hold the same, with all privileges and appurtenances to the same belonging, to him, the said Charles, and to his heirs and assigns forever; which deed of gift is also acknowledged good before the Honorable John Allyn, esq., late of Hartford, aforesaid, in or about as I remember, the year 1688, to the end that the said deed might be recorded according to law, but am now informed the said deed of Gift is since the decease of my said son Charles. casually burnt in the burning of the house wherein it was and is not to be found on record. Now know ye that in consideration of the premises, and to the end that no inconveniences may grow by means of the loss of the said deed of gift, I, the said Gershom Bulkley, do by these presents acknowledge and allow the said deed of gift made by me to my said son Charles, and that I allowed his entry into and possession of the said lands and tenements in New London, afforesaid; and that he was lawfully seized thereof in fees, and for the more full assurance thereof, I, the said Gershom Bulkley, have ratified, approved, and confirmed, and do by these presents ratify, approve, and confirm, my sd son Charles in his entry into and possession of the said land and tenements, together with the rights lawfully accruing thereupon, as particularly the right of dower to his rellict, and the right of inheritance descended upon his heir;

accordingly have ratified, approved, and confirmed, and do by these presents ratify, approve, and confirm, to my said son Charles, his only child, daughter, and heir, Hannah, now Hannah Goodrich, of Glassenbury, aforesaid, the estate of inheritance in fee which the said Hannah by law and right hath in the said lands and tenements, with the privileges and the appurtenances of the same. That is to one messuage which I bought of Samuell Lathrop, late of New London, aforesaid, as by his deed of sale on record may appear, with the house and orchard thereupon. Item: one other piece of land which I purchased of Jacob Waterhouse, late of the same New London, as by his deed of sale on record may appear. Item: one other small strip of land which was granted me by the town of New London, aforesaid, lying betwixt the Mill Brooke and the streete upon which streete the messuage aforesaid abutts south-westward, which grant may appear by the Register of the said town, to have and to hold the said lands and tenements and every part and parcel thereof, of the same and of every of them, with all priveledges and appurtenances to the same and to every of them belonging, or any wise appertaining to her, the said Hannah Goodrich, and to heirs, that is to say true and right heirs, according to the due course of the common law of England, and to her assigns and to her and their and every of their owne only and proper use and behoofs forever, as fully and absolutely to all intents and purposes: as if the said deed of gifts to her father, now extant and on Record, or as if the same deed had been made immediately to herself only, reserving to her mother her right of dower during her natural life, accordingly to the law; and also advertising that whereas I observe that the Register that then was hath omitted the abatements of ye south-eastward end butts upon the neck and uppermost mill-dam, and not upon the lower dam, and so it abuts upon the streete also which in that place passeth over the said dam. And advertising also that this said strip of land must be no detriment or incumbrance to the proprietors or occupiers of the mill, but they may at all times raise the water to what height they can and will, without denyall or disturbance from the said Hannah or her heirs or assigns. And in testimony of the premises, I have to these presents put my hand and seale, in Glassenbury aforesaid, on the second day of December, in the eighth year of the reigne of our Sovereign Lady Ann, by the Grace of God Queen of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, and of the dominions

thereto belonging, defender of the faith, &c., &c. Annoque Domini Dei, 1709.

REV. JOHN BULKELEY, son of Rev. Gershom and Sarah Chauncey Bulkeley, born ; married Patience Prentice, daughter of John and Sarah Prentice, in 1701, and was the father of twelve children. He graduated at Harvard College in 1699. Studied divinity, and was ordained as pastor of the church in Colchester, Ct., Dec. 20, 1703, and took a high rank among the clergymen of his time. He wrote "A preface to R. Wolcott's Meditations; an election sermon in 1713, entitled "The Necessity of Religion in Societies." In 1724, he published an "Inquiry into the Right of the Aboriginal Natives to the Land in America." In 1729, he published another tract, "An impartial account of a late Debate at Lyme, upon the following points: Whether it be the will of God that the Infants of Visible Believers should be baptized; Whether sprinkling be lawful and sufficient; and whether the present way of maintaining ministers, by a public rate or tax, be lawful."

Dr. Chauncey thus writes concerning him: "Mr. John Bulkeley I have seen and conversed with, though so long ago that I formed no judgement of him from my own knowledge. Mr. Whittlesey, of Wallingford, Mr. Chauncey, of Durham, and others I could mention, ever spoke of him as a first rate genius; and I have often heard that Dummer and he, who were classmates in college, were accounted the greatest geniuses of that day. The preference was given to Dummer in regard of quickness, brilliancy, and wit; to Bulkeley, in regard of solidity of judgement and strength of argument. Mr. Gershom Bulkeley, father of John, I have heard mentioned as a truly great man and eminent for his skill in chemistry; and the father of Gershom, and grandfather of John, Mr. Peter Bulkeley, of Concord, was esteemed in his day as one of the greatest men in this part of the world. But by all that I have been able to collect, the Colchester Bulkeley surpassed his predecessors in the strength of his intellectual powers. Mr. Bulkeley was classed by the Rev. Dr. Chauncey, in 1768, among the three most eminent for strength of genius and powers of mind, which New

England had produced. The other two were Mr. Jeremiah Dummer and Mr. Thomas Walter." He was regarded, by the men of his time, as a famous casuist and a sage counsellor. The following anecdote in regard to him is well authenticated:

"A church in the neighborhood had fallen into unhappy division and contentions which they were unable to adjust among themselves. They deputed one of their number to the venerable Bulkeley, for his advice, with the request that he would send it to them in writing. It so happened that Mr. Bulkeley had a farm in the extreme part of the town, upon which he had located a tenant. In superscribing the two letters, the one for the church was, by mistake, directed to the tenant, and the one for the tenant, to the church. The church was convened in order to hear the advice which was to settle all their disputes. The moderator read as follows: 'You will see to the repair of the fences that they be built high and strong, and you will take special care of the old black bull.' This mystical advice puzzled the church very much at first, but an interpreter among the more discerning ones, was soon found who said, 'Brethren, this is the very advice we most need; the direction to repair the fences is to admonish us to take good heed in the admission and government of our members; we must guard the church by our Master's laws, and keep out strange cattle from the And we must in a particular manner set a watchful guard fold. over the devil, the old black bull, who has done so much harm of All perceived the wisdom and fitness of Mr. Bulkeley's late.' advice, and resolved to be governed by it. The consequence was that all the animosities subsided, and harmony was restored to the afflicted church. What the subject of the letter received by the tenant was, we are not informed, and what good effect it had upon him the story does not tell."

Among the land deeds of the town of Colchester, are several to Mr. Bulkeley, which show him to be one of the largest owners of that kind of real estate in town.

He died without having made a will, and the following joint agreement was entered into by his children, as appears on the Probate Records:

"Articles of agreement made this 17th day of July, Anno Domini 1733, by and between John Bulkeley, Gershom Bulkeley, Charles Bulkeley, and Peter Bulkeley, on ye one part, and Sarah Trumble, Dorothy Bulkeley, and Patience Bulkeley, on the other part, witness that all the above named persons, being children and co-heirs of the late Rev'd Mr. John Bulkeley, of Colchester, deceased, taking into our consideration the necessity of a speedy distribution of our Honored Father's estate, who died Intestate, we, under the present situation of affairs, according to the late law of this government enacted for the settlement of such estates, cannot be claimed, do covenant and agree among ourselves that the said estate shall be distributed in manner and form following:

lst. Imprimis that our honored mother shall have the one-half of our father's personal estate, as all ye Negro Man Cæsar.

2d. That John Bulkeley shall have our father's Library, as also one tract of land lying between land of Peletiah Bliss and John Dolbear, being about 30 acres, together with such lands as he the said John Bulkeley hath lately laid out, or in time to come may lay out, on the common right that did belong to our father.

3d. That Gershom Bulkeley shall have all the land in ye lane on which he has erected his house, with the mill and the appurtetenances whatsoever.

4th. That Charles shall have the land lying on the road to Glastenbury and adjoining to land of Mrs. Woodbridge, being about 150 acres, together with twenty acres in addition to such tract, to be set off to it by ye said John Bulkeley, on the northerly side of said Charles' land, in good form.

5th. That Peter shall have all the land that lyes between land of William Douglass and Col. Brown's heirs, and adjoining east on land of Mr. Thatcher.

6th. That the several sums of  $\pm 36$  s<sup>3</sup> d<sup>8</sup>, now delivered to us the said Sarah Trumbull, Dorothy Bulkeley, and Patience Bulkeley, respectively, in personal estate, together with what we have received in good bonds well executed of our bretheren John Bulkeley, Gershom Bulkeley, Charles Bulkeley, Peter and Oliver (Bulkeley), shall be in full of our respective portions; that we said Sarah, Dorothy, and Patience shall have no further claim on our father's estate, either real or personal. In witness and confirmation whereof we have hereunto set our hand and seal, this 17th day of July, 1733.

born December 19, 1752. The following historical sketch was published in the New London Morning News at the time of his decease, February 25, 1848:

## CAPTAIN BULKLEY.

"Captain Charles Bulkley, an aged citizen of this place, recently deceased, was born in Colchester, 19th of December, 1752, and at the time of his death was 95 years and 2 months old. Longevity appears sometimes to be an inheritance. His mother died in 1811, at the age of 90 years.

"His father, Major Charles Bulkley, was son of Rev. John Bulkley, of Colchester, a divine of great eminence in his day, and grandson of Rev. Gersham Bulkley, the second minister of New London, and afterwards minister of Wethersfield. The mother of Major Charles Bulkley was Patience, daughter of Captain John Prentis, of New London. Major Bulkley himself married Ann, daughter of Jonathan and Borradil Latimer, of New London, and removed to this place from Colchester when his son, Charles, was about two years of age. Here he purchased of Deacon Thomas Fosdick the property on Bank Street, both sides of the way, which, with some addition, has ever since continued in the family. He went into business in this town, and was honored with several offices of public trust, but was suddenly removed by death in the year 1762, when he was about 52 years of age. He is interred in our old burial ground, where a moss-covered stone shows the place of his rest.

"His son, Charles, went early to sea, and was an expert and thorough seaman when the war of the revolution broke out. Many pages might be written, full of romantic interest, and yet literally true, relating to the adventures of our townsmen at that period. They were a community of mariners—all the young men went to sea—and were early inured to bear and defy every kind of peril that could beset them upon the broad ocean. Along this coast and in the sound during the eight years of warfare many hard conflicts took place, and many brilliant exploits were performed, which, though only of local and minor importance in the result, are worthy of being rescued from oblivion. They show, at least, the hardihood of our people at that time, the fortitude with which they endured suffering and exposure, and the patriotic devotion to the cause of liberty, which often led them into combat against fearful odds and brought them off victorious.

"Perhaps none of our townsmen at that period met with more wild and perilous adventures than Charles Bulkley. In the spring of 1775 a sloop from New London, which had been on a peaceful trading voyage to the West Indies, was rounding Montauk Point, and had almost arrived in sight of home, when an armed vessel bore down upon her, fired a shot athwart her course, and demanded her surrender. The sloop being unarmed, and totally unprepared for defence or escape, was, of course, given up. The armed vessel was a tender from the British frigate Rose, commanded by Captain Wallace, who was then stationed on this coast, and who afterwards became notorious for his bombardment of Stonington, and for plundering and annoying the inhabitants on the sea-coast to the eastward. The nephew of Captain Wallace came on board the sloop with four men, took possession, and informed the Americans that a battle had been fought at Lexington, and, of course, war had commenced. He transferred the crew of the sloop to the tender, with the exception of the captain, mate, and Charles Bulkley, who was a seaman on board. These he retained to navigate the vessel, and ordered them to shape their course for Boston, where he should take his prize.

"Not long after this change was accomplished a boat from the neighboring shore with two men in it approached the vessel. Wallace armed his men with such weapons as he could find, (harpoons and hand spikes,) and ordered the men in the boat to keep off, which they did. He could not fire upon them, for it happened that there was but one gun on board, and in the first moments of capture Bulkley, with quick foresight, had secreted the powder and As the boat pushed off a bold expedient rushed into Bulkball. ley's mind, which was executed as soon as conceived. He ran along on the boom, plunged into the ocean, got into the boat, and imparting his spirit and activity to the other two men, they pulled for Block Island, and were soon safe on shore. Here he found a small body of militia engaged in taking off some cattle to secure them from the plunder of the British. He made known to the commander a plan he had formed to wrest from the enemy their prize, and was readily furnished by him with two row-boats and a number of men and arms, with which he set out in chase of the sloop. He was so fortunate as to get possession of her without bloodshed. The next day she was towed into New London and delivered up to the owners, and young Wallace and his men were consigned as prisoners to the civil authority.

"Soon after this we find Charles Bulkley a midshipman in the newly-formed American navy, and sailing in the fleet fitted out at New London under Commodore Hopkins. This little fleet had been a source of much solicitude and expense to Congress. It was intended to annoy the British armed vessels that infested the coasts of the Southern States, and much was expected from its gallantry. It left New London harbor in fine style, the stars and stripes on its flag-thirteen stars and thirteen stripes-streaming out on the wind. Yet this fleet accomplished nothing but the plunder of the island of Providence, and the chief officers were afterwards censured by Congress for their inactivity. On the homeward voyage, however, just castward of Montauk Point, they had a sharp engagement with the British frigate Glasgow, which was considerably injured, and only escaped by the skill and tact of its commander. In this action, fought very near the spot where less than a year before he had displayed such signal energy and adroitness, young Bulkley was distinguished for the cool intrepidity with which he stood at his gun.

"He remained several years in the navy, was soon made a sailing master, and then advanced to a lieutenancy. He made one cruise with the valiant Paul Jones, and was afterwards transferred to the Alfred, commanded by Captain Elisha Hinman. This vessel being overtaken by a superior force, and basely deserted by her consort, was taken, and the crew carried prisoners to England. Lieutenant Bulkley, with others, was confined in Falkland Prison, where he suffered a weary confinement, and was subjected to great privations and indignitics. He at length made his escape, by secretly digging, with great labor and perseverance, a trench under ground, leading beyond the outward wall, and succeeded in getting to France, from whence, after some delay, he returned to America.

"On reaching home, without waiting to repose or recruit, he took command of a privateer, and hurried again to sea. In this capacity he made several voyages, and brought a number of valuable prizes into port. After the conclusion of the war he gladly returned to the peaceful merchant service, in which he continued for a long term of years. It would be interesting to know the number of voyages which a man of so much activity in the course of so long a life had made. We may safely say that they must be estimated by hundreds.

"This is but an imperfect tribute to the memory of a brave man, a skillful navigator, an estimable and venerable citizen, one who for almost a century has walked these streets, and sailed on these waters. It is one of the penalties of longevity to outlive old friends and time-endeared acquaintances, and often too the cherished companion of the household and hearthstone. Captain Bulkley had great afflictions of this kind for his portion. Not only neighbors and friends, and a generation of townsmen, and the companions of his youth went before him, but he lived to see most of his children laid in the grave. He leaves behind no descendants but one only son.—F. M. C."

He was born in Wethersfield, Conn., Jan. 16, 1698, being a son of Francis Bulkeley, of that town, and a descendant of Rev. Peter Bulkeley, of Concord, Mass. After graduating, he taught school in Philadelphia for about a year, and then for three years he was an instructor in the college at Germantown, Penn. He studied law with Charles Chauncey, Esq., of Philadelphia, was admitted to the bar May 20, 1822, and resided in that city engaged in practice. In 1832 and 1833 he was Secretary and Treasurer of the Germantown and Morristown Railroad Company. From 1845 to 1850, he was one of the Aldermen of the city of Philadelphia. After this, he resumed the practice of his profession until his death."

At a meeting of the bar, May 25, 1860, Col. J. Gooshman was called to the chair, and Henry Paul Bush appointed Secretary, when Gen. Horatio Hubbell submitted the following resolutions, after an address, in which a brief outline of the character of the deceased and his professional standing was communicated to the meeting.

Resolved, That we have always recognized Mr. Bulkeley as an accomplished scholar, an upright counsellor, and honest man.

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to convey to the family of the deceased a copy of the foregoing resolutions, which were ordered to be published.

An account of his unfortunate death is thus given by an aged member of the Bulkeley family:

In the winter of 1834, the steamboat Pennsylvania, of the Philadelphia and Baltimore passenger line, took fire on the passage up the Delaware river, was run on to the flats below the Navy Yard, Philadelphia, and burned to the water's edge. Among the passengers was a gentleman, in delicate health, returning to his home from a sojourn in the South, who threw overboard sundry settees, and committed himself to their buoyancy as a means of safety. This gentleman was rescued by some boats at hand completely wet through and chilled, and unfortunately taken into a low grogery, known as the Khouli Khan tavern, in Chestnut, above Front street. Here in the course of the evening this gentleman died from the effects of this severe exposure upon his debilitated frame. A gentleman present had heard him say his name was Bulkeley, and speaking of his black silk neckerchief, also said, that it contained something valuable. These facts this gentleman communicated to Charles, J. H., and Chauncey Bulkeley, who immediately sought the aid of the then mayor, Hon. John Swift, in the matter. The party proceeded at once to the tavern spoken of; found deceased there, and the cravat missing. The mayor, addressing himself to a female present, (whom he denominated a "Meg Merrilies" in aspect,) asked her for the missing article. She was then told (after denying knowledge of it) to produce the cravat forthwith, or the whole household would be marched to the lockup in short order. The missing neckerchief was found stowed away under the counter, unfolded, and found to contain several hundred dollars in bank notes. These the mayor took charge of, and the deceased was found to be the above Walter W. Bulkeley, of Rocky Hill, (Stepney, Conn.) Chauncey Bulkeley took charge of the remains, placed them in the care of an undertaker, notified the family, and Mr. Ralph Bulkeley, of New York, went to Philadelphia, identified and removed them to Rocky Hill, with the funds found.

## DR. SYLVESTER BULKLEY.

"Sylvester Bulkley was the second son of Hosea Bulkley, of Rocky Hill, formerly a part of Wethersfield, in which place he was born in 1787. He was prepared for college by Rev. Calvin Chapin, D. D., of Rocky Hill, entered Yale in 1806, and graduated in 1810. The following winter he taught school in Wethersfield, meantime pursuing the study of medicine under the instruction of Dr. Daniel Fuller, of Rocky Hill. He then attended lectures in the medical department of Dartmouth College, Hanover, N. H., and received the degree of M. D. at that institution in 1812. Dr. Bulkley first commenced the practice of his profession in Haddam, where he remained about eight years, when he disposed of his business to a Dr. Munger, and went to Chester. There he remained but a short time, when he returned to that part of Haddam known as Higganum, in professional connection with Dr. Munger. A more favorable offer presenting itself, Dr. Buckley located in Upper Middletown, (now Cromwell,) where he remained in successful practice for about twelve years. He then relinquished his business in that place, and after spending a few months in New York and its neighborhood, availing himself of the facilities for acquiring medical knowledge there afforded, he returned and settled in Berlin. In that town he continued until 1848, when Rocky Hill being left without a resident physician, by the removal of Dr. A. W. Barrows to Hartford, Dr. Bulkley returned to his native place. Here he continued in the practice of his profession until within a few days of his death, though age and its consequent infirmities restricted the amount of his business for the latter part of the time.

"Dr. Bulkley was of a robust habit of body, and of vigorous constitution, and had good health, with the exception of attacks of rheumatism, which is hereditary in his family. In consequence, probably, of exposure and over exertion in visiting a patient in the severe weather of the season, he was taken sick the twentyseventh of January last, and died the first of February, in the seventieth year of his age. His disease was an acute inflammation of that portion of the peritoneum covering the liver, which probably extended to the liver itself. For the first three days of his illness Dr. Bulkley expected to recover, and his physician thought him improving, but after this he passed into a state of total insensibility, and sank rapidly. He was attended by Dr. A. S. Warner, of Wethersfield, and once seen by Dr. E. K. Hunt, of Hartford, and myself. Dr. Bulkley was a member of the Hartford County Medical Society at the time of his decease, and had always felt a. lively interest in all efforts for the promotion of the profession.

"Dr. Bulkley was an honest man, upright and straight forward in his dealings, an active and excellent member of society, of high moral character and correct habits of life, enjoying the esteem of his neighbors and acquaintances, and a sincere professing Christian. He became a member of the Congregational Church in Berlin during his residence in that town, and continued his connection there till his death, though an attendant on divine worship at Rocky Hill after his removal thither.

"As a physician Dr. Bulkley enjoyed a liberal patronage in the several localities where he resided. He stood well in the estimation of his brethren of the medical profession, and was on particularly confidential terms and often in consultation over the sick-bed with the late Drs. Richard Warner, of Cromwell, and Archibald Welch, of Wethersfield. Naturally of a strong mind and independent character, he had little disposition to yield to the foolish whims of his patients, when he saw that yielding would be prejudicial to their recovery; and his refusal to gratify them in this

respect some times made enemies of those who should have had the greater regard for him for his firmness of purpose in their behalf. Considerations of policy, which often stand men instead of sound medical knowledge; subterfuge in conversation, which is a cover for professional ignorance; suavity of manner, which hides defects in the practice of medicine-upon these Dr. Bulkley did not altogether rely to gain the esteem of the families in which he practiced. He expected to benefit his patients rather by the potency of his remedies than by the grace of his bow; by the efficacy of his prescriptions, rather than by the ease of his conversation. Consequently, those who call a physician more for the purpose of having their diagnosis confirmed, and their views of the proper treatment supported by him, than for the sake of his medical advice and care, and who dislike him in proportion as he disagrees with their notions, often complained of Dr. Bulkley, when they would have done better to listen willingly to his counsel, and adhere trustingly to his orders. With quacks and quackery he had no patience, and quite as little with those who followed them. Of 'steam doctors,' 'consumption doctors,' and other like empyrics, he entertained a great abhorrence and contempt; and with the various isms in medicine that from time to time spring up to have a mushroom existence, he would have nothing to do. Correctly considering a proper medical education as indispensably necessary to the proper practice of the profession, and that the science must have a stable theory, based upon known facts for its foundation, in order to be deserving confidence, Dr. Bulkley had no part with those who 'take up' the trade without a thorough training in the various fundamental branches of the profession, and would have no counsel with interlopers, who had no other title to be called doctors than that bestowed by themselves alone.

"Dr. Bulkley lived to a ripe old age, in the enjoyment of respect and esteem, performing his duties, as a man and a physician, capably, faithfully, and honestly, and was gathered to his fathers in peace, like a shock of wheat fully ripe for the harvest.

His early life was passed at a time of great spiritual declension and worldliness in that vicinity, where no special efforts were made for the conversion of children, and yet he was, from a child, the subject of many serious impressions, and when in early manhood, he, with the wife of his youth, united with the Congregational church of Colchester, they were regarded as very young members.

In 1806 he removed to Williamstown, Mass., where, during a residence of nearly forty years, he exemplified the virtues of a sincere
and active piety, by a zealous coöperation with his pastor, in private counsel, in social religious converse and prayer, going from house to house, and in the varied forms of usefulness presented by that series of revivals which signally blessed that region. The Rev. Ralph Welles Gridley, who was for some eighteen years his pastor, used to remark that Mr. B. was his right-hand man. Though a layman of moderate acquirements, he treasured up a large fund of practical religious knowledge, which, united with a happy faculty of winning the unconverted, often rendered his persuasions effectual upon more cultivated minds. They sought and improved occasions of private interview with the students of Williams College, and other young persons, when with great earnestness and force he urged the necessity of personal piety. He thought much of the conversion of children, and passed whole nights in prayer for the conversion of his own, whom he taught and governed with the faithfulness of a Christian father. To great firmness and energy of character he united a habit of great personal industry, literally doing with his might what he found to do. During his last illness from dropsy, he was for seven months an example of Christian patience, the happy result of his settled confidence that the anchor of his hope was cast within the vale. He so familiarized himself with the bright scenes in prospect, that his conversation and prayers evinced an ardent desire to depart and be with Christ. Without a struggle he fell asleep, "calmly as to a night of repose."

The following biographical sketch of Judge Bulkeley appeared in the columns of the *Hartford Courant* at the time of his decease:

"On Tuesday, the 6th instant, Judge Bulkeley, while seated in the office of the Ætna Life Insurance Company, of which he was president, was stricken with paralysis. During that day and the day following he was, at intervals, able to converse, but afterwards was wholly unconscious up to the time of his death, which occurred at his residence in Washington Street, at a quarter before seven o'clock last evening. For the past few years he has been almost wholly deprived of sight, and that affliction, which made it difficult for him to get about, gave him the appearance of being much more feeble in body than he really was.

"Judge Bulkeley was born in Colchester on the 20th of June, 1803, and was therefore sixty-nine years of age. He graduated at Yale College in the class of 1824, and after his graduation studied law in the office of William P. Williams, in Lebanon. In 1830 he was married to Lydia S. Morgan, of Colchester, who survives him, and at about that time he removed to East Haddam. He practiced law in that place, and was also president of the East Haddam Bank. He represented the town in the General Assembly, and was twice a member of the Senate from the nineteenth district. In 1847 he removed to Hartford, and filled the office of School Fund Commissioner. For several years he held official positions, and was a leading man in politics. In 1857 he was elected with Nathaniel Shipman to the legislature, from Hartford, and was chosen Speaker of the House of Representatives by the Union Republicans. He was originally a Whig, and joined the republican party at its formation. In the practice of law here he formed a partnership with the late Judge Henry Perkins, the firm being Bulkeley and Perkins. His later years have been devoted to the business of life insurance. He was the first president of the Connecticut Mutual Company, which he assisted in organizing, and subsequently, in 1850, organized the Ætna Life Company, taking its presidency at the start, and holding it to the time of his death. He was largely interested in all the Ætna moneyed corporations, banking and insurance, fire and life, and was also a director in the Willimantic Linen Company, and other concerns, besides being a leading stockholder in very many profitable business enterprises. Out of them he accumulated a handsome fortune, approximating a million of dollars.

"Judge Bulkeley's habits of life were very regular. He was especially prompt in all his engagements, making it a duty to be

present at meetings where his presence was expected. It is said of him that for eighteen years he has never failed, until during his last sickness, to attend and preside over the meetings of the Pearl Street Ecclesiastical Society, to which he belonged. When he lived in Church Street his regularity of attendance at school meetings in the first district was a matter of remark, and since he removed to Washington Street he has been equally punctual at all the meetings of the south district. At all gatherings, whether religious, political, or otherwise, in which he took an interest he was never tardy. His regularity and promptness were not exceeded by any other citizen, probably. And he was especially faithful to all his political obligations. It was not enough that he should vote on election day, but he urged others to do so. He never neglected his duty as a citizen. One marked characteristic of the man was his wonderfully retentive memory as to individuals and dates. His knowledge in this respect enabled him to give, with surprising accuracy, many genealogical facts relating to families, whose own members were in ignorance. Few men have lived in the state who have possessed such general information with regard to individual associations. In other respects his knowledge was quite extensive, accurate, and valuable."

FETER BULKELEY, youngest son of Rev. Peter and Grace *Chetwood* Bulkeley, was born June 12, 1643. He came to Fairfield, Conn., with his mother; married and settled there, and was by profession a physician. The name of his wife has not been ascertained. She probably died before him. He made his will March 25, 1691. in the 49th year of his age. In said will he names his two oldest daughters, Grace and Margaret, and son Peter,  $7\frac{1}{4}$  years old. From the will of his brother Gershom, of Wethersfield, we find that he had other children, as Gershom and Dorothy, to whom his brother Gershom makes legacies. Gershom's will is some twenty years later than that of Peter. Peter's will commits three children, Margaret, Grace, and Peter, to the care of his brother Gershom, of Wethersfield, which would lead to the inference that they were the youngest.

The following is a copy of his will, taken from the Fairfield Probate Record.

"I Peter Bulkeley, in the 49th year of my age, now ready to go the way of all flesh, do die in the faith of that doctrine which has been preached among us. I give my soul to God that gave it. As to my small estate, my two feather beds with the bedding and linen, I would have them divided between my two oldest daughters, Grace and Margaret. As to that flock bed that is at Hannah Sherman's, there let it remain; or if young James Bennett have it, it shall be only upon courtesy, doing my executor's pleasure, as he may see cause, in the room of other clothing; and when Peter shall come to be bound, let two indentures be written interchangeably, wherein the said James shall be engaged to teach him the art of weaving both lining and wooling to the best of his capacity, being bound to him till he become one and twenty, being now this day seven years and a quarter old. The mare that is now at Daniel Silliman's, the man that I had her of is to have her again, being so agreed upon between me and his agent Bradley, to be delivered at New Haven, together with a Bill of Nathaniel Chittenden for New Haven; the other horse must go into the estate. All the other estate I leave it wholly to my executor, whether physick or other household stuff, and as above so the house and land. I shall leave it wholly to my executor, he knowing all the concerns about it, and the writing being tyed safe in the trunk. I do here make my beloved brother, Gershom Bulkeley, my sole executor, to do and act in all things as occasion shall require. That this is my last will and testament is hereby declared by setting to my hand and seal this 25th of March, 1691.

It seems he left Margaret and Peter, minors, to be clothed out of the estate, unless they shall be provided for by Mr. Gershom Bulkeley. ELEAZER BULKELEY, son of James and Elisabeth Whitehead Bulkeley, born February 2, 1763; married Mary Ogden, daughter of Jonathan Ogden, December 22, 1785, of Mill Plain, Conn. The following historical sketch has been furnished by one of his descendants:

Eleazer Bulkeley was born February 2, 1763. His father, James, was a weaver, "and intended," he says in his narrative, "that I should learn the same trade, for-which I had a great dislike. From eight to ten, at intervals, I was at school, and attending to my father's calls. From ten until twelve I was of some assistance to him, earning in the summer months twenty shillings a month. At twelve I inclined to follow a seafaring life, and at the close of the year 1774 left my home in Mill River, for New York, on a market boat. At the close of the month of April, 1775, the inhabitants were panic-struck at the news, by a messenger on horseback, of the battle of Lexington. The battle of Bunker Hill occurred soon after, and the people were now making every effort to put themselves into a common defense, both by sea and land.

"At the commencement of the year 1776 the Defense, an armed vessel, was fitted out at New Haven by the state of Connecticut. A goodly number of men, and boys too, enlisted in her from Fairfield, I among the latter, after receiving (reluctantly) my father's permission. We were taken from Black Rock, to the vessel then lying in New Haven Harbor, on the 13th of March, 1776, and returned in the Defense to Black Rock, when we learned of the evacuation of Boston by the British. We proceeded to Boston. Our first encounter was with a sloop and brig, and after a close contest both surrendered. The loss on their side was thirty-nine killed and wounded; on ours none killed, and a few only wounded. Colonel Campbell (captain) was taken prisoner. He was afterwards exchanged for Colonel Ethan Allen, then in England a prisoner. After this action we sailed for New London, where we were put on another vessel, to which the name of our old one was given, and in June started on a cruise. When ten or twelve days out I espyed a sail. On coming up to it we found it a British ship from Jamaica

We took off her crew, put a prize master on board, and ordered her back to New London. Early one morning in the last of September we left Holmes Hole for New London. For two months we remained in New London. While here I was severely bitten . by a squirrel, and nearly lost my life by a fall. My skull was fractured, and it was some time before I recovered. In December our captain resigned for a more important charge, and, under command of another, we sailed for the West Indies. Through the winter we cruised about the islands, captured four prizes, which safely arrived at the several ports to which they were sent. In the following spring we returned to New Bedford, when I and a number of others applied for a discharge. Some time after this the Defense was ordered to Boston, to be cut in two and lengthened. We were discharged, and in the early summer L returned to my parents, after an absence of thirteen months, and for the services rendered in the Defense at this early age I am now receiving a pension.

"After remaining at home three or four months 1 found a number of my associates were joining a company in Fairfield, to go to New London to a privateer that was being fitted out, and I resolved . at once to go. I knew my parents would not willingly give their consent to my going, so in the evening I bundled up a few clothes and threw them to the ground from the chamber window, mingled again with the family, and as opportunity offered walked out, took up my clothes and went to Fairfield, where I joined the company and repaired to Black Rock, thence to New London. We soon went to sea, and, as we fell in with no vessels, concluded to repair to the Western Islands and intercept vessels bound for Quebec. Shortly after we captured a British vessel bound for this port, and ordered her back to New Bedford. I was one of the crew put on board. It was thirty-nine days before we made land, and for thirteen days were in want of provisions, subsisting mostly on English damaged biscuit boiled in beer. (The arrival of the brig safely seemed almost a miracle, after passing by all the British ports, and not meeting with a single British sail.) Shortly after this I took passage in a privateer sloop for New London. Ifaving arrived here, and ashamed to go home, having earned nothing, I enlisted in the Brig Nancy, and sailed, on the first of November, for the West Indies. After cruising for some time without success we sailed for Cayenne, on the Surinam coast. Much time was spent here. We, however, resumed the cruise on the first of January. Off Antigua we were run down by what we supposed was a British
vessel, but which proved to be the American privateer, Bunker Hill, from Boston. This unlucky mistake broke up our cruise, and we bore up for home, arriving at New London in about fifteen days, after a cruise of five months. Here we found the Defense, bound for l'airfield, and I with a number of our crew took passage in her for Black Rock, not, however, to reach the latter place in this vessel, for we went back to New London. The ship brought up on a reef and was lost, and again I started for home in a galley. Arriving at Black Rock I gathered up my clothes and started for home, with a full determination to follow some other business beside privateering for the future. I was joyfully welcomed, notwithstanding my two last years had given my parents so much trouble and anxiety. My time now was mostly employed in going to school, and taking vacancies to keep guard.

"At the beginning of the year 1779, I enlisted with a company of forty men under command of Capt. E. Thorp. The guard was stationed close to the beach on the east side of Kinsey's Point; night only required close watch. But on the 7th of July, standing alone on the place now occupied by Oliver Perry, Esq., I saw two hundred British land on the hill opposite. They at once commenced the burning of Fairfield.

"At the opening of the year 1780 my time expired, and for this land service I am receiving a pension (1841) which, with my year's sea service, is termed a full pension. In April, 1780, I sailed for Nantucket with Capt. Stephen Thorp, where I with his consent, enlisted for a cruise to the West Indies. At Providence we found our vessel ready for sea. We sailed the 20th of April for the island of Cuba. About the middle of May, when approaching our destination, the ship brought suddenly on a sunken reef, but by the Captain's stratagem was saved, and we again made sail for Hispaniola, entering in two or three days the harbor of St. Francis. Here we repaired damages. This incessant labor caused much sickness. I was brought very low with intermittent fever. Capt. Gardiner was very kind to me, showing a father's solicitude for I still grew weaker, and all hopes of recovery were given up. me. I thought if I could be at home, I should die content, but the idea of breathing my last in a foreign land, was most painful. A physician brought on board by the Captain, left a vial with my attendant, telling him to give me a few drops in water every half hour. Upon taking the first spoonful, it seemed to me like fire through my whole system, giving new life and animation, and I recovered

slowly from that very hour, and in two or three weeks could walk about deck with assistance. On the first of July we sailed for Philadelphia, and on the morning of the fifteenth arrived off Cape Henlopen. All were in high spirits, expecting to be in Philadelphia that night. While waiting for a pilot we were boarded and taken possession of by two schooners of New York. The captors offered our crew their liberty if they would assist in getting the "Sally" afloat, (for she had been aground on a place called the Sheer,) they gladly accepted the proposal. Being still feeble, I lay in my berth. One of the Refugees ordered me on deck; as. I was ascending the companion way slowly the ruffian aimed a blow at me with a lynch staff which just grazed my side. About sun-down, I, with the rest of the sick, were put in a boat and shoved off from the "Sally," and landed on Cape Henlopen beach; dragging our boat across the beach into Lewiston Creek, we rowed up to Lewiston, where we arrived at 10 o'clock at night. In the morning a sailor kindly gave me a straw hat, which was very acceptable, as I had nothing to screen my head from the scorching sun. I went across the street on to an eminence, to see if I could discover any signs of the "Sally" and her captors; not one of them was to be seen. I learned afterwards, that after getting the "Sally" afloat, the refugees violated their promise to liberate the crew, confined them in a prison ship in New York, where nearly all of them died.

"As I stood upon the hill looking for my lost comrades, my feelings can be better imagined than described. It was a beautiful morning, about wheat harvest, the level fields covered with grain as far as the eye could reach, the birds singing, the quails whistling, and all nature seemed joyous; I alone was miserable, enfeebled by my long sickness, without friends or money, far from home, my shipmates all gone, despair overcame me, and I burst into Recovering my spirits after a while, I returned to the tears. village; the landlady gave me a bowl of bread and milk, the first food I had tasted since leaving the ship. The pilot who brought us ashore took me with him to Cape May, where was his home, and brought me to the Pilots' hotel, kept by Mr. Buck, making known to him my circumstances. Mr. Buck welcomed me with much kindness, telling me to stay with him till I was fully recovered. I remained with him nearly three weeks, and being now quite well again, I determined to return to Philadelphia. On taking leave of Mr. Buck and his family, I expressed my fears that I might never be able to make him any return for his kindness and attention to me. He replied, "You may yet become a useful member of society, if you do, and you meet a person in distress, relieve him, and in that way you will recompense me." Some months afterwards I bought in St. Thomas, a set of China, as a present for Mrs. Buck. I sent it by one of our crew, who proved to be a thief, and never delivered it. While in Philadelphia I agreed to go with Capt. Mathews in his market boat, and made three trips with him. When being fully recovered in health, I shipped in Brig Joanna for St. Thomas, for \$40 the run. After a short passage, we arrived at St. Thomas. Our return cargo was salt; each of the crew had the privilege of 4 bags (8 bushels) to be sold for their benefit in Philadelphia. After a passage of six or seven weeks we reached Philadelphia, and on discharging the cargo my bags of salt were missing. This was a serious loss to me, as it cost little, and then sold for four dollars a bushel. I afterwards learned that the same rascal to whom I entrusted the set of China for Mrs. Buck, had stolen my bags of salt, and sold them in the night. I received the wages for my last voyage, deducting the physician's bill at St. Thomas, and after a few days shipped on a brig for Havana. With what I had saved and a month's advance, I laid out \$40 for flour, cheese, and apples, on my own account. In 15 days we anchored in Havana. Our cargo was in great demand; flour \$20 per barrel, cheese 75 cents a pound, and other articles in proportion. I bought from a boat having such articles for sale, a powder-horn made in the "Moro Castle," on which was a representation of the Spanish Crown, the Castle, and vessels going in and out of the harbor of Havana, which I gave to my grand-daughter, Mary Josephine Bulkeley, in 1841, having owned it myself sixty years. We sailed from Havana, and on the 20th of February, after an absence of three months, arrived in Philadelphia. On settling up my voyage I found myself in possession of over \$100. After providing myself with necessary clothing, still having \$80 in silver, I turned my thoughts home-At Kings Ferry, fifty miles above New York, on my wards. way home, I met an old acquaintance, Gershom Bulkeley, whom I accompanied to Mill River, arriving at home on the first of April, after an absence of a year. Remaining two weeks at home, I went to Boston with Capt. Peters. discharged cargo, and returned to Middletown, when I took my discharge, and walked to Black Rock in one day. Through the summer of 1781, I was engaged on a small Brig owned by the inhabitants of "Mill River."

"Early in 1782, I went with Capt. Stephen Thorp to Rhode Island, and continued in the same vessel through the summer. In the autumn I visited my uncle Moses Bulkeley, who lived back in the country, and bought of him the land on which I now live, (1841,) for fifty dollars. In December I joined one of the boats from Fairfield, in a projected expedition to take some British forts on Long Island. From this time until peace was declared in the following spring, I was engaged in no affair of particular moment.

"In April, 1783, news of peace arrived, which caused great rejoicing. Everybody was anxious to visit New York, which had been in possession of the enemy seven years. I went in April. While there, I engaged to go to New Providence in a small sloop owned by George Brown. We arrived safely in New Providence, disposed of our cargo, took in a return cargo, and started again for New York. I was now put in charge of the sloop, and sailed for Nova Scotia, taking with me Capt. Brown and wife, and a number of his friends. A part of my passengers, and himself and wife landed at Granville, and put up temporary houses. Afterward Capt. Brown laid out a town at Beaver's Harbor, and urged me to take a lot. I declined at first, but he insisting, I accepted one, and gave James Tucker a power of attorney with ten dollars to take care of it for me, but I never went there again to claim it. In September we sailed for Boston, remained there a few days, and in October sailed again for Nova Scotia. Here the sloop was laid up for the winter, but thinking it would not do to be idle long, I made a voyage to Boston, returning to Nova Scotia in 1784, the beginning of the year. I remained three months, visiting the families I had brought here. May following made a voyage to Boston, and in July one to New York. In August, after a monthly visit in the Bay, I sailed again for New York, taking with me Capt. Brown and his family, who had sold out in Nova Scotia. We arrived in October. We sailed the same month for Jamaica; a few days out experienced severe weather. Coming up with Turks Island, as I was asleep in the cabin, I dreamed that I saw land and reefs of rocks ahead. Waking suddenly, visibly impressed with my dream, I hurried on deck, and found the vessel running directly for the land and reefs just as they had appeared in my dream. She would undoubtedly have run ashore in a few minutes had I not in this singular manner been warned of our

dauger. Arriving safely at Kingston, we discharged our cargo in three weeks, and in November cleared for New York, arriving there the 5th of January, 1785. On settling with the owners for my services there was due me for the last nineteen months \$200. which Capt. Brown paid me in gold, one of which pieces I have always retained. I now returned home, where I remained six weeks, but not contented to remain longer idle, I engaged as mate with Capt. Joseph Bartram, and made a voyage in a sloop to North Carolina; returned home in April. I was now solicited by Miah Perry to take part of a vessel with him, which I concluded to do. On one occasion, when Mr. Perry and I were in Marblehead with a cargo of flax, we were swindled out of about \$100 worth of it by one whom we thought would help us sell it. We felt quite sore at our loss, as it was the commencement of our coasting business. I continued in the same business during the summer of 1785, between Mill River, New York, and New Haven. In the autumn of this year I was married to Mary Ogden, daughter of Jonathan Ogden, who died in 1775, when she was only five years old. He would often call her to him and say, 'My poor Polly, what will become of you?'

"In the spring of 1786 I built a house, which is still standing near where I now live. In the autumn Mr. Perry and I dissolved all further connection in the way of business. Unaccustomed to idle habits, I went as mate in a brig to Point Peter, about sixty miles from Cape Francis. We lay here three months, returning to Black Rock in April, 1787. In the spring of this year I bought out Miah Perry's part of the sloop, and continued in the coasting trade the next year; sold out soon after, and bought part of another vessel. Continuing this business for a time I increased my vessel property as means would allow, and as my sons grew up placed them in business with myself, and so have continued, father and sons being equally united."

Thus originated the shipping firm of E. Bulkeley & Sons, of New York, which has continued from that date (1788) until the present time—nearly a century. IIe died February 5, 1843, and for his benevolence and goodness of heart those can testify who knew him best. His mind was ever active. As a patriot and republican of the "old school" he took a lively interest in the perpetuity and welfare of his country, the independence of which he had in some small measure contributed to establish. After the close of the war he was actively engaged in commercial business with his sons until his death.

# APPENDIX.

## THE LIFE OF REV. PETER BULKLY.

BY THE REV. COTTON MATHER, D. D., F. R. S.

#### Ipse Aspectus Boni viri delectat .- Sen.\*

§ 1. It has been a matter of some reflection that among the pretended successors of Saint Peter there never was any Pope that would pretend unto the name of Peter; but if any of them had been christened by that name at the font, they afterwards changed it when they came unto the chair. No doubt, as Raphael Urbine, the famous painter, being taxed for making the face in the picture of Peter too red, replied, He did it on purpose, that he might represent the apostle blushing in heaven to see what successors he had on *earth*: so these infamous apostates might blush to hear themselves called Peter, while they are conscious unto themselves of their being strangers to all the vertues of that great apostle. But the denomination of Peter might be with an everlasting agreeableness claimed by our eminent Bulkly, who, according to the spirit and counsel of Peter, "fed the flock of God among us, taking the oversight thereof not by constraint, but willingly; not for filthy lucre, but of a willing mind."

§ 2. He was descended of an honourable family in Bedfordshire, where for many successive generations the names of Edward and Peter were alternatively worn by the heirs of the family. His father was Edward Bulkly, D. D., a faithful minister of the gospel; the same whom we find making a supplement unto the last volume of our books of martyrs. He was born at Woodhil, (or Odel,) in Bedfordshire, January 31st, 1582.

His education was answerable unto his original; it was learned, it was genteel, and, which was the top of all, it was very *pious*: at length it made him a Batchellor of Divinity, and Fellow of Saint John's Colledge in Cambridge, the colledge whereinto he had been admitted about the sixteenth year of his age; and it was while he was but a *junior batchellor* that he was chosen a fellow.

§ 3. When he came abroad in the world a good benefice befel him, added unto the estate of a gentleman, left him by his father, whom he succeeded in his ministry at the place of his nativity, which one would imagine *temptations* enough to keep him out of a *wilderness*.

Nevertheless, the concern which his renewed soul had for the pure worship of our Lord Jesus Christ, and for the planting of evangelical churches to exercise that worship, caused him to leave and sell all, in hopes of gaining the "pearl of great price" among those that first peopled New-England upon those glorious ends. It was not long that he continued in conformity to the ceremonies of the church of England; but the good Bishop of Lincoln connived at his non-conformity, (as he did at his father's,) and he lived an unmolested non-conformist until he had been three prentice-ships of years in his ministry. Towards the latter end of this time his ministry had a notable success in the conversion of many unto God; and this was one occasion of a latter end for this time. When Sir Nathanael Brent was Arch-Bishop Laud's General, as Arch-Bishop Laud was another's, complaints were made against Mr. Bulkly for his non-conformity, and he was therefore silenced.

§ 4. To New-England he therefore came, in the year 1635; and there having been for a while at Cambridge, he carried a good number of planters with him, up further into the *woods*, where they gathered the *twel/th church* then formed in the colony, and called the town by the name of Concord.

Here he *buried* a great estate, while he *raised* one still for almost every person whom he employed in the affairs of his husbandry. He had many and godly servants, whom, after they had lived with him a fit number of years, he still dismissed with bestowing *farms* upon them, and so took others after the like manner, to succeed them in *their* service and *his* kindness. Thus he cast his bread both upon the waters and into the earth, not expecting the return of this his charity to a religious plantation until "after many days."

- § 5. He was a most excellent scholar, a very well-read person, and one who, in his advice to young students, gave demonstrations

that he knew what would go to make a scholar. But it being essential unto a *scholar* to love a scholar, so did he; and in token thereof endowed the library of Harvard-Colledge with no small part of his own.

And he was therewithal a most exalted Christian, full of those devotions which accompany a "conversation in heaven;" especially, so exact a Sabbath-keeper, that if at any time he had been asked "whether he had strictly kept the Sabbath?" he would have replied, "Christianus sum, intermittere non possum."\* And conscientious, even to a degree of scrupulosity. That scrupulosity appeared particularly in his avoiding all novelties of apparel, and the cutting of hair so close, that of all the famous namesakes he had in the world, he could have least born the sir-name of that well known author, Petrus Crinitus.<sup>†</sup>

§ 6. It was observed that his neighbours hardly ever came into his company, but whatever *business* he had been talking of, he would let fall some holy, serious, divine, and useful sentences upon them, ere they parted: an example many ways worthy to be imitated by every one that is called a minister of the gospel.

In his ministry he was another FAREL, Quo Nemo tonuit fortius.<sup>‡</sup> He was very laborious, and because he was, through some infirmities of body, not so able to visit his flock, and instruct them from house to house, he added unto his other publick labours on the Lord's days, that of constant catechising; wherein, after all the unmarried people had answered, all the people of the whole assembly were edified by his expositions and applications.

His first sermon was on Rom. i. 16: "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ." At Odel he preached on part of the prophecy of Isaiah, and part of Jonah, and a great part of the gospel of Matthew, and of Luke, the Epistles to the Philippians, and of Peter, and of Jude, besides many other scriptures. At Concord he preached over the illustrious truths about the *person*, the *natures*, the *affices of Christ*; [what would he have said if he had lived unto this evil day, when 'tis counted good advice for a minister of the gospel "not to preach much on the person of Christ?"] the greatest part of the book of Psalms; the conversion of Zacheus; Paul's commission, in Acts xxvi. 18. His death found him handling the

commandments, and John xvi. 7, 8, 9. He expounded Mr. Perkins his six principles, whereto he added a seventh, and examined the young people, what they understood and remembered of his exposition.

Moreover, by a sort of winning, and yet prudent *familiarity*, he drew persons of all ages in his congregation to *come* and sit with him when he could not go and sit with them; whereby he had opportunity to do the part of a faithful pastor in considering the *state of his flock*.

Such was his pious conduct that he was had much in reverence by his people; and when at any time he was either *hasty* in *speaking* to such as were about him, whereto he was disposed by his bodily pains, or *severe* in *preaching* against some things that others thought were no way momentous, whereto the great exactness of his piety inclined him; yet those little *stinginesses* took not away the interests which he had in their hearts; they "knowing him to be a just man, and an holy, observed him."

And the observance which his own people had for him was also paid him from all sorts of people throughout the land; but especially from the ministers of the country, who would still address him as a father, a prophet, a counsellor, on all occasions.

§ 8. Upon his importunate pressing a piece of charity, disagreeable to the will of the ruling elder, there was occasioned an unhappy discord in the church of Concord; which yet was at last healed by their calling in the help of a council, and the ruling elder's abdication. Of the temptations which occurred on these occasions, Mr. Bulkly would say, "He thereby came—1, To know more of God; 2, To know more of himself; 3, To know more of men." Peace being thus restored, the small things in the beginning of the church there increased in the hands of their faithful Bulkly, until he was translated into the regions which afford nothing but concord and glory, leaving his well-fed "flock in the wilderness" unto the pastoral care of his worthy son, Mr. Edward Bulkly.

§ 9. It is remarked that a man's whole religion is according to his acquaintance with the new covenant. If, then, any person would know what Mr. Peter Bulkly was, let him read his judicious and savoury treatise of the gospel covenant, which has passed through several editions with much acceptance among the people of God. Quickly after his first coming into this country he preached many sermons on Zech. ix. 11: "The blood of thy covenant." The importunity of his congregation prevailed with him to preach this

doctrine of the covenant over again in his lectures, and fit it for the press. He did accordingly; and of that book the well known Mr. Shepard, of Cambridge, has given this testimony: "The church of God is bound to bless God for the holy, judicious and learned labours of this aged, experienced, and precious servant of Jesus Christ, who hath taken much pains to discover, and that not in words and allegories, but in the demonstration and evidence of the spirit, the great mystery of godliness wrapt up in the *covenant*; and hath now fully opened many knotty questions concerning the same, which happily have not been brought so full to light until now, which cannot but be of singular and seasonable use to prevent apostasies from the simplicity of the covenant and gospel of Christ."

§ 10. Having offered this particular account of a *book* which is to be reckoned among the *first-born* of New-England, I may not forbear doing my country the service of extracting from it one paragraph, which we may reckon the dying charge of a Moses to an Israel in a wilderness:

"And thou, New-England, which art exalted in priviledges of the gospel above many other people, know thou the 'time of thy visitation,' and consider the great things the Lord hath done for thee. The gospel hath *free passage* in all places where thou dwellest; Oh! that it might be *glorified* also by thee! Thou enjoyest many faithful witnesses, which have testified unto thee the gospel of the grace of God. 'Thou hast many bright stars shining in thy firmament, to give thee the 'knowledge of salvation from on high, to guide thy feet in the way of peace.' Be not *high-minded* because of thy priviledges, but *fear* because of thy danger. The more thou hast committed unto thee, the more thou must account for. No people's account will be heavier than thine, if thou do not walk worthy of the means of thy salvation. The Lord looks for more from thee than from other people—more zeal for God, more *lowe* to his truth, more *justice* and equity in thy ways. Thou shouldest be a *special* people, an only people, none like thee in all the earth. Oh! be so, in loving the gospel, and the ministers of it, having them in 'singular love for their work's sake.'

"Glorifie thou the word of the Lord, which has glorified thee. Take heed, least for neglect of either, God 'remove thy candlestick' out of the midst of thee; lest being now 'as a city upon an hill, which many seek unto, thou be left 'like a beacon upon the top of a mountain,' desolate and forsuken. If we walk unworthy of the gospel brought unto us, the greater our *mercy* hath been in the enjoying of it, the greater will our *judgment* be for the contempt."

§ 11. His first wife was the daughter of Mr. Thomas Allen, of Goldington, a most vertuous gentlewoman, whose nephew was the Lord Mayor of London, Sir Thomas Allen. By her he had nine sons and two daughters. After her death he lived eight years a widdower, and then married a vertuous daughter of Sir Richard Chitwood, by whom he had three sons and one daughter. Age at length creeping on him, he grew much afraid of out-living his work; and his fear he thus expressed in a short epigram, composed March 25, 1657:

Pigra senectutis jam venit inutilis ætas, Nil aliud nunc sum quam fere pondus iners.
Da tamen, Alme Deus, dum vivam, vivere laudi Æternum sancti Nominis usque Tui.
Ne vivam (moriar potius !) nil utile Agendo: Finiat opto magis, mors properata Dies.
Vel doceam in Sancto Cætu tua verba salutis, Cælestive canam Cantica sacra Choro;
Seu vivam, moriarve, tuus sim, Christe, quod uni Debit mea est, debita morsque tibi.\*

He was *ill* as well as *old* when he writ these verses, but God granted him his desire. He recovered, and preached near two years after this, and then expired, March 9, 1658-9, in the seventy-seventh year of his age.

§ 12. The epigram newly mentioned invites me to remember that he had a competently good stroke at Latin poetry, and even in his old age affected sometimes to improve it. Many of his composures are yet in our hands. One was written on his *Birth-day*, June 31st, 1654:

> Ultimus iste Dies Mensis, mihi primus habetur; Quo cæpi lucem cernere primus crat. Septuaginta duos Annos exindè peregi. Atque tot Annorum est Ultimus iste Dies. Præterito Veteri jum nunc novus incipit Annus O utinam mihi sit mens nova, vita nova.†

\* I've reached the evening of my mortal day; A sluggish mass of clay is this my frame; Yet grant, O Gop, that while I live, I may Live to the glory of Thy holy name. And if in life I may not honour Thee, From such dishonour may Death set me free. Whether within Thy holy courts below I preach salvation unto dying men-Or in Thine Upper Temple, with the flow Of angel-quirings blend my raptured strain-Living or dying, Thine I still would be: My life and death alike are due to Thee. † This last day of the month is first to me, For with it dawning life began to be. Nor have its mild returns been slow or few: Of seventy-two long years this is the last; A new year now begins, the old year passed; Oh may my heart and life he also new!

Another of them was written on an earthquake, October 29, 1653:

Ecce Dei nutu tellus pavefacta tremescit,

Terra Tremens mota est sedibus ipsa suis, Nutant Fulcra Orbis, mundi compago saluta est; Ex vultu irati contremit ille Dei. Contremuit tellus, imis concussa Cavernis, Ponderibus quanquam sit gravis illa suis. Evomit ore putres magno cum murmure ventos, Quos in visceribus clauserat ante suis. Ipsa tremit Tellus scelerum gravitate vivorum, Sub sceleris nostri pondere Terra tremit. O nos quam duri! Sunt ferrea pectora nobis; Non etenim geminus cum gemit omne solum. Quis te non metuit, metuit quem Fabrica munda Quemque timent cæli, terraque tota tremit. Motibus á Tantis nunc tandem terra quiescat,

Sed cessent potius crimina nostra precor.\*

The rest we will bury with him, under this

Obiit jam qui jamdudum abierat *Bulklæus;* Nec Patriam ille mutavit, nec pæne vitam; Eð ivit, quð ire consueverat, et ubi jam erat.†

\* The solid earth, before an angry God, Shakes at the terrors of His awful nod. The balance of the mighty world is lost-Its vast foundations, in confusion toss'd, Through all the hollows of its deepest caves Rock like a vessel foundering in the waves. Volumes of sulphurous air, with booming sound, Burst through the gorges of the parted ground. The earth doth heave with groanings of distress, Beneath the weight of human sinfulness. Shall not our eyes drop penitential rain, When all creation travaileth in pain? GREAT GOD! who shall not fear Thee in the hour When heaven and earth are trembling at thy power! FATHER, to nature's tumult whisper peace, And bid the wickedness of man to cease!

† BULKLY hath left us for a happier shore— Nay, rather lingers where he was before. He ne'er hath slept beneath this humble sod, For both in life and death he was with Gop.
