SOURCE DATA

Martha Arabella Ashbaugh was born 7 September, 1845, in Buchanan County, Missouri, to James Hervey Ashbaugh and wife Margaret Beard Weller. She was married 13 July, 1884, in Montgomery County, Kansas, to Garland Hubbard Watson. There were no children born to this marriage, and during the last years of the 1800's and early 1900's, she devoted much time to travel and correspondence with relatives developing a genealogy of certain Kentucky families who were her ancestors. She died 14 April, 1917, at Freeman, Cass Co., Mo.

Mrs. Watson left two principal manuscripts, a "Workbook" which was a permanently stitched ruled notebook in which she had copied Family Bibles which she examined on visits to Kentucky, etc., and into which she also interspersed notes giving more recent family history, and another notebook which was essentially narrative, and bearing a date on its first page:- "Sunday, Jan. 25, 1903 1:54 PM."

Afte: her death these papers passed to the family of Mr. James Argo, who in 1939 kindly loaned them to the "editor" and permitted a copy to be made. Correspondence addressed to the Argo Family in Montgomery County, Kansas, during the 1950's returned unclaimed and undeliverable so that information as to the present whereabouts of the original manuscripts cannot be learned.

GENEALOGICAL BACKGROUND

In the late summer of 1738, the <u>Winter Galley</u>, a small sailing ship, came out of Rotterdam and arrived at the Port of Philadelphia on September 5th. Imong the passengers was <u>JOHIAN HEINRICH ESCHERCH</u>, inscribed on the list of "Palatines and others" imported on the vessel; on that same day he took the oath of allegience which was demanded of all non-British coming to the Colony. By the mid 1740's he was established with his family in York County, Penna., near present Littlestown, Mt. Joy Township, Adams County. Shortly before the outbreak of the Revolution he became one of the first settlers of Huntingdon County (then Bedford County) Penna., and died there in 1789. We do not know if his children and wife were with him on the 1738 voyage, or whether they were brought over shortly later.

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Johann Heinrich Eschbach later used the name "Henry Ashbaugh". His wife, maiden surname unknown, was ^Haria Elisabetha, who died at Huntingdon 1792. Johann Heinrich and Maria Elisabetha Ashbaugh's family included:-

John Ashbaugh - b. ca. 1740-44

Raised family in Huntingdon Co., Pa. and in 1799 moved to Fairfield County, Ohio. Wife Catharina

Andrew Ashbaugh - b. ca. 1740; died Adams Co., Pa. 1814

Raised family and remained until his death on home farm or "plantation" adjoining the Johann Heinrich property. Wife Maria Artemesia .

FREDERICK ASHBAUGH, Mrs. Watson's ancestor.

Ages of children indicate he was the youngest son in family. Born about 1748, Mt.Joy Township. Married about 1770-71 SOPHIA SELLS, daughter of Anthony and Catharina Sells of Mt. Joy Area. About 1776 he removed to Huntingdon, buying one of the first lots to be sold in the new town. Shortly thereafter he settled in Hagerstown, Maryland, establishing a pottery very close to the original courthouse. He also owned a homestead on the outskirts of the original town, but now within the city limits. In the winter of 1799 he sold His Hagerstown properties to Lysinger and Bell (the latter later established the famous old "Sheanadoah Potteries" and in some manner this family was related to the Ashbaughs. Frederick and Sophia moved in 1799 to a pottery site just outside present Ft. Erie, Ontario, Canada, taking a land grant from the British king. Catharine died before her husband wrote his will on 20 Jan., 1818; the will was entered for probate in Bertie Township, County Lincoln, Ontario, on 15 December, 1818.

Sarah Smith - Named in father's will, and found as a widow with 2 young females under 10 at 1800 census of Huntingdon.

Margaret - Married Solomon Sells and moved with him and a large family, all born at Huntington, to present Mashington County, Virginia.

The son of the above Frederick Ashbaugh (of whom Mrs. Watson in a letter to relatives said ""Frederick came to Maryland some time in Eighteen Hundred. Have no record of who he married.") who heads this branch of this Ashbaugh family was ANDREW ASHBLUGH- born in Mt. Joy area of Adams Co., Pa.

Similarly, the WELLERS, SHIELDS, FRIORS, HAHNS, etc. were settled in the area along the disputed Maryland/Pennsylvania border. The LaRUE family, originally from New Jersey, had settled by 1743 in present Clarke Co., Va. and is source of the name of LaRue County, Sentucky.

Part I - The "Memoirs"

the following are extracts only. Original language and spelling preserved.

I don't care to write an autobiography in the Hsual sense. I don't want to tell about myself so much as the conditions through which I havecome up to date. All this western life has been so evansecent yet so immense. The growth will be so huge and so permanent and the commencement was so quiet and unassuming that a hundred years from now it will be almost impossible to make anyone realize what the life in the log cabin was, or that there were **Beally ever any log cabins ---** the day is as past now as it can ever be but in us who go back to the first half of the 19th century the memory lingers.

My parents were Kentuckians, cousins, born near Bardstown. I think my paternal grandfather's farm lay to the limits of the town as it was 100 years ago. So it may be overgrown by the town now. My grandfathers were Marylanders, from near Hagerstown. My maternal grandfather German, and his father was noted as owning and driving the finest six-horse team that went freighting into Baltimore. It was possibly one of those fine horses that killed him. A slave, a negro man, reported that a certain high spirited horse refused to be ridden down the bluffy hillside to water, and the master said that he could ride it down and it threw him on a ledge or step of rock and as he was very fleshy it killed him. That is one of the few legends come down from way back and he may have been great-great instead of merely the great-grandfather.

Also one of those Maryland ancestors it has come down that his wife having been long andhopelessly sick, he applied to his church for permission to marry another woman. It was refusedbut he did marry the other woman, it was told me, the third day after the death of the first. But I come from the wife that died. The other is long gone and one no more remembered than the other.

And one man wanted to join the patriot army during the Revolution and had not suitable clothes and the women carded, spun, and wove and made a suit of clothes for him all in a day and night. It was said that the warp was in the loom and as soon as enough cloth was woven to cut a part of a garment it was cut off and the sewing women worked on it. So, early in the morning 24 hours after the resolution to go, he went with his squad clothed in his new jeans. Bit I don't know whether that would make me a daughter or a niece of the Revolution.

My Paternal great grandfather was a dutchman from Amsterdam, come to the United States by way of Canada in 1740. He married and settled near Hagerstown. He was from (in some remote past) a Hungarian family andit may be that to the Magyar blood we owe the restlessness that still crops up in our family and makes us still in spirit "dwellers in tents." The Aungarian ancestor got into political trouble and had to seek a safer place.

Mother's father and two of his brothers were in the War of 1812. The brothers were with Jackson at New Orleans and it was always told us on their authority that cotton bales were used to fortify with. The ohly Kentuckian killed fell against one of these uncles -- he had no change of clothes and he wore his bloodstained clothes home and scared his Mother who when she saw him thought he had been wounded. Mother's father was told off to the relief of Detroit and suffered untold with cold and privations, but Detroit had already surrendered, and the Kentuckians had a good savage grievance to pet and keep them hot all the rest of their lives. (I knew one of them who in 1864 told me, he leaning on his hoe and I on a rail fence, about how the Kentuckians were too late at Detroit and the old man shock with rage and almost cried that [was it Wilkinson, the man who surrendered Detroit?] wasn't hung. The old man's name was William Sutton, then of Buchanan County, Missouri.)

My grandfathers, through father's father, was a potter.

The men raised hogs and grain and the women made cloth and every year for 16 years they sent or mother's father took a flat boat and cargo load of produce down "The River", oftenest to New Orleans but also to Natchez. At their journey's end they sold boat and cargo for coin (gold) and walked back through the wilderness in constant dread of the robbers that infested the wild unsettled world between the Gulf and the civilization in Kentucky. The only wonder is that any man or money reported at the home end of the journey. But he was never molested that I heard of. Beside the jeans (twilled goods) (woolen) and the linsel (plain woven, both with cotton warp) the women wove tow "sacking". The tow was the coarse flax fiber too coarse for the making of household linen or cloth to wear. The tow sacking was coarse and open and sold for baling cotton. Also dried fruit helped load the flat boats and "piroques" that carried the really great river commerce of those days, which was much greater then than we realize now and from the making of the boat in the neighborhood "boat yard" to the delivery of the goods to the merchant in New Orleans or Natchez kept the ancestors of a hundred years of both sexes pretty busy.

Mother's father belonged to the good old school that looked upon the woman as the weaker vessel, and to keep her weak she was not to be much educated nor in a property division should she be allowed to share equally with her brothers. Mother could read and write and to the end of her 73 years nefter forgave her teacher "Mr. Prewitt" for his truly old Presbyterian inflexible hardness to his pupils. No sympathy there -- "If of such is the Kingdom of Heaven!"

Mother told me some old English man who get drunk and one night lay down in the street and a historically big storm came and snow fell and when the neighbors missed him and hunted for him there was a little hole through the snow to the outer air, to show where he was, and when they dug down to him he was quite snug in the snow and asleep. Once when drunk he looked at a church and said, "Fire, Fire will come down from Heaven and destroy you!" ind it did, as it was destroyed by lightning. One Christmas Eve, he was drunk as usual, and gave vent to his homesickness thus:- "I wish I was hin hold Hingland tonight, a ringin' the tenor Bell!" He had been a bell ringer.

Mother's brothers wanted to go to shooting matches, and their parents opposed it, and there were many amusing tales told of how the older ones, Uncle Jim and Uncle Will, would manage to go to the scandal of the parents. Uncle Jim told me that if there had been only 2 or 2½ years between their ages they would have taken LaRue County.

In 1843, Father and Uncle Jim went to Platte Purchase, Missouri, to look out a new home. The place they selected was in Buchanan County, about 14 miles south of St. Joseph. The country had been settled 8 years, and all the land was deeded. A hilly country and timbered but no stone, not a pebble, only the moraine pebbles in the creeks left there when the icebergs had thawed. Every pebble was truly a pebble, ground smooth --- polished with the ages of milling. The timber was chiefly black oak, walnuts, shell bark, and pig nut hickories, iron wood, coffee bean, honey locust, redwater and s slippery elw, sycamore, linn, crabapple, and others that I cannot now think of. These grew tall, and the underbrush was paw paw and in the summer time there was not even flecks of sunshine on the ground. The roof was continuous. No grass grew in the timber. Then white people first went there the ground was covered with nettles and they were nearly all gone before my day. It was the custom to refer to the first settlers as "those who helped tramp out the nett.es." The creeks were very deep ravines with just a small stream at the mottom. In the 58 years since the time of their going there, the soil has washed off 'til other gravels show, and the creeks have cut down to immense beds of limestone.

Thile I taught at Sherwood Henry^[1] came to take me home on Friday - Horseback. It had been raining floods on floods, and we came to Bee Creek Bridge, (Clowser's) it was still standing, but had been obstructed but Henry insisted that he had crossed many worse bridges when in the army in South Missouri so he opened the way and rode over. We had not gone half a quarter when we heard the splash of its fall into the raging creek, to which we would have been no more than straws. -- Oh, what fools these (we) mortals be. But he had very feelingly told me just as soon as we were safe over, that, really, he never had, in South Missouri or anywhere else crossed any such bridge.

> [1] Her cousin Henry Harrison Ashbaugh of Pike County, Mo., son of her father's brother Andrew Ashbaugh andwife Margaret McMillan. The incident was in 1865 when Henry was 24 years old.

Part II - The "Workbook"

The following copied in full and verbatim. The inflexibility of the sewn-in pages of the original notebook made it necessary for Mrs. Watson to carry some entries over past previously-commenced notations. The sequence of each such portion has been restored in the transcript following. One group of records, apparently in a different hand and recording events after Mrs. Watson's death, will be found identified by brackets.

Is said that he was a dandy - - he was, for that day.

In 1850, Christmas Day, Uncle and Miss Mary Ann Mark were married --- Father with dignity performed the ceremony.

Uncle Jim married Mrs. Emily Pleanor Hill, nee White, in August, after Aunt Mary died in October. The new Aunt was a beautiful widow of about 34 with a small bad boy, In the course of time three more children came. - 1d]

Mrs. Matson's papers did not identify the father of Rachel Milkins, first wife of Andrew (1774-1823) Ashbaugh. He is identified as John Milkins in the Marriage Bond at Nelson County, Ky., in which the marriage date for Andrew and Rachel is recorded as 16 r ther than 14 June, 1796.

In her "Memoirs" Mrs. Watson spoke of a daughter of John Wilkins as follows: "A sister of Grandfather Ashbaugh's first wife who never married and always lived at Grandfathers, and died age 96. She was very fleshy."
